WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU.

During the Quarter Ending June 30, 1904.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health; with the execution of the orders of the Board; with the care of contagious diseases; with the inspection of foods and offensive trades; with the inspection of mercantile establishments and issuance of employment certificates; with the pathological, bacteriological and chemical research and investigations, and with the inspection of scholars attending the public, parochial and private schools:

The number of inspections and reinspections made was 434,557, classified as follows:

By the Division of Inspection.....	238,265

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instructions and authority of the Board, granted 1,147 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, and 3,508 miscellaneous permits, under the Sanitary Code.

Such teacher in charge shall hold an assistant to principal (head of department) or a higher license, and shall be regularly appointed for the district in which such school of the fourth order is situated, and shall be assigned to the charge of such school by the Board of Superintendents. Whenever, by reason of increase in the number of classes in a school of the fourth order, such school shall become a school of a higher order, the assignment of the teacher in charge of said school of the fourth order shall immediately terminate, and the said teacher in charge shall be subject to transfer, without diminution of rank or pay, either to another school of the fourth order or to any other school in which the services of an assistant to principal may be required, and the vacancy created in the principalship of said school of the higher order by the aforesaid increase in the number of classes shall be immediately filled, either by the regular appointment or transfer of a principal of a school of a higher order, or in accordance with the provisions of subdivision 12 of this section.

Amending subdivision 6 of section 50 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education so as to read as follows:

6. Schools of the fifth order (unless grouped as provided in subdivision 2 of this section) shall be in charge of a teacher assigned by the Board of Superintendents, who shall be designated the senior teacher. Whenever, by reason of increase in the number of classes in a school of the fifth order, such school shall become a school of the fourth order, the assignment and designation of said senior teacher as such shall immediately terminate, and the vacancy created in the position of teacher in charge of said school of the fourth order by the aforesaid increase in the number of classes shall be immediately filled, either by appointment or transfer, or in accordance with the provisions of subdivision 12 of this section.

Amending section 50 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education by adding thereto a new subdivision, to be designated as subdivision 12, as follows:

12. Committee on By-Laws and Legislation.

A communication from Hon. A. S. Draper, State Commissioner of Education, addressed to the President, in favor of an appeal in the case of Mabel V. Price, was read.

Mr. Schmitt moved that the second resolution attached to the report of the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation be amended by adding thereto the following: "And to issue licenses to all ladies having the same or similar claims as Miss Price, the plaintiff in the action."

Discussion ensued, participated in by Mr. Man and the City Superintendent of Schools.

Mr. Wingate raised the point of order that the City Superintendent was not speaking to the question before the Board.

The Chair decided that the point of order was well taken.

The Chair put the question whether the Board would adopt the amendment offered by Mr. Schmitt, and it was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Ayes—The President, and Messrs. Aldcroft, Barrett, Cunliffe, Greene, Haupt, Higgins, Higginson, Jonas, Lummis, McGowan, Man, Partridge, Payne, Schmitt, A. Stern, M. S. Stern, Vandenhoff, Warburg, Wilsey, Wingate and Winthrop—22.

Nays—Messrs. Backus, Collier, Everett and Frissell—4.

Discussion of the report and resolutions as amended was resumed, and was participated in by the City Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Wingate, Mr. Everett and Mr. A. Stern.

The President put the question whether the Board would approve the report of the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation and adopt the resolutions attached thereto, as amended, and it was decided in the affirmative.

The following were ordered to be printed in the Minutes:

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on By-Laws and Legislation respectfully reports that it has received from the Corporation Counsel under date of December 31, 1904, an opinion in reference to the power of the Board of Education in the enforcement of the Compulsory Education Law, which is deemed of sufficient importance to be made a part of the records of the Board. Said opinion reads as follows:

"I am in receipt of your communications bearing date respectively December 1, and December 28, 1904, requesting my advice relative to the power of the Board of Education to enforce the provisions of section 9, chapter 459, Laws of 1903, known as the Compulsory Education Law.

"That part of the law concerning which you desire specific advice reads as follows:

"Every child suspended from attendance upon instruction by the authorities in charge of furnishing such instruction for more than one week, shall be required to attend such truant school during the period of such suspension."

"You state that two of the City Magistrates have differed in their construction of this statute, one holding that an attendance officer has power to arrest a truant child under practically all circumstances, and the other holding that an arrest by him without a warrant is unauthorized.

"The only case of which I am aware in which an attendance officer may arrest without a warrant is the one specifically designated by statute.

"Section 8 of the Compulsory Education Law provides:

"The attendance officer may arrest, without warrant, any child between eight and sixteen years of age found away from its home and who then is a truant from instruction upon which he is lawfully required to attend within the city or district of such attendance officer. He shall forthwith deliver the child so arrested either to the custody of the person in parental relation to the child or the teacher from whom such child is then a truant, or in case of habitual and incorrigible truants, shall bring them before a police magistrate for commitment by him to a truant school as provided for in the next section. * * * *"

"It will be seen, therefore, that in only one event may the attendance officer arrest without a warrant—that is to say, when the child is away from home and is a truant from instruction. If the child is at home either with or without the consent of those standing in loco parentis, it is necessary, in my opinion, for the attendance officer to procure a warrant.

"It is my opinion that the provisions of section 9 which are here quoted cannot legally be enforced by the Board of Education without recourse to a committing Magistrate. In the absence of the most explicit statutory enactment, I cannot believe that it was the intention of the Legislature to vest the Board of Education with power to commit a child to a truant school against the consent of those standing in parental relation. If they refuse their assent, it is necessary in my opinion to obtain a warrant from a Police Magistrate for the arrest of the child, and to make application to the Magistrate to commit the child to a truant school pursuant to the provisions of section 9.

"For the general information of the Board relative to the authority of attendance officers, I refer you to the case of Reynolds vs. The Board of Education, 33 App. Div., 88."

Resolved, That the Board of Education hereby grants permission to the City Superintendent of Schools, Dr. William H. Maxwell, to District Superintendent Evangeline E. Whitney, and to the Director of Manual Training, Dr. James P. Haney, to attend this meeting, and that their expenses be paid.

Whereas, It has been brought to the attention of the Executive Committee on the Nautical School that Michael A. T. O'Sullivan, a pupil or cadet on the schoolship "St. Mary's," did on January 14, 1905, at the risk of his own life, rescue one Walter Jones from drowning in the East river, at the foot of East Twenty-fourth street; and

Whereas, Such conduct deserves especial commendation and recognition; therefore be it

Resolved, That this Board does hereby attest its appreciation of the heroic conduct of Michael A. T. O'Sullivan in rescuing Mr. Walter Jones from drowning in the East river on the night of January 14, 1905, at the risk of his own life; and be it further

Resolved, That copies of the foregoing preamble and resolution be sent to said Michael A. T. O'Sullivan and to the Superintendent of the schoolship.

New Business.

The President announced that the next order of business would be the election of a member of the Executive Committee, to fill the vacancy caused by the expiration of the term of office of Mr. Adolph Kiendl as a member of the Board of Education.

Mr. Partridge moved that the election of a member of the Executive Committee be laid over until the meeting of the Board to be held on February 23, 1905.

Adopted.

The President presented copies of correspondence between the Commissioner of Bridges and himself with reference to the land under the Williamsburg Bridge to be used for educational purposes, and stated that he had consented to restore to the Department of Bridges the block between Tompkins and East streets, receiving in exchange therefor the space on the westerly side of Tompkins street, in front of the anchorage, for the construction of a one-story building, and the entire block between Goerck and Mangin streets for the construction of a three-story building.

Mr. Field moved that the action of the President be approved.

Adopted.

The President called attention to a communication received from Hon. Gustave Hartman, member of the Assembly, referring to a bill introduced by him providing for a tax of three and one-half mills on the dollar, instead of three mills, for the purposes of the General School Fund, and stating that a hearing on the same would be held on the 31st inst., which communication was read.

Mr. Wingate moved that the matter be referred to the President to take such steps in regard to committing the Board to the support of the measure as he deems judicious.

Adopted.

On motion, all absent members were excused for non-attendance at this meeting.

On motion, the Board adjourned at 7.40 o'clock P. M.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits, thereof.
