

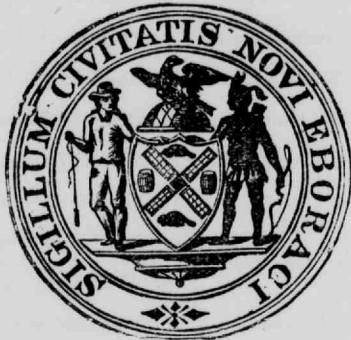

The time for filing the notices provided for in section two of the act, chapter five hundred and fifty of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, entitled "An act relating to certain assessments for local improvements in the city of New York," is hereby extended until the first day of November, eighteen hundred and eighty-two, and the time for the submission of evidence to said commissioners is hereby extended until the first day of November, eighteen hundred and eighty-three, and the time within which said commissioners shall make and render decisions in any cases is hereby extended until the first day of February, eighteen hundred and eighty-four. Provided, however, that in all cases brought before said commissioners by notices filed under this section, interest upon the amounts fixed in the certificates to be filed, as provided in section six of said act, shall be charged from the respective dates of the certificates which may have been first filed, in respect of any assessment for the same local improvement.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the counsel to the corporation of the said city to designate counsel to represent the city before the said commissioners in the matters aforesaid. The comptroller may provide the money to pay the expenses of such proceedings, including compensation to said counsel, by the issue of revenue bonds of the said city, and an amount sufficient to cover such expenses and to pay such bonds shall be included in the final estimates for said city for the years eighteen hundred and eighty-three and eighteen hundred and eighty-four.

Sec. 3. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

Hon. JAMES S. COLEMAN, Commissioner of Street Cleaning:

SIR—On the 30th of June last I received from the Secretary of the Dock Department a communication dated on that day, requesting my opinion as to the powers and duties of the Dock Department in respect to the dumping board located on Pier 12, East river. It was stated in this letter that the assignment and designation of said pier to be used as a dump was made by resolution of the Board governing that department, on your application, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 367 of the Laws of 1881, which the Board believes to be mandatory. It was further stated that the alleged owners of the half of said pier had presented a protest against the continuance of the dumping board at that place, as an infringement upon their legal rights, and had requested the Board to rescind and annul their former action designating said pier for a dump, and to cause the same to be restored to its proper use for commercial purposes.

After the receipt of this letter I was waited upon by Mr. Simon Stevens, attorney for David Whipple, representing the owners of one-half of said pier, and was furnished by him with the names of the persons who claim to own said pier jointly with the city, and I caused an examination to be made as to the nature of the title of the city, and of such persons, to said pier. I ascertained that the pier was originally built about the year 1809, the city contributing one-third, and the owners of property fronting on South street two-thirds of the expense, and that thereupon the city became entitled to receive, and, as I am informed, did receive, one-half the wharfage accruing at the pier. Recently the pier has been rebuilt, at an expense of nearly \$24,000, the city paying one-half and the private owners the other half.

I do not consider it necessary or expedient at the present time for me to attempt to decide precisely what are the legal rights of the city and of such individuals in this pier. It is evident that the city and such individuals are the joint owners of the pier; but precisely what the nature of that ownership is, and precisely what the respective rights of all parties concerned are, is a question not entirely free from difficulty. It is alleged, however, that the use of the westerly side of the pier as a dump causes great injury to the other owners, by preventing vessels from coming to the opposite side of the pier, which would come if the dump were not there, and also causes an injury to their property on the westerly side of South street. It is also alleged that the placing of the barricade running through the centre of the pier, and thus fencing off the portion used by the Street Cleaning Department, seriously interferes with the use of the other side for commercial purposes, because, the pier not being a very wide one, the upper side cannot be used advantageously for commercial purposes unless carts and vehicles can pass down the centre of the pier, which they cannot do so long as such barricade is maintained.

Under these circumstances, referring to the conversation had with you in reference to the matter by my assistant, Mr. Andrews, if you are of the opinion that the claim set up by the private owners that they are injured by the use of the westerly half of the pier as a dump, is well founded as matter of fact, without undertaking at present to decide as to the precise legal rights of the City and private individuals in said pier, I respectfully recommend that the matter should be amicably adjusted with such owners; and for this purpose I suggest that, with the consent, in writing, of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, you should accept a lease from such private owners, of the portion of the pier occupied by you, dating from the time when you began to occupy the westerly side as a dump, and fixing the rental in such lease at such sum as you would consider sufficient to compensate said owners. I enclose herewith a lease which has been prepared by Mr. Stephens and submitted to me, which, I think, is in proper form to accomplish such purpose, and which has been executed by Mr. Whipple on behalf of the private owners.

MY DEAR SIR—I am directed by my clients to name \$425 per month as the very low and reasonable rental they will expect for their interest in the westerly half of Pier 12, East river, to count from February 1, 1882, to October 1, 1882, eight months; equal to say a total of \$3,400, which in fact is equivalent to only part of the damages they have sustained directly on the pier by the action of your Department, without taking into account the damages they have sustained by loss and change of tenants in their properties on the westerly side of South street, Nos. 40, 41, 42, 43, 44, 45, 46, 47, 48.

However, by the terms of the lease transmitted to you by the Corporation Counsel, the amount of rental named will be in full of all damages to property of these private owners.

Whereas, The heirs and executors of the estate of Moses Taylor, deceased, the heirs and executors of the estate of John J. Taylor, deceased, and the heirs and executors of the estate of William Whitlock, Jr., deceased, and Mrs. Caroline Deering, William Hill, and Acton Civil, together with the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, are the joint owners of Pier 12, East river, near the foot of Old Slip, and are entitled by law to collect and receive the wharfage and slippage of said pier; and

Whereas, The Department of Street Cleaning of the City of New York required a pier for the use of the Commissioner as a dump suitable and sufficient for executing the duty imposed upon him by chapter 367 of the Laws of 1881; and

Whereas, The Department of Docks, supposing that it had the authority therefor, did, by a vote of its Board, on the request of the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, designate the westerly side of Pier 12, East river, to be set apart and designated for the use and purposes of said Department of Street Cleaning as a dump, without notice to the city's joint owners of said property.

Now, therefore, this agreement, made this day of August, eighteen hundred and eighty-two, by and between the heirs and Executors of the estate of Moses Taylor, deceased, the heirs and Executors of the estate of John J. Taylor, deceased, the heirs and Executors of the estate of William Whitlock, Jr., deceased, Mrs. Caroline Deering, William Hill and Acton Civil, parties of the first part, represented by David Whipple, their Agent and Wharfinger, and the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, acting by the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning of said city, party of the second part, with the approval in writing of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment,

Witnesseth: That the parties of the first part, by their Agent and Wharfinger, David Whipple, for and in consideration of the rents, covenants and agreements hereinafter mentioned, reserved and contained on the part of the party of the second part are to be paid, kept, done and performed, have granted, demised and to farm let, and these presents do grant, demise and to farm let all their interests in the westerly half of said Pier 12, and have granted and by these presents do grant, bargain, sell and assign to the said party of the second part for the term of eight months, commencing February first, eighteen hundred and eighty-two and ending September thirtieth, eighteen hundred and eighty-two, all and singular the wharfages which may arise, accrue or become due for the use and occupation of vessels of more than five tons burthen from the westerly side of said Pier 12, East river.

And the said parties of the first part, by David Whipple, their agent and wharfinger, hereby condone the action of said party of the second part who entered upon the said premises and erected a bridge and dumping board on the westerly half of said Pier 12, East river, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning, and authorize the continuance and holding the said bridge as now erected upon said joint property for the purposes aforesaid, for eight months counting from February 1, 1882, and continuing until September 30th, next ensuing, for the sum of hundred dollars lawful money of the United States of America, payable on the execution and delivery of these presents, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, and hereby release the party of the second part from all further damages, rent, claims or demands on account of the action of the said Dock Department and the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, in entering upon said premises, erecting such bridge or dumping board, occupying and using said premises since February 1, 1882.

And it is further agreed and stipulated that on or before the first day of October, 1882, or other

The Comptroller presented the following:

HEADQUARTERS—FIRE DEPARTMENT,  
NEW YORK, August 11, 1882.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—The number of fires in this city for the six months ending June 30, 1882, was 1,031, an increase of 15 per cent. over the average for 1881. On the night of July 14, 1882, there were three large fires below Canal street burning at the same time. The alarm was received for the first fire at 6.07 o'clock p.m., Station 7—a cotton warehouse, sixty feet high, five stories, 121 feet front on Whitehall street and the same on Stone street. The alarm was received for the second fire at 6.57 o'clock, p.m., from Station 38 (fifty minutes after first fire), and was at 243 and 245 Pearl, near John street, building sixty-five feet high, five stories, 50 feet front by 219 feet deep, running through to Cliff street. The alarm was received for third fire at 8.30, p.m., from Station 141, being a soap manufactory, with large quantities of grease and rosin stored therein; building was 125 feet front on Vestry street, 100 feet deep on Washington street, 108 feet high, nine stories. All said alarms were received within two hours and twenty-three minutes, making necessary the services of every Company located south of Fourteenth street, 32 in number; also five of the seven companies located between Fourteenth and Thirty-fourth streets; also five additional Companies located between Thirty-fourth and Seventieth streets; making a grand total of 42 Companies employed at these fires and out of quarters, there being 56 Companies only below One Hundred and Thirtieth street, and 65 Companies in the entire Department.

The increasing number of fires, and the condition of the fire-extinguishing force of the Department at midnight on July 14, 1882, 42 companies being employed, and the officers and men exhausted in the faithful discharge of their duties, again admonish us of the necessity of increasing the uniformed force of the Department; also its apparatus, hose, horses, etc.

The following will show the increase in territory, in values, and the increased duties imposed on the uniformed force without proper increase in men, apparatus, and appliances, since the organization of the Department.

In 1865, when the paid Fire Department was organized in this city, there were, south of Fifty-ninth street, in the volunteer department, forty-three (43) fire-engine companies, fifty-one (51) hose companies, and fourteen (14) hook and ladder companies, aggregating three thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine (3,889) men. In November, 1865, the volunteers, south of Fifty-ninth street, were disbanded, and thirty-four (34) steam fire-engine companies, and twelve (12) hook and ladder companies were organized in their stead, with twelve men to each company, aggregating five hundred and fifty-two (552) men. In August, 1882, the organization, south of Fifty-ninth street, is the same as it was in November, 1865, as to number of companies and aggregate number of men, except four additional men with the Water Tower.

Notwithstanding the Department has not increased south of Fifty-ninth street, there has been a vast increase in the number of buildings, in values, in population, and in the duties required of the uniformed force. From the best information we can obtain, there were, in 1865, about sixty thousand (60,000) houses in this city, few, if any, were more than fifty-five feet high; in August 1882, there are about ninety thousand (90,000) houses, being 60, 70, 80, 90, 100, 110, 120, 130, 140, and 146 feet high, and the "tendency upward." In 1865, the assessed value of real and personal estate in this city was \$608,784,355; in 1881, the assessed value of real and personal estate was \$1,185,498,098; and this assessed value does not include merchandise in bond, which, we are informed, amounts to many millions of dollars. In 1865, the population was 726,386; in 1880 (last census), the population was 1,206,299. In 1866, the first full year of the paid Fire Department's existence, there were in the city 796 fires; in 1881 there were 1,785 fires.

By the enactment of chapter 742, Laws of 1871, one or more men are sent to all places of public amusement at each performance, thereby crippling our companies in that part of the city where they are most needed, and at a time (from seven to eleven o'clock in the evening) when they cannot well be spared. We have an average of forty men on this duty each night except Sunday. We are also compelled to have notices of all violations of law from the Building and Combustible Bureaus served by the uniformed force of the Department, amounting to an average of fifteen men per day, and in all parts of the city. There is an average of thirty men each day unable to perform fire duty in consequence of injuries received in discharge of duty, and sickness.

Our men are on duty seven days in the week, three hours only being allowed for meals, and three days in each month leave of absence given for recreation. The average number of officers and men on duty to extinguish fires, at all times, is nine to each company.

We have had in each year two or more large fires south of Thirty-fourth street, requiring twenty to twenty-five companies to control them; during the active continuance of such fires the city must be at least partially unprotected as we are at present organized.

Notwithstanding we have had the good fortune thus far to be able to protect the city, the time has arrived when it is unwise to trust further to fortune for the city's protection from such a calamity as an extensive conflagration would be.

The increased number, height, and area of buildings in the City of New York, south of Thirty-fourth street; the increased value of merchandise stored in them, and the consequent increasing number of fires, warn us of the danger to be feared from two or more large fires occurring simultaneously in distant parts of the city. To be equal to such an emergency, it is necessary to have men, apparatus, horses, and appliances in duplicate, where practicable, so that when a part of a company is absent at a fire, another part may be kept in quarters in readiness to protect the neighborhood in case of another fire.

Where company quarters south of Thirty-fourth street, are sufficiently large for the purpose, and as soon as practicable, companies should be reorganized, and consist of three (3) officers and seventeen men, viz.: one foreman, two assistant foremen, one engineer of steamer, two assistant engineers of steamer, four drivers, and ten firemen, or privates, and be equipped with two steam fire-engines, two hose-tenders, and the necessary horses, hose, and other appliances complete; the company on receiving an alarm for fire where they may be due or called, to proceed thereto with foreman, first assistant foreman, two drivers (one for engine, one for tender), engineer, and assistant engineer of steamer, and proper number of firemen or privates, always leaving in quarters one officer, one engineer, or assistant engineer of steamer, two drivers, and at least one fireman or private. That portion of the company left in quarters immediately put second or spare apparatus in service, hitching the horses thereto, and remaining on watch until the company, there absent, shall return, always being in immediate readiness to answer any alarm for fire that the company may be due at, or called to, during the absence of the first company.

Hook and Ladder companies south of Thirty-fourth street, when practicable, should be reorganized with three (3) officers, and seventeen (17) men, viz.: one Foreman, two Assistant Foremen, two Drivers, two Tillermen, and thirteen Firemen or Privates, and two fully-equipped hook and ladder trucks, and be under the same rule as prescribed for engine companies, as far as practicable.

The following will show in detail the disposition of the company for the day; twenty men per company:

Two on leave of absence each day, which will be three days per month for each man. It will be remembered that firemen have no Sundays. They are on duty the year round, except three days' leave of absence each month, and one hour three times a day for meals.

RULES AND REGULATIONS ESTABLISHED  
for the government and proper care of piers, bulk-  
heads, slips, and other wharf property, under the pro-  
visions of subdivision 7 of section 6 of chapter 574 of the  
Laws of 1871, by the Board of the Department of Docks,  
and published, to take effect on and after  
MAY 1, 1882.

The said subdivision 7, among other things, provides as  
follows:

The violation of or disobedience to any rule, regula-  
tion, or order of said Board shall be a misdemeanor,  
punishable by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars,  
or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or by both  
such fine and imprisonment, on complaint of said  
Board.

And every person guilty of a violation of or  
disobedience to any of the following rules or  
regulations, in addition to the penalties thereby  
fixed and imposed, to be recovered in civil actions,  
is liable to be prosecuted for a misdemeanor and to  
be punished by such fine and imprisonment, or  
by both.

No. 1.—No piles shall be driven, nor shall any platform  
be erected, nor shall any filling-in of any kind be made on  
any part of the water-front of the city, without a written  
permit therefor being first had and obtained from the  
Board, under a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars,  
for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner,  
lessee, or occupant of any pier or bulkhead, or of any  
water-front property or right, who shall cause or permit  
any such work to be done upon his premises before such  
permit therefor has been obtained, and under the further  
penalty of fifty dollars for each and every day which  
shall elapse before any piles so driven, or platform  
so erected, or material so filled-in, without such permit  
being first obtained, shall be removed, after the expira-  
tion of the time which may be allowed for such removal,  
by a notice served upon such owner, lessee, or occupant,  
by the Corporation Wharfing for the district, to be  
also recovered from such owner, lessee, or occupant.

No. 2.—No shed, building, office, tally-house, or other  
structure shall be erected, nor shall any derrick, hoist-  
ing-mast, coal-hopper, sign, or advertising device, or  
other erection or obstruction of any kind be placed or  
maintained upon any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf  
structure, nor upon any reclaimed land, without a writ-  
ten permit therefor being first had and obtained from the  
Board; and if the owner, lessee, or occupant of any such  
premises, or the owner, lessee, or agent, of any such  
structure, erections, or obstructions, shall fail to comply  
with a notice served by the Corporation Wharfing for the  
district to remove any such structure, erection, or ob-  
struction, after the expiration of the time allowed by  
such notice for the removal, such owner, lessee, occu-  
pant or agent, shall forfeit and pay a penalty of twenty-  
five dollars per day for each and every day, which shall  
elapse before any such structure, erection or obstruction,  
shall be removed, after the expiration of the time for the  
removal thereof specified in said notice.

No. 3.—No cargo shall be discharged from any vessel  
upon any bulkhead or wharf structure, at which such  
vessel is being unladen, after service by the Corporation  
Wharfing for the district, upon the owner, consignee,  
master, or other officer, or stevedore, of such vessel, of a  
notice that such bulkhead or structure will be endangered  
by the placing of additional cargo thereon, under a pen-  
alty of two hundred and fifty dollars for every such  
offense, and a further penalty equal in amount to the  
damages of every description which shall be caused by  
the further discharging of cargo upon such bulkhead or  
wharf structure, after the service of the said notice, both  
of such penalties to be recovered from such owner, con-  
signee, master or other officer or stevedore, severally  
and respectively.

No. 4.—All goods, merchandise, and materials of every  
kind, landed or placed on any pier, bulkhead, or other  
wharf structure, or upon reclaimed land, must be re-  
moved therefrom without unnecessary delay, and within  
twenty-four hours after the Corporation Wharfing for

the district shall have served upon the owner, shipper,  
or consignee, of such cargo, a notice to remove the same,  
under a penalty of fifty dollars per day for each and  
every day, during which any part of said cargo shall re-  
main upon such pier, bulkhead, structure, or land, after the  
expiration of the said twenty-four hours, to be re-  
covered from such owner, shipper, or consignee, severally  
and respectively.

No. 5.—All goods, merchandise and materials of every  
kind encumbering any pier, bulkhead or other wharf  
structure, or reclaimed land, after the time designated  
for the removal thereof shall have expired, will be liable  
to be removed by the Board to any warehouse or yard,  
at the sole risk and expense of the owner of any such  
property, and all expense incurred for such removal and  
storage or otherwise, shall be and become a lien thereon,  
and such goods, merchandise and materials will not be  
delivered to the owner until the expense of such removal  
and storage has been paid.

No. 6.—No person shall construct or maintain any en-  
gine-house, tally-house, or other small structure, under  
a permit of the Board, on any unshedded pier, or other  
wharf structure, unless the same be placed on wheels so  
as to admit of easy removal thereupon when required, and  
to prevent the accumulation of dirt or refuse thereunder,  
under a penalty of twenty-five dollars per day for each  
and every day which may elapse before the discontinu-  
ance of such offense.

No. 7.—No vessel of any kind shall be loaded or dis-  
charged by horse power, nor shall stones or similar  
cargo be discharged from any vessel, upon any pier,  
bulkhead or other wharf structure, unless proper plank-  
ing be provided to protect the surface of such pier, bulk-  
head or other wharf structure from injury consequent  
upon the travel of the horse, or the throwing of the  
stones or similar cargo thereupon, under a penalty of  
five dollars a day for each horse so employed, and of  
twenty-five dollars for each offense of discharging such  
stones or like cargo, upon such pier, bulkhead, or other  
wharf structure, to be recovered from the owner, con-  
signee, master or stevedore of any such vessel, severally  
and respectively; and if such penalty be recovered on  
account of sand discharged upon wharf property belong-  
ing to the Corporation, under lease, it shall be paid to  
the lessee thereof, but if such penalty be recovered on  
account of sand discharged upon wharf property not  
owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner  
thereof.

No. 8.—No sand shall be discharged from any vessel  
unless canvas or similar material be extended from the  
vessel's side to the bulkhead or wharf structure at which  
such vessel is being unladen, to prevent the falling of  
the sand into the water, and if the surface of any such  
wharf structure is not sufficiently tight to prevent the  
sand dumped thereon from going through into the water,  
then no sand shall be discharged thereon from any vessel,  
unless canvas or similar material be first laid thereon to  
receive the sand, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars  
for each offense, to be recovered from the owner, con-  
signee, master or stevedore of any such vessel, severally  
and respectively; and if such penalty be recovered on  
account of sand discharged upon wharf property belong-  
ing to the Corporation, under lease, it shall be paid to  
the lessee thereof, but if such penalty be recovered on  
account of sand discharged upon wharf property not  
owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner  
thereof.

No. 9.—The owners, lessees and occupants of every  
pier, wharf and bulkhead in the City of New York shall  
keep the same in good repair, and the slips adjacent  
thereto properly dredged; and whenever, in the judgment  
of the Board, it shall be necessary so to do, written notices,  
signed by the President or Secretary of said Board, shall  
be served upon the owners, lessees or occupants, or col-  
lector of wharfage of any such pier, wharf or bulkhead,  
or the slip adjoining the same, on or in which repairs or  
dredging are required by said Board, specifying the  
nature and extent of the repairs or dredging so required,  
and the time within which such repairs must be made, or  
such dredging done; and in case the owners, lessees or  
occupants so notified, fail to comply with the terms and  
requirements of such notice, they shall forfeit and pay a  
penalty of fifty dollars per day for every day which shall  
elapse before they comply with such notice.

No. 10.—No ashes, refuse, offal, fruit, vegetables or  
any other substances, shall be thrown into the waters  
surrounding or adjacent to any pier or bulkhead, or any  
other part of the water-front of the city, under a penalty  
of twenty-five dollars for every such offense, to be re-  
covered from the owner, lessee, or occupant, severally  
and respectively, of any pier, bulkhead, wharf structure,  
or other property, from which any such substance shall  
be thrown, or from the person actually throwing the  
same; or if any such substance be thrown from any  
vessel lying in waters within the jurisdiction of the De-  
partment, whether berthed or not, then such penalty to  
be recovered from the owner, consignee, or master of  
such vessel, severally and respectively.

No. 11.—No snow or ice shall be dumped into the  
waters adjacent to the water-front of the city, except from  
the piers, bulkheads and other places designated from  
time to time, by the Board, for such dumping, under a  
penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense, to be re-  
covered from the owner, lessee or occupant of any pier,  
bulkhead or other wharf property, from which any such  
snow and ice shall be dumped, or from the person actually  
dumping the same, severally and respectively.

No. 12.—All lumber, brick, or other material in bulk  
discharged on any bulkhead not shedded, shall be at once  
removed, or, if not so removed, shall be placed at least  
twenty feet from the edge of the bulkhead, pending re-  
moval, under a penalty of fifty dollars per day, for each and  
every day such lumber, brick or other material shall  
remain on the bulkhead, to be recovered from the owner  
or consignee of such lumber, brick or other material, or  
from the person placing, or causing the same to be placed,  
on such bulkhead, severally and respectively.

No. 13.—The charges for wharfage and dockage of all  
vessels admitted to any of the piers or bulkheads con-  
structed under the new plans adopted by the Department,  
shall be at the same rates as are now, or shall hereafter be,  
fixed and established by laws of this State, until otherwise  
ordered by the Board.

No. 14.—The term "Board," when used in the fore-  
going rules and regulations, shall be taken to mean "The  
Board of the Department of Docks of the City of New  
York," and the term "Corporation," when so used, shall  
be taken to mean "The Mayor, Aldermen and Common-  
ality of the City of New York."

## ASSESSMENT COMMISSION.

THE COMMISSIONERS APPOINTED BY CHAP-  
ter 550 of the Laws of 1880, to revise, vacate, or  
modify assessments for local improvements in the City of  
New York, in pursuance of said act and the amend-  
ment thereof, give notice to all persons affected thereby  
that the notices required by the said act must be filed  
with the Comptroller of said city and a duplicate thereof  
with the Counsel to the Corporation, as follows:

As to all assessments for local improvements confirmed  
before June 9, 1880, on or before November 1, 1882. As  
to all assessments for local improvements completed be-  
fore June 9, 1880, and since confirmed, on or before No-  
vember 1, 1882. As to any assessment for local improve-  
ments known as Morningside avenues, within two months  
after the dates upon which such assessments may be  
respectively confirmed.

The notice must specify the particular assessment com-  
plained of, the date of the confirmation of the same, the  
property affected thereby, and in a brief and concise  
manner the objections thereto, showing, or tending to  
show, that the assessment was unfair or unjust in re-  
spect to said real estate.
