Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows: From July 10 to July 25 inclusive, thirty-six operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, sixteen at Gouverneur Hospital, thirteen at Harlem Hospital and twenty-one at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the Attending Surgeons or their assistants were present.

It is found that it has been the custom of the Visiting Surgeons of the several hospitals of the Department to perform operations of election at hours which keep the Nurses and Doctors from their meals and necessitate that the Cooks and Waitresses remain on duty after hours. It is recommended that operations of election be not performed after 5 o'clock.

It has been the custom in the Department to supply Drivers with rubber coats, which cost \$3.47 each, rubber boots, which cost \$3.00, and with hats and caps. As other employees receiving smaller salaries provide their own uniforms, an opinion is requested from the Board in this matter.

On motion, duly seconded, it was:

Resolved, To request the Medical Boards of the various hospitals to endeavor to so arrange the hours for operations that there may be no operations of election after 5 o'clock in the evening.

Mr. M. J. Rickard, the Acting Superintendent, reported as follows:

From July 25 to August 8, inclusive, 98 operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, 7 at Gouverneur Hospital, 17 at Harlem Hospital, and 15 at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the attending surgeons or their assistants were present.

The reports of the attendance of the visiting Physicians, Surgeons and their Assistants, at Bellevue, Harlem, Fordham, Gouverneur and Emergency hospitals are herewith submitted.

A fire drill was held in accordance with the regulations of the Board of Trustees at Bellevue, Gouverneur and Fordham hospitals on August 8, and at Harlem Hospital on August 7.

During the month of July \$15.98 was collected for the sale of fat at Bellevue, Gouverneur and Harlem hospitals; \$22.10 for the sale of bones at Bellevue, Gouverneur and Harlem hospitals; \$4.50 for the sale of grease at Fordham Hospital, and \$69 for the treatment of patients at Bellevue Hospital, a total of \$111.58, which was deposited with the City Chamberlain.

An estimate has been received from Joseph D. Duffy on installing two sinks and two nickel-plated douches with rubber hose connections, disconnecting the storage tank on the upper deck, and making connections directly with the street mains, on the boat "Southfield" used as a day camp for tubercular patients. This estimate of \$165 is considered a reasonable one, and as the improvements are badly needed, it is recommended that the estimate be approved and authority for the work be granted.

Mr. Vander Bent, the representative of Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, has been seen regarding the matter of preparing some of the rooms in Pavilions A and B for the storage of furniture, and he reports that it will require at least a week to make such provision. As there is no immediate haste, he has been requested to make the best arrangement possible.

The hand-trucks for removing the bodies of the patients from the wards of this institution to the morgue are unsightly, and the present system is very unsatisfactory. Authority is requested to purchase a wagon, such as is used by undertakers. The cost of a wagon of this kind will be about \$250. It is proposed to have this wagon meet the stretcher carriers, who remove the bodies from the wards, at a part of the building not used by visitors or patients. The wagon can pass out through the gate and along Twenty-sixth street to the morgue, and this will do away with the custom of wheeling the hand-trucks through the grounds.

The temporary appointment of a Helper at a salary of \$20 a month, to act as watchman in Pavilions A and B for a period of about two months, or until it will be possible to open these pavilions, is respectfully requested. The appointment of another Helper for these pavilions is also requested, as it is necessary to have some one see that the painters do not soil the floors.

On August 7 a greatly exaggerated statement appeared in some of the newspapers regarding a patient at Gouverneur Hospital. The matter was investigated at once, and it was found that the patient was only slightly burned, and that the Ambulance Surgeon did not err in his judgment by not taking him to the hospital. The matter was investigated also by the Executive Committee, and the report signed by Dr. Erdmann is attached.

The rooms now occupied by four members of the house staff of this institution at the Students' Club, on Lexington avenue, will have to be vacated when the medical students return the latter part of September.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To approve the action of the Assistant Superintendent in appointing two Hospital Helpers for miscellaneous duties.

Resolved, further, To approve the recommendation of the Acting Superintendent that two temporary Helpers be appointed, one as watchman for Pavilions A and B, and one to see that the painters do not do any damage or soil the floors, both at a salary of \$20 a month and maintenance.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To approve the estimate of Joseph D. Duffy on installing two sinks and two nickel-plated douches with rubber hose connections, disconnecting the storage tank on the upper deck, and making connections directly with the street mains, on the boat "Southfield," used as a day camp for tubercular patients, and to authorize the expenditure of \$165 for this purpose.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To authorize the expenditure of \$250 for a wagon to be used in removing bodies of patients who die in Bellevue Hospital to the morgue of the Department of Public Charities.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To approve the report of the Acting Superintendent regarding the action of the Ambulance Surgeon in not removing to Gouverneur Hospital a patient who was slightly burned.

#### Reports of Committees.

Dr. Brannan reported that on July 30 but one bid was received for "providing all labor and materials required for the tearing down and removal, excavation, masonry, damp-proofing, repairing and replacing of machinery and all other work required to render sound and perfect the damp-proofing of elevator pits and damaged elevator machinery at Fordham Hospital." On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To reject, in the best interests of the City, the only bid received on this work, that of R. Solomon & Son, \$11,880, and to again advertise for bids.

Mr. Barry, to whom had been referred the specifications and drawings of awnings for Fordham Hospital, recommended that advertisements be inserted in the CITY RECORD and the official newspapers calling for bids upon the same.

Mr. Stern reported that on July 30 he communicated with the Department of Health regarding the large number of tubercular patients at Bellevue Hospital and the inability of the Board of Trustees to care for them on account of the lack of proper facilities, and urged that as the Department of Health under the law has control of tuberculosis hospitals, that Department provide for the excess at Bellevue Hospital. Mr. Stern reported that word had since been received from that Department that 100 patients could be taken at Riverside Hospital. There were sixty patients at Bellevue Hospital at the time, but only twelve of them were considered by the Physician in charge strong enough to endure the trip.

Mr. Barry, to whom had been referred the matter of the equipment of the pathological department, recommended that advertisements be inserted in the CITY RECORD and the official newspapers calling for bids upon the articles needed, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To approve this recommendation.

I. That your petitioner is a corporation duly organized under and by virtue of the laws of this State as a railroad corporation for the transportation and carriage of freight exclusively, with an office and principal place of business located at No. 113 Wall street, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, and that William Butler Duncan, Jr., of Port Washington, N. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for the City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the name in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and reading and the award of the contract made.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereto, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety, or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business by which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the estimate, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated

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herein are in all respects true.  
Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by  
the consent, in writing, of two householders or  
freeholders in The City of New York, or of  
a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by  
law to act as surety, and shall contain the matter  
herein.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 450 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the office of the President, Board or Department.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bid or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids on estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Construction Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
