

An Ordinance fixing the compensation of examining board of plumbers of The City of New York.

New York.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:
Section I. The compensation of each member of the examining board of plumbers of The
City of New York is hereby fixed at five dollars per sitting, and there shall not be less than three
sittings per week, making in all sixty-five dollars per month, the same to be paid out of the appropriation already set aside by the board of estimate and apportionment.
Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of
this ordinance are hereby repealed.
Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
