

BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF, ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's office on Thursday, May 26, 1892, at 1.05 o'clock P. M. Present—Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller; William H. Clark, Counsel to the Corporation;

Frederick Smyth, Recorder. On motion, the reading of the minutes of the previous meetings not yet approved was dispensed

with The Comptroller presented the assessment list for paving Dover street, from Pearl to South street, with granite blocks (so far as the same is within the limits of grants of land under water), the same having been received from the Board of Assessors without objections, under date of April

30, 1892.

30, 1892.
On motion, the same was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative. The Comptroller presented the following assessment lists received from the Board of Assessors under date of May 6, 1892, viz.:
I. Paving with trap blocks, curbing and recurbing One Hundred and Fifty-second street, from Third to Courtlandt avenue.

2. Paving One Hundred and Forty-second street, from Third to Rider avenue, with trap blocks.


