No increases or decreases in salaries have been made. An increase of \$500 for witness fees and contingencies is asked for, the appropriation for 1902 having been \$1,500.

I am able to state with a reasonable degree of certainty not only that there will not be any surplus in the appropriation allowed me for the current year, but, on the contrary, that there will be a deficit, as I have been obliged to expend already out of my appropriation of \$1,500 very nearly \$1,250, as the vouchers on file in the Comptroller's office will show, which, however, includes \$200 recently transferred

to the Paymaster for witnesses' fees and which has not been as yet entirely expended. I have already had one murder case, involving a large expense for expert examination as to sanity and otherwise, and have yet two courts of record of criminal jurisdiction to be held. My appropriation for the year 1901 for contingencies was \$1,500. I am unable to state the exact amount of the deficit for that year, but that there was a deficit I am certain; and unless transfers were made from other funds claimants for payment upon that fund were obliged to bring suit against the City.

I estimate the sum of \$2,000 for contingencies, which includes all the disbursements of my office for witnesses' fees, services of physicians and surgeons as experts and the employment of additional counsel in important cases where necessary, the expenses of extradition of fugitives from justice, the services of interpreters, postage, etc.

I again beg to state that, in my opinion, the interests of the City would be conserved by making the appropriation for my office for contingencies at the sum named by me, rather than to have the appropriation overdrawn and consequently suits against the City by claimants for necessary expenditures.

SURROGATES' COURT.

To the Honorable, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

An estimate of the amount of expenditures required for the maintenance of the Surrogates' Court and office for the year 1903, is herewith respectfully submitted for your consideration and action.

The salaries included in the amount so required embrace those of the Surrogates and of the Clerks and subordinates employed in the Surrogates' Court and office, according to the payroll for the month of July, 1902, together with the salaries attached to such of the positions as were at that time vacant.

For the year 1903 is required the same appropriation as was made for the previous year for the Clerks employed, pursuant to chapter 57 of the Laws of 1883, as amended by chapter 467 of the Laws of 1890, in the preservation and transcription of mutilated and obliterated records. Eight Clerks are so employed at a salary of \$1,200 a year each, and a Superintendent and Examiner at \$1,500 a year. Ten libers in addition to those now on hand, at a cost of \$30 each, and \$100 for stationery, will be required for the prosecution of this work next year. The necessity for this work has been duly certified in accordance with the acts mentioned. A certificate as to the same accompanied the communication of September 11, 1890, of the then Surrogate, submitting the estimates for that year; a similar certificate was attached to the respective estimates submitted August 16, 1892; September 5, 1895; September 15, 1896; September 7, 1897; September 28, 1899, October 1, 1900; August 6, 1901, and February 27, 1902. A like certificate is submitted herewith.

For "Supplies and Contingencies" \$2,550 are required for next year. Of this \$1,350 are for office contingencies, and \$1,200 for the purpose of procuring the supplies which, previously to January 1, 1902, were furnished by the Board of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies. Schedule "A," hereto annexed, indicates their character. In our communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of April 14, 1902, we asked for an allowance of the same amount for the same purpose. The Board, however, in passing and fixing the estimates for this year failed to make any specific appropriation for this particular purpose, but appropriated the sum of \$1,350 for "Supplies and Contingencies." This last amount we had asked for office contingencies, postage, procuring law reports and text books, and for other incidental expenses of a minor character, and was in addition to the \$1,200 referred to in the communication of April 14, 1902 above mentioned.

Thirteen hundred and fifty dollars were allowed for office contingencies for the year 1901. This amount proved inadequate, and a transfer of \$57.50 from the appropriation for libers and stationery allowed for the Department for Preservation of Mutilated Records was necessary to make up the deficiency.

Of the \$1,350 appropriated for "Supplies and Contingencies" for this year, \$695.28 had been expended by July 1 last for the usual office contingencies, and the necessary expenditure for these same purposes for the remainder of this year will probably exhaust the entire balance of the appropriation. Out of this appropriation no disbursement has been made for any of the purposes for which the appropriation of \$1,200 for this year was sought.

One thousand dollars are needed for the payment of the Sheriff for services in serving citations and orders in proceedings commenced by the Surrogates to compel accountings of delinquent guardians, executors and others. The amount is the same as was appropriated for the same purpose for last year.

The total appropriation asked is \$168,950, and is \$1,380 in excess of that made for the current year.

The salaries of the Surrogates are fixed by chapter 290 of the Laws of 1889, and chapter 642 of the Laws of 1892. The salary of James A. Donnelly, Stenographer, is fixed pursuant to section 2512 of the Code of Civil Procedure and section 1193, chapter 410, of the Laws of 1882; and the salaries of the Record Bond Clerks pursuant to chapter 367, Laws of 1890, amending chapter 372, Laws of 1867. The salaries of the other Clerks and employees, other than those engaged in the transcription of mutilated and obliterated records, are designated and fixed pursuant to chapter 530 of the Laws of 1884, and chapter 642 of the Laws of 1892. The compensation of the last mentioned Clerks is provided for by chapter 57 of the Laws of 1883, as amended by chapter 467 of the Laws of 1890, above referred to.

It is now impossible to state the amount which may probably remain unexpended of any of the appropriations for 1902 at the end of the year.

Dear Sir—As requested by his Honor the Mayor in circular letter of July 23, 1902, I beg to transmit herewith estimate of expenses of the Department of Correction, boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, for the year 1903.

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President of the Board of Aldermen, New York City:

Dear Sir—The appropriation asked for by the Department of Correction for the year 1903, as shown in the accompanying statement, will be found to be an increase over the amount allowed by your Honorable Board for the present year. I feel, however, that there will be no hesitation in granting the entire amount when the reasons given are considered.

The total amount asked for for Manhattan is \$666,955. Of this \$326,000 is for maintenance and \$260,455 for salaries; the remainder is for new steam plant, etc., at the Workhouse, Blackwell's Island, repairs, donations for discharged prisoners, transportation, etc., of insane criminals, and the improvement of Riker's Island.

The appropriation for 1902 for maintenance was \$305,000 and for salaries \$250,000. This shows an increase for 1903 of \$21,000 for maintenance and of \$10,455 for salaries.

The increase asked for for maintenance is due to several causes: (1) The probable increase in the number of inmates in the institutions during the year 1903. The estimate is made on the basis of the increased census during the present summer, which has been fully 33 1-3 per cent. higher than at the same period of the year 1901, and is equal to the census usually found in the winter. (2) The greatly increased price of supplies of all kinds. (3) The estimate for the year 1902 called for supplies up to December 31, 1902, only, while the estimate for 1903 makes provision for supplies up to January 15, 1904. This has been done in order to have sufficient supplies on hand in case of any delay in the award of contracts and to prevent inconvenience from such a cause, and (4) the stock of dry goods, etc., at the various institutions is completely exhausted and large supplies of clothing, bedding and blankets are imperatively needed.

For salaries a part of the increased appropriation asked for is obligatory and is caused by the need for extra help. In several instances the completion of new buildings necessitated the employment of additional Engineers and Firemen. It is also my desire to increase the salaries of a few employees, in some cases because of long and faithful service, and in others on account of increased responsibilities.

Central Office.

On the Central Office payroll I have restored the salaries of the Secretary of the Department, the Private Secretary and the Clerk to the General Bookkeeper to what they were in 1901. The salary of the Clerk in the Purchasing Department has been increased \$300, as the incumbent performs the duties of Purchasing Agent in addition to his own. The faithful services of these employees entitle them to the restoration, and, in the one case, to the increase. The total increase is \$1,400 only.

In making this request, I would beg to call the attention of your Honorable Board to the fact that the clerical force at the Central Office of the Department of Correction is very small in proportion to the work accomplished.

Steamboats.

Under the head of "Alterations, Additions and Repairs to Buildings, Apparatus and Steamboats," an appropriation of \$10,000 is asked for repairs to steamboats. This sum is required in order to keep the boats in good condition, and also to provide for repairs in case of accidents. An increase of \$100 each for three Pilots is asked, fixing their salaries at \$1,000 each per annum. The salaries of the Cooks are also slightly advanced, the total increase on the Steamboat roll being only \$420. It may be stated that the salaries paid to Pilots in other City Departments are much higher, and, if found possible, I would be glad to see the Pilots of the Department of Correction placed on an equal footing with other City employees in similar positions.

City Prison.

The only increase of salary asked for at the City Prison is an advance of \$200 in the salary of the Principal Keeper. The salary is now \$1,000, which is the same as that received by Keepers performing ordinary duties. As the position of Principal Keeper is at all times one of responsibility, and particularly so during the absence of the Warden, the increase seems just. As it is expected that the new City Prison will be completed and ready for occupancy before January 1, 1903, two additional Engineers, at \$900 each, and two Firemen, at \$480 each (a total of \$2,960), will be necessary.

Penitentiary, Blackwell's Island.

With the completion of the new Administration Building at the Penitentiary, Blackwell's Island, there will be need for the services of an additional Engineer; salary to be \$900 per annum.

Workhouse, Blackwell's Island.

A new steam plant and boiler house are needed at the Workhouse, Blackwell's Island, for which an appropriation of \$40,000 is required. A request for this improvement was made in April last, but was not granted. As was stated at that time, the boilers are in an unsafe condition, and should be replaced. They became useless early in the present year, but have been patched up for use during the coming winter. They are, however, liable to give out at any time, in which event the results might be very serious. I trust that your Honorable Board will grant this appropriation.

It is desired to increase the salary of the Apothecary at this institution \$150, making it \$750 per annum, which, even at this advance, is less than is paid in other Departments for similar services.

Branch Workhouse, Hart's Island.

An increase in the salary of the Head Keeper at the Branch Workhouse, Hart's Island, from \$1,000 to \$1,800 per annum, is recommended. There are many reasons why the salary attached to this position should be increased. During the present year the Branch Workhouse has become one of the important institutions of the Department and, consequently, the responsibilities have become greater. There are about 400 men confined on this island. Early in the present year a Reformatory School for Boys (misdemeanants) was established there, and placed under the care of the Head Keeper. There are about 100 boys at present in the school. A laundry plant which had not been used for several years was put in good condition, and women transferred from the Blackwell's Island Workhouse to operate it. Much of the laundry work for the District Prisons and for the Department steamboats is now done there. About October 1 between 300 and 400 women will be transferred from the Workhouse, Blackwell's Island, to Hart's Island, thus placing additional responsibilities upon the Head Keeper. This transfer is to be made to relieve the overcrowded condition of the Blackwell's Island Workhouse. The buildings on Hart's Island, which were formerly used for the insane, are now being renovated for the reception of these prisoners. It can, therefore, be seen that the position has become one of importance and should command a larger salary.

It is also my desire to increase the salary of the Teacher at the Reformatory School from \$800 to \$1,000 per annum. The position is a very trying one and the request is not unreasonable. An increase from \$900 to \$1,000 in the salary of the Engineer is also recommended. There will also be needed at Hart's Island one additional Engineer, salary, \$900 per annum; two Firemen at \$480 each, \$960; one Head Matron at \$450; two Assistant Matrons at \$400 each, \$800; and one Hospital Nurse at \$400.

Donations to Discharged Prisoners.

For donations to discharged prisoners, \$2,000 is required. This money will be returned to the City by the State, at the end of the fiscal year, September 30, as provided by law.

For the transportation, maintenance and expenses of insane criminals, \$500 is asked.

Improvement of Riker's Island.

For Riker's Island Improvement, \$15,000, the amount appropriated last year, is asked. The salaries of the Warden and of other employees engaged on this improvement are paid out of this fund. It is desired to restore the salary of the Warden to what it was prior to January 1, 1902, i. e., \$1,200, which is an advance of \$200 over that now paid.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Kings County Penitentiary.

The appropriation asked for for the Kings County Penitentiary is \$174,672.50. Of this, \$68,000 is for maintenance, \$48,672.50 for salaries, \$50,000 for supplies for manufacturing purposes, and the remainder, \$5,000, for repairs to buildings, \$2,000 for donations to discharged prisoners and \$1,000 for transportation, etc., insane criminals.

The appropriation for 1902 for maintenance was \$63,000 and for salaries \$52,572.50. This shows an increase for 1903 of \$5,000 for supplies and contingencies and a decrease of \$3,900 for salaries. The manufacturing account shows an increase of \$8,000 over the amount appropriated for 1902 after transfer to supplies had been made. The increase in the appropriation asked for for maintenance at the Kings County Penitentiary is due to the advance in the prices of supplies and the higher census, as already explained. The total increase for Kings County is \$9,100.

Salaries.

An increase of \$150 is asked for in the salary of the General Foreman at the Kings County Penitentiary, which will make such salary \$1,500. The incumbent has the superintendence of a number of shops where different articles are manufactured and consequently must have practical knowledge of many trades. The salary of the Foreman's Assistant is recommended for an advance from \$900 to \$1,000, an increase of \$100.

Sir—In compliance with section 226 of the revised Greater New York Charter, and with the resolution adopted by your Board, and the instructions conveyed in the circular letter of July 23, from the Comptroller, I have the honor to present herewith my estimate of the appropriations required to conduct the public business of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for the year 1903.

Form "A," Salary Schedules, and Form "B," Appropriations, annexed hereto, give all details required in said circular letter.

Salaries—General Administration.

From this appropriation for 1902 have been and are being paid the salaries of the Commissioner, the Chief Engineer of Water Supply, the Secretary to the Department, the Private Secretary to the Commissioner, and since August a Consulting Electrical Engineer. The estimate for 1903 provides in addition to these for a Consulting Hydraulic Engineer, at \$7,000; a Secretary to the Deputy Commissioner, at \$1,500, and a Stenographer to the Commissioner, at \$1,200; also an increase in the salary of the Private Secretary to the Commissioner, from \$1,500, now paid, to \$2,500. The latter is the salary which was paid prior to January 1, 1902, to the Secretary to the Commissioner of Water Supply. Section 455 of the Charter provides for the employment of a Consulting Hydraulic Engineer and a Consulting Engineer of Light and Electricity in this Department.

The manifold duties and responsibilities of this Department require the employment of a Clerk who is an expert in the preparation and examination of contracts and the keeping of detail accounts of contract work. It is therefore proposed to employ such an expert Clerk at a salary of \$2,500.

The transfer to the Central Office from the other boroughs of the purchase of all supplies necessitates the employment of three additional Clerks, two at \$1,200 each and one at \$1,050, and an additional Stenographer at \$900, and the additional labor and responsibility to be imposed upon the present Clerk in charge should be compensated by an increase of his salary from \$1,500 to \$1,650. By such transfer of the purchasing of supplies great savings can be effected.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX.

While said circular letter requires that in this estimate appropriations shall be grouped according to boroughs, it is impossible to give certain appropriations separately for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

The necessity for the additional Clerks and Inspectors of Meters will be apparent when the fact is considered that even with the present force the water revenue for the first seven months of 1902 for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx is greater than that for the same period of 1901 by over \$324,000. The proper enforcement of the ordinance and Charter provisions allowing meters to be installed in stores and in places where water is used for business consumption has entailed great demands upon the inspecting force. It is also desirable to have readings of meters taken and bills rendered at shorter intervals and with greater promptness than heretofore. The effect of this will be for the interest of the City as well as the interest of the rate payers. It will obviate numerous and daily disputes as to the correctness of meter readings and meter bills.

Salaries—Office of Deputy Commissioner and Water Registrar, Borough of The Bronx.

The appropriation for 1902 did not become effective until May 1, after the office of Water Registrar in that borough had been established; pursuant to authority given by your Board and the Board of Aldermen.

The appropriation is therefore for eight months only, and including transfers, amounts to \$22,750.50, or at the rate of \$34,125.75 per year.

Mt. Prospect Laboratory can be made a valuable part of the equipment of the Department, affording means of scientific analyses from day to day of the quality of the water supplied not only from the various stations and sources in the Long Island watershed, but also of the water supplied from the Croton, Bronx and Byram river watersheds and the wells in the Borough of Queens. The territory of this borough is so extended that it is necessary to employ horses and wagons for the Deputy Commissioner and Inspectors, and this, in addition to the telephone service, postage and repairs to furniture, necessitates the additional amount asked for.

The foregoing estimates show an increase of \$704,675.23 over the appropriation of 1902, but the comparison is misleading.

Sections 469 and 530 of the Charter, as construed by the Corporation Counsel since the appropriations of 1902 were allowed, has thrown upon the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity an additional expenditure of \$300,880.46, which expenditure was previously given to other departments, and is not an increase for this Department.

The actual increase for lighting streets—\$115,521.37—is a sum barely sufficient to meet the growth and extension of the City.

Under sections 519 and 522 of the Charter, duties are imposed upon this Department for testing electric meters and currents and illuminating gas, which duties have never heretofore been performed by any department of this City, and make necessary the establishment of a laboratory and the appointment of more Inspectors. This alone adds an expense of at least \$38,000.

Funds have been asked for additional Inspectors and for additional Clerks in the Water Registrars' offices. If leaks are to be watched, meters systematically read, waste prevented and the revenues collected, such force should be added; it will prove an actual economy, and the extra revenue collected will pay many times over the additional salaries.

I also believe that it is of the highest importance that the water of all the boroughs should be regularly submitted for chemical and bacteriological analyses. The Brooklyn Laboratory can be enlarged to include the examination of the water in all the boroughs at an additional expense of \$10,000.

Further increase is asked for maintenance of the Croton water system, as many repairs must be made at once in order to save much greater outlay in the future. A change in the State law has subjected the City to additional taxation on our property in Westchester and Putnam Counties.

In the distribution of water more repairs than usual are necessary on account of the extraordinary amount of excavation now going on, and the safety of the City demands that the mains, gates, etc., should be kept in the best possible condition.

I further beg to suggest that the July payroll of this Department for this year, under conditions which I believe to be exceptional, does not afford a proper standard for comparison. When my predecessor determined to resign, he considerably left appointments to be filled by his successor. I assumed office on the 15th of July, and was not prepared during the first two weeks of my incumbency to fill a number of important positions. I can also state that increase in maintenance and administration of the water supply is not out of proportion to the increase in revenue collected by the City from water rates; in other words, with increased force and equipment, the returns in revenue will so increase that the same proportionate amount will be available for interest charges and Sinking Fund.

It is not likely that any appreciable balance will remain unexpended of the appropriations for 1902 at the close of the year.

I also desire to ask, in case any of the items in this application for appropriation need explanation, that I may have an opportunity of appearing before you and being heard.

Gentlemen—Herewith please find submitted an estimate of the amount of money required to properly maintain and administer the Queens Borough Library for the year 1903.

During the current year, as in the past, the Trustees have been very seriously hampered in conducting the affairs of the Library and in extending its facilities by establishing branches in the various sections of the borough, by the inadequacy of the funds allotted them by your Board.

There are now eight branches in active operation throughout the borough, which will circulate about 200,000 books during this year. Plans are being prepared for a Carnegie building, to be erected at College Point, upon property donated to the City by the residents of that place. At least five other branches should be established during the coming year, in order to supply, at least in part, the demand for library facilities throughout the borough, and the request for \$15,000 for this purpose is moderate, since \$3,000 is a very small sum with which to properly establish, equip and maintain a branch for a year, in accordance with Regent's requirements.

The contract between your Board and Mr. Carnegie's representatives for the erection of the branch library buildings for Queens, specifies that money may be appropriated by you for the maintenance of these buildings before their completion, and as in all probability at least five will be finished before the expiration of the year 1903, it is earnestly requested that provision be now made for their maintenance when completed.

Heretofore, also, the salaries of our employees have compared so unfavorably with those of other persons occupying similar positions that the Trustees have experienced much difficulty in procuring and retaining persons possessing the necessary education, culture, aptitude and other attainments required to properly qualify them for positions on the Library staff.

The society will require for the persons who will come under its care and support on its two floating hospitals and at its Seaside Hospital at New Dorp, Richmond Borough, during the year 1903, the sum of \$50,000.

Of this sum \$30,000 is the amount named in chapter 501 of the Laws of 1894, and in the charters of Greater New York as the appropriation to which the society is entitled each year from The City of New York.

The residue, to wit \$20,000, is the aggregate of the two sums of \$10,000, which were deducted from such annual appropriation in the years 1900 and 1901.

St. John's Guild, at your request, submitted to your Honorable Board, under date of February 28, 1902, a revised estimate of its expenditures for the year 1902, and in that communication the society set forth at length the grounds for its request for an appropriation from the City sufficient to meet the aggregate of the two sums which were withheld as above stated. Without repeating these reasons here, we earnestly commend them to your careful consideration.

For years past St. John's Guild has been working in co-operation with the Health Department of the City in keeping down the death rate among the children of the poorer classes. As an evidence of such friendly relations, we now submit the following letter which Hon. Ernst J. Lederle sent to our society under date of July 31, 1902, and which, by reason of its great importance to the vital interests of the City, has received wide publicity through the public prints.

JOHN P. FAURE, Esq., Secretary of St. John's Guild, City:

My Dear Mr. Faure—At the end of the first month of the work of our Summer Corps of Physicians I am writing to ask you for an additional supply of tickets for the admission of sick persons to the Floating and Seaside hospitals which you main-

tain. Our physicians are using these tickets constantly in the course of their work among the people of the tenements, and I can testify to the great amount of benefit which the ailing children of the poor are getting as a result of the work of your charity.

I have had numerous opportunities for observing the work of St. John's Guild, as have also the physicians in charge of the purely medical work of this department. While we give grateful recognition to the various good features of other local summer charities, fresh air work and the like, I may say that we are looking to St. John's Guild more than to any other of these charitable endeavors for the good of the City's tenement population, because it has always emphasized the medical side of charitable work.

Our Summer Corps Physicians are sent everywhere throughout the tenement districts with the aim of giving medical attention in summer to the children of the poorest people—those who are not able to employ physicians, but who die by hundreds from the complaints peculiar to children, largely because the mothers are either not instructed in or cannot follow the best methods of feeding and care. It very often happens that what the children need most of all, after proper food, is proper air, and this we look to the summer charitable workers to supply. Your organization is our main opportunity for use in getting these children away from the crowded City, and we have recognized its value by putting some of our own Summer Corps Physicians upon your boats. Your Floating and Seaside hospital accommodations undoubtedly save the lives of thousands of sick children every summer, and aid and strengthen the mothers in caring for their children. The medical care which these children get with you and the feeding by pasteurized milk and other approved methods will do much to strengthen them, and enable them to resist disease in the succeeding winter, when contagious disease is most prevalent.

I think that the importance of your charity should be especially emphasized this summer, when conditions among the children of the tenements are even worse than usual. Although none of the experts in the diseases of children has been able to give us a definite reason for it, it is a fact that the mortality among children under five years has been greater thus far this summer than for some seasons past. It must be that some conditions other than atmospheric are the cause of this, for one might have imagined that the cool weather had been distinctly favorable to a lowering of the death rate. I am having a great deal of work done in milk inspection, especially in the tenements, and I find conditions there very bad. These we will correct, but meanwhile we look to you to take the ailing children away, for a brief time at least, from the dangers imposed by tenement surroundings. In the four weeks ending July 26, 1,328 children under five years died in this City of diarrhoeal complaints, due, in most cases, probably, to improper food. Last year, in the same period, despite the extreme heat, the deaths in this class numbered only 1,289.

Your friends must hold up your hands and enable you to extend your work throughout the month of August and beyond, as needed. This is the critical time for the young children in the tenements. In the four weeks from July 20 to August 17 last year, more than 1,800 children of this City died from diarrhoeal complaints, which were, I believe, largely preventable. It lies with New York's citizens to give adequate funds to St. John's Guild and similar charities and so cut down the enormous number of these deaths.

If your experience points out any way in which this Department can aid you in your work beyond what we are now doing, I shall be very glad to have you indicate it, and shall do my utmost to insure the largest possible measure of co-operation on the part of the City with your admirable charity.

THE NEW YORK SOCIETY FOR THE PREVENTION OF CRUELTY TO CHILDREN.

The New York Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children,
No. 297 Fourth Avenue (corner East Twenty-third Street),
New York, August 29, 1902.

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—Pursuant to Laws of 1894, chapters 25 and 336, and section 230 paragraph 22, subdivision 2, of the Greater New York Charter, and section 230, paragraph 9, subdivisions 2 and 24 of chapter 466, Laws of 1901, The New York Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children hereby respectfully makes application for an appropriation of \$40,000 for the year 1903.

The amount asked for is an increase of \$10,000 over the appropriation of last year. It is asked for because the Society's work has greatly increased since its original appropriation in 1894, thus causing the necessity of larger expenditure to maintain its present standard of efficiency.

In support of this application we would invite your attention to the following facts:

1. Although exempt by law from taxation, the Society pays to the City its annual taxes upon its real estate, consisting of the building, No. 297 Fourth Avenue, used for its offices and reception rooms for the care of the children.

2. At its own expense the Society cares for all children under the age of sixteen years arrested or taken in charge by the police or its officers in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, providing them while in its custody temporarily with proper food, clothing and attendance pending their disposition by the Magistrates or Courts.

Section 291 of the Penal Code provides that no children shall be confined in prisons, or practically in station houses. The City has no place for their detention. Institutions decline to receive such children, because the commitment is temporary (Penal Code, section 291, subdivision 6), and to erect a fireproof building for the purpose and properly equip it with accessories, attendants, food, medical attention, etc., to say nothing of the incidental fees of the Sheriff for transportation of the children to and from the Courts, would be a most expensive matter for the City. The City is now relieved of this expense by the Society. The number of such children cared for by the Society during the year 1901 was 5,176, and no part of the money appropriated to the Society by the City is used for this purpose. This expense was paid entirely from subscriptions from annual donors and others. Children thus received, who are the victims of physical violence, not only frequently require medical attention, but a physical examination is often directed by the Court to determine the truth of their story, and to corroborate their evidence against the offender. All such examinations are made by skilled physicians, assisted by a competent nurse, with every facility afforded by the best hospitals in the land. Moreover, for the better protection of the children thus temporarily in the care of the institution, isolating rooms are provided for those who may be found at any time suffering from contagious disease, and a skilled nurse is always in attendance to see that every ordinance of the Board of Health is enforced and every suggestion of the physicians carried out.

3. The City's appropriation is used to defray the expenses of the transportation of the children to and from different Courts, those incidental to the employment and investigation by the Society's officers of their cases by the direction of the Court, and for the collection of moneys from parents under orders of Courts for account of board of children to reimburse the City for their care while in institutions. The Society has transferred during the year 1901, in its own wagon, to and from different Courts, 6,780 children. It has investigated, at the request of the Magistrates and Courts during the year 1901, the applications for the commitment of 1,049 children. Our investigations resulted in the commitment of only 396 of these children, leaving as improper cases 653, which, if they had been committed, would have entailed an annual expense on the County of \$104 for each child, or a total of \$67,912. This sum was therefore saved to the City as the direct result of our investigations. The Society has also investigated the cases of 3,975 children charged with offenses, and reported the facts to the Courts and Magistrates, upon which they were able to base their conclusions in acting in the disposition of the children. It has also aided in securing the evidence in 117 cases of criminal assaults upon children. It has prepared and submitted to the District Attorney accurate briefs upon which such cases were tried, the children being cared for by the Society at its own expense. It has caused 239 orders to be made for the support of children by the parents, when committed to institutions, and has collected and paid over to the City the money received upon the same; and where such payments were not made it has aided in the prosecution of the parents and others, thereby securing payment to the City for the year 1901 of the sum of \$20,491.48, which sum could not have been collected had it not been for the energetic action of this Society. This shows an increase of \$6,083 over the year 1900. This has entailed a heavy expense upon the Society, not only for clerical hire to keep the necessary books of the accounts, but for the trained agents necessary to follow up the parents and others to see if they pay as directed, or, if not, that the proper Court proceedings are instituted to compel payment.

The work of the Society never ends, night or day. Its building is always open, and children are received at all hours, bathed, dressed and properly cared for. During the present year a new Children's Court will be put in operation. Practically there are now in existence seven such Courts in the City, in each of which the Society keeps an officer in attendance to take charge of all such cases. These will have to be continued, and two or three new officers will have to be placed in the newly organized Court, in addition to which the Society will be put to an extra expense for the transportation of children from the seven District Courts to the Children's Court.

Your attention is also drawn to the fact that in 1901 the Society was put to an extraordinary expense of \$4,599 in removing its boilers, heating apparatus, etc., from the vaults under the sidewalk in front of our building. This vault space was held under license from the City, contained our four boilers and was the receptacle for the large amount of coal used by the Society. It contained the engineer's department. Under the subway plans our corner is to be used for a station for the underground road, consequently the City has taken from us most of this vault space and we have been compelled to vacate, thus entailing the heavy expense mentioned above.

With the growth of the City's population and the multiplication of agencies for the care, reformation and correcting of children under the influences of that humane spirit now happily predominant in the treatment of children's cases, the Society's beneficent work is increasing. May God, the rewarder of all good, bestow upon you abundant blessings for time and eternity, is our daily prayer.

Complying with the request of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the estimate of our hospital for 1903, St. Joseph's Hospital receives, cares for and treats such patients as are sent to us, or accepted, in pursuance of the rules established by the Commissioner of Charity.

The City pays the hospital 80 cents per day for medical patients, and 38 cents for children under five years of age, so sent and received.

Since January 1, 1902, the number of patients approved of by the Commissioner of Charity are as follows:

We are convinced from many years of experience that during the year 1903 we will be called upon to render service to at least the same number of patients, and perhaps more, as were treated during the year 1902, and we have taken as a basis for an estimate for 1903 the average monthly treatment as above. HARLEM LIBRARY.

To the Honorable the Mayor, the Comptroller and the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York:

The petition of the Harlem Library respectfully shows:

That it is a library association, duly incorporated under the Laws of 1798, its charter having been amended by chapter 217 of the Laws of 1871.

The library owns real estate in the County of New York, in the Borough of Manhattan, being the real estate occupied by it at number 32 West One Hundred and Twenty-third street, in said borough. It owns over 26,000 volumes of books, and maintains its association as a free library for the free circulation of books among the inhabitants of The City of New York until such time as the plan of consolidation is perfected, the trustees having passed the initial resolutions to effect the transfer.

It has actually circulated in the twelve months ending June 30, 1902, more than 164,905 volumes, to be read by the people at their homes, and no charge was made in any case for such circulation.

The library is subject to the inspection of the University of the State of New York, and registered by it as maintaining the proper standing, and the Regents have issued "certificate of approved circulation," which is hereto annexed, showing that the circulation of books, upon which your Honorable Board is entitled to appropriate money under the statute for the year ending June 30, 1902, is 152,000 volumes, for the maximum appropriation which may be made under the statute amounts to \$15,200, and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is allowed by law to make this application of money in this City to this library.

The corporation is in great need of funds to properly carry on the present work, and also to meet the imperative demands for the extension of reading facilities to the people of the City. This library is one of the oldest in the City. It was for the first time made free in 1897, and its circulation since that time has phenomenally increased. For the first year after such increase it was much hampered in its work, for the reason that it received no funds, as formerly, from the borrowing readers.

In 1888, although the library was entitled, by the rule applied to other libraries, to an appropriation of over \$7,000, it received only \$2,400. The library has not yet recovered from the setback which it suffered owing to the extremely small appropriation in that year. It has been handicapped throughout the entire period since that year, and its struggles to meet the necessary charges and expenses have hardly enabled it to give the public the best books and the best service. Its service, however, has been as good as if the appropriation had been normal; but it has been unable to purchase as many of the best books as the public has desired. The class of books purchased by the library is of the highest quality, and has met with the emphatic approval of the representatives of the New York Public Library and of the regents who have called at the library building.

The amount of the appropriation asked for, and which the law authorizes your Board to make, which, under the certified circulation is \$15,200, is not more than enough to meet the current expenses and to provide for the continual demands upon the library.

Attention is called to the fact that the "certificate of approved circulation," granted by the University of the State of New York, does not represent the actual circulation. As a matter of fact, the statement, verified by the president, of the circulation during the year ending on the 31st of May, shows a circulation of 163,586 volumes. The undersigned believes that it is the general practice of the University to deduct a certain percentage of the circulation and to grant a certificate for the balance remaining after such deduction.

In view, however, of the omission in 1898 to give the full appropriation asked for by this library (an appropriation which would have been entirely justified by law, and which, when too late, the members of the Board then existing stated should have been made), it is suggested that this Board may properly except this library from the ordinary scale of appropriations, and either make a larger appropriation, based on the figures given in the certificate of the University, or make the appropriation on the same basis as that given to other libraries, but basing the appropriation on the actual circulation as shown by the verified statement already referred to.

Annexed hereto is a statement of the library account for the year ending June 30, 1902, as required by the Comptroller.

Wherefore, Your petitioner prays that your Honorable Board may make to this corporation the full allotment which, under the law, it is authorized and empowered to make.

During the year ending June 30, 1902, the Long Island College Hospital has rendered, free of charge to the patients, medical and surgical aid and treatment to the poor of Kings County, who applied to it therefor and were approved by the Commissioner of Charities of Kings County.

During the said period of one year the number of persons so treated in the Long Island College Hospital (exclusive of the Maternity and the Dispensary) was 633, who remained in hospital 12,784 days, divided as follows:

COLORED HOME AND HOSPITAL.

The Honorable Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—In compliance with the request that a departmental estimate of the amount required for the care and support of the inmates of the Colored Home and Hospital, in and for the year 1903, be prepared and sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the following statement is respectfully submitted.

In conformity with the provision by law (section 230, Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 196, Laws of 1899), the Board of Managers petition for a per capita allowance for patients accepted by the Department of Public Charities as proper charges against the City Treasury, at the rate of 60 cents per day for medical treatment, and 80 cents per day for surgical treatment; for infants under five years of age, at the rate of 38 cents per day; for maternity cases, \$18 per case; for destitute mothers, nursing their infants, \$12 per month.

The Managers desire, further, to inform you that the Thirty-fifth Police Precinct was assigned to the Hospital for ambulance service on April 30, 1902, and the Hospital became a general hospital for the care of patients without regard to race, creed or color. The change of the corporate name of the institution from Colored Home and Hospital to Lincoln Hospital and Home has been authorized by the Supreme Court of the State of New York, and was assumed from and after the 15th day of August, 1902. In view of the high price of all food and other supplies, the Board of Managers respectfully ask your consideration and that the appropriation in the Budget for 1903 be not less than \$42,000, and that it be determined by the work performed. The number of days treatment from September 1, 1901, to September 1, 1902, was 102,981.

ST. VINCENT'S HOSPITAL.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—In presenting our application for the year 1903 we beg to say that during the last year the strain for accommodations has been such that we have been compelled to add thirty beds to the hospital equipments and we already foresee that these will be inadequate.

We have in former communications called your attention to the fact that St. Vincent's Hospital occupies a position adjacent to the water front, the docks and large steamship lines and yet is on the edge of the busiest shopping district in the city.

We are thus so favorably situated for our work as to be in constant demand night and day, both in the centre and on the west side of the city, where we have almost the whole field.

The assistance given by your Honorable Body last year for the maintenance of the ambulance service was not only necessary but greatly appreciated; the demands on this service also increase in such a way that from hard usage we are obliged to purchase a new ambulance.

It is likely that your Honorable Body will have its attention directed by other institutions also to the very greatly increased cost of living.

The expectations of a few months ago, that the advances in all necessary supplies would fall again have not been realized, and we find that the increase in the cost of living is not only firmly maintained, but we are not yet sure that the end of the advance has been reached.

If your Honorable Body could know these extra burdens fall upon those of us who struggle to maintain these great works of charity we have faith to believe that you would be glad to add substantially to the appropriations, so that the receipts of the hospital might be approximately adequate to its work.

We respectfully request that there be appropriated to the work of the hospital: first, for its ambulance service, the sum of three thousand six hundred dollars (\$3,600), and for the general work of the hospital thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) and for the increased accommodation seven thousand dollars (\$7,000).

Trusting you will give this matter your kind consideration and aid us to care for the large number of suffering poor who are constantly applying for admission to our wards, I beg to remain,

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—Complying with the request contained in your circular letter of July 23, 1902, we beg to state:

1. This institution does not receive any fixed appropriation from the City Government.

2. It does receive from the City remuneration at the rate of \$2 per week for each child over the age of two years legally committed to it, and 38 cents per day for every infant under that age, while the same remains within its charge. (See section 230, Charter of Greater New York, amended by chapter 196 of Laws of 1899.)

3. For the year 1899, it received from the City for the care of children so committed to it, \$63,482.12, but for 1902 it received only \$49,665.40, the cause of this falling off we ascribe to the burning of our Home for Boys (St. Agnes' Convent, Sparkill) in August, 1899. Since that period the boys have been temporarily housed at the Old Provincial Seminary, Troy, N. Y., and the distance and inconvenience of getting there prevented the City authorities from sending us as many children as formerly. A new and substantial building has now been completed at Sparkill. It has all the modern improvements, and can accommodate eight hundred children. As we have been encouraged to erect this building, we feel assured that the number of inmates will be much increased, and a larger amount of money will be required.

4. As children are constantly being received and discharged, it is impossible to say what amount should be paid the institution by the City for the year 1903, but a safe conjecture would seem to be that it should not be less than that paid for 1899, viz., \$63,482.12.

5. Regretting our inability to answer your inquiries more positively, and trusting that the foregoing may, to some extent, be of service to you, and be what you desire, with every wish to furnish whatever further information may lie within our power,

Gentlemen—In compliance with the circular of the Hon. Edward M. Grout, we, on behalf of the Lutheran Hospital Association of The City of New York and Vicinity, respectfully submit the following:

The amount of expenditures for the year 1903 for the above institution is, of course, entirely dependent upon the number of patients that may come to our care. In order to give your Honorable Board an outline of our work we beg to state that during the last year we nursed seventy free patients 9,481 hospital days. The aggregate hospital days, including day patients, were 11,149 days. Our dispensary, which was opened in the middle of December, 1901, gave free treatment to 1,107 patients in seven and one-half months. Besides 1,260 free meals were given last year to poor people.

They would be obliged to appeal to the City for help if we could not provide for them.

The appropriation for the year 1902 is \$3,024.78 (as revised on April 30, 1902), on the basis of 60 cents a day for medical, and 80 cents a day for surgical patients, as per section 230, Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 196, Laws of 1899.

In addition to our hospital and dispensary, we are now contemplating a school for training nurses.

We respectfully request your Honorable Board to set aside for the use of our hospital for the ensuing year a sufficient sum to enable us to carry out our charitable work and thereby to lighten the burden of The City of New York.

Gentlemen—The Catholic Home Bureau for Dependent Children, No. 105 East Twenty-second street, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, respectfully reports that, since its organization, about four years ago, it has placed 465 children in good family homes. In 1899, 48 children were placed, 112 in 1900, 176 in 1901, and since January 1, 1902, up to the present month, August, homes were secured for 129 children. Nearly all of these children were New York City charges, taken from twenty-five different institutions. Of the 129 children placed during the present year, 118 were regularly committed and were being paid for by The City of New York.

It can be readily seen from the above that our work is steadily increasing. New homes must be found and investigated, and children already placed must be regularly visited.

Recently, by request of the Department of Public Charities of the Borough of Brooklyn, we have been placing children at present inmates of Brooklyn institutions. This means additional work of canvassing and investigation.

To properly carry on this important work, which means a large saving to The City of New York, we respectfully request that there be included in the estimate for the year 1903, the sum of eight thousand dollars (\$8,000), out of which payments may be made by the Comptroller of The City of New York for the work done by the Bureau.

As the Trustees of the institution have no disposition to charge the counties for clothing State pupils anything more than the actual cost of the clothing furnished, they have decided to reduce the charge to twenty dollars (\$20) each for male pupils, and twenty dollars (\$20) for females. They are enabled to do this only by purchasing the supplies at wholesale and by making a portion of the garments with the labor of the inmates.

The following pupil has been received into the institution from your county upon the proper legal certificates as required by the law relating to the admission of pupils:

It will therefore be your duty, under the act aforesaid, at your next annual meeting, to raise the sum of \$20 for clothing said pupil for the year ending September 30, 1903.

Gentlemen—In compliance with the request of the Hon. Edward M. Grout, Comptroller, under date of the 23d of last July, the Society of the Lying-in Hospital presents to your Honorable Board its estimate of the amount required for the care of such cases as the Department of Public Charities may send to this institution, in and for the year 1903, and having been accepted by the Commissioner as a proper charge against the City, and under such pro rata rate as shall seem expedient.

The new building of the society recently erected occupies the entire front of the block on Second avenue, between Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets, and has an accommodation for 186 patients. The number applying to the society for care in childbirth during the past year was 3,757. The applicants now amount to over 500 a month, and it is estimated that more than 6,000 poor women in this borough will apply for medical treatment from the society during the year 1903. The hospital is centrally located, and its object is to relieve as far as possible the suffering of the poor. It was built for that purpose and receives no pay patients whatever, and its managers are anxious to receive all maternity cases that cannot be accommodated in the Metropolitan and City Hospitals on Blackwell's Island or in the Emergency Hospital on Twenty-sixth street. It is believed that the enormous growth of this City has long demonstrated the absolute necessity for a large and centrally located maternity hospital.

The work of the society among the deserving poor in this borough must to a large extent depend on its annual appropriation from this Honorable Board. It earnestly appeals, therefore, for the full amount asked for to care and relieve such cases among the deserving poor as it seems probable it will receive from the City during the ensuing year.

Hon. CHAS. V. FORNES, President, City of New York:

Dear Sir—Transmitted herewith please find Estimate of Expenditures for the maintenance and support of the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys, and the education of its inmates in schools and shops for the year 1903, including salaries and moneys required for the care, improvement and preservation of the grounds and buildings, and the population therein contained.

The purchase of many utensils and supplies necessary for the improvement and preservation of our buildings and grounds, which heretofore were supplied by the Department of Public Buildings and Supplies, has become a severe strain on our appropriation of \$48,000 in consequence of the Corporation Counsel's interpretation of section 111 of the amended Charter, with regard to the furnishing of the above-named supplies by said Department to this institution. This fact, as well as the great increase in commitments, has compelled your Board of Management to relinquish many improvements in schools, shops and household accommodations in order to meet the increasing demand, with a proper observance of the law.

Hence it will be observed by your Honorable Board that we may reasonably expect at least 200 boys more during the coming year, thus increasing our population to a number in excess of 400. From this number we expect to discharge 20 per cent., or about 80 boys, leaving an increase of more than 55 per cent. over present population to be provided for, or about 314 boys, for the year 1903.

Visiting Grand Juries, Judiciary and heads of Departments of the Municipal Civil Government have observed the great practical service rendered in this institution in the reformation of the youthful delinquents committed to our care, and commenting upon the large percentage of discharges to employment or parental jurisdiction compared with the number of admissions, have recommended to your Honorable Board the importance of an appropriation for the erection of an extension to the present four-story brick structure, 60 by 100, at an estimated cost of \$50,000, including the necessary equipments for the accommodation of from 500 to 600 boys. The present frame building, used as a detention ward, hospital, school and trade shops, is over a century in age, and is unsuited to the purposes stated, as well as a menace to the health of the wards of the City.

Much interest has been manifested, and general satisfaction expressed, with the efforts of your Board of Management in the general conduct of the institution during their administration, and they would feel honored by a visit from your Honorable Board, who would be better able to judge conditions from personal observation than can be explained in a communication. The accompanying estimate is based on a population of 300 boys.

We have in the institution, as stated, 213 boys, an excess of 25 per cent. over the previous year, all assigned from the courts, and great fear exists among the members of the Board of Management that the time is not far distant when the doors of the institution will be closed against those most needing the instruction and training dispensed by your Board of Management. It is reasonable to expect a demand on us for shelter, support and instruction of at least 20 additional boys per month during the year 1903, and the number of discharges would probably average 25 per cent.

In the year 1902, under section 1399 of the Greater New York Charter, we asked for \$13,200 for the maintenance of the Children's Court; \$11,200 was allowed, which amount has since been turned over to the Court of Special Sessions under the act which transferred the Children's Court from the control of the Board of City Magistrates of the First Division to the Court of Special Sessions.

The increase asked for under the heading of "Supplies and Contingencies," of \$2,600, is required for the general repairing of furniture, telephone service, ice, Penal Codes, Session Laws, etc., in the seven City Magistrates' Courts of the First Division. Under the present chapter provision the Borough President having no power or appropriation for the purpose of furnishing supplies and repairs, and the Board of City Magistrates being compelled to make contracts therefor, after a careful consideration of the matter and the work that will be required to be performed in the line of repairs, etc., in the seven courts during the year 1903, the increased amount asked for is necessary for the purposes specified.

Gentlemen—In response to the circular letter of the Honorable Comptroller of The City of New York, under date of July 23, 1902, the General Society of Mechanics and Tradesmen, of The City of New York, begs to present its application for an apportionment towards the maintenance of its free library. It has attached hereto a formal application as authorized by the society for the sum of \$11,000, also a statement showing the actual disbursements for this department of its work. It would respectfully urge that the full amount asked for be appropriated to it, which is based upon the maximum allowed by the laws of the State of New York, but which we are aware is entirely within the discretion of the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York. The indirect expenditure towards the maintenance of this library approximates a considerable sum in addition to that shown in the attached statement. This society maintains, in addition to its libraries, free schools for the instruction at night of young men who are actively engaged in different vocations during the day, and a considerable portion of the expense for the carrying on of this work and general maintenance of the buildings might be properly apportioned to the library, but as this would involve a separation that would be largely a matter of estimate, no attempt is made to fix any sum. It also sets apart a floor space, nearly 100 feet square for the libraries, for which, of course, no rental is charged or claimed.

Gentlemen—In compliance with directions contained in circular letter of Comptroller, bearing date July 23, 1902, I send inclosed herewith estimate of the expenditure for the year 1903 for the Municipal Court, Borough of Richmond, First District, dated August 20, 1902, and prepared in form prescribed by the Comptroller.

All the salaries set forth in such estimate are fixed by the provisions of sections 1355 and 1373 of the Charter, except the Assistant Clerk, and the amount stated is that paid in Queens. The service of all of the officers, clerks and subordinates named in such estimate are necessary for the efficient performance of the duties of this Court.

The item of \$300 for supplies and contingencies is an increase of \$200. This item is estimated to cover disbursements necessary in the business of the court, such as telephone service, postage, expressage, books, etc. The increase is due to the fact that the telephone service and various other supplies have heretofore been furnished and paid for by the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, as constituted prior to January 1, 1902. The bureau which now performs similar functions has no appropriation I am informed for this purpose, and each department has its own appropriation for such service and supplies, so that the increase is only apparent, it being rather a change in form of appropriation.

Dear Sir—In conformity with circular letter of Hon. Edward M. Grout, Comptroller of The City of New York, we hereby request an appropriation for conducting the work of the Northern Dispensary in and for the year 1903, of eighteen hundred dollars (\$1,800).

The Northern Dispensary was incorporated in 1828, and since then has furnished free medical attendance to the needy sick poor residing in that portion of the City bounded on the north by West Twenty-third street; on the east by Broadway; on the south by Spring street, and on the west by the North river.

During the year ending December 31, 1901, 12,298 patients were treated, 27,104 visits were made and 18,723 prescriptions dispensed, showing an increase in work over year 1900 of almost 12 per cent.

The disbursements in the year 1901 were \$7,357.39, of which \$781.25 was received from The City of New York, the balance being the proceeds of voluntary contributions by friends of the institution.

The only salaries paid are to the physicians and employees of the Dispensary, the officers serving gratuitously.

The Dispensary was erected by private subscription on land donated by the City for the purpose, at the intersection of Christopher street and Waverley place.

The appropriation asked for is needed for the proper continuance of the work of the Dispensary.

Gentlemen—I have the honor to send you herewith the estimates for this office

for 1903, together with a statement showing the salaries and amount allowed for supplies and contingencies for 1902.

I have asked an increased appropriation of one hundred dollars (\$100) in the salary account over the present year. Formerly one Bank Messenger received twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200) and the other one thousand dollars (\$1,000). In my revised estimate for the present year I placed both of them at one thousand dollars (\$1,000) each. I believe that ten hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,050) is a fairer salary for the work they do.

Note—In reference to the application for \$4,000 for payment of legal fees, this amount has been allowed each year for some years back, and the charges against the same in 1901 amounted to \$3,682.27 and will amount to about the same this year, or probably a little more.

Regarding the application for \$22,000 for recopying, etc., I do not know that I can add anything to the letter addressed to the Comptroller on June 11, 1902, a copy of which is hereto annexed, excepting that the condition of the books in this office is growing worse day by day, and it is absolutely necessary that something be done

to preserve these records, as they are in a much more mutilated condition at this time than at the date of the following letter:

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller, New York City:

My Dear Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for the purpose of revising the Budget for the year 1902, I made an application for an appropriation in addition to the sum of \$5,000 allowed by the last Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to carry on the work of recopying, repairing and rebinding old and mutilated records in the office of the Clerk of Queens County, as provided for by section 518 of the Laws of 1901.

The Board did not see fit to make an increase in the appropriation, and I fear that in going over the vast amount of work before it at that time that possibly this matter did not receive the careful consideration due such an important branch of our public offices.

The facts are briefly as follows: The Commission appointed by the Supreme Court, according to the provisions of the act, condemned to be rebound and repaired 173 volumes of public records and ordered to be recopied into new books 128 volumes. With the appropriation of \$5,000 available I engaged, out of about forty applicants, six of the very best copyists, who have been at work since February and have succeeded in recopying 21 volumes. In addition to this I have had rebound and repaired 29 volumes and have ordered 31 new books at a total cost of \$4,889.40, leaving in the fund of \$5,000 \$110.60, and 107 books to be recopied into new books and 144 books to be rebound and repaired.

As you will see from the above statement the appropriation of \$5,000 is practically exhausted, and there remain 251 books to be recopied, repaired or rebound. These books are in a most shameful condition for public records; many of them are actually falling apart and will become of little public value as records if something is not done very soon.

I write this to notify you of the facts and to ask if something cannot be done to remedy the existing condition of affairs and carry on this important and necessary work. I have been obliged to discharge all of the clerks engaged on the work, which I regret very much, as they have become experienced and were doing remarkably good work. If they become scattered and engaged in other pursuits it will take considerable time to obtain equally as good service.

I inclose you herewith a copy of a petition signed by all the leading members of the Bar and real estate dealers doing business with the office, praying that the work be done, as well as an additional statement which I filed with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at the time of making my application.

I might add that if the sum of \$8,000 to \$10,000 could be appropriated for this work it would serve to keep the clerical force together and continue the work, especially on the badly mutilated books, until a sufficient amount could be appropriated in the Budget of 1903 to complete the work.

Trusting you will give this matter your earnest consideration, and awaiting an early reply, I am,

Regarding the application for \$5,000 for remounting, recopying and comparing mutilated maps, I desire to say that section 161 of the County Law provides that County Clerks shall have the custody of all books, records, deeds, pamphlets, maps and papers deposited in the County Clerk's office, and it made his duty to attend to their arrangement and preservation. To perform this duty it is absolutely necessary that an appropriation be made to preserve the mutilated maps in this office, as they all have relation to real estate titles in Queens County and many of them have become so torn and mutilated that they will become of little use unless some measures be taken to preserve them at once. Under the provisions of subdivision 9, section 230 of the County Law, this will become a charge against the County of Queens.

Regarding the application for the appropriation of \$1,500 for record books, indices, etc., I desire to say that when I took office on January 1, 1901, there was a large supply of books on hand, but I have estimated that these books will be all used up by the end of the present year, consequently a new supply will be necessary for next year's work. Taking 1901 and the first six months of 1902 as a basis, I estimate that \$1,500 will be required to furnish books for the year 1903.

Gentlemen—In response to the circular letter of the Comptroller, dated July 23, 1902, The Hospital and Dispensary of the Town of Flushing submits the annexed estimate of the amount required for the care and support of its inmates for the year 1903.

By chapter 754 of the Laws of 1895 and section 230 of the Greater New York Charter the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is authorized to appropriate moneys for the benefit of the Hospital; payments to be made thereout only for such inmates as are received and retained in the hospital pursuant to the rules established by the State Board of Charities.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York:

Gentlemen—I beg to submit herewith a statement of the funds necessary for the support of the Brooklyn Public Library for the year 1903. The estimate has been very carefully prepared, and the amount asked for is no larger than the actual needs of the great public library system of Brooklyn. Having no endowment, the library depends entirely upon the appropriation made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its support. Any curtailment of the amount asked for would seriously cripple the

institution, and it is earnestly hoped that your Honorable Board will approve and grant the request made by the Directors of the Brooklyn Public Library.

The total amount of the estimate, \$278,674, includes several items not found in the Budget for 1902, as follows:

(1) Additional amount necessitated by the consolidation of the Brooklyn Library with the Brooklyn Public Library.

(2) Changing of the Station at Ridgewood to a regular Branch.

(3) Cost of heating and lighting all the library buildings (including the two new ones above named), which has heretofore been borne by the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies. In any event, it is understood that the heating will have to be done by the library authorities.

The increase asked for over that appropriated for the year 1902 is made up as follows:

(a) Additional assistants needed to carry on the work demanded by the increased circulation of books, cataloguing of books and supervision of the several branches, based upon the salary list and actual work of 1902.

(b) Accession of new books absolutely necessary to make the work effective in the different sections of the city, based upon the circulation of 1902 and the number of books at present in each branch.

(c) Papers and periodicals required to satisfy the demand of the public.

The repair gang, when the vacancy caused by the promotion of James Rice from Laborer to Bridge Tender is filled, will consist of two Laborers. The Foreman and the third Laborer work with the Bridge Tenders part of the time. I have accordingly scheduled as being necessary an increase in the force by the appointment of an additional Laborer and one Carpenter. There are now no mechanics in the Bronx Repair Gang, and all skilled labor is supplied by the Harlem River Repair Gang or by the Brooklyn Repair Shop. While this arrangement is satisfactory on jobs of some magnitude or difficulty it is still necessary that a small gang be attached to this borough, in order that the numerous small and ordinary repairs may be made cheaply and promptly.

Skilled Labor Supplied by the Harlem River Repair Gang and by the Brooklyn Repair Shop.

As noted above, all skilled labor on repairs in this borough is furnished by the Harlem River Gang and by the Brooklyn Repair Department. Using our expenditures on this account for the present year as a criterion, I estimate that in 1903 we shall require for mechanics' labor and similar charges the following amounts:

The item of \$1,200 for an electric motor for City Island Bridge is included, because the ruins of the old bridge having been removed and a clear channel provided for vessels it is likely that the number of boats using the inside route past our bridge will increase. The present mode of turning the draw by hand is slow and expensive and the installation of a motor would obviate delays to vehicular traffic and reduce the cost of operation.

The item of \$900 is for electric current for One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street Bridge over Mott Haven canal, Westchester Avenue Bridge over Bronx river and City Island Bridge, and is based on the minimum estimate of the Edison Company or its predecessor. Up to the present time it seems impossible to obtain power from the Union Railway Company and it is likely that I shall be forced to install alternating motors and buy current generated for industrial purposes at market rates.

The item of \$5,000 for extraordinary repairs is included to provide for Unionport and Eastchester bridges. These structures are in an unstable condition. Application has been made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a bond issue to pay for a new structure at Unionport, and it is my purpose to substitute the present draw span at Westchester avenue for the Eastchester Bridge as soon as the new Westchester Avenue Bridge is completed. Until these projects are undertaken it is necessary to have on hand funds for repairs in case of accidents to either bridge.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I have the honor to transmit to you, pursuant to the Comptroller's circular letter of the 23d of July, the Departmental Estimate for the Department of Bridges for the year 1903.

Every item of expense not absolutely necessary for conducting the public business has been excluded, and every item included in the estimate has been reduced to the lowest amount of expenditure consistent with efficient service.

The increase in the estimate over the appropriation for the current year arises from the following sources:

On the Harlem river bridges, where the largest increase occurs, provision is made for maintaining and operating the new bridge at One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, for establishing a repair gang attached to the bridges over the Harlem river, and for thoroughly painting all of such bridges. For many years past the painting of these bridges has been neglected and repairs have been made by men sent from the Brooklyn Bridge. The creation of a repair gang for the Harlem river bridges will enable repairs to be made at a considerable saving in cost to the City. The work of painting the bridges can no longer be postponed without serious detriment to the structures.

Provision is also made for the maintenance and operation of new bridges at Grand street, Brooklyn, over Newtown creek; at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, Bronx, over the Mott Haven canal, and for repairs to the bridges over Newtown creek and in the Borough of Brooklyn, which are imperatively needed.

I inclose also estimate for the New York and Brooklyn Bridge for 1903.

As the Legislature has provided that your Honorable Board shall determine as to the amount a charitable institution shall be allowed in any one year we submit herewith a brief statement to show the claims of the Sloane Maternity Hospital for the allowance of \$12,000 as asked for in inclosed estimate.

For the year 1901 the hospital performed work for the City to the amount of \$11,186.44, and for the current year we were granted an appropriation of \$12,000. From the present indications this amount will just about be sufficient to cover the charge for emergency cases that will be accepted by the Department of Charities.

The Sloane Maternity Hospital has 120 beds absolutely free, and over two-thirds of them are occupied most of the year. During the year 1901 there were received in the hospital 1,525 patients, of which 592 were accepted as public charges by the Department of Charities.

For the year 1901 the entire cost of maintenance was \$44,923.31, of which we received from the City \$9,384.08, the balance having been contributed by friends of the institution.

The City only approves and allows for emergency cases at the rate of \$18 per case.

The hospital is conducted on the most economical basis, is doing effective work in relieving the city's poor, and believes its request for an allowance of \$12,000 a reasonable one.

DEPARTMENTAL ESTIMATE.

Estimate of the Amount of Expenditure of the Webster Free Library for the Year 1902.

The Webster Free Library is maintained for the welfare and free use of the public in The City of New York. It is subject to the inspection of the Regents of the University of the State of New York, and registered by them as maintaining a proper standard.

The aggregate circulation, as certified by the Regents, for the year ending June 30, 1901, which is the term fixed by the Regents of the University for their annual examination, was 106,000. The amount granted in 1901 by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and approved by said Board in 1902, was six thousand seven hundred dollars (\$6,700).

A certificate from the Board of Regents of the University is presented herewith, showing that in the judgment of the Regents, said library has circulated for the free use of the public during the year ending June 30, 1902, 133,500 volumes, of such a character as to merit a grant of public money.

The appropriation to which, under such certificate, the said library would be entitled, is thirteen thousand three hundred and fifty dollars (\$13,350), for the expenses of the year 1903. Mindful, however, of the necessity of economy, the managers of the library ask for a grant of public money to the amount of eight thousand seven hundred dollars (\$8,700) only. They propose to spend eleven thousand nine hundred and fifty five dollars (\$11,955).

The managers annex hereto two tabulated statements, as requested by the Comptroller, showing the expenses of the library during the year 1902, and also the expenses proposed to be incurred during the year 1903, with explanations showing the reasons for the increase in amounts.

A separate comparative statement is also appended, showing in one column the amounts specified in the estimate for 1902, and the amounts proposed to be paid out by the library during the ensuing year. Every item of expense not absolutely necessary for the business of conducting the library has been excluded, and every item included in the estimate has been reduced to the lowest amount of expenditure consistent with efficient service. The library is very glad to co-operate with the Board of Estimate in accomplishing these important objects.

In the management of the library, we have co-operated to the utmost extent possible with the principals and teachers of the public schools in our vicinity, so as to provide them and their pupils with books which shall be of use to them in their studies, and also with a small museum of illustrative objects to aid them in their studies.

The building and land occupied entirely by the library, and the books contained therein, represent an expenditure of about thirty-six thousand dollars, most of which has been raised by private subscription.

No part of the appropriation for 1902 will remain unexpended at the close of the year.

The grant of the public moneys has been of the greatest utility in extending the work of the library, and we believe that by this combination of the intelligent and careful supervision of unpaid managers, and of capital contributed by private liberality, with the grant of public funds, results are obtained which are of great advantage to the citizens of New York, and contribute to their permanent welfare.

Gentlemen—In accordance with your resolution adopted July 11, 1902, I have prepared the annexed estimates of expenditure of the Law Department, which are

to be sent in triplicate to the Mayor, the Comptroller and the Board of Aldermen.

The estimates are prepared in accordance with the form recommended by the Comptroller in his printed circular letter of July 23, 1902.

The only changes recommended from the appropriations made by your Board on April 30, 1902, for this Department, are as follows:

The following are full explanations of the reasons for the proposed increases:

I.—Salaries.

The proposed increase in salaries is made up of three separate items, viz.:

1. Increase in salaries to persons now employed.....	\$5,550 00
2. Additional employees needed.....	11,100 00
3. Difference due to the fact that a part of the present office force was only to be employed after May 1, 1902, so that the appropriation for the year was cut down below the total annual payroll by.....	11,662 00

1. The following persons now employed should, in my judgment, receive higher salaries; provided, in the case of those whose positions are competitive, they pass proper promotion examinations:

R. Percy Chittenden, Assistant, now at \$6,000, should receive \$7,500. He has now been in the Department nearly five years in responsible charge of all the most important trials in Kings, Queens and Nassau Counties, and has had exceptional responsibility in the difficult water litigation.

James W. Covert, Assistant, now at \$3,000, should receive \$5,000. His functions were formerly limited to the trial of cases in Queens County, and it was understood that he was also at liberty to attend to private business. Since January 1, 1902, Mr. Covert has been actively engaged both in Kings and Queens in preparing and trying cases, and has devoted all his time to the business of the City, with very satisfactory results.

Frederick W. Stelle, Assistant, now at \$2,500, should receive \$3,500. Mr. Stelle has general charge of the Health Department cases in Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond. He has been in the Department only since the spring of 1902, but he came in at a low salary, and the experience he has since acquired, combined with unusual zeal and ability, fully justify the proposed increase.

William H. Lake, Examiner, now at \$1,500, should receive \$1,800. Mr. Lake has been connected with the Department since 1884. He was at first a policeman detailed to duty in the Department, and in 1896 was appointed examiner. The small increase proposed seems to me due to his faithful and efficient service.

James M. Valles, Librarian, now at \$2,100, should receive \$2,400. Mr. Valles has been Librarian since 1875, and has sole charge of our large collection of books, comprising not only a complete general working library, but a mass of pamphlets and documents relating to the City. The work of indexing and caring for these books, and of attending to the purchase and receipt of accessions is difficult and important; and it is uniformly well done.

James J. McGrath, Chief Clerk in the Bureau for the Collection of Penalties, now at \$1,800, should receive \$2,100. Mr. McGrath occupies a responsible post, and has been a faithful servant of the City since 1875. The proposed increase will be but a partial recognition of his conscientious work.

Thomas A. Murphy is a Process Server at \$900. I recommend raising his salary to \$1,050, in view of his experience and efficiency.

2. I recommend the following additions to the force of the Department:

1 Junior Assistant at \$1,800.....	\$1,800 00

All these positions fall within the competitive classes of the Municipal Civil Service.

My experience has satisfied me that the increase of force granted in April, 1902, is not entirely adequate, in view of the constantly increasing work to be performed.

One junior assistant is needed in Richmond, to which borough I can only now spare one assistant and one stenographer.

The other two junior assistants are needed in the main office to help in the work of investigating cases before trial. Every lawyer knows that thorough preparation is the most important element in successful litigation; and with the present office force it is impossible to get cases as well prepared as they should be.

Four additional stenographers and typewriters are needed to keep up with the constantly increasing volume of work; two in the main office, one in The Bronx office and one in the Bureau for the Collection of Penalties. Large amounts are now paid for extra stenographic work, some of which might well be done by the regular staff. Such payments for extra work will have to continue as an item of outlay, even if the additional stenographers are allowed, because of the frequent necessity of getting emergency work done in haste. But the increase asked for will be a measure of economy, as the enlarged force will undoubtedly be kept fully occupied at all times.

A clerk is needed in The Bronx branch office, where there is now neither a clerk nor a stenographer. By the courtesy of the Borough President, a clerk and stenographer have been detailed from his force to help my assistant, but this arrangement is not satisfactory to anyone and ought not to continue.

An additional office boy is needed in the main office.

The proposed increases in the payroll amount altogether to \$14,800, which is 4.35 per cent. of the amount now paid. As the growth of the business of the Department fairly corresponds with the growth in population and wealth of the City, an increase of a little over 4 per cent. in our payroll seems not unreasonable.

There will be 169 persons on the payroll if all the foregoing recommendations are adopted. The average rate of salary will then be \$2,177.87 as against an average of \$2,556.18 at the close of 1898, and \$2,521.42 at the close of 1901.

II.—Supplies and Contingencies.

In my communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated February 19, 1902, I asked for an appropriation of \$80,000 for this item, and was allowed \$50,000. A transfer of \$13,715.45 was subsequently made to this account for the purpose of covering bills of former years that had been paid by me. The amount available for the expenses of 1902, therefore, remained at \$50,000 only.

On August 21, 1902, I was compelled to address a letter to your Board, stating that the appropriation was exhausted, and that the balance on hand was insufficient even to meet the bills which I was then prepared to certify; and I therefore asked for a transfer. The amount expended up to the end of August, 1902, together with the bills received, but not yet certified, will amount to about \$52,200. At this rate the total expenditure for the year for supplies and contingencies will amount to \$78,300.

There is no reason to suppose, so far as I can see from my own experience in the management of this Department, and from the records of expenses in former years, that the Department can be managed to advantage for any less amount.

I repeat here what I said on this subject in the communication of February 19, above referred to.

"The amount disbursed by this Department for general contingencies has steadily increased during the last four years, as follows:

"The last amount mentioned does not include the sum of \$18,567.92, which represents the amount of unpaid bills against that appropriation. It appears, therefore, that the amount which was actually expended, or for which an indebtedness was incurred in 1901, was \$88,223.74; the provisional amount allowed by the Board of Estimate for the year 1902 is \$50,000.

"The steady increase in the amount disbursed for general contingencies in this Department is explained by the fact that the business transacted is explained by the fact that the business transacted by the Department has increased in volume and importance; that the number of trials has increased greatly, and that in a great many of these cases it is necessary to employ expert witnesses.

"The following statement shows the principal items of expenditure under the appropriation for the year 1901, and the amounts which (as far as it is now possible to predict) will be needed for like purposes for 1902:

"The only item in the above schedule which I have materially increased is the allowance for cleaning, repairs and supplies for the Department. Under the new Charter it will be necessary to purchase from this appropriation all furniture, typewriters, office files and other supplies which were formerly obtained through the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies; and as I have decided to open branch offices in the boroughs of The Bronx, Queens and Richmond, this increase will be absolutely necessary.

"The amount specified for expert witnesses may seem large, but it must be borne in mind that in many of the cases tried, such as contract and negligence cases, and cases involving the water supply of the City, it is absolutely necessary to employ these experts both to prepare for trial and also to offset the testimony offered by other experts hired by the plaintiff.

"In the cases tried during the past few months in which these experts have been employed, the recoveries have been small, and I am sure that it is wise economy to employ the very best experts in these trials and pay them whatever their services are reasonably worth. Parsimony in such cases might easily cost the City in large verdicts many times over what the experts' fees would come to. Obviously, this is so in the large and important class of litigation which may be grouped under the head of personal injury cases. Unless the Department can secure the best medical advice and assistance, the City would be at the mercy of enterprising, and often unscrupulous litigants. The same thing is true in a very marked degree of the water cases arising in the neighborhood of Brooklyn, where claims by owners of agricultural land have been made, amounting to many hundreds of thousands of dollars."

My experience in the past six months fully confirms the opinions expressed last February. There is no way of limiting such expenditures except by constant vigilance on the part of the head of this Department and of the Auditing Officers of the Finance Department. By appropriating any less amount than the \$75,000 asked for, no economy will result. The only effect will be the production of a budget which, to that extent, will be misleading.

III.—Unexpended Balances.

I am instructed by the resolutions of your Board to "state the amount which may probably remain unexpended of any appropriations for 1902 at the end of the year."

I estimate the following unexpended balances:

Salaries of Assistants, etc.....	\$8,000 00

Against this amount there is to be offset a probable deficiency, as above stated, of \$28,300 in the appropriation for supplies and contingencies.

This statement is, of course, made without reference to transfers that may be authorized to or from the several accounts.

In explanation of the above I desire to offer the following observations:

The salaries for this Department were fixed by a vote of your Board on April 30, 1902, and went into effect on the following day. The schedule, which was then adopted on my recommendation, involved the addition of twenty-eight persons to the office force. It was not practicable to appoint them all at once; and as the summer was approaching, I have thought it best, as a measure of economy, not to fill some of the places until the autumn. Some vacancies still exist, but it is my expectation that substantially all of them will be filled by the first of October. The delay from May to October in completing the list has thus effected a substantial saving, which will not, however, occur again.

As to contingent counsel fees, the annual expenditure is necessarily a fluctuating item which cannot be foretold. It is my purpose to limit the employment of special counsel as closely as possible. But, like all contingent expenses, it is impossible to foretell the amount in advance. This year there is likely to be a saving; but next year, in view of certain exceptional litigation, it is probable that the entire appropriation asked for may be needed.

Upon the acquisition of a new location for the Central Department the present buildings and land may be turned over to the City and sold for business purposes, for which there will soon be a great demand. The revenue from this source can be applied to the acquisition of the land required and the erection of a proper building thereon. The buildings now occupied by the Central Department were erected in 1862 and are inadequate for the proper transaction of its rapidly increasing business, such increase having been at least fourfold since the erection of such buildings. Because of the age of the buildings, the absence of fireproof protection for records invaluable to the Department and to the City and State, the lack of proper facilities and appliances for police service, the location so far removed from commercial centres and from the lines of greatest travel within the city, and for many other important reasons the Police Department should be provided with better and more centrally located headquarters.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.
