DEAR SIR—From report made to me by the General Bookkeeper of this Department I find that the expenditures and liabilities on account of the appropriation "Contingencies, Department of Water Supply, Borough of Brooklyn, for 1901," exceed the appropriation by about \$600, and that the expenditures and liabilities on account of "Contingencies, Department of Water Supply, Borough of Queens, for 1901," exceed the appropriation by \$300.

Carlin & Co., if it is finally determined, after taking up the present caisson, that it was not built as per specifications of general contract of P. J. Carlin & Co.; and

Whereas, At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held March 31, 1902, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 3, chapter 626 of the Laws of 1896, as amended by chapter 642 of the Laws of 1897, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the extra work and changes in the contract of P. J. Carlin & Co., for the construction of the steel cells in the new City Prison: For cutting out openings for dumb-waiters at the City Prison, and all mason work in connection with same, and for the cutting out of the holes required in steel walls of cells, in connection with steam heating, at a cost not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500), as requested by the Commissioner of Correction, under date of March 5, 1902, subject, however, to the consent thereto, in writing, of the contractors and their sureties.

This approval is given on the express understanding that the question whether this work is called for and should be done, under the contract of P. J. Carlin & Co., for the construction of the steel cells, shall be determined at the completion of the contract, and if it is decided that it comes within the terms of the specifications and plans of said contract, then the cost of this work shall be deducted from final payment of said contract of P. J. Carlin & Co.; be and it is hereby

Post, of Nos. 33 and 35 East Seventeenth street, appointed by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, July 2, 1896, Consulting Architect to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for the improvements on the new City Prison (the Tombs) done under the authority granted to the Department of Correction by chapter 626 of the Laws of 1896, is hereby directed to make an examination of the extra works allowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 28 and March 31, 1902, and make a full report to this Board, whether any of the specified works are included in any contracts, and as such should be paid for by the contractors; and it is

The Comptroller presented the following report relative to fire insurance on City property:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—I am in receipt of a communication from the Commissioner of Docks, dated March 14, 1902, which reads as follows:

"I beg to advise that I have directed, if you so approve, that bids be asked upon a schedule of insurance expiring during the current year, in responsible companies, public notice thereof to be given according to the practice of this Department in the 'City Record,' and a postal card sent from this office to all prominent insurance companies and agents, calling their attention to said advertisement.

"This procedure will be adopted in the future unless we hear from you that, after a further consideration of the matter, you deem it inadvisable.

"Inasmuch as the contracts heretofore sent you for insurance have not yet been approved, will you please express your opinion as to the advisability of abolishing all insurance on the buildings and floating property of this Department.

"It appears that during the past year the sum of \$8,381.67 was expended for premiums on insurance, while insurance on the new tug 'Brooklyn,' not yet placed, will increase this amount by about \$1,000. The only sum recovered by the Department during the past twelve years, I am informed, and the only sum probably recovered during the existence of the Department, was \$275, due to an accident to the tug 'Richard Croker' in the year 1900."

I desire to call the attention of the Board to the fact that the custom of the City is to carry its own insurance, except in the case of certain isolated buildings in the parks, steamboats and some other isolated property, school buildings in course of construction, school houses and furniture in Queens and Richmond, and the Fulton and West Washington Markets.

The City has lost very few buildings or property by fire, and the result of the policy of not insuring all public property has been an enormous saving to the City.

In the case of the Dock Department, the statement is that the only loss since 1851 has been one of \$275. I do not know what premiums have been paid during that period, but had it been at the rate paid last year (\$8,381.67), it would have amounted to about half a million dollars, with a loss of but \$275.

The Commissioner of Docks asks for an expression of opinion as to the advisability of abolishing all insurance on the buildings and floating property of his Department, and I respectfully submit the matter for consideration.

SIR—A communication from your Department by its Chief Clerk, dated March 14, was received, which reads as follows:

"The Police Commissioner this day directed the following proceedings:

"Whereas, In the Departmental Estimate of the Police Department of The City of New York for the year 1902, application was made for the appropriation for account entitled 'Supplies for Police' in the sum of \$440,193.55, including therein the sum of \$60,000, for the item 'Gas and Light for Station-houses and Central Department';

"Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriated for the year 1902, for account entitled 'Supplies for Police,' including such item, the sum of \$312,000, leaving a deficit of \$128,193.55, which would leave for expenditure for item 'Gas and Light for Station-houses and Central Department' approximately the sum of \$42,600;

"Whereas, The Commissioner is informed that under the Greater New York Charter the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity shall have cognizance and control of the making and performance of contracts, and for the execution of the same, in the matter of furnishing the City or any part thereof with gas, electricity or any other illuminant, etc.; and

"Furnish all labor and materials and form a sump of 24 inches by 36 inches heavy tile and cast iron frame and cover; one length of the tile to be perforated. Fill around the tile with broken stone. Tile to have openings for inlet and outlet. Make connections from pipe trench to sump and from sump to present soil line. Inlet sump and outlet to be 6 inches and all fittings and pipe as well as necessary fittings in present soil line to be extra heavy cast iron. All joints to be made with oakum and lead, to conform with City requirements. Do all necessary excavating and filling and remove rubbish."

In reply I would report that this sump is necessary to drain the steam pipe trenches in cellar of the New City Prison, and was not specified or included in the contract of Howe & Bassett for plumbing and drainage of the New City Prison.

The contract of Howe & Bassett amounts to \$66,500, and pursuant to section 3, chapter 626 of the Laws of 1896, alterations and changes can be made with the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, provided that such alterations shall in no case involve or require an increase greater than 5 per cent. of the whole expenditure provided for in said contract.

The contract of Howe & Bassett, as stated above, being \$66,500, 5 per cent. of this amount is \$3,325.

No extra work has been approved of by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in connection with the contract of Howe and Bassett, hence the extra work, amounting to \$245, can properly be allowed since it is within the limits prescribed by the law.

The requirements of the law having all been fulfilled, the consent of the sureties having been given, and the work, in my judgment, being necessary, I think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly give its approval to the work, as requested by the Commissioner of Correction.

It is true that the pipes were broken or cracked by the water freezing in them, but in my opinion, the contractors should protect their work until it is finally accepted by the City.

Since there is a difference of opinion who should repair the pipes it may be as well to allow for the expenditure, and determine who should be responsible at the completion of the contract of P. J. Carlin & Co.

In reply I would report that last January, when I began an examination of the premises, I found that it was owned by the Millinery Building and Loan Association of No. 409 Broadway, which was winding up its affairs, and which, several months ago, agreed, I am told, to sell all its property at Hollis, about 22 acres, to the Corporation Liquidating Company of No. 21 Park row. A receiver has since been appointed, and a sale of all the property made to the Corporation Liquidating Company, who now offers the plot (Lots Nos. 222 to 233, inclusive, in Block 13, map of Hollis Centre), for \$1,500.

This price I consider excessive, and have so informed Mr. Joshua T. Butler, Secretary of the Company, but have been unable to receive a better offer. The premises have been appraised by a real estate expert at \$750, and in my opinion, this appraisal represents the full market value of the property.

This additional strip is not absolutely necessary for school purposes, as the present site (300 feet by 176.49 feet by 158.78 feet by 300 feet), is sufficiently large for the school building, which is situated in a very thinly settled district, and has 287 sittings, and only an average attendance of 180, with no children taught in part time classes. The only reason for acquiring the short lots on Vera avenue is to square out the school property.

Since a reasonable proposition cannot be received for the purchase of the premises, I would recommend that negotiations of all kinds, either by purchase or condemnation proceedings, be discontinued, until such time when a favorable offer is made.

The said contracts have been approved, as to form, by the Corporation Counsel. The contract, as advertised in the proposals to contractors, is:

"For loading and trimming deck scows and dumpers of the Department of Street Cleaning and for the privilege of sorting and picking over and appropriating certain of the refuse at the dumps of the said Department in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx."

The work is to be begun on the Monday following the date of the contract, the term of which is to be for one year, with the provision that it may be terminated at any time by the Commissioner on thirty (30) days' notice to the contractor.

The surety required shall be five thousand dollars (\$5,000). The adequacy and sufficiency of the sureties to be approved by the Comptroller after the award is made and prior to the signing of the contract.

Each bid or estimate to be accompanied by a certified check for five per centum of the amount for which the bidder proposes to perform the work for one year.

The compensation to be stated at a price per week for each of the dumps, as enumerated below, viz:

**East Side Dumps—**

Clinton street.  
Stanton street.  
East Twenty-ninth street.  
East Forty-sixth street.  
East Sixty-first street.  
East One Hundred and Tenth street.  
Lincoln avenue and Harlem river.

**West Side Dumps—**

Canal street.

West Thirtieth street.  
West Forty-seventh street.  
West One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street.

The total of the price bid for the work at the above dumps must be for the entire work under contract at all of said dumps.

The contract is drawn with care.

Specification 1—Requires the contractor to furnish all labor, implements and materials and do all the work required by the Commissioner, to load and trim all deck scows and dumpers used by the Department of Street Cleaning in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and to clean the dumping boards, as may be required at the dumps named.

Specification 2—Contractor, whenever required, to whitewash the various dumping boards and runs in thorough and workmanlike manner.

Specification 3—To remove promptly and carry away from beneath the dumping boards all materials picked from scows and temporarily stored under dumping boards, and to keep entire space beneath dumping boards cleaned and whitewashed at all times.

Specification 4—To furnish and keep at all times beneath each dumping board, at convenient place, six round-bottomed fire buckets filled with water, and not to build fires of any kind under dumping boards, except in stoves approved by Commissioner.

Specification 5—To prevent any refuse material from falling into the water, as far as possible, and to cause all material that may have fallen in to be at once picked up.

Specification 6—To install and furnish at his own expense electric lights at Canal street, Clinton street and East Twenty-ninth street dumps.

Specification 7—To remove daily all refuse material separated in process of the work, and should refuse accumulate upon the dumping boards by reason of delay in scows or other cause, the contractor to remove such refuse to scows at earliest practicable moment.

Specification 8—The contractor not to assort, pick over or remove or appropriate from said dumps, any bones, fats or other refuse of similar organic nature, but said organic matter so-called, shall not include paper, rags, rope, wood and similar fibrous substances and metals.

Specification 9—The laborers furnished by the contractor shall work during such hours of day or night as may be required by the Commissioner, and contractor will dismiss from his service any of his agents or employees who by disorderly, quarrelsome or disobedient conduct, or by incompetency, lessen the efficiency of the work.

By clause C the contractor shall have the privilege of picking over all refuse at said dumps, including paper, rags, wood and metal objects, except the aforesaid bones, fats or other refuse of similar organic nature, and shall have the right to appropriate to his own use and behoof the said material.

By clause

"(D) In case of any change of location or number of dumps or in the method of disposition from that employed at the time of the award of this contract whereby the value of the privilege provided for herein is reduced from the value as estimated in the Contractor's bid the compensation for the value of the dumps as determined by said bid may be decreased by the Commissioner in a fair proportion in the form of a rebate of the price paid from week for which the privilege during the time of such decrease in value of an amount not exceeding the actual loss of value at the dump or dumps where such decrease occurs; and if the value of the privilege at any of the dumps shall be increased by such change, then and in that case by the payment by the Contractor of an increased amount for each week during the time of such increase by the value of an amount not to exceed the actual increase in the value for this period at the dump or dumps where such increase occurs.

"(E) In order to determine the decrease or increase aforesaid the decision of the Superintendent of Final Disposition of the Department shall be accepted by both parties hereto as final and conclusive, provided, however, that the Contractor shall have the right at any time during the continuance of this contract within thirty (30) days after the completion of the same to submit to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the said decision, by way of appeal and then and in that case the final decision thereon by the said Board shall be conclusive as to both parties."

GENTLEMEN—I inclose herein a tabulation of the various bids for the removal of ashes, etc., in the Borough of Queens. Of these bids as they appear upon their face for the full eight months from May 1 to the end of the year, Walters was slightly the lowest bidder, and if he could have started upon the execution of his contract by the 1st of May, no question would arise.

The bids were opened on April 24, and the contract was sent to the Board of Estimate, and was approved by it on April 30. After that, however, occurred the following delay, for which the Department of Finance is not responsible.

The papers were not sent here for approval of the sureties until the 5th day of May. The sureties did not appear for examination, and substitute sureties were sent here on the 9th of May, and returned to the President of the Borough of Queens for his consent of the substitution, which is required by the ordinance. The papers were not returned here again until the 12th day of May, when, the sureties being sufficient, they were approved. The contract has not yet been presented here for registration and certification. It, therefore, by its terms, is not yet in force, and Walters cannot now operate under it for more than seven and a half months. The result of this is that Walters is no longer the lowest bidder for the less than seven and a half months remaining.

I submit these facts to you for your consideration.

In that letter I stated at considerable length the reasons why those amounts were needed and called attention to the fact that there were a large number of bills incurred during the previous administration which were still unpaid. I called the attention of the Board to the fact that the amount actually disbursed for General Contingencies during 1901 was \$69,655.82, which did not include the bills remaining unpaid amounting to the sum of \$18,567.92, making the total amount of the indebtedness actually incurred for 1901 \$88,223.74. I also referred to the fact that there were outstanding bills for Contingent Counsel Fees still unpaid amounting to over \$40,000.

The Board of Estimate has appropriated the sum of \$50,000 for General Contingencies including Office Supplies, etc., and \$25,000 for Contingent Counsel Fees including Deficiencies, and I am informed that this was done with the understanding that the deficiencies in last year's appropriation would be met by transfers from funds which were available for that purpose now in the hands of the Comptroller.

Most of the unpaid bills for general contingencies were for small amounts and in a number of cases it was absolutely necessary to pay these bills at once for the reason that the persons were needed as witnesses in other cases by the City. As each of these was a valid claim against the City, I have already certified the vouchers and the persons have received their warrants.

I attach hereto four schedules, as follows:

The amount last mentioned is mostly made up of two items, namely, counsel fees claimed by Mr. John R. Bennett for services in connection with the case of Brickill against The City, and a fee of \$10,000, claimed by Mr. William L. Turner for services in various litigations involving the validity of the taxes against the Metropolitan and Manhattan Railway Companies. In regard to both of these bills, it is proper for me to say that I am not yet prepared to certify the full amount claimed. It is evident that under the arrangement made by my predecessors, a very large sum of money is due to these two gentlemen for their services, the litigations for which charges are made having been very extensive and involving very large amounts of money. I hope, however, within a few days, to be able to arrive at an understanding with them as to the amounts to be certified, but I can not hold out any expectation that they will be very greatly less than the figures asked.

I find that there was an unexpended balance in this Department for the year 1901 amounting to \$3,675.55. If there are similar unexpended balances in other departments I would suggest that they be used in making the transfers which I am about to suggest.

I make the following suggestions and ask that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment take the necessary action thereon.

First—That the sum of \$13,910.09 be transferred from any available funds now in the hands of the Comptroller to the appropriation to this Department for "Supplies and Contingencies, including Deficiencies, 1902," to reimburse the Department for the deficiencies for 1901 already paid out of the appropriation for 1902. These are given in detail in schedule "A," attached to this letter.

Second—That the sum of \$6,019.09 be transferred from any available funds now in the hands of the Comptroller to the appropriation to this Department for "Supplies and Contingencies, including Deficiencies, 1902," to provide for the payment of the bills in schedule "B," attached to this letter.

Third—That the sum of \$1,500 be transferred from any available funds now in the hands of the Comptroller to the appropriation to this Department for "Contingent Counsel Fees, including Deficiencies, 1902," to reimburse this Department for the amount paid out for the bill mentioned in schedule "C," attached to this letter.

Fourth—That the sum of \$42,800 be transferred from any available funds now in the hands of the Comptroller to the appropriation to this Department for "Contingent Counsel Fees, including Deficiencies, 1902," to provide for the payment of the bills for deficiencies mentioned in schedule "D," of this letter.

The Comptroller presented the following:

THE ELECTRICAL REFLECTOR COMPANY,

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—We understand that a resolution will come before your Honorable Body on Friday, May 16, to authorize the expenditure of \$40,000 for the purpose of providing suitable illuminated street corner signs in the Borough of Manhattan, pursuant to the request of the Board of Aldermen. Believing that you desire to obtain the most economical, efficient and artistic sign for the least possible expenditure of money, we respectfully urge upon your Honorable Board the merits of our sign.

The Electrical Reflector Company is the owner and manufacturer of an illuminated sign adapted for the purpose desired, and much more economical, efficient and artistic than any that have heretofore been proposed. The sign has been placed and is working successfully on the following electric light poles:

1. On the southwest corner of Twenty-eighth street and Fifth avenue.
2. On the southeast corner of Forty-fifth street and Madison avenue.
3. On the northwest corner of Seventy-second street and Broadway.

At your meeting on Friday, May 9, our sign was the subject of consideration and was approved, not only by the officers of the West End Association, who very magnanimously, at that time, admitted that the sign which they had theretofore proposed was by no means as good as ours, and who recommended the adoption of our sign, but also by the President of the Borough of Manhattan, who stated that our sign was a good one for the double light electric pole, but did not think it good for the shepherd-crook pole. His Honor the Mayor then suggested that we place a sign on a shepherd-crook pole. This was immediately done on the pole at the Northwest corner of Seventy-second street and Broadway, and by the evidence of all who have seen it, the sign is an unqualified success.

The only other illuminated sign offered for your consideration is the one of the Edison Electric Lighting Company. As we understand their proposition, it is to furnish signs for both gas and electric light posts at \$2.50 per sign, and to furnish the light necessary to illuminate the signs at the rate of \$7.50 yearly for electric light and \$12.50 yearly for gas light. On the calculation that there are 2,200 corner posts in the Borough of Manhattan, 600 of which are electric and 1,600 of which are gas posts, the total expenditure required under the Edison system would be as follows:

2,200 signs at \$2.50 each.....	\$5,500 00
Yearly maintenance of 600 electric light signs, at \$7.50 each.....	4,500 00
Yearly maintenance of 1,600 gas light signs, at \$12.50 each.....	20,000 00
Total cost of signs and first year's maintenance.....	\$30,000 00

There would be an annual expenditure of \$24,500 for the maintenance of these signs.

As against this proposition of the Edison Company, we will submit the two following alternative propositions:

First—We will sell our signs to the City and erect them, ready for use, guaranteed for ten years against the usual wear and tear, at the following prices:

1,600 Welsbach gas light signs, at \$10 each.....	\$16,000 00
600 Electric light signs, at \$15 each.....	9,000 00
Total.....	\$25,000 00

There will be no cost to the City whatsoever for maintenance, and no cost for illumination. These signs do not obstruct the light, so that the illumination now given to the City would be maintained free and clear, and the City would not be deprived of any light by the erection of our signs. This initial expense will be the only expense to the City for a period of ten years or more, under usual wear and tear.

Second—We will furnish the 2,200 gas and electric light signs at \$2.50 each, and we will maintain the 1,600 gas light signs, as long as the present illumination of the City continues, at \$2.50 per sign per annum, and the 600 electric light signs at \$5 per sign per annum. The total is shown as follows:

Furnishing 2,200 signs at \$2.50 each.....	\$5,500 00
Yearly maintenance of 1,600 gas light signs at \$2.50 each.....	4,500 00
Yearly maintenance of 600 electric light signs at \$5 each.....	3,000 00
Total for yearly maintenance.....	7,500 00
Total expenditure for first year.....	\$13,000 00

The total cost of the Edison Company's sign for the first year would be \$30,000 and for each year thereafter \$24,500. We will make this second proposition on the basis that we obtain a contract for three years or more from the City.

We guarantee that the material used in the construction of our signs will be iron and glass, the best that can be obtained, and no tin whatsoever will be used in the manufacture thereof.

We would respectfully request that we be allowed an opportunity to compete for the erection of these signs, and that we, or our attorneys, Messrs. Liebuwna & Naumberg, be given an opportunity to be heard before your honorable body in reference to the merits of our signs.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—The agitation for street signs has been adroitly managed in the interest of a plan which, if adopted, will eventually result in large and needless annual expense. Nobody denies that street signs are needed, and I am and have always been ready to vote for a proper appropriation for that purpose. Were New York to follow the example of other cities, simple signs which plainly denote the streets would be provided, and the first cost would be all, except the slight expense of renewals and repairs. Wherever signs such as are used in London and Paris would not be clearly seen in our streets, there would arise a problem of street lighting, not of illuminated signs; or if illuminated signs be still needed, they might be provided at reasonable and a single cost by reflectors attached to the electric light poles, after the manner approved by the West End Association, which seems to have studied the question and to thoroughly understand it. It is conceded that the reflector sign is entirely satisfactory on the straight electric light poles. It is now on exhibition on the crooked poles and the Welsbach lights, and I am informed works equally as well there. With a real desire to accomplish the object at the lowest cost, it is undeniable that the streets can be adequately marked by these illuminated signs without the recurring and increasing annual expense.

But the agitation has been so conducted that every one who opposes the recurring annual charge of from \$7.50 to \$12 per sign for interior lighting of the sign—a lighting expense which will not illuminate the streets—is falsely put in the position of opposing street signs at all.

The project comes before this Board in a form which requires unanimous consent. It could have more properly been introduced last month as a Budget item, to carry which a majority would have sufficed. Under such circumstances I shall not feel that a single dissent ought to be interposed against the will of all the other members of the Board, especially as such dissent might prevent altogether the doing of a most necessary thing. I shall therefore move that none of the money be expended on signs which will involve the annual charge for maintenance, and if every other member of the Board be against the amendment, I shall not refuse to concur in a resolution which will permit the installing of the signs which will cause a recurring annual expense. But if Manhattan is to have such an allowance it will be impossible to discriminate against the other boroughs, and Brooklyn, Bronx, Queens and Richmond will rightly ask similar provision. This Board would thus lay the basis of an utterly needless charge in the Budget which will soon amount to a large sum, doubtless at least one hundred thousand dollars. The whole problem is whether a necessary thing shall or shall not be done extravagantly. I believe in doing it, but in doing it without needless extravagance.

Hon. SETH LOW, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIR—The resolution unanimously adopted by the Board of Aldermen, authorizing the expenditure of \$40,000 for the erection and illumination of street signs for this borough, will, I presume, be acted upon to-day by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and the revenue bonds authorized.

I have already given, orally, my views and intentions with respect to these signs. I desire now to more specifically inform the Board, so as to make it a matter of record, that I intend to erect 2,126 signs, most of them to be illuminated from within, upon the principal thoroughfares of this city traversed by street cars. This will include, wherever necessary, the avenues east of Third avenue, and from Third avenue to Tenth avenue, both inclusive. A map on file in my office will show in detail where these signs are to be located.

There will be, in all, 683 signs on electric light poles on corners, and 1,443 signs on lamp posts, some of which are in use, and many dismantled. These signs are of a character already approved by the Municipal Art Society, after a most careful, patient and disinterested investigation of the entire subject. They will be not only legible, but artistic in character and moderate in price.

At the meeting of the Municipal Art Commission held on Tuesday, May 13, the design for an illuminated sign heretofore selected by me was unanimously approved.

In addition to these, should the appropriation be made, it is my intention to place 6,000 signs on the houses on street corners of the blue enameled type. These can be manufactured by any sign manufacturer or iron worker, and will, of course, be thrown open to public competition in conformity with the provisions of the Charter. None of these signs is patented.

The Comptroller moved to amend by adding the words "provided that none of this money shall be spent for signs that will involve an annual expense for lighting."

The question was then taken upon the original resolution.

The President of the Board of Aldermen offered the following:
