REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING MARCH 31, 1902.

Department of Public Charities,
Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.
New York, April 1, 1902.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, City of New York:

Dear Sir—Pursuant to section 1544 of the Charter, I beg leave to submit herewith the quarterly report of the Department of Public Charities for the period ending March 31, 1902.

I have omitted from this report the voluminous statements heretofore included in the quarterly reports of the Department, showing in detail the number of minor repairs made and other work done at each of the various institutions, and include only such reports as are of general interest. In addition to these statistics, the following administrative changes during the quarter should be placed on record:

Hospital for Consumptives.

On January 1, 1902, there were 318 consumptive patients in Bellevue, City, Metropolitan and Almshouse Hospitals. One hundred and fifty-five were distributed through wards occupied also by other patients and one hundred and sixty-three were in wards devoted to phthisis patients, but in the same building as wards occupied by other patients. On January 31, a separate hospital for consumptives was opened in buildings vacated by the Manhattan State Hospital for the Insane in October, 1901. Within a week all consumptive patients not in wards set apart exclusively for consumptives, were transferred from Bellevue, City and Metropolitan Hospitals to the new hospital and thereafter all consumptive patients admitted to the care of the Department were sent directly to the hospital for consumptives. The number of patients received in this hospital from January 31, 1902, to March 31, 1902, inclusive, was 194. While a large majority of the patients received were in the advanced stages of the disease, a small number were in a condition which admitted of some hope of improvement. For these patients, separate accommodations, extra diet and special treatment were provided, with a result that a majority of patients of this class showed a substantial gain in weight and a diminution of the active symptoms of phthisis.

Transfer of Moribund Cases.

On January 16, 1902, an order was issued requiring a full report to be made to the Commissioner by the Superintendent of any hospital receiving a patient from any other hospital, within or without the Department, dying within three days after admission. In every such case, unless the facts showed that the death was one which could not readily have been foreseen, the facts were reported in detail to the President of the Board of Trustees of the hospital from which the patient was transferred, with a request for an investigation. As a result, the number of such transfers has markedly diminished and there are now practically no transfers of this character except under circumstances which make the transfer practically unavoidable.

Court Fund, Property of Deceased Patients, and Sales of Material.

On January 1, 1902, the accounts of moneys received by the Department in abandonment cases, for the support of illegitimate children, from the sale of waste materials and as part of the personal effects of deceased patients, were found in extreme confusion, owing to the unbusinesslike methods by which those properties were handled, as well as to the then recent disappearance of the former Acting Treasurer and Trustee of the Department, who was custodian of this fund. The system of receiving and accounting for these moneys and properties has been thoroughly overhauled and placed on a business basis.

The entire daily receipts of the court fund are now turned over each day to the head of the Department, and the account in which the money is kept can be drawn upon only by his signature. Separate daily cash books as well as ledgers are now kept for the court fund, the Treasurer's fund, and the moneys belonging to deceased patients. At the end of each month, these accounts are balanced and audited by the Auditor of the Department. On January 17, 1902, when the new plan was instituted, there was \$17.30 to the credit of the court fund. On March 31, 1902, there was \$4,768.11 to its credit. Of this amount, \$2,055.65 was received from the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company on account of the deficit caused by the defalcation of the previous treasurer of the fund; showing an actual increase in the fund of \$2,695.17.

In regard to the property of deceased patients, when the present Private Secretary took charge, there were about 2050 envelopes containing property of inmates of the various institutions, found in the office, many of which were not numbered, classified, or recorded, which had been allowed to accumulate since the year 1896, but from which all cash had been removed and taken by the former Acting Treasurer. Arrangements were immediately made with the Public Administrator to turn over to him the property other than cash that had thus accumulated, and up to date there has been delivered to him 1968 of these envelopes. All such property will henceforth be turned over to him quarterly.

It is believed that these safeguards will protect the beneficiaries from further loss of funds and property placed in the custody of this Department for care and safe-keeping.

Supplies.

The records of the Department show that in May and June, 1901, a marked reduction was made in the amount of food and other supplies provided per capita for the various institutions of the Department and also that from that time to January 1, 1902, little or no supplies of clothing, lumber, paint and hospital furniture were provided. The allowance of food supplies was increased during the first week in January to the amounts indicated by dietary tables prepared by experts at the request of the Department, and as rapidly as the funds at the disposal of the Department would permit, clothing, hospital furniture, etc., were provided to meet the needs which had been most urgent for many months.

Complaints.

All complaints and suggestions received from any source whatever in regard to the institutions under the Department, except anonymous communications, have been investigated under the personal direction of the Commissioner. In many instances the complaints have proven to be groundless, but in the course of their investigation, facts have been brought to light which have led to many improvements. A number of very practical suggestions in regard to the serving of food, the care of clothing, etc., were received from inmates of the Almshouse and have been acted upon.

Specifications.

Practically all supplies for the use of the Department during 1902 had been advertised for and the contracts awarded prior to January 1, 1902, except those for clothing, paints and oils, lumber and hardware. The specifications for these articles used in former years were thoroughly overhauled and many changes made which have resulted in improving, in several instances, the quality of the articles supplied with a substantial reduction in the prices paid. The specifications were also rearranged so as to afford the fullest opportunity for bidders. The specifications were made more specific and a copy of the specification of each contract was sent to the heads of all institutions and all officers of institutions were instructed to report forthwith any supplies not conforming to the requirements of the specifications.

Teachers' Retirement Fund.

At the instance of the Department, legislation has been secured enabling the Teachers in the Department of Public Charities to share in the benefits of the School Teachers' Retirement Fund, which is made up very largely from a proportion of the Excise Fund.

Miscellaneous.

On February 20, a visiting dentist was appointed for Randall's Island. Heretofore the children under the care of this Department on Randall's Island, numbering some 800, have received no dental care. The visiting dentist has agreed to devote gratuitously, each Saturday forenoon to the dental care of these children.

At the request of this Department, the Buildings Department and the Fire Department made special inspections of all buildings in the Department and submitted reports as to the adequacy of means of escape in case of fire and as to the means of prompt extinguishment of fires. These reports showed that in numerous instances the fire escapes were woefully inadequate, in some cases the only means of escape being by wooden stairways or by fire escapes with wooden steps. Immediate steps were taken to carry into effect the requirements of the Buildings and Fire Departments.

In February instructions were issued to the Superintendent of the Out-door Poor, and the Superintendent, Bureau of Dependent Children, at whose offices large numbers of destitute people apply for such relief as the City affords, to remain open during Saturday afternoons.

On May 15, two weeks' notice in advance having been given, all servants and domestics heretofore carried on the payroll of the Department and assigned for duty to officers' families, were dropped from the payroll and the officers were forbidden to assign to such duties any persons receiving compensation from the City.

On March 3, the sending of State paupers from the office of the Department at East Twenty-sixth street to Flatbush, Brooklyn, was discontinued and instructions were issued to send them instead to Blackwell's Island. An average of over 1,200 persons a year had theretofore been sent by wagon, a distance of several miles, in all kinds of weather to Flatbush, most of whom were returned therefrom in similar manner within a few days. The trip to Blackwell's Island can be made by boat in fifteen minutes without discomfort. Not only was this hardship to over 1,200 persons per annum obviated, but incidentally, the salaries of a driver and attendant and the maintenance of two horses and a wagon were obviated. The over-crowding at the Flatbush Almshouse was appreciably relieved.

A small store maintained by consent of the Department on Blackwell's Island was placed in March under new management. A schedule of the articles permitted to be sold in the store and the prices allowed to be charged therefor was approved by the Commissioner and posted conspicuously in the store. Charges of extortion and of the sale of intoxicating liquors had been made.

Plans were put into effect in March by which the course of training in the New York City Training School for Nurses on Blackwell's Island, which provides nurses for the City, Gouverneur, Harlem and Fordham Hospitals, will be extended on October 1, 1902, from two years to three years.

The plan of boarding in families the foundling babies formerly sent to Randall's Island having been found to be extremely successful and having reduced the death rate among such children from approximately 100 per cent. to about the normal death rate among children of similar age in the city at large—14 per cent.—has been extended so as to include orphan and abandoned children as well as foundlings.

A woman has been assigned to hear privately all complaints made by women in abandonment and bastardy cases in the office of the Superintendent of the Outdoor Poor. Heretofore these statements have all been made publicly and to the Superintendent.

An expert Chemist was appointed on March 25 as the head of the General Drug Department, which position has been left vacant since the death of Dr. Charles E. Rice in May, 1901.

On March 29, a Board of Managers of the Metropolitan Training School for Nurses was appointed to assist the Commissioner in developing and improving the work of the school. The Board consists of seven members appointed for terms varying from one to seven years. Five members of the Board were appointed, as follows:

Louise de Raasloff (Mrs. Harold de Raasloff), No. 116 East Thirty-eighth street, for a term of one year.

Eunice Ives (Miss Eunice Ives), No. 83 Irving place, for a term of three years.

Alice Warren (Mrs. Schuyler N. Warren), No. 311 Lexington avenue, for a term of six years.

Eunice D. Brannan (Mrs. J. W. Brannan), No. 11 West Twelfth street, for a term of seven years.

A Superintendent of the School was appointed on March 26, 1902, the office having been vacant for many months and the efficiency of the school having suffered materially in consequence.

On March 1 a Supervising Nurse was appointed for the Infants' and Children's Hospitals on Randall's Island, that position also having been vacant for many months.

During February and March, 46 patients, who had ceased to need hospital treatment, but for various reasons had been allowed to remain at the City Hospital, were transferred to the Almshouse, leaving that number of additional beds for those in actual and urgent need of hospital care and treatment. Attention is invited to the fact that during the quarter the number of patients increased by 89, while the number of employees decreased by 95.

MUNICIPAL LODGING HOUSE.

Sir—Herewith I have the honor to submit my report for the first quarter of the current year.

On February 1 Bellevue and Allied Hospitals were separated from this Department. Previous to the separation it was decided that this Bureau should continue to supply the new Department with medicines in the same manner as it is now supplying the Department of Correction. The various medical supplies furnished to these two departments are replaced by them by purchases of a few expensive articles of large consumption in such quantities as will balance the distribution.

Regular and special requisitions for medical and surgical supplies have been filled for the following institutions:

I.—Department of Public Charities.

City Hospital, Blackwell's Island; Almshouse, Blackwell's Island; Metropolitan Hospital, Blackwell's Island; Randall's Island Hospitals; Municipal Lodging House; Photographical Department.

II.—Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

Bellevue Hospital, Bellevue Dispensary, Gouverneur Hospital, Harlem Hospital, Fordham Hospital.

III.—Department of Correction.

Workhouse, Blackwell's Island; Penitentiary, Blackwell's Island; City Prison (Tombs); District Prisons.

The Manufacturing Bureau has turned out as many of the pharmaceutical and chemical preparations as are preferably made by the Department.

All supplies purchased have been carefully examined, and the quality of the milk supplied to the Department has been controlled by daily inspection.

Hon. WILLIAM C. REDFIELD, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—It has been reported to me that notice has been given to the authorities of the old City of Brooklyn and the present Borough of Brooklyn for many years past to the unsatisfactory drainage facilities which exist in the vicinity of old Bushwick creek. Recent attention has been drawn thereto by the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning of The City of New York. The condition existing has resulted in the attention of the authorities being called, both directly and by implication, to the fact that property has been damaged by the flooding of cellars in the vicinity of Leonard street and Van Pelt avenue, and in Driggs avenue, between North Twelfth and North Thirteenth streets, also in other places adjacent to the bounds of old Bushwick creek, especially in the cases of Friberg against The City of New York, and Patridge against the City of New York.

Bushwick creek formerly extended inland from the East river, following approximately North Fourteenth street on one side and North Fifteenth street on the other, to and beyond Driggs avenue. Outlet sewers were built, discharging into the then existing creek at Driggs and Union avenues, at Nassau avenue and Banker street, at Norman avenue and Banker street, and at Kent avenue and North Fourteenth street. All of these outlets have been discontinued by the filling in of said creek, excepting the last two mentioned, by extending temporary sewers to North

Twelfth street. By such procedure the North Twelfth street sewer has been surcharged by some forty-three acres of drainage, which, according to the adopted drainage plans of The City of New York, should be drained elsewhere. A small and ill graded channel extends from the Norman avenue outlet at Banker street to North Fourteenth street and Kent avenue, discharging into what remains of Bushwick creek, which the authorities will not be able to fill in until proper sewers for the drainage of the vicinity are constructed, thereby continuing a nuisance.

It is recommended, therefore, that main sewers be constructed in the following mentioned streets:

Quay street, from the East river to West street;
North Fifteenth street, from West street to Engert avenue;
West street, from Quay street to North Fifteenth street;
Engert avenue, from North Fifteenth street to Humboldt street; and in
Engert avenue, from Russell street to North Henry street; also in
Wythe avenue, from Norman avenue to North Fifteenth street

—the estimated cost of which is \$75,000, and the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment, which is \$3,510,805.

I urgently recommend that the above construction may be authorized by the proper authorities, to abate damage to property, to relieve the North Twelfth street sewer from surcharge of drainage, and to abate a nuisance by the removal of sewage discharge at the foot of Norman avenue into the present ill-graded Bushwick creek.

I now beg to report further, as follows, concerning street opening:

Quay street is paved its entire length from bulkhead at East river to West street, and may be considered open. Proceedings should be taken to open West street, from Quay street to North Fifteenth street.

North Fifteenth street is on the city map, but not open from Franklin street to Engert avenue. It is not on the map and is not open between West and Franklin streets. Proceedings should be taken to put it on the map from West to Franklin street, and to open it from West street to Nassau avenue. From Nassau avenue to Engert avenue, it is in McCarren Park and should not be opened.

Engert avenue, from Graham avenue to North Henry street, is open and paved. It should not be opened from Leonard street to Graham avenue or from Driggs avenue to Leonard street, for it is in McCarren Park and should not be opened.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
