## COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

*Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock A. M., on Monday, April 24, 1905.*

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Edward M. Grout, Comptroller; Patrick Keenan, Chamberlain, and Charles V. Fornes, President, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meetings held April 5 and 12, 1905, were approved as printed.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, relative to the final adjustment of the Staten Island Ferry matter (see page 61):

NEW YORK, April 20, 1905.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., *Secretary, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

SIR—I beg to advise that, pursuant to resolutions adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on January 31 last, this Department proceeded with the preparation of the agreement to be entered into with the Rapid Transit Ferry Company for the continuation of the ferry service between the boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, for the purchase of the terminal structures at St. George, in the Borough of Richmond, and at the foot of Whitehall street, in the Borough of Manhattan, and for the purchase of the five ferry boats now in use on the ferry. Pursuant to the resolutions adopted April 5, 1905, agreements have been prepared for the leasing of track terminal privileges at St. George to the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company and to the Richmond Light and Railroad Company.

I have had included in the agreements such provisions as I consider would properly protect the interests of the City, and have submitted the same to the attorneys for the companies, Messrs. Edward Lauterbach and Lester W. Clark, for examination preparatory to execution.

The attorneys interpose certain objections to the forms of the agreements as prepared, and I will take up the various questions in their order:

First—The agreement for the purchase of the boats, as prepared, provides that the sum of \$245,000 shall be paid for the ferryboats "Robert Garrett" and "Castleton," \$30,000 for the "Southfield," \$23,000 for the "Westfield" and \$22,000 for the "Middletown," these being the appraised values of the ferryboats on May 1, 1903, the prices, however, to be subject to such change of value or deterioration as may be found to have taken place at the time the City takes possession.

The attorneys contend that the depreciation clause is a departure from the resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and that it is unnecessary because of the provisions in the lease for the continuation of the ferry, which provide that the company shall at all times during the term of the lease keep the ferryboats in good order and will furnish them with a sufficient number of proper implements, tackles and necessities at its cost and expense; and that it is prejudicial to the interests of the ferry company in that it refers to an appraisal made in the year 1903 by appraisers at that time satisfactory to the City and to the ferry company, whereas in the present indenture new appraisers may be appointed who have no knowledge whatever of the condition of the boats in May, 1903. They state that any reappraisal can be made only by the same appraisers that made the first appraisal.

It has always been a part of the negotiations that the sums fixed to be paid for the boats as above stated should be subject to such depreciation as might occur up to the time when the City actually takes possession of the boats and makes payment therefor. The resolution adopted makes no reference to any depreciation provision, but it was naturally assumed by me that such a provision, having been part of the negotiations at all times, was implied, and I have therefore had such provision inserted in the agreement. There is no objection on my part to the re-employment of the persons who appraised the boats on May 1, 1903, but a clause providing specifically that these same appraisers be re-employed in the future might, of course, be impracticable.

Second—The lease provides that it shall cover such property only as is occupied in connection with the ferry service to Staten Island. The resolution authorizes a lease for a continuation of the Staten Island ferry service from June 1, 1904.

While the resolution is not quite definite in this particular, I assumed that the new lease would cover such property only as is exclusively used in connection with the Staten Island ferry service. There are two slips at the foot of Whitehall street, in the Borough of Manhattan, one occupied by the Rapid Transit Ferry Company and the other by the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey for the purposes of a ferry to Communipaw, N. J. The railroad company up to June 1, 1904, the date of expiration of the former ferry lease, paid for the use of the one slip to the ferry company. It may be stated that the occupation of the slip by the railroad company has been without the sanction of the City. I am informed that the rental paid for the use of this slip was at the rate of \$4,000 per annum.

It seemed to me, in view of the very low rental fixed under the present arrangement, it was only intended to give under the new lease such property as has been used and will be used exclusively for Staten Island ferry purpose since June 1, 1904, and that the City is entitled to the back rental from the railroad company for the use of the one slip after that date. Under the agreement as prepared, any rental for the use of the slip commencing June 1, 1904, would, of course, be paid to the City.

The attorneys for the ferry company contend that the two slips should be included in the new lease so that the ferry company would receive this back rental, and state that it was a substantial part of the consideration which induced the ferry company to accept the proposals of the City. They ask that the proposed agreement be amended by inserting a description of all the property embraced within the former lease, including the property now used and occupied in part by the Rapid Transit Ferry Company for the purposes of the Staten Island ferry, and in part now occupied and used by the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey for a ferry between Whitehall street and Jersey City.

It must be noted that as soon as the agreements are executed this Department will proceed with the necessary alterations to the present terminal structures, and for this purpose it will be essential, in any case, that the use of the slip by the railroad company be discontinued. The only question, therefore, is, as to who should receive the back rental from the railroad company for the use of the one slip from June 1, 1904, until the date on which the City begins operations. If the agreement is amended, as desired by the ferry company, a provision should be inserted in the lease to the effect that the use of the property by the railroad company cease immediately upon the City being prepared to begin the alterations.

Third—The agreement for the continuation of the ferry service provides that the ferry company shall not, at any time, assign or underlet the lease or any part thereof without the consent of the City. The company contends that this should be modified so as to provide that there shall be no assignment other than to the present occupants. This is a matter which must, of course, be taken up in connection with the second proposition, and action thereon is dependent upon the settlement of that question.



Fourth—The ferry company desires that a schedule of the ferry rates should be attached to the lease. There is no objection to that request.

Fifth—The lease of the track terminal privileges to the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company provides that the work of construction and laying of the tracks shall be done pursuant to plans approved by me. It is contended that this should be more definite, that the plans should be referred to by date, and that copies of such plans should be annexed to the lease, designated as Plans "A" and "B," one showing the general track layout as approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and the other the elevation plan.

There is no objection to this request. The agreement can be easily amended as desired and the plans attached.

Sixth—The track lease to the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company provides, on pages 3 and 4, that upon the failure of the railway company to make repairs within a space of ten days after notice, that then the indenture and everything therein contained shall be null and void. They ask that that provision be eliminated.

This request could be granted in view of the fact that the clause further provides that the repairs, if not made within the space of ten days by the Railway Company, can be made by the Commissioner of Docks, at the cost and expense of the Railway Company; and there is a general provision on pages 7 and 8 of the proposed lease, that for the violation of any of the covenants or conditions of the lease, it can be terminated by the Commissioner of Docks.

Seventh—The track lease referred to contains a covenant against assignment, "either by act hereof of the party of the second part, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether, under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of the Commissioner of Docks."

Mr. Clark contends that the clause should be restricted to voluntary assignments.

In this connection I would only say that the lease is drawn on the lines of the lease which was recently granted to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, covering track privileges between Thirty-third and Thirty-seventh street, on the North river. The provisions of that lease were detailed in the resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorizing the same and have been followed in the preparation of this proposed agreement.

The proposed track lease to the Richmond Light and Railroad Company has been examined and has been returned to me by Mr. Edward Lauterbach, attorney for that company, without comment. I therefore assume that the same is satisfactory to that company, but if any changes are made in the form of the lease to the Railway Company, similar changes will be made in the track lease to the Railroad Company.

I inclose copies of the letters received by me from Mr. Clark and from Mr. Lauterbach, and would respectfully request that you advise me as to your intent in the adoption of the resolutions authorizing the leases and agreements, and as to what action should be taken on the requests made, as above recited.

DEAR SIR—The leases and agreement submitted by you for execution by the Staten Island Ferry Company and the other parties interested seem to be correct, except in two particulars:

You make provision for the reappraisal of the boats in order that if any depreciation has taken place since the time of the first appraisal, May 1, 1903, that such depreciation shall be deducted from the then appraised value. There are two objections to this, first, that if any appraisal is to be made it can only be properly made by the same appraisers as made the first appraisal. But, more than this, as the lease provides that we are to maintain the boats in good condition, that you are at liberty to make any repairs at our expense, if we do not make them, the provision for reappraisal is unnecessary.

We note that you also intend to limit the occupation of the slips as they have been heretofore enjoyed, to the slip or slips that may be actually or necessarily used by the Staten Island ferry service, thus eliminating the possibility of permitting the whole or partial use of one slip by the Central Railroad of New Jersey, from which the ferry company expects to derive a rental, as it has heretofore done.

This fact was known at the time of the adjustment of the figures, and was taken into consideration in agreeing to pay the rental fixed by the lease and in consenting to a reduction of the price originally contemplated to be paid for the terminals. Under these circumstances, if you do not concur with our views and eliminate the provisions to which we object, we suggest the propriety of submitting the questions involved to the Sinking Fund Commissioners at the earliest possible moment.

DEAR SIR—I return to you herewith the copy of indenture, handed to me by you to-day, between The City of New York, acting through yourself as Commissioner, and the Rapid Transit Ferry Company.

The lease is a departure from the resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, dated January 31, 1905, and from the draft contract already approved by the Rapid Transit Ferry Company, in two particulars:

First—Upon page 2 of the indenture the description of the demised wharf property at the foot of Whitehall street excludes the easterly slip, now occupied by the ferry to Jersey City. The inclusion of this slip, now omitted, was the subject of long negotiations between the City and ourselves, and our final agreement was, according to our view, correctly embodied in the resolution of the Sinking Fund above referred to. That the two slips should pass to the ferry company, under the new lease, was a substantial part of the consideration which induced the ferry company to accept the proposals of the City, as embodied in the indenture originally approved. Inasmuch as the inclusion of the two slips is indispensable to the ferry company, I beg to suggest the following amendment to the last indenture:

Page 2, strike out the description between the words "first" and "inclusively," both inclusive, and substitute in place thereof the following:

"All that certain wharf property situated on the East river and known as Pier No. 1, together with the eighty-one and one-half feet of bulkhead lying between the easterly side of said pier and the westerly side of the small pier located between the piers numbers one and two, and also the westerly half of said small pier, together with the structures thereon; and also all that small pier west of Pier one (1) East river; the bulkhead between said piers and the buildings, sheds, platforms, ferry racks and other structures erected on said small pier and said bulkhead, and along the westerly side of said Pier one, and on the land under water between said piers, being the same wharf property now used and occupied in part by the Rapid Transit Ferry Company for the purposes of said Staten Island ferry, and also in part now occupied and used for the ferry between Whitehall street and Jersey City."

Second—The above restriction to one slip is perpetuated in the description which will be found on page 3 of the new indenture, concerning which we respectfully propose the following amendment:

Strike out the clause between the words "the intent of the above" and "of the Staten Island ferry," both inclusive, and insert in place thereof the following:

"The intent of the above is to include all the structures, ferry appurtenances, etc., located upon the area in use by the Rapid Transit Ferry Company, under a lease dated October 15, 1894, from The City of New York to Howard Carroll, and assigned by the said Howard Carroll to said Rapid Transit Ferry Company, with the consent of The City of New York, by assignment dated November 1, 1894, the boundary being located as described above."

Third—The present indenture departs from the resolution of the Sinking Fund Commissioners in that it contains, upon pages 16 and 17, a provision that the purchase price of the ferry boats shall be reduced to the extent of any depreciation which may have occurred between May 1, 1903, when the boats were appraised by the City, and the date when the City shall buy and take possession of the boats; the depreciation, if any, to be settled by arbitration, as provided in the indenture.

This departure seems to us to be unnecessary because of the clause, at the bottom of page 11 of the indenture, providing that the ferry company shall at all times during the term keep the ferry boats in good repair and will furnish them with a sufficient number of proper implements, tackles and necessities, at the cost and expense of the ferry company. This departure also seems prejudicial to the interests of the ferry company in that it refers to an appraisal made in the year 1903, by appraisers at that time satisfactory to the City and to the ferry company; whereas, in the present indenture, new appraisers may be appointed who had no knowledge whatever of the condition of the boats in May, 1903, and are therefore disqualified from comparing the condition of the boats at that date with the condition of the boats at the time of their delivery to the City. Under these conditions we respectfully enter our protest against the insertion of the depreciation clause.

P. S.—To carry out the request of the ferry company as to the inclusion of the second slip, the words "other than to present occupants" should be restored before the words "without the leave," in line 11, page 18 of the indenture. The lease should have schedule of ferry rates attached.

DEAR SIR—Herewith I beg to return to you the copy, loaned by you to me to-day, of the proposed indenture between The City of New York and the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, covering the use and occupation of the terminal station at St. George by the railway company.

First—This indenture refers, on page 3, to certain "plans, approved by the Commissioner of Docks." For greater certainty, I suggest that there be inserted in the indenture a clause identifying these plans by their respective dates, and that copies of such plans be annexed to the indenture.

Second—The indenture further provides, pages 2 and 3, that upon the failure of the ferry company to make repairs within a space of ten days after notice "then this indenture and everything herein contained shall be null and void." With the option, however, to the Commissioner of Docks to make the repairs and to charge the expense against the ferry company.

This clause is particularly drastic, and would make the tenure of the ferry company under the indenture too precarious to warrant the acceptance of the provision by the ferry company, and we respectfully request that it be stricken out.

Third—On page 5, the covenant against assignment of rights prohibits the assignment "either by the act hereto of the party of the second part, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the Commissioner of Docks."

This clause ought, in our opinion, to be restricted to voluntary assignments.

Mr. Edward Lauterbach and Mr. Lester W. Clark, attorneys for the companies, and Mr. Edwin J. Freedman, of the Law Department, representing the Dock Commissioner, were heard in regard to the matter.

The Comptroller moved that the resolution adopted by the Board on January 31, 1905, approving of the adjustment of the Staten Island Ferry matter, be reconsidered. Carried. (See page 78.)

The Comptroller then offered the following resolutions:

Resolved, That so much of the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held January 31, 1905, approving of the adjustment of the Staten Island Ferry matter, as relates to the agreement for the continuation of the ferry service (paragraph 1) be and the same is hereby amended by adding after the words "the agreement to provide for the right of the City to enter upon the terminals at the foot of Whitehall street" and before the words "and at St. George" the words "heretofore leased to the Staten Island Ferry Company."

Resolved, That so much of the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held January 31, 1905, approving of the adjustment of the Staten Island Ferry matter as relates to the payment by the City for the ferryboats "Garrett," "Castleton," "Southfield," "Middletown" and "Westfield" (paragraph 3), be and the same is hereby amended by adding at the end of the paragraph the words "a clause to be inserted in the agreement in such form as the Corporation Counsel may approve, providing for any depreciation since the appraisal in 1903."

Which were severally unanimously adopted.

"Resolved, That a committee, consisting of Messrs. Fairchild, Alexander E. Orr, Nash and Palmer, continue negotiations with the City and report back to the Board."

2. Property on Franklin avenue, west side, 25 feet north of Clifton place, Borough of Brooklyn.
3. Property on Third avenue and on One Hundred and Twenty-first street, between Third avenue and Sylvan place, Borough of Manhattan.
4. Property on Elm street, between Leonard and Franklin streets, Borough of Manhattan.
5. Property, corner Twelfth avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-first street, Borough of Manhattan.
6. Property corner of Front street and Peck slip, Borough of Manhattan.
7. Property located on the northerly side of Ninety-sixth street, extending from First avenue to the marginal street, Borough of Manhattan.
8. Property fronting on the marginal street, extending from East Ninety-fourth to East Ninety-fifth street, Borough of Manhattan.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—At a recent meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund there was presented a report requesting the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to the sale, at public auction at an upset price, of two parcels of land in the



Borough of Manhattan and a large number of tax-sale lands in the Borough of Brooklyn. The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at that meeting adopted a resolution authorizing the sale of the two parcels in Manhattan at public auction, and also authorized that a title insurance company examine the titles in reference to guaranteeing the same for the purpose of a sale at public auction. In that report I stated that it was my intention to present to the Board, from time to time, other parcels to be disposed of at public auction, in accordance with the provisions of the Charter, and I therefore beg to submit the following parcels of lands for the consideration of the Board, in accordance with said communication. Of the parcels herewith submitted three are in the Borough of Brooklyn and seven in the Borough of Manhattan.

*Parcels Located in the Borough of Brooklyn.*

1. Prospect place, between Underhill and Washington avenues; a vacant lot 25 feet in width, front and rear, by 131 feet in depth on each side. This property was originally acquired in the laying out of Prospect Park and was afterwards, by an act of the Legislature, authorized to be sold and was included in that portion known as the East Side Park Lands. It was offered for sale at public auction and sold, the old City of Brooklyn taking a mortgage for part payment of the purchase money. The City of Brooklyn had to foreclose the mortgage and acquired the title April 2, 1897. The appraised value put upon this lot is \$2,000, and I would respectfully recommend that this property be exposed for sale at public auction at an upset price for that amount. The assessed valuation is \$1,300.

2. Located on Franklin avenue, west side, 25 feet north of Clifton place. There is an old frame house on the property, with a portion of a brick stable in the rear. This property was originally acquired for the purpose of a volunteer fire department on December 31, 1862. It is leased monthly and is bringing in a nominal rental. The appraised value put upon this lot is \$2,250, and I would respectfully recommend that this property be exposed for sale at public auction at an upset price for that amount. The assessed valuation is \$1,500.

*Parcels Located in the Borough of Manhattan.*

1. One Hundred and Twenty-first street and Third avenue, and One Hundred and Twentieth street, between Third avenue and Sylvan place. These two parcels, with others, were acquired by condemnation proceedings September 3, 1839, for market purposes, but have not been used as such since 1867, as, in October of that year, part of the property acquired for the market was sold at public auction, and six of the lots disposed of. The balance was offered at auction, but the bidders failed to complete their purchases. After that the Harlem Court-house was established on the corner of One Hundred and Twenty-first street and Sylvan place, leaving the parcels above described to be leased, and which can now be offered for sale. The parcel on the corner of Third avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-first street is 126 feet 2 inches front on Third avenue, a depth of 100 feet on One Hundred and Twenty-first street, and is assessed at \$165,000. The parcel on One Hundred and Twentieth street is located 100 feet west of Third avenue, and is 25 by 100 feet 11 inches, and is assessed for \$7,000. The lease of this property expires on May 1 of this year, and I am informed brings in to the lessee of the City, who sublets it to various parties, a sum approximating \$11,000. I am of the opinion that the interests of the City would be better served if the City disposed of this property at public auction, and the property were thus made tax-producing property. The assessed valuation, as herein shown, includes land and buildings. The appraised valuation is \$165,000. The buildings have practically no value, their value having long since gone into the ground. I would respectfully recommend that the property be exposed for sale at public auction at an upset price of \$165,000.

2. This is property located on Elm street, between Leonard and Franklin streets, three of the lots being 25 by 90 feet each in depth, one lot being 25 by 46 feet. 50 by 90 feet of the land was acquired by the Charters of 1686 and 1730 and used for school purposes. The most northerly plot, 25 by 90, was acquired from John Heath and wife October 2, 1843, and occupied by the Fire Department; the southerly plot 25 by 46, acquired from Henry McCaddam, Jr., February 10, 1882, was also used for school purposes. Under assignments of the Sinking Fund Commissioners the premises are partly occupied by departments under the jurisdiction of the Borough President, and partly by the Department of Health, the remaining half being rented for commercial purposes at a nominal rent.

Inasmuch as this property is too valuable for the City to retain and only receive a nominal rental therefor, other quarters should be obtained for the City Departments, and the property sold. The assessed valuation for the land is \$117,200, buildings \$22,800, total \$140,000. The appraised value put upon this property is \$148,000, but the value of the buildings have long since gone into the value of the ground, and I would respectfully recommend that this property be exposed for sale at public auction at an upset price for the amount of \$117,200.

3. Premises on the corner of Twelfth avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-first street. This property was acquired by the Charters of 1686 and 1730, and leased to Charles B. Morris at a yearly rental of \$2,100, and Croton water rents. All the buildings and improvements on the premises, at the expiration of the term of the lease become the property of The City of New York. The building was erected by the lessee not to cost less than \$5,000, and the lease expires November 1, 1906. The value of this property lies in the fact that it can be used for commercial purposes on account of its railroad connections, it lying adjacent to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, and it cannot very well nor so advantageously be used by the City for public purposes. The assessed valuation of the land and buildings is \$35,000. The appraised value of this property is \$50,000, and I would respectfully recommend that this property be exposed for sale at public auction at an upset price for that amount.

4. Corner of Front street and Peck slip, being 23 feet 5 inches on Front street and 36 feet 6 inches on Peck slip. This property was acquired by the Charters of 1686 and 1730, and was leased to John H. Irwin for 21 years from May 1, 1892, at \$650 per annum, payable quarterly, the lessee to pay all taxes, the City to pay the lessee the value of the buildings erected on the premises April 20, 1829, all other buildings and improvements now on the premises to be removed by the lessees within ten days after the expiration of the term of the lease, which expires May 1, 1913. The appraised value put upon this property, that is, the land alone, is \$13,500, and I would respectfully recommend that this property be exposed for sale at public auction at an upset price for that amount. The assessed valuation of the land is \$10,700.

5. This property is a vacant plot located on the northerly side of Ninety-sixth street, extending from First avenue to the marginal street, and is 100 feet 11 inches on First avenue by 168 feet through to the marginal street. It was acquired by the Charters of 1686 and 1730, and is leased to the New York City Railway Company at a yearly rental of \$1,695 and Croton water rents, the lease of which expires December 21, 1907. The appraised value of this property is \$45,000, and I would respectfully recommend that it be exposed for sale at public auction at an upset price for that amount, the assessed valuation being \$45,000.

6. This property is a vacant parcel of land fronting on the marginal street, extending from East Ninety-fourth to East Ninety-fifth street. This is the property upon which the City readjusted its lines with Dean Sage and others. It has a frontage on Ninety-fifth street, beginning 103 feet from the corner of First avenue, of 149.49 feet; a frontage on Ninety-fourth street, beginning 202 feet from the corner of First avenue, of 150 feet, and was acquired by the Charters of 1686 and 1730, and rented monthly to the New York City Railway Company at \$40 per month. The appraised value of this property is \$50,000, and, although it is assessed for \$138,000, this includes, in addition to the land above described, land in the proposed marginal street and easterly thereof to the East or Harlem river. I would respectfully recommend that the property be exposed for sale at public auction at an upset price of \$50,000, and that the sales of all the parcels authorized to be sold by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be made upon the following terms and conditions:

The highest bidders will be required to pay ten (10) per cent. of the purchase money and the auctioneer's fee on each lot immediately after the sale; thirty (30) per cent. upon the delivery of the deeds, within thirty days from the date of sale, and the balance, sixty (60) per cent. of the purchase money, or any portion thereof, may remain, at the option of the purchaser, on bond and mortgage for five years, with interest at the rate of 6 per centum per annum, payable semi-annually, the mortgages to contain the customary thirty days' interest and ninety days' tax clauses.

The bond and mortgage may be paid off at any time within the term thereof on giving thirty days' notice to the Comptroller, or it may be paid by installments of not less than five thousand dollars on any day when the interest is due or on thirty days'

notice. The bonds and mortgages will be prepared by the Counsel to the Corporation, and the sum of twelve dollars and fifty cents will be charged for drawing, acknowledging and recording each separate mortgage. If more than one lot of land is included in any mortgage the whole mortgage must be paid off before any release can be given by the Corporation, as a release of any part of the premises included in a mortgage to the Corporation is forbidden by law.

The Comptroller may, at his option, resell any lot which may be struck off to the highest bidder who may fail to comply with the terms of sale, and the party who may fail to comply therewith will be held liable for any deficiency that may result from any such resale.

The right to reject any bid is reserved.

These properties are sold subject to the terms and conditions of leases now thereon, which said leases are recorded in the Comptroller's office in the books of special leases, and bidders should familiarize themselves with the terms of the leases before making their bids.

GENTLEMEN—In the matter of the proposed lease of land under water north of One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street, on the Harlem river, which you refer to me for examination and expression of opinion, I beg to say that I have personally inspected the territory in company with the Landscape Architect of the Department, and who sees no objection to the proposition from a park standpoint, and I am myself of the opinion that the same may be carried out without prejudice to park interests.

I would therefore express approval of the plan recommended by the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, as set forth in the accompanying papers and shown on diagram.

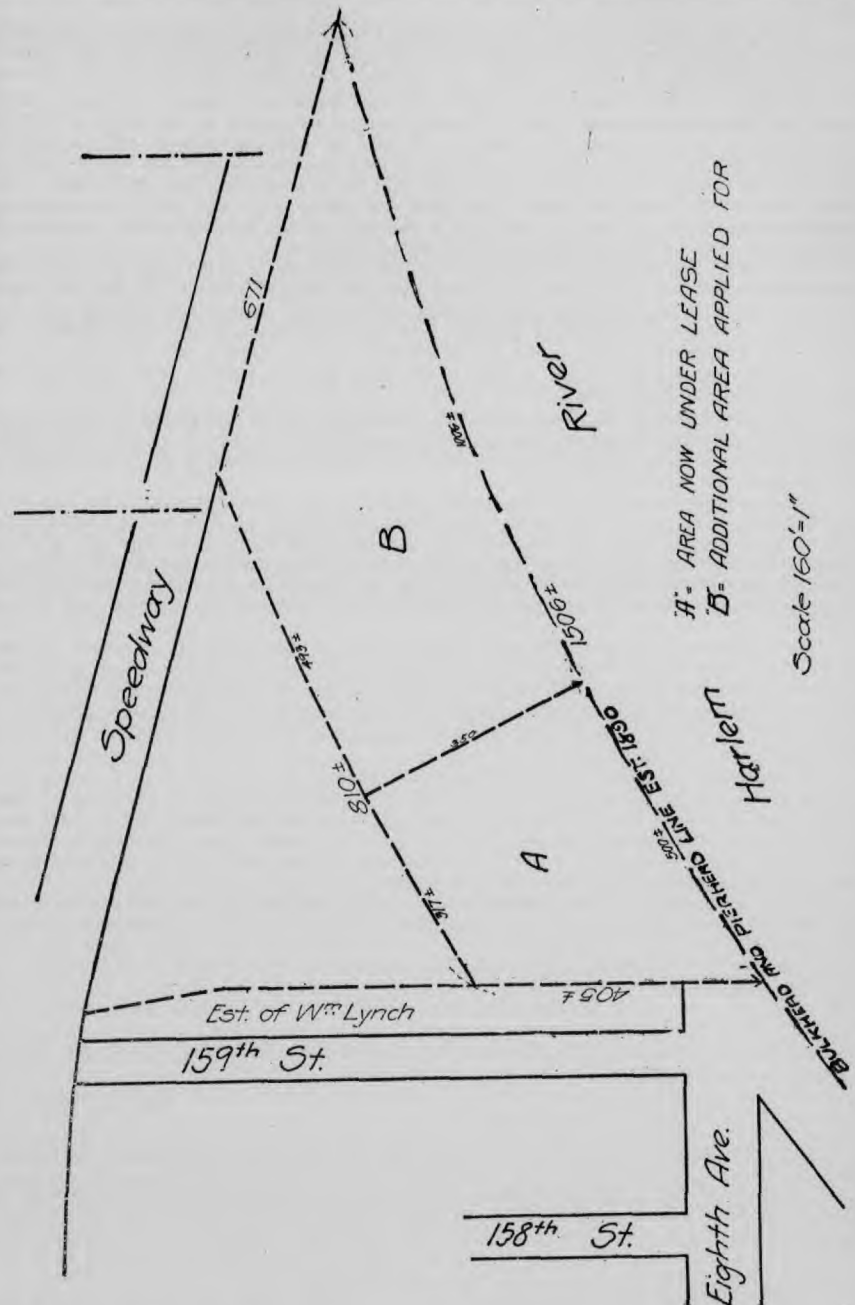
Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—The recommendation of the Dock Commissioner that a lease be made of certain land and land under water north of One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street, and adjoining the easterly side of the Speedway on the west bank of the Harlem river, to the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, which was considered at the meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held March 22, 1905, and referred to the Commissioner of Parks for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, has been reported upon by the Park Commissioner, who, in a communication under date of April 4, 1905, states that he sees no objection to the proposition from a park standpoint.

Such being the case, I would recommend that the lease as proposed by the Dock Commissioner be approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, except that a restriction be placed in the lease to the effect that no elevated structures shall be erected north of the line drawn between the points C and D on the accompanying map. This, I believe, will obviate any interference with the view from the Speedway or a view of the Speedway from the opposite bank.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the cancellation by the Commissioner of Docks, of the existing lease to the Manhattan Railway Company, of land under water immediately north of One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street, Harlem river, containing an area of 143,500 square feet, for a term of ten years ending December 29, 1907, and the execution of a new lease to the Interborough Rapid Transit Company covering the land under water already occupied, including an area of 262,325 square feet, lying between the Speedway and the northerly line of the land under water leased to the Manhattan Street Railway Company, containing together an area of 405,825 square feet, for a term to December 29, 1907; the annual rental for the first term to be \$6,500, the rate now paid, plus \$11,700 for the additional space, making a total rental for the first term of \$18,200 per annum. The lease to provide for three renewal terms of 10 years each; the annual rental for the first renewal term to be \$8,000, the rate already fixed for the space now occupied, plus \$12,870 for the additional space, a total of \$20,870 per annum for the second term. On the second and third renewal terms, the rental is to be at an increase of 15 per cent. on each renewal term, so that the renewal for the third term of the new lease will be at the rate of \$24,000.50 per annum, and for the fourth and last term at the rate of \$27,600.58 per annum; the lease is to contain a proviso that no elevator structures shall be erected upon any part of the premises shown on the diagram within the lines marked "C," "D" and "E." The point "D" being located 1,000 feet northerly along the bulkhead line, from the intersection of the northerly property line of the land belonging to the estate of William Lynch and the bulkhead line as established by the Secretary of War in 1890. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in the existing lease to the Manhattan Railway Company. Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Board of Education, relative to a payment to Grace Church for water used while in occupation of premises No. 415 East Thirteenth street, Borough of Manhattan:

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to transmit herewith a certified copy of report and resolutions adopted by the Board of Education at a meeting held on the 12th inst., relative to allowing Grace Church, in The City of New York, an amount equivalent to the sum paid by it for water rent for the premises No. 415 East Thirteenth street, Manhattan, for the years 1902, 1903 and 1904, in excess of the average amount expended by it for the same purpose for the years 1898, 1899, 1900 and 1901.

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Buildings respectfully reports that it has had under consideration a communication from the Comptroller, transmitting from Mr. J. Frederick Kernochan, warden of Grace Church, in The City of New York, a request for reimbursement for certain sums of money paid for water rent in excess of the amounts paid prior to the occupation of premises at No. 415 East Thirteenth street, Borough of Manhattan, for public school purposes. (See Journal, 1902, page 2557.)

These premises were placed at the disposal of the Board of Education, free of rent, in the latter part of 1902, since which time it appears that the bills for water rent have increased about 270 per cent.



The communication of Mr. Kernochan, addressed to the Mayor, reads in part as follows:

"In the year 1902, on account of the dearth of school houses in the City for the public schools, we offered some of our large rooms for use as a public school for the instruction of children of all denominations, of course. Since the use by the City of our premises for a public school our Croton bill has been very largely increased; and, while the Church most gladly gives the free use of its rooms to the City for public school use, it hardly seems fair that we should be saddled besides with a largely increased claim for the use of Croton water. I well understand that the Water Department has no power to remit any water bill, and thus, when the bill, according to the meter, is presented to us, we must seek relief elsewhere, if we are entitled to any, and I assume that the only way we can get such relief is by an application to you and through you to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

"The facts are briefly as follows: In the years 1898, 1899, 1900 and 1901 our Croton water bill for all of these buildings averaged \$239.46 a year. In the year 1902 the use of part of our premises by the City for a public school commenced and our meter bill for the year 1902 was \$604.68; for 1903, \$606.45, and for 1904, \$628.42. It would thus appear that there has been an addition to our Croton bill, since the use of our premises for public school purposes, of from \$350 to \$400 a year, and this has continued now for three years.

"We have not paid the last year's bill, waiting to see if something could be done for our relief by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for all of the three years past and also for bills in the future, if the City wishes to continue the use of part of our buildings for the public school.

"The average attendance at the public school in our buildings since 1902 has been 160 each day. Of course, you must understand that Grace Church is not complaining that no rent results from the use of their building; the Church is only too glad to furnish this facility to the City freely, but it does seem inequitable and it certainly presses very severely upon our resources that we should have so large an additional expense thrown upon us by the free use that we have given to the City of part of our premises.

The Appraiser of Real Estate, Department of Finance, in a report to the Comptroller, states that it seems only reasonable and just that some relief should be granted to Grace Church in the matter of water rents. In this view your Committee fully coincides, and desires to recommend that said church be allowed such amount as it has paid for water rent in excess of its average Croton water bills for the years 1898, 1899, 1900 and 1901.

The following resolutions are submitted for adoption:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that Grace Church, in The City of New York, should be allowed such an amount as shall form an equivalent for the sums paid by it for water rent for the premises No. 415 East Thirteenth street, Manhattan, for the years 1902, 1903 and 1904, in excess of the average amount expended by it for the same purpose for the years 1898, 1899, 1900 and 1901.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they hereby are requested to take such steps as may be necessary to provide for the payment to Grace Church of the amount as aforesaid.

SIR—The Board of Education, at a meeting held April 12, 1905, adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that Grace Church, in The City of New York, should be allowed such an amount as shall form an equivalent for the sums paid by it for water rent for the premises No. 415 East Thirteenth street, Manhattan, for the years 1902, 1903 and 1904, in excess of the average amount expended by it for the same purpose for the years 1898, 1899, 1900 and 1901.

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they hereby are requested to take such steps as may be necessary to provide for the payment to Grace Church of the amount as aforesaid."

It appears that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a meeting held October 22, 1902, adopted a resolution authorizing the lease from the Corporation of Grace Church of two rooms in the building No. 415 East Thirteenth street, Borough of Manhattan, for a term of one year from the date of occupation, at an annual rental of one dollar, including light, heat and janitor service. The lessor of the premises was unwilling to execute the lease prepared in pursuance of the resolution, and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a meeting held November 26, 1902, rescinded the foregoing resolution at the request of the Board of Education, which request read as follows:

"Resolved, \* \* \* That the resolution adopted by the Executive Committee October 15, 1902, requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize a lease of two rooms in building No. 415 East Thirteenth street, Borough of Manhattan, for a term of one year, at an annual rental of \$1, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

\* \* \* "Resolved, That the offer made to the Board of Education by Rev. W. R. Huntington, D. D., rector of Grace Church, of the use of rooms in the parish house on East Thirteenth street, Borough of Manhattan, be and the same is hereby accepted with thanks."

The Board of Education has since been in possession of the rooms free of rent, and Mr. J. Frederic Kernochan, one of the wardens of Grace Church in The City of New York, in a communication addressed to his Honor the Mayor, under date of March 21, 1905, states that:

"In the years 1898, 1899, 1900 and 1901, our Croton water bill for all of these buildings averaged \$239.46 a year. In the year 1902 the use of part of our premises by the City for a public school commenced, and our water bill for the year 1902 was \$604.68; for 1903, \$606.45, and for 1904, \$628.42."

The average attendance at the public school in the building since 1902 has been about 160 each day, and it seems only fair, inasmuch as the City pays no rental for the building, that the owners should receive some equitable adjustment for the payment of increased water bills since the City began occupation of the premises.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize the Comptroller to pay to Grace Church, in The City of New York, the sum of \$1,121.17, being the difference between the average of the total water bills for the years 1898, 1899, 1900 and 1901, on the premises No. 415 East Thirteenth street, Borough of Manhattan, to wit: The sum of \$239.46 per annum and the exact amount of the water bills which were rendered to Grace Church, in The City of New York, as follows:

—which sum is to be paid without the necessity of entering into a lease upon a voucher prepared by the Board of Education.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—The Board of Education at a recent meeting turned over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for such action as the Commissioners might deem necessary and proper the property heretofore acquired by the Board of Education in the Borough of Brooklyn, located on the south side of Lawrence avenue, 300 feet east of Third street. After the property was accepted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Commissioner of the Police Department requested that it be assigned to his Department for the purpose of erecting thereon a police precinct station-house and stable.

Before this property was assigned to the Police Department, this office made an examination of the title, but could not find that the title was in The City of New York, and we suggested that the Title Guarantee and Trust Company be called upon to examine the title for the purpose of discovering whether the City was the owner or not. An examination showed that while the Board of Education was in possession for a period of upwards of forty years, the fee title was in the wife of one of the old School Commissioners and not in the City. This office made a request that the heirs of the owners be approached for the purpose of obtaining quit-claim deeds to The City of New York rather than to proceed by an action at law, which would be expensive and doubtful of results. One of the owners was a resident of the Borough of Brooklyn and the other a resident of a Western State, and they have executed deeds to The City of New York, which are recorded.

The Title Guarantee and Trust Company, for the examination of this title and guaranteeing the same, presented a bill for \$50, which bill was reasonable and just. The cost of drawing two deeds, recording two deeds, disbursements and notaries' fees, amounted to \$33.75, which price, in my opinion, was also reasonable and just; in other words, the total disbursements were \$83.75, including the title company's certificate. The title is now vested in The City of New York, and the Police Department is erecting thereon its precinct station-house and stable. The title company made the disbursements and has never been repaid, and it seems to me that the only proper authorities to pay this bill is the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and I would respectfully recommend that a resolution be adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorizing the payment of \$83.75 to the Title Guarantee and Trust Company of the Borough of Brooklyn, in full settlement of claim under Policy No. 88194, in the matter of the property on the south side of Lawrence avenue, 300 feet east of Third avenue, heretofore assigned to the Police Department for a Police precinct station-house and stable.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—Andrew Mayer, trustee, etc., of No. 104 St. Mark's avenue, Brooklyn, in a communication under date of March 22, 1905, states that he has purchased the block of ground bounded by Seventy-first street, Silliman place, Second avenue and Third avenue, Bay Ridge District, Brooklyn, with the exception of a small triangular strip fronting on Seventy-first street, which is owned by The City of New York, and desires to purchase from The City of New York the said strip for the sum of \$120, and inclosed a certified check for that amount as evidence of his good faith.

The City acquired the title to this property on March 9, 1883, by a deed to the Trustees of School District No. 2 of the Town of New Utrecht, County of Kings, State of New York.

On October 1, 1903, a resolution was adopted by the Bay Ridge District Local Board requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to lay out a public park on the property bounded by Seventy-first street, Cedar lane, Second and Third avenues, which is the block purchased by Mr. Mayer, and which included this small strip of land. I understood from Mr. Mayer that the President of the Borough of Brooklyn had written a letter to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment withdrawing the proposition of a public park from the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that the Local Board of the Bay Ridge District had adopted a resolution rescinding their action looking to the taking of this property for a public park. I deemed this necessary to be done before the City alienated this small strip of land, for the reason that it was not proper to sell a piece of property and then repurchase again for park purposes at an advanced price, and by calling the attention of the Borough President and the Local Board to this subject, they having full knowledge that the City intended to dispose of this gore, any action that they would take in future would be upon them and not upon this office.

I disagree with Mr. Mayer as to the value of the strip, and believe it to be worth \$250, which price I have put upon the same as being reasonable and just, and he has agreed to bid that amount at public auction.

The Board of Education having turned over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund this gore strip of land as being no longer required for educational purposes, under the provisions of section 205 of the Amended Greater New York Charter, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing the sale of the following described premises at public auction, at an upset price of \$250:

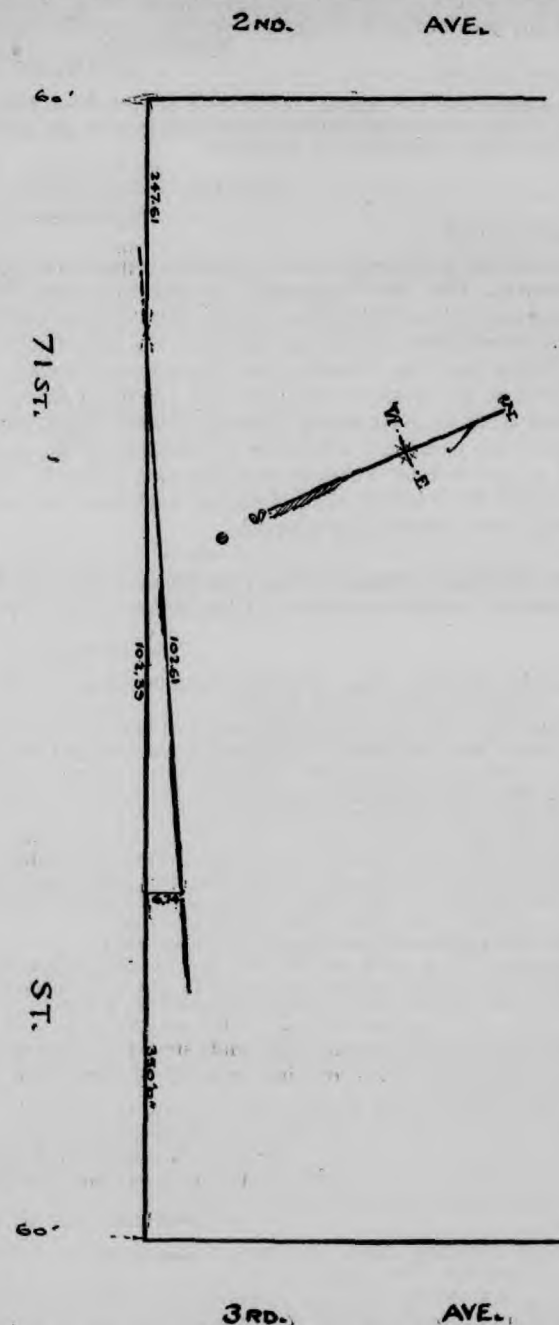

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—The Board of Education has occasion from time to time to use rooms throughout The City of New York for the purpose of delivering free lectures, and has transmitted to this office thirteen vouchers for the payment of rent, but it appears that no application has ever been made to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their sanction to the use of lecture rooms by the Board of Education. The Corporation Counsel, in an opinion under date of March 31, 1905, in relation to the use of the rooms for lecture purposes, states:

"In my opinion, the Sinking Fund Commissioners should have passed upon an application to lease the rooms or halls in question."

Inasmuch as the liability has already been incurred by the Board of Education for the payment of rent, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the hiring of the rooms in question and authorize the Comptroller to pay the following bills without the necessity of entering into a lease, and charge the same against the appropriate account of the Board of Education upon vouchers prepared by them.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
