

# THE CITY RECORD.

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### DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks, held Friday, December 7, 1900, at 2 o'clock P. M. Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting, held November 30, 1900, were approved.

A committee from the Board of Trade appeared and requested that the piers along the water front be renumbered, in order that their locations may be more easily understood by the public.

On motion, the matter was referred to the President and Commissioner Meyer and the Committee informed that the same would receive immediate consideration.

The Secretary reported that an order to show cause and preliminary injunction had been served upon the Department restraining the Board from granting to James Shewan & Sons a lease of the southerly side of the pier at the foot of East Fourth street, with the privilege of placing a floating dry dock thereat. His action in transmitting the papers to the Corporation Counsel for advice as to what steps the Board should take in the matter was approved.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board.

Hudson River Day Line, to berth the steamer "Albany" on the north side of the Pier foot of West Fifth street during the winter season, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

William H. Hastorf, to use and occupy the dumping-board on the Pier foot of East Thruway street, at the same rate of compensation as formerly paid, namely, \$500 per annum, payable monthly at the end of each month to the Treasurer, commencing July 11, 1900, the date upon which said Hastorf re-entered the premises.

Andrew Enk-meier, to maintain a float at the foot of One Hundred and Second street, Harlem river, compensation to be paid therefor at the same rate as heretofore, namely, \$10 per month, commencing December 1, 1900, payable monthly in advance to the Dock Master.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

John H. Starin, to repair the shed and plank platform on the southerly end of the bulkhead at Pier, new 13, North river.

Citizens' Steamboat Company, to lay a 4-inch pipe from Pier, new 46, North river, to connect with water-main on West street, all pavement to be taken up and relaid by the force of this Department at the cost of said company.

Hudson River Day Line, to make general repairs to the Pier foot of West Twenty-second street, during the ensuing six months, the work to be kept within existing lines and at least twenty-four hours' notice to be given the Engineer-in-Chief before the commencement of any such repairs.

Union Stockyard and Market Company, to make general repairs to the Pier foot of West Fourth street, during the ensuing six months, the work to be kept within existing lines and at least twenty-four hours' notice to be given the Engineer-in-Chief before the commencement of any such repairs.

New York Mastic Works, to dredge in the slip on the southerly side of the Pier foot of Seventh street, Long Island City.

Warren-Scharf Asphalt Paving Company, to dredge in the slips on the north and south sides of the Pier to a of Seventh street, Long Island City.

Standard Oil Company of New York, to repair its Pier at the foot of Tenth street, Long Island City, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Henry P. Kirkham & Son, to construct a basin near the foot of Conover street, Brooklyn, in accordance with plans submitted as amended.

Brooklyn Dock and Terminal Company, to repair the Pier between Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth streets, Brooklyn, the work to be kept within existing lines.

The following permits were granted to continue during the pleasure of the Board, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Peoples' Co-operative Ice Company, to place and maintain scales and scale houses on the Piers foot of West Thirty-ninth and East Sixty-first streets.

P. Ward, to drive about ten piles at his property at the foot of Camelia street, Astoria, Borough of Queens, for the purpose of mooring scow thereat.

Frank McWilliams, to drive piles around the old canal boats now located at his dry docks at West New Brighton, Staten Island, and to fill in behind same.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Comptroller, advising that his certificate has been indorsed upon Contract No. 696, for furnishing Manila rope, and that the same is now a valid contract.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Transmitting bills of costs in proceedings for the acquisition of water-front property between Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets, and at the foot of East Nineteenth street, between Nineteenth and Twentieth streets, between Twentieth and Twenty-first streets, at the foot of East Twenty-first street, and between Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets, East river. Chief Clerk directed to draw the necessary requisitions therefor.

2d. Advising that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has not yet approved the application for the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of the private interests in and to Piers, old 18, 19, 23, 24, 26, 32 and 33, East river.

On motion, the communication from C. H. Mallory & Co., in relation to the necessity for increased wharfage accommodations on the East river, was ordered on file, and the Secretary directed to request the Comptroller to take action on the application of this Department for consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the institution of the condemnation proceedings.

From the Department of Correction—Requesting that mooring piles for naphtha launch be driven near the cribwork at Riker's Island. Engineer-in-Chief directed to drive the necessary piles thereat.

From the Carroll Box and Lumber Company—Accepting the terms and conditions of the permit for the use of the bulkhead between Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets, East river.

From H. L. Herbert & Co.—Accepting the terms and conditions of the permit for the use of the northerly half of the bulkhead between Nineteenth and Twentieth streets, East river.

From Edward Wells, Jr., attorney—Transmitting notice of application to be made by the Barber Asphalt Paving Company for a grant of land under water at the foot of Sixth street, Long Island City.

From the International Navigation Company—Reporting that the cribwork at the outer end of Pier, new 14, North river, is constantly settling. Secretary directed to state that the difficulty complained of can be overcome by the extension of the pier out to the new pierhead-line, and that this Department will construct such extension provided said company will agree to pay an additional rental therefor the sum of five per cent. per annum on the cost of the work.

From Kane & Wright—Requesting permission to berth a manure scow on the north side of Pier 62, at the foot of Stanton street, East river.

On motion, by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Cram and Murphy, Commissioner Meyer voting in the negative, permission was granted to berth said scow thereat during the pleasure of the Board, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer, and the consent of the Health Department to be first obtained.

From Frank H. Brockway—Requesting permission to store brick on the bulkhead between One Hundred and Thirty-second and One Hundred and Thirty-third streets, North river. Application denied.

From the New York and College Point Ferry Company—In relation to the necessity for proper drainage at the foot of East Ninety-ninth and East One Hundredth streets. Engineer-in-Chief directed to construct box drains at the foot of said streets.

From the Citizens' Steamboat Company—Requesting permission to sublet Pier, new 46, North river, to the Maine Steamship Company.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Citizens' Steamboat Company to sublet to the Maine Steamship Company so much of the wharfage granted by a certain lease dated January 31, 1899, as may arise, accrue or become due at Pier, new 46, North river, from December 15, 1900, to March 15, 1901, provided that said Citizens' Steamboat Company and the surety on said lease, shall file in this Department a written agreement that their obligations under the provisions of said lease shall not in any manner be affected or impaired by reason of said subletting.

From the Treasurer—

1st. Reporting his inability to collect from the North-German Lloyd Steamship Company the cost of repairing Pier, new 31, North river, where damaged by the steamship "Bremen," and recommending that the claim be sent to the Corporation Counsel for collection. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Reporting his inability to collect from George C. Murphy rental for the use of the bulkhead at the foot of One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, Harlem river, from August 1 to October 1, 1900, and recommending that the permit to use said bulkhead be revoked as of October 1, 1900, the date upon which the premises were vacated, and that the claim for the rental therefor to that date, amounting to \$25, be sent to the Corporation Counsel for collection. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the New Jersey Steamboat Company for a berth on the south side of the Pier foot of West Thirty-ninth street be fixed at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged George Grossman for the use of the bulkhead between One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-second streets, North river, be fixed at the rate of \$1,000 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, commencing December 1, 1900. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Recommending that the application of A. C. Gilderleeve for a lease of land under water, between Dyckman and Two Hundred and Third streets, Harlem river, be denied. Recommendation adopted.

6th. Recommending that a renewal lease of the premises in the vicinity of Peck slip, East river, be granted the New Haven Steamboat Company for a term of five years, at an annual rental of \$14,520, subject to the conditions contained in the resolution adopted by the Board November 16, 1900.

On motion, the report of the Treasurer was approved, and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such cases made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm-let to the New Haven Steamboat Company, all and singular, the wharfage which may arise, accrue or become due, in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, for the use and occupancy of Pier 25, East river, and sixty feet of bulkhead adjoining the westerly side of Pier 25, westerly half of Pier 26, bulkhead between Piers 25 and 26 and platform in front of said bulkhead, together with privilege of using the sheds thereon, for a term of five years from the 1st day of May, 1901, at an annual rental of fourteen thousand five hundred and twenty dollars (\$14,520), payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer. It being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the New Haven Steamboat Company shall, within ten days from receipt hereof, file in this Department its written acceptance of the terms and conditions thereof, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions as at present embodied in leases of wharf property now used by this Department, and containing also the following covenants:

First—That said lease shall terminate whenever the title to the property owned by private parties and now leased to or occupied by said company, shall become vested in the City.

Second—That in the event that The City of New York shall at any time acquire, either by purchase or by the exercise of the right of eminent domain, for the improvement of the water front, the premises on the East river now leased to or occupied by, or which may during the continuance of the lease hereby granted be leased to or occupied by said company, then and in that event, and in every such event, no additional item or value shall be claimed by or allowed to said company nor shall The City of New York be required to pay any additional value or compensation by reason of any improvements which said company may make or cause to be made to the premises leased to or occupied by said company between the date of the adoption of this resolution and the date on which the title to said property becomes vested in the City.

7th. Recommending that the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company be granted leases of Pier, new 34, with the half bulkhead southerly thereof, at an annual rental of \$24,250 for the first term; and of the half bulkhead northerly of said pier at an annual rental of \$750 for the first term, the lessee to have the privilege of two renewal terms at an advance rental of five per cent. per annum on each renewal.

On motion, in accordance with the recommendation of the Treasurer, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That, by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such cases made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm-let to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, all and singular, the following described wharf property, to wit:

First—Pier, new 34, East river, together with the half bulkhead southerly therefrom, about ninety feet.

Second—The half bulkhead northerly of said Pier, new 34, East river, about ninety feet.

The rental for the said pier and bulkhead southerly therefrom shall be twenty-four thousand two hundred and fifty dollars (\$24,250) per annum, and shall be for a term of ten years from January 1, 1901, with the privilege of two renewals of ten years each at a rental of five per cent. advance on each renewal term.

The rental for the half bulkhead northerly of said pier shall be at the rate of seven hundred and fifty dollars (750) per annum, and shall commence whenever said bulkhead is completed and ready for occupancy, and shall be for a period coterminous with the lease of the pier and bulkhead southerly, namely: January 1, 1911, with the privilege of two renewals of ten years each at a rental of five per cent. advance on each renewal term.

The lessee shall have the privilege of mooring in front of said bulkheads, floating pontoons, and maintain same thereat during the term of the lease, or shall have the privilege of building a temporary wharf structure in front of said bulkheads extending outshore a distance not exceeding 50 feet, and to erect on said temporary wharf structure a shed; said temporary wharf structure and said shed to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board, and to be erected under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, in accordance with plans and specifications to be first submitted to and approved by the Board.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company to erect a shed on Pier, new 34, East river, said shed to be constructed in accordance with plans and specifications to be first submitted to and approved by this Board, and to be erected under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and to revert to and become the property of The City of New York, free from all incumbrances, upon the expiration or sooner termination of the lease of said pier.

Resolved, That Pier, new 34, East river, be and the same hereby is set aside during the term of the lease hereby granted, for the exclusive use of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company.

It is understood and agreed that the above resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company shall, within ten days from receipt hereof, file in this Department its written acceptance of the terms and conditions thereof, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions as at present embodied in the leases of wharf property now used by this Department.

8th. Recommending that Henry B. Turner be granted a lease for a term of five years, of the inner 350 feet of the new Pier at the foot of East Twenty-second street, at an annual rental of \$525, commencing from the date of the completion of the bulkhead thereat.

On motion, the recommendation of the Treasurer was approved and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That, by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board, and in pursuance of the statutes in such cases made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm-let unto Henry B. Turner all and singular the wharfage which may arise, accrue or become due, in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, for the use and occupancy of the following described property, to wit: The south side of the Pier at the foot of East Twenty-second street, extending from the bulkhead eastwardly a distance of 350 feet, for the term of five years, commencing from the date said pier and the bulkhead adjacent thereto are completed and ready for occupancy, at the yearly rental or sum of \$525 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer.







formed otherwise than by contract, as provided in section 821 of the Greater New York Charter, and that it be done by the force of this Department by days' work, except so much of the labor and material as is now or may hereafter be contracted for, and that all materials, tools and implements necessary for the above-mentioned work not heretofore contracted for or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Treasurer be and is hereby authorized to issue Treasurer's Orders for sprinkling with sand, the asphalt pavement under the control of this Department when, in his opinion, said pavement is rendered unsafe and dangerous by ice or sleet.

The Secretary reported that the pay-roll for the month of November, 1900, amounting to \$22,854.21, and for the week ending November 30, 1900, amounting to \$14,039.07, had been approved, audited and transmitted to the Department of Finance for payment.

The Board went into executive session at 3 P. M.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission—

1st. Submitting list of persons eligible for appointment as Mechanical Draughtsman.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That Max Raymond, having been certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission as eligible, be and he is hereby appointed Mechanical Draughtsman (structural), in this Department, on probation, with compensation at the rate of \$1,500 per annum, to take effect when he reports for duty.

2d. Submitting list of persons eligible for appointment as Dock Builders.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the following-named persons, having been certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission as eligible, be and they are hereby appointed as Dock Builders in this Department, with compensation at the rate of thirty-seven and one-half cents per hour while employed:

From the Engineer-in-Chief, recommending the discharge of Jacob A. Schmidt, Marine Souder, for failure to report for duty. Recommendation adopted.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the wages of laborers and others employed by this Department on concrete work be and the same is hereby fixed at the rate of 29 cents per hour while so employed. This change, however, not to affect any Laborers or others now appearing upon the rolls at a fixed monthly or weekly rate.

On motion, the compensation of James McMahon, Coxswain, was fixed at the rate of \$15 per week, commencing December 8, 1900.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to request the Municipal Civil Commission to consent to the change in title of Daniel J. Donohue from Souder to that of Marine Souder.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks, held Friday, December 14, 1900, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held December 7, 1900, were approved.

The following communications were referred to the Treasurer:

From the Atlantic Transport Company—Requesting that this Department erect a double-deck shed on Pier, new 40, North river, and a single deck shed on the bulkhead north and south of Piers, new 39 and 40, North river, and that a new lease of the premises be granted said company for a term of ten years, from March 1, 1901.

From the Hecker-Jones-Jewell Milling Company—Renewing its application for permission to run a condenser pipe through the bulkhead at the foot of Cherry street, East river.

A. W. Welch—Requesting permission to use and occupy an additional thirty feet of space on the north side of the Pier foot of Stanton street, East river.

The following reports on Secretary's Orders were referred to the Treasurer for collection:

No. 20501. Submitting cost of taking up and relaying pavement to permit repairs to gas pipe at the bulkhead between Pier "A" and Pier, new 1, North river, amounting to \$28.35, for collection from the Consolidated Gas Company.

No. 20502. Submitting cost of taking up and relaying pavement to permit repairs to gas service pipe at the foot of Chambers street, North river, amounting to \$342.30, for collection from the Consolidated Gas Company.

No. 20509. Submitting cost of relaying pavement at the foot of Chambers street, North river, taken up to permit repairs in the water pipe leading to the ferry thereat, amounting to \$25.20, for collection from the Erie Railroad Company.

No. 20511. Submitting cost of taking up and relaying pavement to permit repairs to gas service pipe in front of Piers, new 24 and new 34, North river, amounting to \$94.50 for each location, for collection from the Consolidated Gas Company.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board:

Kane & Wright, to stretch an apron from the Pier foot of Stanton street, East river, to the manure scow moored thereat, for the purpose of preventing material from falling into the river.

Thomas F. Kearney, to maintain a portable derrick on the Pier foot of Noble street, Brooklyn.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

New York Telephone Company, to substitute new chestnut poles for the old poles now maintained on West street, between Cortlandt and Christopher streets, North river; all pavement that may be taken up to be relaid by the force of this Department at the cost and expense of said company.

Southern Pacific Company, to repair water pipe leading to Pier, new 38, North river, all pavement to be taken up and relaid by the force of this Department at the cost and expense of said company.

Manhattan Railway Company, to dredge in the slips and in front of the adjoining docks at the foot of One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street and Eighth avenue, Harlem river.

A. D. Buschman, Louis Stauch and Gilbert Stratton, to construct two jetties, 175 feet long, at the foot of Buschman's walk, Coney Island.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Comptroller—Requesting information in relation to the desired acquisition of the private interests in and to the bulkhead between Catharine and Market streets, and Pier, old 36, East river. Action of the President in replying approved.

From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund—Transmitting copy of resolution adopted by said Commissioners approving the agreement entered into with the Protestant Episcopal Church Missionary Society for Saratoga, for the purchase of its 51 feet 3 inches of bulkhead on the southerly side of South street, East river, easterly of Market slip. Secretary directed to request the Corporation Counsel to take such action as is possible in order to hasten the early vesting of the title to the property in the City.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—Requesting that dredging be ordered under the dumping-board at the pier foot of Nineteenth street, North river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to order the necessary dredging thereat.

From the Electric Fireproofing Company—Accepting the terms and conditions of the permit granted for the use of the southerly half of the bulkhead between Nineteenth and Twentieth streets, East river.

From the New Haven Steamboat Company—Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted December 7, 1900, agreeing to lease to said company the premises in the vicinity of Peck slip, East river. Secretary directed to request the Corporation Counsel to prepare the necessary form of lease.

From the John P. Kane Company, Contractors—Inclosing consent of sureties to the extension of time to and including October 29, 1901, granted for the completion of the work of furnishing the first delivery of 2,500 barrels of cement under Contract No. 691.

From the Citizens' Steamboat Company and The United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, sureties—Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted December 7, 1900, granting permission for the subletting of Pier, new 46, North river, to the Maine Steamship Company to March 15, 1901.

From the Anchor Line—Requesting that action be taken on its application for an extension of the existing lease of Pier, new 54, North river.

From Joseph H. Colyer—Requesting that dredging be done in the slip at the foot of Washington street, Brooklyn. Engineer-in-Chief directed in order the necessary dredging thereat, and the Secretary directed to notify said Colyer that all future dredging must be done by those using the pier thereat.

From the Maine Steamship Company—Stating that it will vacate Pier 38, East river, on December 15, 1900. Engineer-in-Chief directed to take possession of the premises on that date, and to proceed with the work of improvement thereat as soon as possible.

From the Treasurer—Recommending that the compensation to be charged the Hudson River Day Line for the berth occupied by the steamer "Albany," on the north side of the pier foot of West Fifth street, be fixed at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

From the Dock Superintendent—

1st. Report for the week ending December 8, 1900.

2d. Stating that Dock Master Hamlin has been assigned to District No. 14 and Dock Master Powers to District No. 6.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Report for the week ending December 8, 1900.

2d. Reporting the commencement of the work of delivering manila rope under Contract No. 696, on December 10, 1900.

3. Reporting repairs required to the pavement on South street, between Pier 16 and 17, East river, and recommending that the Department of Highways be requested to make necessary repairs thereat. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Reporting damage to the extension to Pier, new 45, North river, between Pier No. 37, owned by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, and recommending that necessary repairs be made thereat at the cost and expense of said company. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Recommending that the lowest be directed to make necessary repairs to Pier, new 59, North river, and to repair and repave the sidewalk on said pier. Recommendation adopted.

6th. Reporting a hole in the bulkhead on the south side of Chambers street, North river, and recommending that the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, the company, be directed to make necessary repairs thereat. Recommendation adopted.

7th. Reporting work on the sidewalk between Chambers and Fifth streets, North river, and recommending that the Glasgow Ice Company be directed to make necessary repairs to the pavement thereat. Recommendation adopted.

8th. Recommending that repairs be made by the force of this Department to the floating landing south of Pier "A," North river, and to the walking way on the bulkhead between One Hundred and Third and One Hundred and Fourth streets, Harlem river. Recommendation adopted.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 20462, stating that the work of building a new bulkhead and platform in front of the property adjoining the wharfery side of Right's street, East river, was completed November 29, 1900, and structures covering an area of land about 2,014 square feet. Treasurer authorized to direct right thereat from the York City Dockmaster Hygeia Ice Company in accordance with the resolution adopted October 19, 1900, namely, at the rate of \$500 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer.

The action of the Secretary in notifying the Department of Parks that the Piers at the foot of Bay Ridge avenue, and at the foot of Seventy-ninth, Eighty-eighth and Ninety-ninth streets, in front of the Bay Ridge parkway, Borough of Brooklyn, are under the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks and Ferries, to whom all wharfage collected should be transmitted, was approved, and the communication from the Department of Parks stating that the matter has been referred to the Commissioner of Parks for the Borough of Brooklyn, placed on file.
