I have had a careful survey made and find that there is a slight encroachment for a short distance along the line of the Subway, but the encroachment does not interfere with the construction of a building as proposed by the owners. I have been in consultation with the owners for the last few days, and have notified them that they can remove any portion of the structure as already built without any damage to the property if properly done.
