No. 296.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Resolution to Transfer Jurisdiction Over Transverse Roads Crossing Central Park, from the Department of Parks to the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

City of New York, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Office of the Secretary, Municipal Building, March 13, 1916.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I transmit herewith certified copy of resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment March 10, 1916, authorizing, subject to concurrence of the Board of Aldermen, the transfer from the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, to the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the jurisdiction of the four transverse roads crossing Central Park from 5th Avenue, at 65th, 79th, 85th and 97th streets, to Central Park West, at 66th, 81st, 86th and 97th streets. Borough of Manhattan, such jurisdiction and control of the President of the Borough of Manhattan to apply and have reference only to the care and maintenance of the roadway and sidewalk surface.

Resolved, That, subject to concurrence herewith by the Board of Aldermen, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of section 243a of the Greater New York Charter, amended by chapter 331, Laws of 1913, hereby transfers from the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, to the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the jurisdiction and control of the four transverse roads crossing Central Park from 5th Avenue to Central Park West (8th Avenue), as follows:

Transverse Road No. 1—From 5th Avenue at 65th Street to Central Park West and 66th Street.

Transverse Road No. 2—From 5th Avenue at 79th Street to Central Park West and 81st Street.

Transverse Road No. 3—From 5th Avenue at 85th Street to Central Park West and 86th Street.

Transverse Road No. 4—From 5th Avenue at 97th Street to Central Park West and 97th Street.

—provided that such jurisdiction and control of the President of the Borough of Manhattan shall apply and have reference only to the care and maintenance of the roadway and sidewalk surface, that the right to grant concessions or privileges of any character remain under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, and that no change of grade shall be made in any part of the roadway or sidewalk of any of the transverse roads without the consent of the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York, Municipal Building, Bureau of Contract Supervision, February 23, 1916.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On January 21, 1915, the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, transmitted to your Board an estimate of corporate stock authorizations deemed necessary to cover the cost of various proposed improvements by the department during the years 1915, 1916 and 1917, including in which were requests as follows:

For the year 1915—Paving of Transverse Road No. 2 (79th Street), Central Park .....	\$60,000 00
For the year 1916—Paving of Transverse Roads Nos. 1 and 4 (66th Street and 97th Street), Central Park .....	120,000 00
	\$180,000 00

The Bureau of Contract Supervision reports that the pavements on these streets were laid many years ago, that they are in extremely bad condition, and that the roadways should either be extensively repaired or entirely repaved.

It is the opinion of your committee, however, that the repair or repavement of these streets should be under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, rather than under the Department of Parks. The Bureau of Highways, Borough of Manhattan, is equipped with an adequate pavement repair plant and has an engineering force, whose duties are mainly concerned with the laying and maintaining of pavements while the Department of Parks has only a limited amount of this work.

The traffic consists mainly of commercial vehicles and heavy trucking crossing the park. The roadways are in open cut below the park level, and their use is similar in all respects to that of other ordinary city streets.

Chapter 331, Laws of 1913, amending the Greater New York Charter, empowers the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, subject to the concurrence of the Board of Aldermen, to transfer the jurisdiction and control of any streets from any department, board or office to any other department, board of office.

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution which, subject to the concurrence of the Board of Aldermen, will transfer the jurisdiction of the transverse roads in Central Park from the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, to the President of the Borough of Manhattan. **An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York.**

By Alderman Bent—  
AN ORDINANCE to Amend Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:  
Section 1. Article 4 of chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

**ARTICLE 4.**

Dealers in Second-hand Articles.

**Section 40. Definition; Exceptions.**

41. License; Term; Fee and Bond.
42. Record of Purchases and Sales.
43. Report to the Police Commissioner.
44. Restrictions.
45. Lost or Stolen Property.
46. Violations.

**Section 40. Definition; Exceptions.**

Any person, co-partnership, or corporation dealing in the purchase or sale of second-hand articles of whatever nature, or [engaged] dealing in the purchase or sale of any second-hand manufactured article composed wholly or in part of gold, silver, platinum or other metals, or in the purchase or sale of old gold, silver or platinum, or any person, co-partnership or corporation dealing in the purchase of articles or things comprised of gold, silver or platinum for the purpose of melting or refining, or engaged in melting precious metals for the purpose of selling, or in the purchase or sale of pawnbroker tickets or other evidence of pledged articles, or, not being a pawnbroker, who deals in the redemption or sale of pledged articles, is hereby defined to be a dealer in second-hand articles. *Nothing contained in this ordinance shall be construed to apply to pianos, books, magazines, rugs, paintings, drawings, etchings and engravings; nor to exchanges of, returns of, or credits on merchandise where the article or articles exchanged, returned, or credited are accepted in full or part payment for new merchandise; nor to the first purchase or sale in the City of New York of any imported second-hand article.*

**Sec. 41. License; Term; Fee and Bond.**

The annual license fee for each dealer in second-hand articles shall be [\$20] \$15, and every such dealer shall give a bond to the City, with sufficient surety, to be approved by the commissioner of licenses, in the penal sum of \$100, conditioned for the due observance of the provisions of law, or ordinance relating to such dealers.

All licenses for dealers in second-hand articles shall be issued as of February 1 in each year and shall expire on the 31st day of January next succeeding the date of issuance thereof.

**Sec. 42. Record of Purchases and Sales.**

Every dealer in second-hand articles shall keep a book in which shall be legibly written in English, at the time of every purchase or sale, a description of every article so purchased or sold, the number or numbers and any monogram, inscription or other marks of identification that may appear on the article, a description of the articles or pieces comprising old gold, silver, platinum or other metals, and any monogram, inscription or marks of identification thereon, the name residence and general description of the person from whom such purchase was made or to whom sold and the day and hour of the purchase or sale, except articles or things purchased or received for the purpose of refining or melting by persons, firms or corporations principally engaged in such business.

In the case of a purchase or sale of a pawnbroker ticket or other evidence of a pledged article or a redemption or sale of a pledged article, there shall be written in said book at the time of such purchase, sale or redemption.

1. The name and address of the person, co-partnership, or corporation who issued the said ticket or other evidence;
2. The pledge number of said pawn ticket or other evidence;
3. The name and address of the pledger as it appears upon said pawn ticket or other evidence;
4. The amount loaned or advanced as it appears on said pawn ticket or other evidence;
5. The day and hour of such purchase, sale or redemption, as the case may be;
6. The name, residence and general description of the person from whom or to whom the redeemed article is purchased or sold, as the case may be;
7. The sum paid or received for such pawn ticket or other evidence, or the sum paid or received for the redeemed article or pledge;
8. Such description of a pledged article as appears on said pawn ticket or other evidence and an accurate description of every redeemed pledged article.

Said book shall at all reasonable times be open to the inspection of any police officer, to the commissioner of licenses or any inspector of licenses, or any magistrate of the City, or any person duly authorized in writing for such purpose by the commissioner of licenses, or by any magistrate, who shall exhibit such written authority to the dealer.

**Sec. 43. Report to the Police Commissioner.**

Every dealer in second-hand articles, upon being served with a written notice so to do by a member of the police department, shall report to the police commissioner, on blank forms to be furnished by the police department, a copy of the records required to be kept under section 42 of this article of all goods, articles or things, or any part thereof, purchased, received or sold in the course of business of the second-hand dealer, during the days specified in such notice.

**Sec. 44. Restrictions.**

1. Place, expired licenses. No dealer in second-hand articles shall carry on business without a license, or at any other place than the one designated in his license, nor shall he continue to carry on business after his license is suspended, revoked, or shall have expired.

2. Prohibited persons and hours. No dealer in second-hand articles shall purchase any second-hand goods, articles, or things whatsoever from any minor, apprentice, or servant, knowing or having reason to believe the person to be such, or from any person or persons whatsoever, between [the setting of the sun and the hour of 7 o'clock in the morning] the hours of 6 o'clock in the evening and 7 o'clock in the morning.

3. Sales by dealers. No articles or things except household furniture, curtains, carpets, stoves, kitchen utensils, office furniture [books and magazines], automobiles, motor and other vehicles, machinery, belting, building materials and barrels, or other articles or things that have already been kept by a dealer or pawnbroker for a period of time, in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, or have been received from persons, firms or corporations known to be jewelers, dealers, banking institutions, executors or administrators, shall be sold or disposed of by any dealer in second-hand articles until the expiration of one [month] week after such purchase or redemption, except that all second-hand articles or things purchased for the purpose of melting or refining by persons, firms or corporations principally engaged in such business, from persons, firms or corporations not jewelers or dealers, shall not be sold refined, melted or disposed of until the expiration of 48 hours after said purchase; and no such dealer shall receive any article by way of pledge or pawn, or employ any subterfuge for receiving goods as security for the advancement of money.

4. Not to be pawnbroker or junk dealer, not to use pawnbroker signs, etc. No dealer in second-hand articles, while licensed as such, shall be licensed as pawnbroker or junk dealer; nor shall any sign or other device or subterfuge be displayed, used or employed by any dealer in second-hand articles in or about the premises where such business is conducted, which in any wise resembles the emblem or sign commonly used by pawnbrokers, or which is intended to give the appearance that the business conducted on such premises is, or is connected with, the business of a pawnbroker and calculated to so mislead; nor shall there [by] be any sign displayed which is calculated to deceive.

Sec. 45. Lost or stolen property. [to be advertised] If any goods, articles or things whatsoever, shall be advertised in any newspaper printed in the City as having been lost or stolen, and if the same or any such answering to the description advertised, or any part thereof, shall be or come in the possession of any dealer in second-hand articles, such dealer, upon receiving written, printed or oral notice [thereof] so to do, shall give information thereof in writing to the police commissioner stating from whom the same was received. Every dealer in second-hand articles who shall



have or receive any goods, article or thing lost or stolen, or alleged or supposed to have been lost or stolen, shall exhibit the same, on demand, to any police officer, or to the commissioner or any inspector of licenses, or any magistrate of the City, or any person duly authorized in writing for such purpose by the commissioner of licenses or by any magistrate of the City, who shall exhibit such written authority to the dealer.

Sec. 46. Violations. Any person who shall violate, or neglect or refuse to comply with any of the provisions of this article, shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not more than \$100, or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect on April 1, 1916.

City of New York, Police Department, Office of the Commissioner, March 13, 1916.

Re Article 4, Chapter 14, of the Code of Ordinances—Dealers in Second Hand Articles. Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President of Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

My Dear Mr. Dowling—During the past two months we have held conferences and interviewed fully five hundred business men and their attorneys, concerning the hardships imposed by the Second Hand Dealers Ordinance, which was amended on January 3, 1916, to become effective April 1, 1916.

I believe now that all opposition has been removed by the amendments offered in the copy attached hereto.

Attorneys representing the Jewelers' Board of Trade, Retail Jewelers' Association, Refiners and Smelters, and dealers in antique and art goods, met in the office of S. Stanwood Menken, Esq., on Saturday morning and agreed to the ordinance in the amended form, and, at the same time, promised to send you a communication to that effect.

The ordinance as now submitted to you has also been carefully gone over and passed on by Assistant Corporation Counsel Walter Caughlan.

Trusting that this measure may be adopted in place of the one which has been so strongly opposed, I am

Section 1. Article 1 of chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "licenses," is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to read as follows:

§ 8. Offices.

The department of licenses shall have its principal office in the borough of Manhattan, with a branch office in each of the other boroughs of the city, for the purpose of issuing and recording all licenses authorized by law or ordinance to be issued by said department. Each branch of the department shall be presided over by one designated by the commissioner of licenses.

#### An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to "Explosives and Hazardous Trades."

AN ORDINANCE to amend chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "Explosives and hazardous trades."

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 114 of article 8 of chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "explosives and hazardous trades," is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof the following new subdivision:

6. Keeping of amount. Except as hereinbefore provided, no person shall keep, in any building, volatile inflammable oil in quantity exceeding four ounces, unless the same is kept in an approved safety can, or other approved container.

Sec. 2. Subdivision 1 of section 157 of chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "explosives and hazardous trades," is hereby amended to read as follows:

1. Method. No person shall deliver volatile inflammable oil from a storage tank to a motor vehicle, except by means of an approved portable tank or directly through the outlet of the drawing-off pipe by means of an authorized hose attachment[,] or an approved safety can. All lights on motor vehicles, except electric lights, shall be extinguished before volatile inflammable oil is delivered to fuel tanks.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

No. 128—(G. O. No. 48).

#### Report of the Committee on Buildings of Board of Aldermen in Favor of Adopting an Ordinance to Amend Article 16 of Chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Signs and Showbills.

The Committee on Buildings, to which was referred on January 18, 1916 (Minutes, page 126), the annexed ordinance to amend article 16 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to signs and show bills, respectfully

##### REPORTS:

That the proposed amendments to this ordinance are designed to include signs illuminated by "gas" with those illuminated by "electricity" and meets with the approval of the Fire Commissioner. On a suggestion of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, the ordinance is further amended by adding after the word "jurisdiction" in subdivision 2 of section 215 the following words: [ ]; except that in the case of a sign illuminated by gas the certification of the superintendent of buildings only shall be required.

It, therefore, recommends that the said ordinance, as so further amended be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE to amend article 16 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to signs and show bills.

Be It Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision 3 of section 211 of article 16 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

3. Illuminated signs [Electric wiring and appliances]. In the case of [a] an illuminated sign [illuminated by electricity], a certificate must also be procured from the department of water supply, gas and electricity, certifying that the piping or the electric wiring and electric appliances of the proposed signs are in conformity with the rules and regulations of that department.

Section 2. Section 215 of article 16 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 215. [Electric] Illuminated signs. 1. Application of preceding sections. Except as hereinafter specifically prescribed, all provisions of §§ 211 to 214, inclusive, of this article, shall apply to the continuance, construction, alteration, reconstruction and maintenance of [electric] illuminated signs, as hereinafter defined.

2. Issue of permits. All permits for [electric] illuminated signs shall be issued by the city clerk, upon applications therefor approved by the commissioner of water supply, gas and electricity and the superintendent of buildings having jurisdiction. A permit or renewal thereof issued hereunder, upon the expiration thereof or within 30 days thereafter, may be renewed for a further period of one year; and, upon the payment by the applicant of the fee therefor and the surrender of the old permit, accompanied by satisfactory proof in the form of an affidavit that the illuminated sign is the same as when originally licensed and that the wiring or piping of the sign is in good condition, the city clerk may issue the permit.

3. Definition. Any illuminated letter, word, model, sign, device or representation, used in the nature of an advertisement, announcement or direction [illuminated by electricity], erected on any building and extending beyond the building line, shall be deemed to be an [electric] illuminated sign. No illuminated sign shall be illuminated other than by gas or electricity.

4. Fee for permit. The applicant for a permit to construct or maintain an [electric] illuminated sign shall pay to the city clerk an annual fee of 10 cents for each square foot of sign space or part of square foot of such sign space displayed on such [electric] sign, to be computed and collected by the city clerk. The square feet of sign space on one side of an [electric] illuminated sign, however, shall be deemed to be the entire number of square feet of sign space, for the purpose of computing the license fee herein referred to and required to be paid.

5. Consent of owner of adjoining residence. No permit shall be issued for the erection of an [electric] illuminated sign on a building which adjoins another occupied exclusively as a private residence, until the applicant for the permit shall have filed the written consent of the owner of such residence to the erection of the proposed sign.

6. Restrictions. a. No [electric] illuminated sign shall extend more than 8 feet from the building line, nor shall any such sign be less than 10 feet in the clear above the level of the sidewalk beneath the same.

b. All [electric] illuminated signs shall be constructed entirely of metal or other incombustible material, except the insulation thereof if such sign is to be illuminated by electricity, including the uprights, supports and braces for the same, and shall be properly and firmly attached to the building, and shall be so constructed as not to be or become dangerous.

c. If such sign is to be illuminated by gas, the gas burners for same shall be located entirely inside of the sign and so arranged and protected as to prevent the flame from being extinguished by the wind. A shut-off valve shall be placed on the gas piping extending from the building to the sign, and so arranged as to permit of the shutting off of the gas to the sign from the outside of the building, in case of necessity. Such signs as to construction, arrangement and location shall be subject to the approval of, and to rules and regulations adopted by the Fire Commissioner.

Sir—The department respectfully refers to the proposed amendment of article 16 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances relating to signs and show-bills, which was introduced at the January 13 meeting of the Board of Aldermen.

It is noted that under the proposed revision of subdivision 3 of section 211 this department will, in addition to its present duty of certifying that the wiring and appliances of electric signs are in conformity with its rules and regulations as at present, be charged also with the duty of certifying that "the (gas) piping" of gas signs is "in conformity with its rules and regulations." Whether this particular portion of the revised ordinance was inserted inadvertently and without regard for the fact that this department now exercises no jurisdiction over, and consequently has no rules and regulations in relation to gas piping, or whether it was actually the intention to impose this duty upon this department rather than upon the Bureau of Buildings, is not clear. The department believes, however, that it is not wise to place upon it this particular duty for the reason that all matters relating to gas piping are now



and have heretofore been under the supervision of the Bureau of Buildings, and it is believed that they should continue to receive attention therein where extended experience and special organization for such work will undoubtedly result in more efficient control thereof.

My dear President McAneny—Request is hereby made for an issue of Special Revenue Bonds in the amount of \$4,000 to provide for the replacement of the old, inefficient hydraulic passenger elevator in the Harlem Court Building, 121st Street and Sylvan Place, Borough of Manhattan, with a modern electric elevator.

This change will result in a saving in operating cost of approximately \$3,200 per annum, and the investment will, therefore, pay for itself in about one and one-quarter years.

The present equipment requires high-pressure steam for the operation of the elevator pump and this necessitates the employment of a licensed engineer throughout the year. If the motive power of the elevator is changed to electricity the services of the engineer at this building could be dispensed with entirely and he could be transferred to another building. Also, the three firemen now required throughout the year would, under the new conditions, be used only during the heating season.

It will be noted that the cost of the coal used during the summer months for the operation of the elevator is greater than the cost of the electrical energy of an electric elevator for the entire year.

The saving in operating cost above referred to is estimated as follows:

A record of the actual travel of the present elevator was made and found to be 2.19 miles per day.

$2.19 \times 3.5$  K.W. hours per car mile = 7.67 K.W. hours per day;  $7.67 \times 300 = 2,300$  K.W. hours per year;  $2,300 \times \$0.06 = \$138$ , cost of electrical energy per year.

Amount of coal actually used during summer of 1915 for the operation of elevator was 126,815 pounds No. 1 Buckwheat.  $126,815 \times \$1.725$  per M pounds = \$218.75, cost of coal used.

It is assumed that the same amount of coal would be used during the heating season with either type of equipment.

Sir—In reference to your communication of February 25, 1916, requesting the Bureau of Standards to investigate and report upon the request of the Sheriff of Bronx County for special revenue bonds in the sum of \$8,271, for the payment of the services of additional employees and equipment made necessary by the construction of the new jail and Sheriff's offices in The Bronx, the Bureau of Standards reports thereon as follows:

On or about April 1, 1916, it is expected that the new County Jail of Bronx County, situated in the Bergen Building at 177th Street and Arthur Avenue, will be ready for occupancy. It appears that this jail will be inadequate, according to the present census, to house even criminal prisoners. For that reason, it is proposed to operate the two jails, the old one now situated in the County Court House at 161st Street and 3d Avenue, as well as the new. At the present time all the prisoners in that county are kept in the old jail by means of overcrowding and in total disregard of the provisions of the Prison Law, which provides that separate segregation shall be made for male and female and civil and criminal prisoners. The State Prison Commission has urged the advisability of establishing a separate House of Detention, and has also been insistent that only one prisoner shall be kept in a cell. The force requested by the Sheriff to operate the two jails is reasonable, but inasmuch as the \$7,140 represents the year's allowance, this amount may be reduced to \$5,355, apportioned as follows:

To the Honorable, the Board of Aldermen, The City of New York:

Dear Sirs—The Budget appropriations for 1916 for this department contemplate the purchase of several hundred tons of coal for use in the public buildings, and also about four hundred tons of coal for use in the crematories and disposal plants in the borough.

In accordance with the usual procedure, specifications were drawn and approved by the Bureau of Standards of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and advertisements inserted calling for bids and specifying delivery at different points in the borough.

Bids were opened on February 16, 1916, at which time the fact was disclosed that the prices for delivery for about 220 tons was \$8.16 per ton from the lowest bidder and that other prices for delivery at different points were as low as \$6.48 and up to \$6.83 per ton.

In my judgment, the prices are excessive and more than the City is now paying for delivery for small quantities for the same quality of coal, and I do not feel justified, therefore, in awarding a contract at these prices.

In explanation of the high bids, I was informed that it is expected that the price of coal will rise some time or another during the coming year, but at the present time the price is not as high as the price submitted by the lowest bidder.

In the case of the bids received for coal for the crematories and disposal plants, the bids received show an advance of about \$1.00 a ton over the price paid last year, for which I can see no justification at this time for the reason that the prices submitted are in excess of the market price at this time, and the reason given for this excessive charge is the same as in the case of the coal for the public buildings.

In view of these facts, I request your approval, in accordance with the provisions of section 419 of the Charter, of a resolution authorizing me to purchase coal on open market order for the use of the public buildings to the extent of \$6,000, and for the Bureaus of Street Cleaning and Sewers, \$5,500. Dear Sir—In connection with the voting of the budget for this Department for the year 1916, reduced appropriations were made for fuel supply with a view to using a cheaper grade of coal than heretofore. The use of this cheaper grade of coal necessitates the installation of blowers on the various ferryboats and in the power plant at the St. George Terminal.

One blower system has been installed on the ferryboat "Richmond" by the Parson Manufacturing Company, and this system has been in successful operation for some time past. On the ferryboats "Bronx" and "Brooklyn" another blower system, purchased from the Coppus Engineering and Equipment Company, has been installed, and this system on these two boats has operated successfully. The installation on the ferryboat "Bronx" was effected last year, and on the ferryboat "Brooklyn," this year, and both have been paid for.

The Parson Manufacturing Company offers to sell its equipment now on the ferryboat "Richmond" for the sum of \$2,000, and the purchase at this price is considered desirable. I request authority for the purchase of the blower equipment on the ferryboat "Richmond" from the Parson Manufacturing Company at \$2,000.

Authority is also hereby requested to purchase without public letting the necessary equipment for the installation of Coppus Blowers, as follows:

For the ferryboat "Queens" and "Manhattan," \$1,650, each.....	\$3,300 00

In view of the fact that all blower apparatus is covered by patents, it is impossible to draw specifications which would secure fair competition and at the same time be certain to secure apparatus which would be sufficient beyond doubt in operation. Both the Parson and Coppus Blowers have been tried out for a considerable time and both are satisfactory. The Parson Blower, however, is heavier and of a more elaborate type of installation, and it is not deemed desirable to place it on any additional boats. It is, however, entirely satisfactory in operation, and it is felt it would be poor policy to remove the blower from the ferryboat "Richmond" for the purpose of substituting the Coppus Blower.

The price of \$2,000 represents not only the cost of the apparatus, but also the cost of installation thereof, which is paid for by the Company. Respectfully,

Sir—I have received a communication signed by your clerk, Mr. John J. Flaherty, and dated February 24, 1916, which reads as follows:

"The Committee on Public Thoroughfares of The Board of Aldermen to which was referred the following resolution:

"Resolved, That upon the request of the owners of the property abutting thereon, the south side of 145th Street, between 7th and 8th Avenues, in the Borough of Manhattan, be and the same is hereby designated and set aside for market purposes for pushcart peddlers, under supervision by the Police Department."

"—instructs me to place the same before you, and request an opinion as to the jurisdiction of the Board of Aldermen in the matter."

The cases of Matter of Fiegle, 36 Misc. 27, and People ex rel. O'Reilly vs. The Mayor, etc., 59 How. Pr., 277, would seem to be controlling in this relation. In the first of these cases it appears that in the year 1899 the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York adopted an ordinance purporting to authorize licensed vendors and peddlers to stand with their wagons and display and sell their wares on both sides of Siegel Street in the roadway or carriageway between Graham Avenue and Broadway, in the Borough of Brooklyn, until midnight on every day of the week except Sunday. It was held that the ordinance was void, not only because no city has power to appropriate a street for such a use, but also because the New York City Charter forbids its Municipal Assembly to pass an ordinance authorizing an encroachment upon or obstruction of a street or sidewalk, except temporary occupation of them during the erection or repair of a building on a lot opposite. Judge Gaynor, in his opinion, said:

"It is too well known to need the citation of authorities that there is no power in the municipal assembly or in the city government in all its departments combined to appropriate a public street for such a use \* \* \* The ordinance in question is void, and it is the duty of the respondent to clear the street of the obstruction."

In the second case the Common Council of The City of New York, by resolution adopted June 6, 1879, declared that licensed vendors should be permitted to occupy 42d Street, west of Eighth Avenue, and within 325 feet of that avenue Saturday nights from 6 to 12 o'clock.

The Court said:

"To permit the street to be occupied and obstructed in this manner was clearly unlawful."

I am therefore of the opinion that the Board of Aldermen is without power to establish a pushcart market in the highway, as contemplated by the foregoing resolution. And the case is not altered by the circumstance that the abutting owners consent to such use of the public street.

(c) On or within 2 feet of the surface of any asphalt pavement, except for the purpose of repairing, removing or constructing the same.



A fire kindled, built and maintained under a permit issued in conformity with the provisions of this section shall be continuously under the care and direction of a competent person from the time it is kindled until it is extinguished.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, Manhattan:

Dear Sir—Application is hereby made for an issue of special revenue bonds in the amount of \$4,950 for the payment of services of additional employees required for overhauling index and filing plans in the Bureau of Buildings under my jurisdiction.

For many years the efficiency of the Plan Desk of the Building Bureau has been severely impaired by the lack of an adequate method of indexing and filing plans and applications.

About two years ago a system was devised to rectify, as far as possible, this condition. This system is based upon filing all plans and applications according to location as to lot and block number, the filing being arranged according to tax sections, a distinctive color scheme being introduced, so that any drawing belonging to any tax section or block could be quickly located. A description of this system appeared in the annual report of the Building Bureau for 1914.

On account of inability to provide an adequate force for the prosecution of this work little or no progress has been made. In fact, in something like two years not quite one tax section has been completed. It has been impossible at any time to employ more than one or two men at this work, which is not only very unsatisfactory but very expensive.

The very large reduction in the force available for duty at the Plan Desk makes it at this time of the utmost importance that the work in connection with the proper filing and indexing of the plans be completed at the earliest possible moment, as this would very materially reduce the labor and time now necessary to find or locate a plan. In fact, with the plans properly filed and indexed, one man could probably handle the work, where three are now necessary.

While it is extremely difficult to estimate the exact time that it would take to complete the work, yet it is believed that it could be done by a temporary force of ten men working for about nine months.

I would therefore earnestly urge the desirability of having a resolution presented to your Board for the issuance of special revenue bonds to provide for a temporary force as follows:

As request is made for the services of this force for only nine months the total amount of revenue bonds necessary will be \$4,950.

I would also call the attention of your Board to the fact that the overhauling, indexing and filing of plans will facilitate the discarding of a great many old and useless records in the Violations Division, provided the permission of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, with the approval of the Corporation Counsel, is obtained. This would provide more filing space and, in consequence, would reduce materially budget requirements for filing cases for the year 1917.

Sir—In reference to your communication of March 2, 1916, requesting the Bureau of Standards to investigate and report upon the request of the Borough President of Manhattan for special revenue bonds in the sum of \$4,950, for the payment of services of additional employees for overhauling index and filing plans in the Bureau of Buildings. The Bureau of Standards reports thereon as follows:

The files containing plans and applications for buildings are in a condition of the utmost confusion so far as concerns plans and applications received up to two years ago. The new method devised about two years ago is good. However, the Bureau has not had sufficient force for the completion of the installation of this new method. The complete indexing and filing should be proceeded with as soon as possible. The force asked for is proper and necessary. In two cases the salaries requested are high. The Bureau recommends that these salaries be fixed at the minimum of the grade provided in the standard specifications for the work to be performed. The Superintendent of Buildings agrees with these changes.

In requests made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for modification of personal service schedules, the Borough President has indicated that he has budget funds available for transfer to the amount of \$3,000. #### NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on day of delivery hereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste remaining from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the buildings.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
