

Hon. SMITH ELY, Jr., Mayor and Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—To meet the constantly growing demand for Croton water, it has been necessary to increase the volume of water passing through the Aqueduct, and to enable it to bear the additional strain the structure has to be strengthened in many places by additional masonry and embankment. In my estimate for the year 1878, I called attention to the necessity of making provision for this extra work, and asked for an appropriation of \$115,000 for "Aqueduct—Repairs and Maintenance," but the appropriation was fixed at \$100,000.

The Department has already done considerable work in strengthening the Aqueduct, but much remains yet to be done to render all the weak places perfectly secure.

The frequent breaks in the six-foot pipes in Ninetieth street and Eighth avenue, laid in 1866-67, in place of the Masonry Aqueduct, have also been a source of extra expense. The repairs made upon them this year have already cost about \$9,000, and are not yet finished.

An addition to the appropriation for "Aqueduct—Repairs and Maintenance" is therefore absolutely necessary, and I have to request that the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) be transferred to it from the appropriation for "Lamps and Gas" for 1878, for which the said sum is not needed.
