EXTRACT FROM

MINUTES BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK, MARCH 19, 1909.

Union Railway Company of New York City.

By resolution adopted by this Board December 18, 1908, and approved by the Mayor December 21, 1908, the Union Railway Company of New York City was granted franchises to construct, maintain and operate two double track extensions to its existing street surface railway in the Borough of The Bronx, as follows:

(a) Beginning and connecting with the existing double track road of the company in Third avenue, at the intersection of said avenue with Pelham avenue, and running thence easterly upon and along said Pelham avenue to the Southern boulevard.

(b) From the existing track of the company at the intersection of Sedgwick avenue and Fordham road, Borough of The Bronx, upon and along Fordham road, Hampden place and West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, to the approach to the University Heights Bridge, upon, along and over said University Heights Bridge and its approaches, to West Two Hundred and Seventh street, Borough of Manhattan, to Amsterdam (or Tenth) avenue, to Emerson street, to Broadway, thence connecting with the existing railway.

At the meeting of March 5, 1909, a communication was received from the Chief Engineer, transmitting report from the Division of Franchises, together with proposed resolution for adoption, having for its purpose the interpretation of the compensation clauses in the contracts governing said franchises, and consideration of the matter was postponed for two weeks.

The following was offered:

Whereas, This Board did, on December 18, 1908, adopt resolutions granting franchises to the Union Railway Company of New York City, to construct, maintain and operate two double track extensions to its existing street surface railway, as follows:

First—From the intersection of the existing tracks at Sedgwick avenue and Fordham road, Borough of The Bronx, upon and along Fordham road, Hampden place, West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street and the University Heights Bridge, in the Borough of Manhattan, to West Two Hundred and Seventh street, to Amsterdam (or Tenth) avenue, to Emerson street, and connecting with the existing tracks on Broadway;

Second—Beginning at and connecting with the existing double track road of the company in Third avenue, at the intersection of said avenue with Pelham avenue, and running thence easterly, in, upon and along said Pelham avenue to the Southern boulevard, Borough of The Bronx,

—which resolutions were approved by the Mayor December 21, 1908; and

Whereas, Said resolutions provided that, before such grants should become effective, the company and the City should execute contracts as set forth in said resolutions; and

Whereas, Section 2, third, of both contracts provides for the payment by the company to the City of certain compensation for such grants; and

Whereas, Chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892 obligates the Union Railway Company to pay to The City of New York certain percentages of gross receipts from passengers; and

Whereas, It was not the intention of this Board to require the payment of any additional sums as compensation for such grants except such sums as specifically set forth in said contracts; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Mayor of The City of New York be and he is hereby authorized to execute and deliver an agreement in the name and on behalf of the City, as follows, to wit:

This agreement made this _____ day of _____, 1909, between The City of New York, party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of the said City, under and at purview of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, and the Union Railway Company of New York City, party of the second part.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York had by two certain resolutions adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment December 18, 1908, and approved by the Mayor December 21, 1908, authorized the construction, maintenance and operation of two extensions of branches of the road of the Union Railway Company of New York City, the first upon and along Pelham avenue from Third avenue to Southern boulevard in the Borough of The Bronx, for a length of twenty-nine hundred (2,900) feet, and the second from the extension of Sedgwick avenue and Fordham road along West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, University Heights Bridge, Two Hundred and Seventh street and Emerson street for a length of four thousand six hundred and fifty (4,650) feet, and approved forms of contract for execution by the parties for such rights or franchises; and

Whereas, The Union Railway Company is obligated to pay to The City of New York percentages on gross receipts from passengers at varying rates under the provisions of chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892, received on lines constructed and operated prior to December 21, 1908, and proposes to accept the contracts authorized by said resolutions adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 18, 1908, and approved by the Mayor December 21, 1908, provided the obligation to pay percentages proposed by said act, chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892, is not and shall not be claimed by the City as applicable therein.

Now, in consideration of one dollar to each party paid by the other and of the covenants contained in said contracts, it is agreed:

That the resolutions and contracts requiring the payment of annual charges by the Union Railway Company, its successors and assigns, to The City of New York, for the right or franchise granted by each of said resolutions and the contracts executed in pursuance thereof do not and shall not require, nor shall The City of New York demand or require the payment by the said company, its successors or assigns, of a percentage of gross receipts under the provisions of chapter 340 of Laws of 1892 on the gross receipts earned on each of such extensions.

This instrument is undertaken and executed by the parties hereto solely for the purpose of making clear their mutual understanding as to the terms and conditions regarding payment of the annual charges contained in the aforesaid contracts authorized by said resolutions adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 18, 1908, and approved by the Mayor December 21, 1908, and is not intended to modify or change said contracts in any particular.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers thereto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

South Shore Traction Company.

In the matter of the franchise granted to the South Shore Traction Company to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway extension on Clason Point road, from Westchester avenue to Long Island Sound, Borough of The Bronx.

Sir—The contract between The City of New York and The Bronx Traction Company for the construction of a street surface railway extension on Clason Point road, from Westchester avenue to Long Island Sound, Borough of The Bronx, which was executed by the Mayor February 1, 1909, provides in Section 2 first thereof as follows:

"The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said street and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the company within six months of the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time * * * otherwise this grant shall cease and determine."

Under date of February 27, 1909, the attorney for the above named company filed with the Board certified copies of the consents of abutting property owners for the construction of the above described extension. There are fifty-eight parcels of property abutting on the proposed route, the total assessed valuation of which for 1909 is \$2,138,450, one-half of this amount, or the sum required under the above quoted provision of the contract is \$1,079,225. Consents have been obtained by the company covering twenty-three of the abutting parcels having a total valuation of \$1,096,200. It would, therefore, appear that the provisions of Section 2 first of the contract had been complied with.

Section 2, sixth of the contract provides as follows:

"The company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within six months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are obtained * * * and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within one year from the date of obtaining such consents."

The consents filed with the Board were obtained by the company between August 28, 1908, and January 11, 1909.

Inasmuch as such consents were obtained prior to the execution of the contract by the Mayor, it would seem that the proper interpretation of the last quoted clause would be that the company shall commence the construction of the railway within six months and place the same in operation within one year from the date of such execution.

Union Railway Company of New York City.

Sir—The contract between The City of New York and the Union Railway Company of New York City for the construction of a street surface railway extension on Pelham avenue, from Third avenue to the Southern boulevard, which was executed by the Mayor March 1, 1909, provides in section 2 first thereof as follows:

"The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said street and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the company within six months of the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time * * * otherwise this grant shall cease and determine."

Under date of February 27, 1909, the attorney for the above named company filed with the Board certified copies of the consents of abutting property owners for the construction of the above described extension. There are eighty-three parcels of property abutting on the proposed route, the total assessed valuation of which for 1909 is \$2,166,100, one-half of this amount, or the sum required under the above quoted provision of the contract is \$1,083,050. Consents have been obtained by the company covering thirty-eight of the abutting parcels having a total valuation of \$1,398,400. It would, therefore, appear that the provisions of Section 2 first of the contract had been complied with.

Section 2, sixth of the contract provides as follows:

"The company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within six months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are obtained * * * and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within six months from the date of obtaining such consents * * *."

The consents filed with the Board were obtained by the company during a period extending from December 2, 1902, to December 22, 1908.

Inasmuch as these consents were all obtained prior to the execution of the contract by the Mayor, it would seem that the proper interpretation of the last quoted clause would be that the company shall commence the construction of the railway and place the same in operation within six months from the date of the signing of the contract.

South Shore Traction Company.

GENTLEMEN—I have received from you the following communication dated February 26, 1909, signed by Joseph Haag, Secretary:

"I transmit herewith certified copy of resolution this day adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, tentatively approving the terms and conditions in the proposed form of contract submitted with the report, dated January 30, 1909, from the Engineer in charge of the Division of Franchises to the Chief Engineer, for the grant of a franchise to the South Shore Traction Company to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway from the Manhattan end of the Queensboro Bridge, upon, along and over said bridge and its approaches, to the Borough of Queens, and upon and along various streets and avenues to Central avenue, at the boundary line between the Counties of Nassau and Queens.

"You will note you are requested to approve the proposed contract as to form, and to incorporate therein such matter as you may deem advisable to fully protect the interests of the City.

"Inclosed herewith is a copy of the report of the Engineer in charge of the Division of Franchises to the Chief Engineer, heretofore mentioned."

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—At the meeting of the Board held on February 26 last tentative approval was given to a proposed form of contract granting to the South Shore Traction Company the right to construct and operate a street surface railway from the Manhattan end of the Queensboro Bridge over the said bridge, and along Thomson avenue, Hoffman boulevard and other streets to the line between Nassau and Queens Counties, and the proposed form of contract was at the same time referred to the Corporation Counsel for his approval as to form. This approval has been given by the Corporation Counsel in a communication addressed to the Board on March 6, so that the matter is now properly before the Board for action.

When this contract was originally drawn the New York and Queens County Railway Company had two petitions before the Board covering practically the same route as far as Jamaica, including operation on the bridge. On June 12, 1908, contracts were presented for each of these applications, one of which gave the Queens County Company the privilege of operating a shuttle service from one end of the bridge to the other for a single fare not exceeding three cents, or five cents for the round trip. The contract in the South Shore Company prohibited such shuttle service and did not permit the operation of cars upon the bridge until at least one mile of track at the easterly end of the bridge should be completed and in operation. No progress has been made relative to the application of the Queens County Company since that time, the company having manifested no interest in the matter and having made no reply to a communication sent on March 4.

The bridge is rapidly nearing completion, and unless a contract is soon agreed upon with some company to operate cars across it, the structure will be finished and no traction facilities will be provided for. The officials of the South Shore Traction Company have been conferred with and have agreed to install a local bridge service as soon as possible after the opening of the bridge, the rate of fare to be the same as that proposed in the contract as originally drawn for the Queens County Company.

The company has also agreed to deposit with the Comptroller the sum of \$30,000 as a guarantee that the construction of its railway on Thomson avenue and Hoffman boulevard will be prosecuted with diligence and completed and in operation within two years after the consents of the property owners in the vicinity have been secured; in case of failure to do so, the company agrees to forfeit this sum to the City; otherwise it is to be returned. This sum, together with the \$40,000 originally provided for, makes a total of \$70,000 in cash or securities which must be deposited by the company within ninety days after the signing of the contract.

I would therefore recommend that the contract as previously approved by the Board be amended by requiring the operation of local bridge cars as soon as the bridge is opened to traffic. In addition to this, it is recommended that an additional security fund of \$30,000 be required as a further guarantee for the completion of the railway on Thomson avenue and Hoffman boulevard. The amendments suggested are embodied in the paragraphs herewith transmitted.

In accordance with the provisions of law, the form of contract must be entered on the minutes of the Board for thirty days, and a date fixed for a public hearing, and I would recommend that April 23, 1909, be named as the date for such hearing.

Mr. NELSON P. LEWIS, Chief Engineer:

Sir—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held February 26, 1909, the contract for the proposed grant to the South Shore Traction Company for the right to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway from the Manhattan end of the Queensboro Bridge over and across said bridge, thence via Thomson avenue and Hoffman boulevard and various other streets through the former Village of Jamaica to the line between the Counties of Queens and Nassau, was tentatively approved by the Board and referred to the Corporation Counsel for his approval as to form.

The Corporation Counsel, in a communication of March 6, has duly approved the same as to form, and the matter is now properly before the Board for action.

When this contract was originally drawn, the New York and Queens County Railway Company had two petitions before the Board, covering practically the same route as far as the Village of Jamaica and including operation on the bridge. Contracts were at that time, June 12, prepared for each of the rights applied for, one of which for the operation of cars upon the bridge by the Queens County Company gave the privilege of operating a shuttle service from one end of the bridge to the other for a single fare, not exceeding three cents or five cents for the round trip.

On the other hand, the contract to the South Shore Company prohibited such shuttle service and did not permit the operation of cars upon the bridge until at least one mile of track at the easterly end of the bridge should be completed and in operation.

The Queens County Company, however, has shown no interest in the matter of its applications since the report was presented, and, in consequence, no progress has been made.

Under date of March 4, I addressed a communication to Mr. Alfred A. Gardner, of counsel for the New York and Queens County Railway Company, in which I re-

requested to be advised as to the company's intention in prosecuting its application for the right to cross the Queensboro Bridge, but to date no reply whatsoever has been received.

Unless a contract is soon agreed upon with some company for the right to operate upon the bridge the structure will be finished and no traction facilities will be provided for. To overcome this difficulty, I have conferred with representatives of the South Shore Traction Company, and they have agreed to install a local bridge service as soon as practicable after the opening of the bridge, and to operate a shuttle service for a single fare of 3 cents, two tickets for 5 cents.

As a further guarantee that the construction of the railway upon Thomson avenue and Hoffman boulevard will be prosecuted with greatest diligence, they have agreed to deposit with the Comptroller the sum of thirty thousand dollars in cash or securities, that such portion of the railway will be completed and in operation within two years from the obtaining of the property owners' consents, and unless so completed the said sum will be forfeited to the City; otherwise the amount is to be returned. This sum, with the forty thousand dollars originally provided for, makes a total of seventy thousand dollars in cash or securities which must be put up by the company within ninety days of the signing of the contract.

I would therefore suggest that the contract as previously approved by the Board be amended by requiring the operation of local bridge cars as soon as the bridge is opened to traffic, and as a further guarantee for the completion of a railway on Thomson avenue and Hoffman boulevard an additional security fund of thirty thousand dollars be required. These amendments are submitted herewith.

Pursuant to the provisions of law, the form of contract must be entered on the minutes of the Board for a period of thirty days and a date fixed for a public hearing, and I would suggest Friday, April 23; the Mayor to be requested to designate two newspapers in which the form of contract will be advertised.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

SIR:—I have received from you the following communication dated March 12, 1909, signed by Harry P. Nichols, Engineer in Charge of Division of Franchises:

"Under date of March 6, you forwarded to the Board your approval of the proposed form of contract for the grant to the South Shore Traction Company of a street surface railway from the Manhattan end of the Queensboro Bridge, upon and along said bridge and its approaches, to the Borough of Queens, and thence upon Thomson avenue and the Hoffman boulevard and other streets through the former Village of Jamaica to the line between the Counties of Queens and Nassau, all as contained in the report of this Division of January 30, 1909.

"Since the time this was submitted to you by the Board, one or two questions have arisen, which may or may not affect the proposed form of contract. The first is in regard to local bridge traffic, but, you will note, there is no provision made in the contract for such traffic at a fare of three (3) cents or a round trip for five (5) cents, but rather that section 3, Fourth, on page 25 of the report, practically prohibits this.

"As I say, the situation has now changed, and the New York and Queens County Railway Company, to which it was proposed to grant this right for the local bridge service, has failed up to the present time to enter into any negotiations for the obtaining of this right, and it may appear desirable to the Board to grant the privilege to the South Shore Traction Company in order that local service on the bridge may be inaugurated as soon as the bridge is opened.

"I have, therefore, prepared a paragraph to be inserted in place of the above mentioned paragraph, to wit, section 3, Fourth, and also an amendment of the fare clause, being section 4, Fifth, on the 28th page, providing for a fare not exceeding three (3) cents upon the bridge, two tickets to be sold for five (5) cents.

"Second—Thomson avenue and the Hoffman boulevard form the only direct line between the former Long Island City and the former Village of Jamaica, and in consequence any company receiving the right for a street surface railway on this route will be in a position to accelerate or retard the growth of all the intervening territory. As there are at present three applicants for the right on this route, it has occurred to me that a more severe penalty for non-fulfillment of the terms and conditions of the contract should be inserted in the contract to any company which will accept a franchise. In accordance therewith I have prepared an additional paragraph to be inserted after section 4, Sixteenth, on page 31, and to be known as 17th, the 17th, 18th and 19th paragraphs of the present contract to be renumbered. The object of the additional paragraph is to compel the deposit of the additional sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) as a guarantee that seven miles of street surface railway will be constructed on Thomson avenue and the Hoffman boulevard within two years of the date when the consents of the property owners are obtained, this sum to be in addition to the initial payment of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) and the security deposit of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), as originally provided, and this latter sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) to be held only until the route is completed between the points named, when it is to be returned to the company, or, in case the company fails to build within the time limit, then it is to be forfeited to the City. The final sentence of the paragraph provides, however, that if the Board shall grant more than one franchise to construct tracks on this street, then the deposit shall be returned.

"These proposed amendments are enclosed herewith, and I should be glad to have your approval of the same as to form, in case the Board may decide to use them. As the matter will be placed upon the calendar on Tuesday next your early reply will be appreciated."

I have carefully examined the proposed alterations and amendments, and while they, in general, have my approval, there are certain changes I think should be made. The changes I suggest will, I think, remove any doubt as to the power of the Bridge Commissioner over the proposed local bridge service, and will enable him to discontinue the operation of local bridge cars where, in his opinion, the other traffic is adequate to accommodate the local service.

I have also altered the paragraph relating to the fare to be charged for such local service, inasmuch as in the form proposed it was not clear that tickets at the lower rate could be used on the other cars of the company operated over the bridge.

The proposed contract with the South Shore Traction Company as already approved by me will have my approval as to form if amended in the following respects: Alternative paragraph to be inserted in place of section 3, Fourth:

The company shall furnish and supply a sufficient number of cars (herein called local bridge cars) and commence the operation of same as soon as practicable after this contract is signed by the Mayor, and continue to operate the same during the term of this contract back and forth upon the bridge between the Bridge Plaza, in the Borough of Queens, and the Bridge Approach, in the Borough of Manhattan, with such frequency as to provide reasonable accommodations for the traveling public, provided, however, that if the through cars operated by the company, or the operation of cars across the bridge by any other company, shall, in the opinion of the Commissioner of Bridges, be sufficient to supply reasonable accommodations for the traveling public, the operation of such local bridge cars shall be discontinued for such period as designated by the Commissioner of Bridges.

Between the first and second sentences of paragraph 5, section 4, insert the following:

The rate of fare upon the local bridge cars, or the through cars of the company, entitling a passenger to ride once across the bridge shall not exceed three cents, and the company shall at all times have tickets on sale, one of which shall entitle a passenger to ride across said bridge and the company shall sell such tickets at the rate of not exceeding three cents for one and five cents for two.

As a new section, to follow section 4, Sixteenth, on page 31, insert the following:

Seventeenth—The company within three (3) months after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, exclusive of the rights conferred upon the Queensboro Bridge and approaches thereto, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City a further sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000), either in money or securities to be approved by him, which said further sum shall be returned to the company upon condition that

the company shall have completed the construction of a double track street surface railway from Jackson avenue, at the Queensboro Plaza, and the intersection of Hoffman boulevard with Pierson street, and put the same in operation within eighteen (18) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are obtained, necessary for the lawful construction of such railway, or from the date upon which the decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court that such railway ought to be constructed is rendered in lieu of such consents.

For the purpose of facilitating the work of the company in constructing and putting in operation said section of its railway, it is hereby consented that the company may construct its temporary overhead crossings on Thompson avenue within the lines of said avenue.

If such railway shall be constructed and put in operation at any time within such period, a certificate stating that such railway has been constructed and put in operation shall be prepared by the President of the company, and delivered to the Board, and the Board shall immediately thereafter verify the correctness of such statement and either accept such statement as correct, or, if it deems it to be incorrect, return said certificate to the company, specifying in writing the respects in which it deems such statement to be incorrect. If such statement is found by the Board to be correct, or is thereafter proven to be correct, the Board shall thereupon adopt a resolution directing the Comptroller to return to the company the said sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000). Unless such a certificate is delivered to the Board by the company, and the statement therein contained accepted by said Board as correct, or proven by the company to be correct, then such sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) shall be forfeited to and become the property of the City. If at any time prior to the time specified in this clause for the completion and operation of that portion of the line described in this clause, the right to construct a street surface railway upon all or any portions of such line are granted to any other railroad corporation, then and in that case the Board shall thereupon by resolution authorize and direct that the Comptroller of the City of New York return the said sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) to the said South Shore Traction Company.

Paragraphs seventeenth, eighteenth and nineteenth, on pages 31 and 32 to be renumbered eighteenth, nineteenth and twentieth.

"I hereby certify that the person named in this bill or voucher for services rendered the Department specified therein has been examined; that the same is for a period during which this Commission could not attach its regular certificate, for the reason that the appointment was not made in accordance with the technicalities of the Civil Service rules; that the services of the person named were contracted for by the Department herein named to perform these services until such time as the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen have established the position and grade in the said Department; and that the bill or voucher is, owing to the peculiar and unusual circumstances, certified upon the ground that the decisions of the courts require payment of employees of the City who have performed work for it."

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated February 3, requesting instructions in the following cases:

Mr. Joseph F. McGee, at different times a Monitor in the service of the Commission, had accepted an appointment in the Park Department in the labor class, where he was paid by the day, and had requested that so long as he did not receive pay from both Departments on one day, he be permitted to continue to serve as a Monitor in the office of the Commission. After consideration of the matter, the request was denied and the Secretary was directed to notify the said employee that he would have to relinquish either one of the positions specified.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated February 6, stating that in the examination for Police Sergeant there were two men of the name of John J. Hines, one of No. 2412 Snyder avenue, Brooklyn, and the other of No. 151 Cleveland street, Brooklyn; that in numbering the records an error had been made which resulted in each man getting the rating due to the other on record, and that he (the Chief Examiner) had therefore given orders that the necessary correction be made so that each man would get what he was entitled to. The action of the Chief Examiner was approved.

A report was presented from Mr. Murray, Examiner in Charge of the Promotion Bureau, dated February 8, stating that the request of the Treatment House Commissioner that Miss Kathryn R. Reilly be examined for promotion to third grade Stenographer and Typewriter could not be granted for the following reasons:

"1. Miss Reilly was appointed on March 12, 1907, as second grade Typewriting Copyist. She will not be eligible for promotion until March 12, 1910, when she will have served three years in the grade (Rule XV, clauses 2 and 5).

"2. A promotion examination as requested would have to be open to all second grade Typewriting Copyists in the Bureau in which Miss Reilly is employed (Rule XV, clause 2)."

On motion, the request was denied.

A communication was presented from Mr. Murray, Examiner in Charge of the Promotion Bureau, dated February 9, making the following recommendation relative to the examination for promotion to the grade of Deputy Chief in Charge of the Marine Division, Fire Department, which had been ordered by the Commission at the meeting of January 27. That as a necessary qualification for entrance to the examination, all candidates should be Masters of Steam Vessels as described in Rule V, paragraphs 26, 27, 28 and 29 of the Rules and Regulations of the Steamboat Inspection Service, and citing the reasons upon which his opinion was based. After careful consideration of the matter, the recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from Mr. Murray, Examiner in Charge of the Promotion Bureau, dated February 9, with reference to the request of the Board of Health that Mr. Daniel J. Gilman be granted a non-competitive examination for promotion to second grade Clerk. The Secretary was directed to call the attention of the Department to the resolution of the Commission dated February 3, that no more requests for promotion in the clerical or the civil engineering service be granted until the month of October.

A report was presented from Mr. Murray, Examiner in Charge of the Promotion Bureau, dated February 9, in relation to the request of the President of the Borough of The Bronx that an examination be held for promotion from Laborer to Telephone Operator for his Department. On motion, the request was denied.

A report was presented from Mr. Murray, Examiner in Charge of the Promotion Bureau, dated February 4, with reference to the request of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, that the following classes of employees be permitted to compete in the promotion examinations for Assistant Stable Foreman and Section Foreman recently ordered by the Commission:

Promotion to Assistant Stable Foreman—Acting Assistant to Stable Foreman, Hostler, Stableman, Driver.

Promotion to Section Foreman—Assistant Stable Foreman, Assistant Dump Inspector, Acting Assistant to Section Foreman, Acting Assistant to Stable Foreman.

The matter was referred to the President.

A report was presented from the Labor Clerk, dated January 29, with reference to the case of George W. Hyde, of Croun Lake, N. Y., whose name had been dropped from the preferred list of Laborer on the report of the Board of Water Supply that he had failed to respond to the notice of appointment sent him. The report stated that when the said employee's name had been forwarded to the office of the Commission to be placed on the preferred list, an incorrect address had been given, and consequently when he was certified the notice had failed to reach him. On motion, it was ordered that the candidate's name be restored to the preferred list, to remain there for a period equal to that during which it would have appeared on said list had his address been given correctly by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity at the time of his suspension.

A report was presented from the Labor Clerk, dated February 9, in relation to the request of the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, for approval of the transfer of five Drivers in his Department to the position of Park Laborer, notwithstanding the fact that twenty-eight Park Laborers had been laid off for lack of work. The report stated that heretofore all such applications had been denied, but that, in view of the long service of the men and the fact that the Park Commissioner had stated that they had been incapacitated for further service as Drivers on account of injuries received in the performance of duty, the application was presented for consideration by the Commission.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the transfer of William H. Merrill, John Connolly, Owen Nulty, John Connolly and John Mulvaney from the position of Driver in the Department of Parks, Borough of Manhattan, to that of Park Laborer be and the same hereby is approved in view of the long period of service of the said employees, and the fact that they have been incapacitated for further service as Drivers on account of injuries received in the performance of their duties.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, dated February 4, requesting that the forthcoming examination for promotion to Assistant Superintendent of Ferries be limited to the Pilots in the Department holding the rank

of Captain in the Ferry Service. The matter was referred to Mr. Murray, Examiner in Charge of the Promotion Bureau, for a report.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, dated February 4, requesting an amendment of the classification of exempt positions in that Department by striking therefrom the positions of Superintendent of Ferries and Assistant Superintendent of Ferries. The matter was laid over, to be taken up at the time of the general revision of the classification which had been requested by the State Civil Service Commission.

A letter was presented from the Secretary to the Board of City Magistrates, First Division, dated January 29, requesting authority to appoint Charles Helene, No. 221 East One Hundred and Thirtieth street, Manhattan, as an Interpreter (French, Italian and Yiddish), in accordance with the provisions of paragraphs 3 and 4 of Rule XII. On motion, the emergency appointment of Charles Helene was approved for a period of fifteen days, in accordance with paragraph 4 of Rule XII, and the Secretary was directed to summon him for the necessary non-competitive examination to qualify him for appointment pending the preparation of an eligible list.

A communication was presented from the Secretary to the Board of City Magistrates, First Division, dated February 3, requesting an examination for promotion from the position of Interpreter to that of Assistant Court Clerk, to fill a vacancy caused by the death of an incumbent of the latter position. On motion, the matter was referred to the Examiner in Charge of the Promotion Bureau for a report.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health, dated February 5, transmitting a list of Nurses (appointed in the non-competitive class), who had been dismissed for lack of appropriation with the request that they be placed upon a preferred list. The matter was laid over.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to readvertise the examination for Nurse, and to open the receipt of applications for that examination from February 18 to March 4, in order that the persons employed as Nurses in the Department of Health in the non-competitive class may have an opportunity to file applications for the examination.

A letter was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health, dated January 29, forwarding a resolution adopted by the Board of Health at its meeting held January 27, 1909, withdrawing the charges of intoxication and conduct unbecoming an employee preferred against John J. Walker, formerly a Sanitary Inspector, who had been dismissed on said charges on October 29, 1908, and requesting the Municipal Civil Service Commission to consent to his reinstatement. On motion, the request was denied.

A communication was presented from the Department of Health, dated February 9, transmitting a resolution of the Board of Health adopted at a meeting held on February 3, 1909, appointing Robert J. Wilson, M. D., as Assistant Director of the Research Laboratory, a Superintendent of Hospitals of the Department of Health, with salary at the rate of \$3,000 per annum, pending an examination to be held by the Municipal Civil Service Commission, the same to take effect as of January 1, 1909. A communication was presented from the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated February 4, submitting a report of the Superintendent of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices regarding an alleged violation of the Civil Service Law in that Bureau. On motion, the communication was ordered filed.

A communication was presented from the President of the Metropolitan Sewerage Commission, dated February 4, requesting authority to employ Dr. Payot B. Parsons and Mr. William B. Fuller, C. E., as experts, pursuant to the provisions of paragraph 6 of Rule XII, and setting forth the qualifications of the said persons for the work for which their services were required.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That, with the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, Dr. Payot B. Parsons, of No. 605 West One Hundred and Thirty-second street, Borough of Manhattan, be and he hereby is exempted from examination, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 6 of Rule XII, to render expert service for a period of one year in the Metropolitan Sewerage Commission as Bacteriologist and Inspector, provided, however, that his compensation shall not exceed the sum of \$2,100.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That, with the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, Mr. William B. Fuller, C. E., be and he hereby is exempted from examination, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 6 of Rule XII, to render expert service as a Civil Engineer in the Metropolitan Sewerage Commission, for a period of one year; provided, however, that his total compensation shall not exceed the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000).

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of Licenses, dated February 5, requesting authority to employ Herman Kurtz, of No. 1673 Second avenue, as an Interpreter whenever his services might be required, at a compensation of \$5 a day, during a period not to exceed five weeks.

On motion, it was

COMMISSIONERS OF ACCOUNTS.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1908.

Office of the Commissioners of Accounts,

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, and the Honorable Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

Sir—Section 195 of the Charter reads as follows:

" * * * The accounts of the chamberlain shall be annually closed on the last day of December, and shall be examined in the month of January in each year by the commissioners of accounts. Such commissioners shall examine the accounts and

vouchers of all moneys received into and paid out of the city treasury during the year ending on the last day of December next preceding such examination, and shall certify and report to the mayor and board of aldermen in the following month of February the amount of moneys received into the treasury during such year, the amount of moneys paid out during the same period by virtue of warrants drawn on the treasury by the comptroller, the amount of moneys received by the chamberlain who shall be in office at the time of such examination, if he entered upon the execution of his duties since the last preceding report; the balance in the treasury on the last day of December preceding such examination, the amount of moneys borrowed for or on the credit of the city during such year, and the amount of the bonds of the city issued during such year, with the purposes for which and the authority under which such bonds were issued. Such commissioners shall also compare the warrants drawn by the comptroller on the treasury during the year ending on the last day of December preceding such examination, with the several laws and ordinances under which the same shall purport to have been drawn, and shall in like manner certify and report whether the comptroller had power to draw such warrants; and if any shall be found which, in their opinion, he had no power to draw, they shall specify the same in their report, with their reasons for such opinion."

The great volume of detail comprehended in an examination and comparison of the vouchers and warrants issued and paid in the course of the calendar year, if sought to be completed in the month of January following as prescribed, would require the concentration of a much larger force of assistants than could be spared for this work at one time, without seriously affecting other examinations and investigations. In practice, therefore, the examination provided for in the above quoted section of the Charter is continuous throughout the year, eight Accountants and Clerks being assigned thereto.

Certification

The Commissioners of Accounts hereby certify that they have complied with the law as quoted above, having examined all warrants paid in the year 1908, together with the supporting vouchers thereon; that in their opinion the Comptroller was duly authorized by the several laws and ordinances to draw the warrants examined, and none was found which was improperly drawn. They have also examined the accounts of the City Chamberlain for the year 1908 as to moneys received into and paid out of the City Treasury.

It should be stated here that the annual examination provided for by law to be made by the Commissioners of Accounts, under section 195 of the Charter, in its results is merely an audit of the Chamberlain's receipts and disbursements, verifying the cash balances in the books at the beginning and close of the calendar year and certifying to the amount of Corporate Stock and Bonds issued.

Nowhere in the Charter is it provided that an examination and report be made, either by the Commissioners of Accounts or any other agency, which should comprehend the City's income and expense accounts.

In our report covering the year 1907 in this connection we made the following comment:

"If the City's accounts were upon an income basis and all the assets and liabilities were set up on the books, it would be feasible to prepare at stated periods a proper balance sheet and an income and expense account which would exhibit, respectively:

"A," the City's true financial condition and "B," all the income and expenditure during the period following the date of the next preceding balance sheet and accounting for the changes occurring in the City's surplus or deficit in the current balance sheet, as compared with that appearing on the previous one."

"The importance of such statements as a source of information regarding the City's affairs cannot be overestimated. The improved accounting methods by which such statements would be arrived at, necessarily involving the use of controlling accounts over the City's income and expenditure, would greatly aid toward a far more efficient audit of the City's business than is at present possible under the system of bookkeeping which obtains, at the same time rendering it practicable for the proper officials to satisfy themselves that the City was receiving all the income it should receive, something which at present cannot be accomplished without great labor."

"To prepare statements as outlined above from the present records would involve an immense amount of work and would necessitate the taking of inventories of all the City's assets and liabilities of every description, and this, of course, is not within the scope of our duties."

We understand that under the direction of the Comptroller's Committee on Revision of Accounts and Methods a new system of accounting is in course of installation in the various departments and offices of the City which will ultimately serve to render possible the desired end as outlined above.
