6½ miles of overhead wire were removed from various streets and avenues during the quarter. 2,250 certificates for interior wiring were issued. Certificates were granted for the installation of 76,582 new incandescent lights, 604 arc lamps, 21 generators, of a total of 1,202½ K. W. capacity ; 976 motors, of a total of 3,273½ H. P. capacity. 6,556 inspections were made. 2,251 gas meters were tested and sealed.

Hon. HENRY S. KEARNY, Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies:

SIR—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of this bureau for the quarter ending September 30, 1898:

CRIMINAL COURT BUILDING.

The usual orders were renewed for cleaning glass in doors and windows. Plumbers' and Carpenters' supplies, supplies for cleaning purposes; engineer and electrical supplies were furnished, also 150 feet rubber hose with nozzle and couplings complete; 1 United States flag with halyards complete was furnished and reeved on flag-pole of roof of above building. Two 16-inch Lundell motor fans with necessary wiring, etc., complete, were installed in engine-room of above building.

The Elevators.

No. 1. New operating cable was furnished and put in place.
No. 4. Piston and valve repacked.
No. 5. Piston and valve repacked.
No. 6. Piston and valve repacked.
Janitor's Apartments—Ceilings, side walls and woodwork were washed off, plastering repaired, ceilings calcimined, walls painted and woodwork varnished.
District Attorney's Office—Partitions in typewriting department and hall on same floor were cleaned off and thoroughly sand-papered and smoothed, filled and varnished and same received a rub finish.
Civil Service Board—4 typewriters were furnished. The following motor fans were furnished, erected and connected with circuits in Criminal Court Building: In the office of above Board 11 16-inch Lundell fans and 2 24-inch exhaust Lundell fans located as follows: 2 16-inch Lundell fan motors, and 1 24-inch exhaust fans, starting box-fans, switch and fuses in the disrobing-room, 1 16-inch fan motor on wall to drive the air into the hall. In the gymnasium-room 1 24-inch exhaust fan, starting box, switch and fuse, and 1 16-inch fan motor. In Labor Bureau (ground floor) 3 16-inch fan motors. In Clerks' room 1 16-inch fan motor; in Record room 1 16-inch fan motor, and in Chief Clerk's office 1 16-inch fan motor.
Labor and material furnished to put up 6 cut-out hook-and-eye balls to hold cord, fuse plugs insulators and switches; also placed on the desk of Clerk in examining-room one two-light bracket connected with chandelier in Board-room by flexible cord.
Civil Service Board (Labor Bureau)—One Smith-Premier typewriter and one hat rack with umbrella stand and pan furnished.
Coroners' Office—Law books, bentwood chairs (3 dozen), 5 dozen wood seat chairs furnished, and about 108 yards of linoleum were furnished and laid.

Court of Special Sessions—A supply of law books was furnished.

Court of General Sessions—3 electric fan motors were furnished and installed, also a supply of law books was furnished.

COUNTY COURT-HOUSE.

The usual orders for a supply of steam were renewed. Cleaning and Engineers' supplies, including soap powder and machinery oil, furnished. The four water tanks in above building were cleaned out, interior scraped off and painted one heavy coat of red lead and when same became dry it received one coat of metallic brown paint with sufficient quantity of patent English dryers. All rubbish was removed from premises. All sash frames, storm sheds, doors on both sides, also iron beams underneath stoop on Chambers street side were cleaned off and reglazed with white lead putty. All nail holes, etc., puttied up and all new work touched up, and all work received two coats of best lead and oil paint. All hardwood doors, etc., including those underneath stoop on Chambers street, were cleaned off, filled and received two coats of the best varnish with a rub finish.

Iron roof, where defective, was taken out and replaced with best quality corrugated steel and same painted. Front hand rope of elevator was removed and replaced with new one. One dozen six-gallon water-coolers were furnished for use in above court-house.

Supreme Court—Law books, where necessary, were rebound, and the following stationery was furnished: 50 copies each Nos. 1 and 2 calendars of above court. 2 magic trolley ladders were furnished for use in Naturalization Bureau. Carpets were furnished and laid in Judges' chambers and Parts III., VIII., IX. and X. of above court. The walls, ceilings and woodwork were washed off, ceilings decorated, walls painted and woodwork varnished in Parts III., IV., VIII., IX., and X., Clerks' offices, corridors adjoining jury rooms, library and Judges' chambers of above court.

In Clerk's office, Part IV, an iron railing about 15 feet by 6 feet, provided with gates, locks, springs, hinges, etc., finished in gold bronze, was furnished and put up, and at Jury Box, Part X., on three sides about 28 feet of iron railing 3 feet high, surrounded by 2-inch pipe top rail, with necessary gates, braces, locks, etc., all finished in gold bronze, was also furnished and put up. A wrought-iron balcony, with stairs leading to same, and new bookcases in the room known as the Library of above court were constructed and erected. Hereinafter follows the work in detail:

Iron work—In construction and design the balcony and railing to be as nearly as practicable a duplicate of that now in the City Library in the City Hall.

Brackets—The balcony supported by wrought-iron brackets secured to the mason work with expansion bolts of special size properly secured to the pilasters of the bookcase now in place. Said pilasters were properly reinforced and strengthened. The brackets made of the following material: Top bars of 1½-inch square iron, back bar 1¼-inch by ¾-inch, brace bar 1¼-inch by ¾-inch, filled in with scroll work made of 1-inch by ¾-inch iron and placed as directed, extending from the walls about 3 feet 6 inches.

Flooring—The floors constructed of wrought-iron material 1½-inch by ¾-inch, space 2¾-inch on centers, having battens where directed of the same size.

Railing—All the railing of balcony about 2 feet 6 inches high, with bottom railing of 2 inch by 2 inches angle iron, top railing of 1½-inch channel iron, topped with a 2-inch polished bronze railing. The dividing posts are 1-inch square iron; the railing is made in panels of various sizes as directed and filled in with ornamental scroll work made of ¾-inch by ½-inch and ¾-inch by ¾-inch iron. On top of railing was placed an oak shelf 10 inches wide by 1½ inches thick, moulded, set on brackets, properly secured to the railing and polished on both sides.

Stairs—Two circular pairs of cast-iron stairs, with railings made similar to the railings of the balcony, extending from floor of library to the floor of the balcony, placed where directed.

All ironwork painted two coats of drop black paint and finished in the flat.

Book-cases—The book-cases constructed of the best quality quartered oak, extending from top of iron balcony to the ceiling cornice, with sash doors, hung with bronze metal hinges of of special size as directed; flush bolts and other fastenings also furnished.

The doors were glazed with 26-ounce French glass. The book-cases furnished with racks suitable for movable shelves.

Shelves in Book-cases—All shelves necessary, composed of first quality 7-8-inch white pine, with quartered oak strip glued on edge of same. All exposed ends of book-cases paneled and moulded in raised panels.

All the above described woodwork was properly filled, varnished, rubbed down and polished in oil, and all done in the most complete and approved manner.

County Clerk—City directories and a typewriter furnished.

CITY HALL.

The usual order for supplying steam to above building was renewed. Cleaning supplies were also furnished. Defective tin on roof was cut out and replaced with new tin of best quality, painted bottom and top.

The necessary scaffolding to tower was furnished and erected to permit of making the following repairs: The entire carpenter work of the tower where defective replaced—new moulding, sheeting timbers, hardware, etc., replacing old parts. The sword in the hand of figure of Justice was regilded, and a pair of copper balances gilded and placed as directed. An octagon-shaped wrought-iron skylight, glazed with ½-inch hammered glass, clipped at bottom with galvanized iron clips surmounted by a galvanized ventilator 12 inches in diameter, tied at base with ¾-inch tie rods, all painted two coats of best quality paint, was furnished and erected. At south side entrance to above building stone steps and caps were reset, cement blocks relayed and cement joints pointed up.

All sashes, frames, doors, window guards, grates, railings, and all ironwork on exterior of above building, were cleaned off; all sashes reglazed, cracks and nail-holes puttied up, new work touched up, and all remaining work received two coats of best lead and oil paint. Lamps and railings on Esplanade at south of building cleaned off, and painted two coats of best quality paint, and gilded as directed. The statue of Thomas Jefferson, with pedestal, was repaired and removed from Governor's room to Rotunda.

Mayor's Office—A supply of law books, one table and new Wilton carpets were furnished. In Board-room there was furnished and put up one combination chandelier fixture for Welsbach burners in central slide, all surrounding electric lights, finished in polished brass; also in lobby in ante-room two three-light combination fixtures and Welsbach burners, globes, key sockets, etc., all properly wired, were furnished and put up. Weights and measures for use of Inspectors also furnished.

Bureau of Licenses—An electric fan motor properly connected was furnished and installed.

President of the Borough of Manhattan—An electric-motor fan, properly connected, was furnished and installed.

City Record—The ceilings, side walls and woodwork in the room occupied by the above office, including the toilet, entrance-hall, also door, both inside and outside, were washed off, plaster repaired, ceilings calcimined, except one, which was painted. The walls, woodwork, shelving, closets and counters received three coats of the best lead and oil paint. All hardwood and the top of counters cleaned off and varnished; all steam-pipes and radiators were bronzed.

Reporters' Room—63 yards of best quality linoleum furnished and laid.

BROWN STONE BUILDING.

The usual cleaning supplies were furnished. Two new hydraulic passenger elevators, operated by water-pressure from pressure tank in cellar, were furnished and erected in above building.

Hereinafter follows detailed statement of work performed:

Cars—Size of cars about 6 feet 4 inches by 5 feet 4 inches; rise of car from basement to third floor being about 53 feet 6 inches; each car made of metal, and of approved pattern.

Annunciators and Light—Each car provided with an electric annunciator having a call-button at each floor; also gas-fixtures.

Lever-operating Devices—Each car provided with latest improved lever-operating devices and auxiliary valve.

The machinery constructed so that car will stop automatically at the upper and lower landings.

Cylinder—Each water-cylinder to be made of cast-iron, of sufficient thickness and strength to withstand a pressure of two hundred pounds to the square inch, thoroughly and substantially bolted together at the joints and properly secured to the wall or floor timbers and bored out true and smooth, having a capacity to lift a load of 2,500 pounds in the car, with a water-pressure of 110 pounds to the square inch (from pressure-tank in cellar).

Speed—Speed of each car, with average load, 200 feet per minute.

Piston and Piston-rods—Each piston cast-iron, with safety apron, turned to fit the cylinder, and attached to the traveling sheave by two solid piston-rods 1¼ inches in diameter, both having ultimate strength of 100,000 pounds, and capable of safely sustaining a working load of over 18,000 pounds. These work through brass stuffing boxes in the head of cylinder, and attached to cross-head of traveling sheave and piston by nuts on each end, with guard pins to prevent unscrewing.

Cables—Each car operated by four of the best wire cables five-eighths of an inch in diameter, having ultimate strength of 40,000 pounds, and capable of sustaining a working load of 10,000 pounds.

Gravity Safety—Improved safety device attached to bottom of safety frame supporting car and connected to a Governor Safety.

Governor Safety—This safeguard is brought into action by the car itself in descending at undue speed, locking the car to the guides. Thus, whether the ropes are broken or not, the rapid running down or falling off the car is effectually guarded against.

Traveling Sheave—Each traveling sheave cast-iron, extra strong and substantial, and of proper size, having a steel shaft attached to piston-rods by a wrought-iron frame, and outside of

this safety strap on which there is no strain, which is never to be used unless the frame breaks. Each of these straps to sustain a load of more than 50,000 pounds.

Main Sheave—Each main sheave cast iron, of extra strength, and as large size as could best be used, with steel shaft, 4-inch bearing on each side, running in babbitted boxes.

Counterbalance—Each car was properly counterbalanced to lift the load herein specified.

Valve—Each valve a balance piston valve, so arranged as to move easily, and receive and discharge the water through graduated openings, to avoid shock or jar.

Posts, Guides and Sheave Supports—Posts, guides and sheave beams furnished and put in place. Posts consisting of channels and steel tees, and overhead beams of steel.

Masonwork—The hatchways and places for cylinder and other parts of machinery were prepared and finished. All mason, brick and iron work, cutting of walls and timbers, painting of wood and iron work also done. Also iron grating under overhead work furnished. Old elevator shaft left in present condition with exception of taking out the north side and removing it to north end of new shaft. The front of new shaft was inclosed to correspond to old shaft, and both old and new work of the inclosure painted and varnished.

Tanks—Two tanks, each of 1,500 gallons capacity, furnished and set upon foundations, both made of steel and placed in cellar.

Pump—One steam pump of Worthington make, size 14 by 8½ by 10, furnished and properly set upon foundation. This pump is capable of readily delivering water to allow the elevators to make one round trip every 1½ minutes, with 65 pounds steam pressure at the pump.

Water connections—Water connections from pump with tanks, and from tanks to elevator cylinder; also all drip-pipe connections from cylinder and valve made; steam connections with pump made. Automatic pump regulating apparatus furnished.

Old Elevator and Machinery—Such parts of old elevator and machinery in the Brownstone Building as could not be used, were removed.

On completion of the work all dirt and surplus material were removed from the premises and the place left broom clean.

All the materials used in this work were the best of their several kinds, and all the work was done in workmanlike manner.

City Court—A supply of office furniture, consisting of desks, chairs, tables, etc., was furnished.

HALL OF RECORDS.

The usual cleaners' supplies were furnished; one safe, one 20-light gas regulator, one telephone connected with exchange, also one desk set of telephone instruments were furnished. The entire building was equipped with Welsbach burners, mantles, shades, etc.; 4 book typewriting machines also furnished. All the stoves, furnaces, etc., including pipe, elbows, etc., were entirely overhauled, cleaned and repaired, new parts replacing defective parts taken out.

The necessary scaffolding, steel brushes, etc., to clean off and point up the stonework on exterior of above building, were furnished. All damaged stonework removed and replaced with Portland cement. Where openings were too large, they were filled up with hard brick to within two inches of surface. All joints properly pointed up with cement putty. All stone columns cleaned down and all loose material brushed off and pointed up with sand and white lead putty, color same as stonework.

The steps in front of building trimmed off where necessary and all pointed up with cement putty.

All rubbish removed from premises and same left broom clean.

The exterior of the above building was cleaned off, plastering of same pointed up and repaired, the sashes were reglazed with white lead putty where necessary, and all cracks and nailholes puttied up. The entire building was painted on the outside, including sash frames, doors, stone and plaster work, three coats of the best lead and oil paint; the same blocked off in uniform granite blocks.

The following flooring work was done in room on northwest corner: The necessary pine sleepers, 2 by 3 inches, placed 12 inches from centres and scribed to the present marble flooring so as to secure a level surface, furnished; on top of these sleepers maple flooring, 2½ inches by 7½ inch, all properly nailed, having joints properly broken and all smoothed off at completion, was laid; all present closets, desks, benches, etc., were removed and replaced after flooring was laid, setting all level and plumb; the bottom of doors, where necessary, were rehung or cut off; all nails, hardware, etc., were the best of their several kinds.

HARLEM COURT-HOUSE.

The usual cleaning supplies, including one barrel of soap powder, also engineer's supplies, were furnished; one 10 by 15 and one 6 by 10 U. S. flags, of best quality standard bunting, furnished; 9 window awnings, with necessary hardware, etc., complete, were furnished and put up; the entire building was equipped with Welsbach burners, with mantles, chimneys, shades, etc.; a new exhaust head was furnished and fitted up on roof of above building.

WEST FIFTY-FOURTH STREET COURT-HOUSE.

The usual cleaning supplies were furnished, and the entire building equipped with Welsbach burners, mantles, chimneys, shades, etc.

THIRD DISTRICT COURT-HOUSE.

The usual cleaning supplies were furnished. Five flues of above building were cleaned out; also stove-pipe and flue in Janitor's apartments.

SEVENTH DISTRICT COURT-HOUSE.

The usual cleaning supplies were furnished, including one barrel of soap powder. The entire building was equipped with Welsbach burners, chimneys, mantles, shades, etc. All damaged brick and coping from six chimneys on above court-house were removed and replaced with best hard brick, laid in cement mortar; also coping, all rubbish removed and all damage to roof made good. The old damaged lining of the boiler in above court-house was cut out and replaced with first-class quality fire clay and white sand. The front of boiler was cut out and pointed up. The wooden skylight, glass, etc., over hallway at entrance to Judges' private rooms, were removed, and a new iron skylight frame, about 12 feet 10 inches on the roof and 12 feet 10 inches on the front, erected. The framework made of angle and tee iron, with ribs placed far enough apart so that the glass which was good in the old skylight could be used.

MARKETS.

Fulton Market—Gas governors, with necessary tubes, couplings, etc., were furnished and set up complete.

30 Welsbach double lanterns, with all attachments complete, were furnished and put up.

The sewer pipe in above market was cleaned and main water-pipe repaired.

Catharine Market—Defective tin on roof of above market was cut out and replaced with new tin of the best quality, painted bottom and top.

Gas governors, with necessary tubes, couplings, etc., were furnished and set up complete.

Centre Market—10 Welsbach single lanterns, etc., with all attachments complete, were furnished and put up.

Tompkins Market—19 Welsbach single lanterns, etc., with all attachments complete, were furnished and put up.

Washington Market—Defective tin on roof above market was cut out and replaced with new tin of best quality, painted bottom and top.

48 Welsbach single lanterns, with all attachments complete, were furnished and put up.

West Washington Market—Defective tin on roof of above market was cut out and replaced with new tin of best quality, painted bottom and top.

Clinton Market—Gas governors, with necessary tubes, couplings, etc., were furnished and set up complete.

11 Welsbach single lanterns, with all attachments complete, were furnished and put up.

The following carpenter work throughout the entire building was performed: All doors and jambs repaired, all beams, girders, plates and rafters were jacked up and new timbers were placed where necessary.

Jefferson Market—Gas governors, with necessary tubes, couplings, etc., were furnished and set up complete.

22 Welsbach double lanterns, with all attachments complete, were furnished and put up.

ARMORIES.

First Brigade Headquarters—1 typewriter was furnished.

Seventh Regiment Armory—Cleaning supplies, etc., consisting of oils, pails, brooms, etc., were furnished.

Eighth Regiment Armory—10 gallons ink chaser, 1 barrel of disinfectant and 1 barrel of floor oil, new halcyards reeved on flagstaff, etc., were furnished. The building is now equipped with Welsbach burners, mantles, chimneys, shades, etc., 24 window-shades made up of best quality shade cloth hung on hartshorn rollers, complete, also 16 shades for circular tops, made of same material, were furnished and put up. The ceiling of magazine-room was covered with No. 16 gauge steel and in openings in walls, 2 steel ventilating doors with necessary hinges, etc., were placed; all above received two coats of best quality paint. Also two sets of Rogers' patent grate bars were furnished and set under boilers.

On main hall, second floor, a new floor was laid, all damaged boards of flooring were removed and replaced with the same kind and quality of material as that now in use; present floor thoroughly examined and nailed where found loose. Present floor properly leveled, and on top of this floor a new flooring of edge-grain yellow pine, ¾-inch by 2½-inch, all properly nailed, joints and heading joints cleaned off, was laid.

The necessary panel work in two doors to inclose space between the door jamb in side and the end of the double lockers each way in centre of the Officers' Room was furnished. Style of work and material corresponding with that at present in said room, with crown moulding furnished on top and on both sides, same as at present in use on lockers, same properly intersected with cornice. Doors hung with double action bronze butts of suitable size, and two bronze plates placed on each door.

All sashes and doors through main building repaired and eased, new sash cords put in where necessary. Gates leading to streets and all doors leading to roofs repaired. All sashes on main roof repaired and eased. New ropes for opening sash from Drill Room put in and new locks put on where necessary.

Roof boards where necessary for tinner taken up and replaced with new boards and joists. New edge-grain flooring in vestibule of Company Officers' room put down. Doors on second floor leading to roof on Park avenue side of building sheeted up. Sliding doors on first floor on Park avenue leading to street repaired, and new sliding-door lock furnished. Railing on Squad Room floor taken down and put up again; repaired and hung gate; three press machines on Squad Room floor screwed down; new platforms on outside of storm-doors on Ninety-fourth street side put down. First and Second Battalion rooms and Company Officers rooms on second and third floors were washed off, ceilings calcimined and decorated; side walls painted three coats paint, with decorated frieze top and bottom. All old woodwork washed off and received one coat of varnish; all new wood work received two coats of varnish.

Ceiling and side walls of Ambulance Room, first floor, washed off, and painted three coats of paint. All woodwork washed off and painted one coat of varnish. Lockers received one coat of filler, rubbed down and two coats of varnish.

All the iron work on the exterior of the above building, window-guards, screens, gates, railings, lamps, cornices, leaders and all metal designs; the sash and frames over the lantern dome over Drill Room, all skylights, including window frames, sashes and entrance doors, throughout the building, and those opening out on the roofs; also, the storm-shed on Ninety-fourth street main entrance (inside and outside), and the large doors and gates on the inside of storm-shed were washed off, all cracks, nail-holes, etc., puttied up and all the old putty was dug out of all sashes, same touched with a coat of paint and reglazed with a composition of white lead, putty and white sand. The above work received three coats of the best lead and oil paint. Two flag-staffs also received three coats of paint and the balls on top of same were regilded. The main entrance doors on Ninety-fifth street were cleaned off, filled and received three coats of the best varnish having a rub finish.

Ninth Regiment Armory—A supply of paints, varnishes, etc., floor oil, disinfectant, toilet paper, etc., furnished also 300 feet 1½-inch hose with reel couplings, nozzle, etc., complete were furnished.

Gas governors, with tubes, couplings, etc., furnished and put in place.

The above armory is now equipped with Welsbach burners, mantles, chimneys, shades, etc., automatic electric-lighting chandelier fixtures were attached to chandelier. In fire-boxes under the boilers two patent arches were furnished and placed.

The fire-boxes of two boilers were rebuilt and fire walls of same removed and rebuilt, making the fire-boxes 6 inches deeper. Two water cylinders were rebored; two metal pistons with metal rings fitted to the cylinders and piston rods were made and fitted; a new exhaust pipe from pump to main heating system connected; a drip-pipe from plumber pump to sewer pipe furnished and connected.

On Drill Room floor one ice-water drinking fountain, 17½ feet long, with seven spaces and seven faucets, same to be made of 1½-inch sound Tennessee marble, with back 20 inches high and 1 inch thick, having floor base in front and ends 6 inches high, 1 inch thick; water waste into 2-inch galvanized-iron pipe run into cellar, and in cellar one sink furnished and put up. The necessary galvanized-iron pipe was furnished to run from engine room, connected with water supply from main and run into tank made of 2-inch pine, 48 inches by 24 inches by 24 inches, lined with polished copper, having ¾-inch tin-lined lead coil in same for cooling purposes. Drinking-fountain supplied through ½-inch tin-lined lead pipe connected with N. P. pantry cocks, self-closing pattern, having a sufficient length of ¾-inch coil pipe in tank to secure sufficient coolness.

There was furnished and put in place quartered oak panel work 21 feet 6 inches by 2 feet 6 inches high, with raised panels and mouldings, with two doors hung with 3-inch brass butts and brass locks and escutcheons; same placed in Drill Room making a finish under the Tennessee marble slab.

Also cover for ice cooler in cellar built and entire top of cooler covered with a cover made in scuttle shape; two doors under stairs on Drill Room floor cut out; new panels in doors in room of Company K put in; gate in Adjutant's office repaired and all doors in Adjutant's and Surgeon's offices eased.

Twelfth Regiment Armory—Cleaning supplies, 3 barrels disinfectant and 2 barrels of lime furnished. Gas governors, with necessary tubes couplings, etc., were furnished and placed. Defective tin on roof cut out and replaced with new tin of best quality, painted, bottom and top. The above armory is now equipped with Welsbach burners, mantles, chimneys, shades, etc. The old flag-pole on roof was taken down and replaced with new one.

Twenty-second Regiment Armory—1 barrel disinfectant furnished. Gas governors, with necessary couplings, tubes, etc., were furnished and placed. The building is now equipped with Welsbach burners, mantles, chimneys, shades, etc. Interior telephones connecting target pit with marker's desk, in rifle range, were installed. Defective tin on roof cut out and replaced with new tin of best quality, painted, bottom and top.

Labor and material necessary to stiffen the circular striking plate was furnished. An iron relief shelf the full length of tank, securely fastened to side of tank, with the necessary bolts, screws, rivets, etc., was furnished; also placed in position the ¾-inch iron plate in bottom of tank, extending the entire length of same and securely bolted to the present bottom plates.

All earth, stones and other material between the stone coping and side of main building, on the Sixty-seventh street side, Sixty-eighth street side, and Columbus avenue end, were removed to the depth of 5 inches, the remaining material rammed to solid surface and filled in with three parts of ashes and one part of Rosendale cement to within 2 inches of the level of the stone coping, with a finishing coat of one-half clear sharp sand and one-half Hockendorf cement, to the level of the stone coping, with a descent from the face of the building of about 2 inches.

Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory—Telephone instruments connected with exchange were furnished and put in. Gas governors, with necessary tubes, couplings, etc., furnished and placed. The above armory is now equipped with Welsbach burners, mantles, chimneys, shades, etc.; steam-pipes throughout building were re-covered.

All the mason work around the two boilers down to the level of ash-pit floor was removed and replaced complete.

New arches, with cheek blocks, all set in cement mortar furnished; all necessary back-stays and tie-rods placed in position.

All damaged iron railings, casing, gratings, etc., on the outside were removed and replaced with new material, same size and design as that removed. All iron-work necessary for resetting two boilers furnished, all necessary wrought-iron buck-stays, tie-rods, hand-hole covers, bed-plates, yokes and mouth-pieces furnished. Grate and bearing bars were furnished and set, and the two boilers scraped out and cleaned.

Seventy-first Regiment Armory—Cleaning supplies furnished. Gas governors with necessary couplings, tubes, etc., were furnished and placed. The above armory is now equipped with Welsbach burners, mantles, chimneys, shades, etc.; defective tin on roof was cut out and replaced with new tin of best quality painted bottom and top.

Iron work required to strengthen and brace the main staircase of the above armory furnished as follows:

All measurements taken from the existing work at the building.

All castings were clean and true on bearing face.

All framing done in the best manner, fittings close and well bolted.

All work received a heavy coat of red lead before setting.

Under the soffit of each of the first flights of stairs at about the centre of their run, a bracket formed with double top and back bars of 2½ by 2½ by 3-16-inch angles properly riveted together, bent braces of 3½ by 3½ by 6-16-inch tees, and straight braces of 3 by ½-inch flat bars, all properly riveted together were placed, the top bars being bolted to beams above and back bars bolted to walls.

Over these brackets 5-inch steel beams, weighing 30 pounds per yard, extending in walls at least 8 inches and properly anchored, were furnished and set, brackets and beams being drilled for bolting together.

10 12-inch steel beams, to weigh 120 pounds per yard, were furnished and set under trimmer beams, as follows: Two at top of first flight of stairs, two at bottom of second flight, two at bottom of third flight, and two at top of second flight, and two under trimmers at well holes on upper floor. Two girders, formed of two 12-inch steel beams, weighing 96 pounds per yard, under trimmer beams at top of third flight of stairs, were also furnished. Girders were closely bolted together with four separators, each having two ¾-inch bolts at each separator, the beams and girders having bearing on walls of at least 8 inches, and resting on cast-iron plates set in wall and well bedded in cement; plates to be 8 by 12 by 1 inch.

Under carriage beams back of face strings at each of the second and third flights of stairs an 8-inch steel deck beam, weighing 65 pounds per yard, beveled at ends to frame to the 12-inch beams at proper angles, securely bolted with ¾-inch bolts, was furnished and set.

Four 6-inch steel beams, weighing 40 pounds per yard, one end resting on cast-iron plates set in wall, as described for other plates, and the other end to frame 8-inch deck, with proper angle securely bolted with ¾-inch bolts, were furnished and set.

Supporting the ends of 8-inch deck beams under upper flights of stairs, two posts, formed of two 4 by 4 by 5-16-inch angles riveted together with ¾-inch separators between, were furnished and set, with bottom roll of deck beams cut flush, with webs for webs to pass between angles, with angles bolted to deck beams and 12-inch beams below.

The contractor doing all cutting of plaster and brickwork, setting all plates and making good after all beams were set; also doing all cutting and making good all woodwork required in setting and completing the ironwork, under specification, in a neat and substantial manner.

Squadron "A"—Cleaning supplies, 2 barrels disinfectant and 150 tons of tan bark furnished, new halyards furnished and reeved on flag-poles, gas governors, with necessary tubes, couplings, etc., were furnished and placed.

The above armory is now equipped with Welsbach burners, mantles, chimneys, shades, etc. An iron ladder extending from top floor to roof was furnished and placed.

All sashes throughout the building repaired and eased, and all necessary sash-cords, sash-pulleys and sash-lifts put in. Parting strips and stop beads repaired and made good, and all left in perfect condition.

All the iron work on the exterior of above building—window guards, screens, gates, railings, lamps, cornices, leaders, stairs, and all metal designs, the sashes and frames on lantern dome over Drill Room; all skylights, the bulkhead on the east end, including window frames, sashes and entrance doors throughout the building, and those opening out on the roofs, the storm shed at main entrance (inside and outside), and the large doors and gates—all cleaned off. All cracks and nail-holes, etc., puttied up and all the old putty cut out of all sashes, and the same touched up with a coat of paint and reglazed with a composition of white lead putty and white sand. The above work was given three coats of the best lead and oil paint; two flag-staffs were also painted three coats and the balls on top of same were regilded with gold leaf.

First Battery—Cleaning supplies, disinfectant, etc., were furnished. Gas governors, tubes, couplings, etc., were furnished and placed.

Second Battery—Cleaning supplies, disinfectant, etc., were furnished. The above armory was equipped with Welsbach burners, mantles, chimneys, shades, etc.

First Signal Corps—Cleaning supplies were furnished.

First Naval Battalion—Cleaning supplies, paints, oils, etc., were furnished; also 40 brass lamps were furnished. The galley ranges were entirely overhauled and repaired, and new parts furnished to replace defective parts.

MUNICIPAL COURTS.

First District—This court is now located in building on southwest corner of Prince and Wooster streets, and to make same habitable (it not having been used for years) it was necessary to entirely overhaul, alter and repair same, including carpentering, plumbing, painting, plastering, masonry work, etc. All the repairs necessary are now complete, and the building is in first-class condition.

The telephone connected with exchange was furnished and installed.

Second District—A toilet cabinet, with a supply of clean towels weekly, furnished. Linoleum of best quality was furnished and laid. All the ceilings and walls of Court-room, Judges' private room, Clerk's room, the vestibule of Court-room and Clerk's room were thoroughly washed off, plaster repaired, ceilings calcimined and tinted, all hardwood cleaned off and varnished and all fine woodwork painted, grained and varnished.

Fourth District—A supply of law books and City Directory furnished.

Fifth District—City Directory furnished. Defective tin on roof of above building was cut out and replaced with best quality of new tin, painted bottom and top.

The front of above court was renovated, all decayed or loose stonework to the solid was cut out, and a composition of brown stone was substituted corresponding in color with old stonework, same being rubbed down and repainted.

Sixth District—A supply of law books was furnished, and 9 window awnings, with necessary hardware, etc., were furnished and put up.

Ninth District—A supply of law books was furnished.

Eleventh District—A supply of law books, 1 roll top desk and 1 stenographer's desk furnished; 215 yards of linoleum were furnished and laid.

CITY MAGISTRATES' COURTS.

Eighteen annotated charters for the use of above courts were furnished.

COUNTY JAIL.

A supply of paints, etc., and 6 barrels of unmixed lime furnished.

There was placed where directed in the yard of above-mentioned prison one anti-freezing closet and one urinal with stone platform and back piece, same connected with main service pipe by a 4-inch extra heavy iron pipe and continued above roof of closet. The necessary brick vault for valves built a 3/4-inch. A lead pipe from 1 1/2-inch iron main in basement to fixtures was carried, same controlled by 3/4-inch stop-cock, and properly trapped and back aired.

All necessary excavating for above work done and all excavations filled up, properly rammed, and all pavements replaced.

DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS.

One filing cabinet with roll front, 1 book typewriter and 1 City Directory furnished.

BUREAU OF MUNICIPAL STATISTICS.

French, Spanish, German and English dictionaries and 1 revolving book-case furnished.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

2 window shades hung on Hartshorn rollers were furnished and put up, 61 1/2 yards of carpet, with best paper lining, were furnished and laid; also 82 yards of linoleum were laid; 2 desks, 3 revolving chairs, 4 tables, 6 armchairs, 12 side chairs, 3 rugs, 1 wardrobe, 6 cuspidors, 1 desk 6 feet 6 inches, 1 12-foot wall desk with compartments, sliding doors, partitions, etc., 2 centre desks, with cupboard, doors, partitions, etc., 1 bookcase 7 feet long, 7 feet 9 inches high, with pigeon holes, etc., 1 case with shelves and double doors, 1 case 7 feet 11 inches by 4 feet, with cupboards, compartments and partitions, 6 revolving chairs, 6 foot benches, carpet top, 1 Tucker file case, 4 special locks, and 1 railing, including gates, were furnished.

BUREAU OF CHEMICAL TESTS.

A galvanized iron hood connected with 8-inch galvanized iron pipe 15 feet long, with revolving chimney top, 8 8-inch elbows and 1 sheet iron pan 4 feet by 18 inches by 2, furnished; drain board at side of sink was covered with sheet lead 2 feet square.

BUREAU OF EXPERT ACCOUNTANTS.

A pigeon-hole case containing 75 compartments, built of 3/4 by 18-inch shelving, was put up in above office.

CITY CHAMBERLAIN.

1 toilet cabinet, with a supply of clean towels weekly, furnished; 63 1/2 yards of Axminster carpet and 220 yards of linoleum furnished and laid; 27 1/2 feet of iron railing, with necessary gates, hinges, brackets, plate glass, shelves, etc., all finished in gold bronze, were furnished and put up. There was furnished and put up, to connect Comptroller's office with above office, 1 dumbwaiter. All the necessary cutting out was performed, shaft inclosed with two sides of North Carolina pine ceiling boards, small door at both openings, furnished, hung and securely fastened; also weight boxes, counter balances, ropes, automatic catches, runs and all machinery and framework furnished and put in place.

All the quartered oak paneled and partition work in above office was filled with best quality Wheeler paste filling, cleaned off and given three coats of best quality rubbing varnish, rubbed down and polished in oil.

All the woodwork in Chamberlain's office received two coats of paint and grained in imitation of the woodwork in the new paneled partition, having two coats of best finishing varnish.

CITY PAYMASTER.

1 oak desk, 1 revolving desk chair, 7 slope-top oak desks, with drawers on each side, Yale locks, etc., filled, varnished, rubbed and polished in oil, furnished. 1 Rapid safety filter furnished; 2 safes in above office were covered with cabinet work prescribed by Holmes Electric Protective Company, so that the proper burglar-alarm connections could be made; same is now connected and in perfect working order.

Labor and material were furnished to do the following work herein specified in the City Paymaster's office, No. 83 Chambers street: A paneled wood and glass partition was constructed and set up, the material was the best quartered oak and extended from Chambers street to Reade street, about 150 feet long by 7 feet high. The doors in said partition are 1 1/2 inches thick, hung on bronze butts, having bronze faced lock and knobs, with elongated escutcheons, sash slides on bronze ways, and noiseless sheaves.

The glass in the upper part of partition and sliding sash is of the best quality double thick ground glass, secured with moulding on each side. All set level and plumb.

16 wardrobes were furnished and put in place, with doors having raised panels, and having a cornice same design as that now in partition against which wardrobes are placed, cornice of wardrobes to intersect with that of partition. All doors hung on 3 1/2-inch loose pin brass butts, having Yale locks, with two keys for each lock. All drawers have Yale locks, with two keys for each lock. All joints in counter top made, where possible, so as to be covered by the iron railings.

All the above work was properly filled, varnished three coats, rubbed down and polished.

DEPARTMENT OF TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS.

Two oak desks and 2 revolving chairs furnished. 1 set of telephone instruments connected with Exchange was furnished; 92 1/4 yards of velvet carpet and 53 1/3 yards of linoleum furnished and laid between Rooms H and G in above Department. An iron-latticed partition 9 by 8, with scroll

border and points on top, gates, hinges, lock, etc., all finished in gold bronze, was made and put up, in Room G, between desks a gate 6 by 3, with necessary locks, springs, hinges, etc., all finished in gold bronze, was made and put up. Cage in Room E was taken down, reconstructed and replaced. The brass railings on desks in Rooms E and G were taken down, reconstructed and replaced. An iron railing with necessary appurtenances, about 12 feet by 4 feet, finished in gold bronze, was furnished and put up; in Room E there was furnished and erected a quartered oak desk about 12 feet long by 2 feet 6 inches wide, doors hung on bronze butts and having Yale locks, all of which was filled, rubbed down, varnished and polished.

Two oak desks, 2 revolving chairs and 8 hat-trees furnished.

A supply of law books and 1 City Directory furnished.

1 Remington typewriter, 2-foot wardrobe, 2 roll top desks, 3 S. & S. chairs, 1 leather couch, 1 revolving book-case, 8 arm chairs upholstered, 1/2-section screen, 62 yards of carpet, 3 mats and 22 rubber ends furnished and laid.

Bureau of Street Openings—1 typewriter chair furnished.

6 window-frames in sash removed and replaced with new frame same size and thickness as those now in use. The necessary glass, sash weights, sash cords and sash fastenings furnished. New trim, cornice, blocks, stools and wall moulding to said 6 windows furnished, the wainscoting at present in use repaired and new wainscoting was furnished where necessary. 6 pairs of shutters repaired.

16 City, 1 Business and 2 Brooklyn Directories furnished.

DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION.

17 City, 1 Co-partnership, 4 Business and 5 Brooklyn Directories furnished.

PRESIDENT BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.

1 roll top desk and a supply of law books furnished; glass on door lettered.

There were furnished and put in place in above office 2 map cases 6 feet long by 8 feet high and 3 feet deep, 1 map case 4 feet 7 inches long by 8 feet high and 2 feet 6 inches deep, and 1 map case 16 feet long by 8 feet high and 3 feet deep, as per plan on file in this office.

All sides and tops 3/4-inch thick, all divisions 1/2-inch thick, and all doors paneled and moulded and hung with 2 1/2-inch brass butts, having locks with the key-hole escutcheons; all drawers have brass draw pulls, all map cases made and put together in sections so as to be easily moved. All the above cases made of clear white pine lumber.

DEPARTMENT OF WATER SUPPLY.

Typewriter repaired at above office.

DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING.

2 City Directories, a supply of law books, and 1 Neostyle Rotary Duplicating Machine, with necessary oil, paper, ink, etc., complete, furnished.

DEPARTMENT OF SEWERS.

1 five-gallon water cooler furnished.

DEPARTMENT OF BRIDGES.

Typewriter repaired, door lettered and 2 maps of The City of New York, 1 Brooklyn and 1 City Directory furnished.

DEPARTMENT OF HIGHWAYS.

1 Smith-Premier typewriter, 2 City Directories, 2 Brooklyn Directories and 1 6-foot book-keepers' desk furnished.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS, LIGHTING AND SUPPLIES.

A supply of law books, rubber stamps, table, chairs, etc., 4 stamping machines, 1 typewriter, 4 Kinsman electric-light lamps and 2 directories furnished; 20 yards of Brussels carpet were furnished and laid in general office of above Department. Window awnings complete, with necessary hardware, etc., were furnished and put up on windows of above Department; and at entrance in hall a brass railing, with gate, etc., was furnished and put up.

Deputy Commissioner's Office—Desk, chairs, wardrobe, etc., were furnished.

Engineer Inspector's Office—1 air pump, map, tracing paper, drawing materials, etc., furnished.

Bureau of Meter Tests—38 1/2 yards plain linoleum, 8 1/2 yards of stair oilcloth and 16 rubber plates furnished and laid. Seals, presses, wires, etc., also furnished, and cables of elevators were adjusted. Window shades were also furnished and put up.

Bureau of Repairs and Supplies—A supply of coal and wood for heating, etc., the different public buildings, courts and offices in the care of this Department was furnished; also a supply of ice, brooms, pails, soap, Sapolio, sponges, mops and handles, feather-dusters, scrubbing-brushes, etc., for the use of the different buildings. The order was renewed for use of horse and wagon for Superintendent of above Bureau. Among the many items of repairs made are plumbing, steam-fitting, gas-fitting, painting, carpentering, mason work, iron work, electrical work, repairing, furniture, etc. Lumber, hardware, paints, varnish, etc., for use of carpenters and painters in employ of this Department, were furnished. Contracts and specifications were drawn for furnishing and erecting two new elevators in Brownstone Building and the construction and erection of wrought-iron balcony with stairs and bookcases in Supreme Court, all of which, after being duly advertised, were awarded at public letting to lowest bidder. Orders were drawn for repairs and supplies, and 475 vouchers were drawn on Comptroller for payment.

FREE FLOATING BATHS.

The usual orders for small supplies and lumber were renewed; the anchors and chains on the East One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, East Fifty-first street and Battery baths were recovered and removed to Corporation yards and stored until next season; the baths were towed from their summer berths in this city to storage quarters, where they will be entirely overhauled and repaired so that they will be in perfect order for the forthcoming bathing season.

The bathing season just closed has been the most successful of any during their history. Opened June 20, 1898, and closed September 24, 1898, or about one month less than they are usually in commission, but for all that the largest number ever recorded availed themselves of their use.

SIR—In accordance with your instructions, I respectfully submit the following report of the transactions of this office for the quarter ending September 30, 1898:

Six men have been employed, especially in the field and office work of compiling maps of the Street Lighting Systems of the different boroughs and inspecting the Lighting of the Public Buildings. This work is still in progress.

Tables have been compiled of the average daily consumption of gas in each of the Public

Buildings during each month of the years 1894, 1895, 1896, 1897, 1898; and with the aid of reports from all Janitors of Public Buildings a weekly record has been kept of the present rate of consumption.

Owing to the wide variations in the pressure of illuminating gas, as furnished at different hours of the day and probable advantage of adopting a more uniform pressure, tests have been undertaken and are still in progress, having in view an improvement in the quality of lighting and a reduction in its cost in the different public buildings. In the principal markets these tests have shown a saving of 40 per cent. in the number of cubic feet of gas consumed, as compared with the corresponding quarter of the year 1897.

DEAR SIR—I herewith submit the following detailed statement of the transactions of the Bureau of Meter Tests, commencing May 25 up to June 30, 1898, and for the quarter ending September 30, 1898.

In order to pass inspection, meters must register accurately the amount of the gas delivered by the standard measure, at the rate of six feet per hour for each light the meter is marked to supply.

Meters passing inspection bear, soldered on top, a brass badge with the Inspector's name and number, and on the edge, directly over index, the date impressed with sealing-wax.

The total number of new and repaired meters received for inspection and test, ranging in size from three light up to three hundred light, were 8,501, of which 8,327 were found to be correct; 174 were rejected on account of registering fast or slow, or not being sound, and returned for repairs and readjustment, upon the request of the gas companies or consumers; 56 special tests were made and certificates issued for same, as follows:

BOARDS OF LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS.

TWENTY-FIRST DISTRICT, BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

MINUTES.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen, the members of the Local Board, Twenty-first District, met at 2 P. M., February 16, 1899, at the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, Municipal Building, Crotona Park.

Present—President Haffen, Councilman Murray, Alderman Geiger, Alderman McGrath, and Councilman Hottenroth.

Minutes of previous meeting read and adopted.

Belmont Avenue, laying out easterly line on the block between One Hundred and Seventy-sixth and One Hundred and Seventy-seventh Streets ten feet further east than at present, and to extend the said avenue south from One Hundred and Seventy-sixth Street to One Hundred and Seventy-fifth Street parallel with Crotona Avenue.

The Petition of James E. McKown, No. 1822 Arthur avenue, and six others dated November, 1, 1899, transmitted to this Board by the Board of Public Improvements under date of February 14, 1899, was read. On motion of Councilman Murray, seconded by Alderman Geiger, it was resolved that a hearing be had on this matter on March 2, 1899, at 2 P. M., at this office.

Lillian Place (formerly Division Street), between Boston Road and One Hundred and Seventy-seventh Street (Request to have same Restored to Map of The City of New York).

Petition of George S. Daniels No. 35, Nassau street, dated February 9, 1899, was read. President Haffen suggested that this place be restored to the Map of The City of New York, as shown upon the map of the former Village of West Farms. On motion of Alderman Geiger, seconded by Alderman McGrath, it was

Resolved, That this Board hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that Lillian place (formerly Division street) be restored to the Map of The City of New York, from Boston road to One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted to the said Board of Public Improvements.

East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth Street Opening, Boston Road to Third Avenue, a Width of Fifteen (15) feet.

Petition of Dennis J. Quirk, M. D., No. 1001 Boston road, advertised in CITY RECORD December 24, 1898, was read. Dr. Quirk appeared and stated that the property-owners were willing that the petition be amended to read fifteen (15) feet in width instead of twenty (20) feet as called for in the petition.

Alderman Geiger, to whom the matter was referred, stated that he had made an investigation and believed that the improvement petitioned for necessary and essential. He submitted a suggested plan of the improvement and suggested that the petition be amended to read "fifteen (15) feet in width" instead of twenty (20). The following was adopted:

Resolved, That this Board hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street be continued from Boston road to Third avenue, a width of fifteen (15) feet, including as far as practicable the division lines of property as per accompanying sketch, not to touch any existing buildings, and that the city acquire title thereto.

Macy Place, Regulating and Grading, from Prospect Avenue to Hewitt Place.

The following petition was read for the second time:

Hon. LOUIS F. HAFEN:

GENTLEMEN OF THE BOARD—Your petitioner, Theodore E. Macy, agent, respectfully petitions that permission be granted him to regulate and grade, curb and flag Macy place, as laid out on final map, from Prospect avenue to Hewitt place.

Said work to be done at his own expense and under the supervision of Department of Highways.

The undersigned owns nine-tenths of all the property included in above proceeding.

On motion of Councilman Murray, it was

Resolved, That this Board hereby recommends to the Municipal Assembly that permission be given to Theo. E. Macy to regulate and grade, curb and flag Macy place, as laid out on final map, from Prospect avenue to Hewitt place; the work to be done at his own expense under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways.

Woodlawn Road (Scott Avenue) Bridge.

Petition of William W. Niles, and forty-three others, dated January 16, 1899, was read. The Secretary informed the Board that President Haffen had already written the Corporation Counsel in reference to the bridge in question, and that he (President Haffen) had also communicated with the Commissioner of Parks in reference to the approach and that the Commissioner of Parks had answered under date of October 18 last.

"That the same is now being considered by this Department (Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx) and that no doubt, that the action that will be taken will be satisfactory to all parties concerned." The secretary was directed to communicate with the above-mentioned officials in the matter.

One Hundred and Fifty-third Street Bridge over the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad and the Melrose Avenue Viaduct connecting Melrose Avenue with Webster Avenue.

President Haffen suggested again the necessity of having these structures proceeded with at once. On motion of Councilman Hottenroth, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to request the Corporation Counsel again to have Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment appointed so that the construction of the One Hundred and Fifty-third Street Bridge over the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad, and of the viaduct over the New York and Harlem Railroad, connecting Melrose avenue from East One Hundred and Sixty-third street, at the junction of Webster avenue and Brook avenue, at One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street (both under contract), may be commenced without further delay.

Cleaning Sewers and Drains by Day's Labor.

The appropriation of \$45,000 for the cleaning of sewers and drains by contract was rediscussed, each member of the Board participating and each declaring himself in favor of having the work in question done by day's labor as it was formerly done in this borough. On motion of Councilman Hottenroth, it was resolved that a committee of the whole confer with the Mayor upon this subject at 1.30 P. M. on the afternoon of the 17th instant; and it was further

Resolved, That we, the members of the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby express our disapproval of the proposition to clean, by contract, sewers and drains in the Borough of The Bronx, believing it to be in the interest of the city to have the work done by day's labor as heretofore, and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby respectfully requested to transfer the sum of forty-five thousand dollars, appropriated to the Department of Sewers for "Contracts at Public Letting" in the Borough of The Bronx, to the account for "Pay-rolls and Supplies," for said borough.

Extension of Manhattan Railway Company's Lines.

Councilman Hottenroth stated that the Committee on Law and the Committee on Railroads, were to meet on the 17th instant, to discuss the question of the extension of the Manhattan Railway system, and he expressed the opinion that as many property-owners as possible should be requested to be present. At his suggestion it was agreed that the Committee of the Whole, as above appointed, should also attend the Manhattan Elevated Railway hearing.

Matters Pending in Board of Public Improvements.

On motion of Councilman Murray seconded by Councilman Hottenroth, the following preamble and resolution were adopted:

We would also like to have either a board or cinder walk, for in rainy weather it is almost impossible for children to go to school on account of the bad roads. We therefore ask you to be kind enough to have a resolution passed at your next Board meeting. These two improvements asked for are wanted on Unionport road, from Morris Park avenue to Miana street, along Miana street to Hunt avenue, along Hunt avenue to Bronxdale road.

Resolved, That this Board hereby recommends to the Department of Bridges that the work of building new bridges authorized across the Bronx river be hastened as rapidly as possible.

Lighting East of the Bronx River.

Alderman Gass called attention to the communication of Commissioner Henry S. Kearny of the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, dated January 17th last, stating that as no contracts had been made for lighting for the year 1899 it would be impossible for him to order lights recommended until a contract was made.

Councilman Hyland stated that a contract was in existence with the Bronx Gas and Electric Company and the Secretary of the Board was directed to call the attention of the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies to that fact.

WE, THE UNDERSIGNED COMMISSIONERS of Estimate and Assessment in the above-entitled matter, hereby give notice to all persons interested in this proceeding, and to the owner or owners, occupant or occupants of all houses and lots and improved and unimproved lands affected thereby, and to all others whom it may concern, to wit:

That we have completed our fifth partial and separate estimate of damage, embracing all that portion of the Grand Boulevard and Concourse and traverse roads designated as Section 5, and shown as Parcel A, P and Q on our damage map deposited as hereinafter mentioned, and extending from the southerly boundary line of the land formerly of the Metropolitan Real Estate Association to East Two Hundredth street with transverse road at East Two Hundredth street; and that all persons interested in this proceeding, or in any of the lands affected thereby, and having objections thereto, present their objection in writing to us, at our office, Nos. 90 and 92 West Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, on or before the 28th day of February, 1899, and that we, the said Commissioners, will hear parties so objecting within the ten week days next after the said 28th day of February, 1899, and for that purpose will be in attendance at our said office on each of said ten days at 3 o'clock P. M.

Second—That the abstract of said estimate, together with our damage maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates and other documents used by us in making our said estimate, have been deposited in the Bureau of Street Openings, in the Law Department of The City of New York, Nos. 90 and 92 West Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, in said city there to remain until the 7th day of March, 1899.

Third—That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 130 of the Laws of 1895, as amended by chapter 89 of the Laws of 1896, we propose to assess for benefit, which assessment will appear in our last partial and separate abstract of estimate and assessment, all those lots, pieces or parcels of land, situate, lying and being in The City of New York, which taken together are bounded and described as follows, viz.: Northerly by the line separating The City of New York from the City of Yonkers; easterly by the Bronx river and the East river; southerly by the Harlem river, The Bronx Kills and the East river, and westerly by the Hudson river and the Harlem river, all of which land taken together is known as the Twenty-third Ward and part of the Twenty-fourth Ward, as such territory was annexed to the City of New York by an act of the Legislature, designated as chapter 613 of the Laws of 1873, and acts amendatory thereof.

Fourth—That our fifth partial and separate report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, First Department, at a Special Term thereof, Part III., to be held in the County Court-house, in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, on the 3d day of April, 1899, at the opening of the Court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, a motion will be made that the said report be confirmed.
