## DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

### REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING SEPTEMBER 26, 1914.

#### ENFORCING THE MUZZLING ORDINANCE.

Active steps to enforce the dog muzzling ordinance recently enacted by the Board of Health, began on September 15th. During the following week 1,307 dog-owners who neglected to conform to the requirements of the law were served with copies of the ordinance, and were warned that prompt compliance was necessary. Following such notification non-complying dog owners were summoned to court, and, during the week ending September 22nd, 59 were fined by various Magistrates, while in 20 cases sentence was suspended.

During the month of August 5,258 stray dogs and 22,459 cats were seized and destroyed by the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

Through the courtesy of the Police Commissioner, arrangements have been made whereby patrolmen throughout the city will warn all dog-owners who fail to comply with the muzzling law. In order, however, not to involve the Police Department in any way that would prove distracting to the force or which would lessen its efficiency and usefulness in other ways, the Patrolmen will not be asked to serve summons and complaints. This part of the work, as well as the necessary attendance at court, will continue to be performed by the Health Squad.

#### FREE PUBLIC LECTURES FOR SANATORIUM PATIENTS.

Through the courtesy of the Lecture Bureau of the Department of Education, a series of interesting travel lectures is being given by that bureau at the Otisville Sanatorium. The lectures are proving extremely popular among the patients, and this extension of the valuable work done by the Lecture Bureau is greatly appreciated.

#### PROSECUTIONS FOR FAILURE TO FILE BIRTH CERTIFICATES WITHIN TEN DAYS.

An investigation was recently made by the Registrar to ascertain the completeness of births registered at the Department during the year ending August 1, 1914. For an entire week every physician, inspector and nurse, in addition to their ordinary routine work, obtained in every house they chanced to visit the name and place and date of birth of every child under one year of age, and the name and address of the physician or midwife attending in each case; this information was forwarded to the Bureau of Records and careful searches were made of the indices of births in order to ascertain which were not reported.

In some of the boroughs the results were highly satisfactory; in others disappointing. In the Borough of The Bronx, every report made by the physician or nurse was found to correspond with the certificate of birth on file, equivalent to 100 per cent. as to the completeness of registration; the result in the Borough of Manhattan was also satisfactory, a percentage of 99.2 being attained. In the remaining three boroughs results were not as satisfactory, Brooklyn having a percentage of 96, Queens 94 and Richmond 93.

The filing of the certificate of birth of each child born in this City has become of paramount importance; physicians and midwives who neglect to safeguard the legal rights of children by violation of Sections 1237 and 1239 of the Charter in failing to file certificates where they have been attendants at birth should realize that the Commissioner of Health feels it to be his bounden duty to maintain the rights of the children born in this City and to prosecute all violators of the law. With that end in view, proceedings have been begun against the delinquents as determined by this recent investigation, and the offending physicians and midwives of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond must stand trial for their non-compliance with the statutes. The necessity for this rigorous action is greatly regretted, but the duty of the Department, however unpleasant, is clear.

During the past year over 120,000 applications were made for certificates of birth to be used in obtaining admission to school and certificates of employment, in probating wills and in other legal transactions. A more recent phase of the necessity of having certificates of birth on file is the demand upon citizens of this country, at present in continental Europe, to present evidence of citizenship; in these cases a certified copy of a certificate of birth does much to establish the identity of the individual.

#### EXCELLENCE OF SEROLOGICAL LABORATORY WORK.

Dr. David J. Kaliski, a member of the Advisory Council of the Department of Health, was invited by the Commissioner of Health to examine and report upon the work of the Serological Laboratories. After a painstaking study, for which the Department is duly grateful, Dr. Kaliski has presented his report, embodying many valuable suggestions. The report, which is too long to be printed in the Bulletin, was accompanied by the following letter:

"September 17th, 1914.

"Dr. S. S. GOLDWATER, Commissioner of Health, New York City:

"Dear Doctor Goldwater—At your suggestion, I have made an investigation of the Serological Laboratories of the Department of Health of the City of New York, and I have the honor herewith to present to you the results of my investigations.

"It is a pleasure to acknowledge the cordial spirit of cooperation with which the various members of the laboratory staff entered into the investigation, and I am particularly grateful to Dr. A. McNeil, chief of the Department of Venereal Diseases, and Miss Miriam Olmstead, in charge of the Department of Complement-Fixation Research, for their kind help.

"Before proceeding to a detailed report of my investigation of the various activities of the laboratories, I wish to commend the department for the accuracy and reliability of the work performed by the laboratories under consideration. I wish particularly to emphasize the fact that in the preparation and standardization of various reagents, to be mentioned in detail hereafter, the department has set a standard that can be approached by few, if any, institutions known to me.

"I wish further to make a suggestion that the department take the initiative in an effort to provide standard reagents for the performance of the various tests, and that ways and means be provided to supply such reagents to properly accredited institutions, etc. I shall revert to this proposition in detail.

#### SCHOOL MEDICAL INSPECTION: A REPLY, BY DR. C. WARD CRAMPTON.

In the Weekly Bulletin of August 8th, we published an article entitled "School Medical Inspection as a Function of Health Departments." In this we reviewed a paper previously published by Dr. C. Ward Crampton in the Wochenschrift: Das österreichische Sanitätswesen. We herewith give Dr. Crampton's reply to our criticisms:

"South Casco, Maine, August 22, 1914.

"S. S. GOLDWATER, M.D., Commissioner of Health:

"Dear Sir—Availing myself of your kind offer to print my comment on the criticisms in your Bulletin of August 8th of my article entitled 'School Medical Inspection in the Larger Cities of the United States,' I beg leave to state as follows: I doubt if I have ever seen an article so full of error and fallacy as that your bulletin contains. Never have I seen so feeble a plea for Board of



Health control of school inspection, and misquotations so frequent and adroitly used, except, perhaps, those revealed in the school inspection work by the investigations of the Bureau of Municipal Research.

"Your writer does not even quote my figures correctly, writing his self-made errors in three instances, 10 per cent. of the data quoted. This would merely indicate negligence, but your writer invites attention to 'discrepancies' in the tables presented, stating that they 'would seem to render the conclusions of little value.' This is beyond comment."

"Your writer misquotes my words and makes use of the misquotation in argument, as follows: 'It is, therefore, clear that control by the school authorities, with respect to the percentage of pupils examined, is 11 per cent. more efficient.' The words underlined are omitted, making the quotation refer to the efficiency of the whole work, which includes much more important factors of efficiency, i. e., scope and thoroughness of examination and the success of the follow-up system, none of which were under discussion. This paves the way for succeeding argument."

"Your writer does not even state correctly the source of the material, ascribing it to a 'German periodical,' while it was published in Vienna, at the solicitation of Burgerstein."

"Finding 'discrepancies' in comparing tables of the number of pupils per inspector, your writer infers that the conclusions drawn from some of them are of little value and by inference also a former conclusion, based upon different data, not quoted. If errors and discrepancies found in one part of an article invalidate the balance, your writer's product is indeed worthless, and clothes with doubt the accompanying matter in your bulletin. The data referred to above as omitted are worthy of notice. Of 27 cities of over 200,000 inhabitants, 17 have inspection under the Board of Health, 10 have inspection under the Board of Education. The trend is toward the Board of Education management, for in the first 10 (organized 1894-1906), 9 were Board of Health; in the last 10 (1909-1911), only 3 were Board of Health, 7 Board of Education. It is clear that no 'discrepancy' in a succeeding discussion on the mere number of pupils per inspector can affect the weighty significance of these facts."

"The 'discrepancies' complained of exist between a table in one part of my article, given for the purpose of ranking the cities with reference to pupils to inspector, and a pair of tables, showing pupils per inspector, for the purpose of comparing Board of Health and Education control. The purpose of these tables being different, under circumstances like the following, it is clear that different data must be used: St. Louis and Minneapolis each had a certain number of inspectors and are given credit as cities for the proper relative number of pupils per inspector for the total school population. But these inspectors were not assigned to the whole city, but only a section (in St. Louis only 19 schools). In computing the efficiency of the inspector with reference to the percentage of pupils examined, it would be absurd to include pupils not in the inspection area, either the proportion or percentage column. The 'discrepancy' is not only proper, but requisite, if the facts are to be fairly set forth. I would have been glad to have made this clear to you, had you asked me to do so. The figures for Newark differ because in the middle of the year this city increased its corps from 16 to 37. Obviously this improves the rank of Newark and it is accordingly given credit in the first table for the proper proportion on the basis of 37. Obviously, again, in comparing the work of full years, it was necessary to combine the figures of the first half with 16 inspectors and the second half with 37, giving a different figure for the second table. I omitted Boston from my comparison of percentage of pupils examined per inspector because conditions are different, the school teachers make eye and ear examinations. Philadelphia was omitted because I could get no data, owing to a change of administration."

"For a single error (clerical) in misstating the number of pupils per inspector for New York City, I plead guilty. Your writer has made three errors in copying figures to my one, in an article one-quarter the length (12 times greater rate), and I cannot feel as humble as I otherwise should. This figure was correctly given in the only table from which conclusions were drawn. New York is placed wrong in rank of cities, sixth instead of next to last, and I have written to Dr. Burgerstein to make the correction, enclosing your comment and my reply (this letter)."

"Criticism and counter-criticism will never decide the large question of the jurisdiction of school medical inspection. Controversy is unworthy in the face of the great need of constructive work for the health of school children, which is very much at stake. Your formation of an advisory committee on the subject and your cordial solicitation of suggestion from the educational authorities have been much more to the point. The concluding arguments of your writer must, however, be met, for they are as fallacious as the preceding are erroneous."

"After providing errors in my data and argument, your writer states they are 'pedagogical,' as if pedagogy and error were synonymous. This is a trifle hard on pedagogy, although the word is used to much rough handling. The distinction is made between 'school children' and 'children of school age,' as of some significance, when, under our compulsory education law, they are nearly synonymous, as the per cent. of children examined in Boston and Philadelphia is near 100. Your writer states that 'at the most liberal estimate, children are in school only five hours out of the twenty-four in one hundred and ninety of the three hundred and sixty-five days of the year. The remainder of the time they are without the influence of school boards, who have no general authority to supervise in the homes or street the sanitary, hygienic or personal health methods that govern the larger part of the child's life.' Of course, this disregards summer schools and playgrounds, recreation centres, after-school playgrounds and athletic activities, which are largely and definitely concerned with matters of health."

"It exhibits a characteristic and old-fashioned error of Boards of Health by exalting authority, and minimizes the influence of education, which is called 'pedagogical.' The school management and instruction is calculated to influence the child's life at home and on the street, and to make for lifelong habits of health. Boards of education control more than 900 hours a year of the child's life and influence the balance by education. Boards of health exercise their authority occasionally in the home life to protect the community, but educate but little in comparison. A new era is coming, as indicated by your prospective Bureau of Education. May it place this, our city, high on the roll of honor!"

"Your writer states further that, 'Where boards of health are well organized and efficient, the great majority have the system of medical inspection under their control,' thereby implying efficient management to such control. I sincerely wish, for the sake of the children of this city, that this might be so, and I feel confident that under your management the system will render the best service that can be expected from Board of Health control. I would solicit, however, your earnest study of the advantages offered by board of education management. They are indicated by the words of your own writer: 'The schools offer the easiest method of reaching the greater part of the children of the city.' At present the teachers' intimate knowledge of the pupils, and the influence and authority of the school are not fully operating with your nurses and physicians, solely because they belong to separate departments, and, with the best will and interest of all concerned, the physicians, nurses and teachers cannot fully co-operate so long as two departments continue in charge of the children."

"Much more remains to be said. Enough has been written, I trust, to indicate my position and to disclose the errors of your writer. In closing, I wish to express my appreciation of your courtesy and my best wishes for the continued success of your progressive campaign. Yours truly,

Careful study of Dr. Crampton's letter fails to reveal to us any valid argument to change our views as already set forth. We sincerely regret, of course, having made several typographical errors. That none of these, however, affect in the least the validity of the arguments, can be seen from the following corrected tables:

\*\*Technically, of course, this criticism is true. The article is, however, written in German and would ordinarily be classified as German medical literature.

†This is hardly a correct statement. What we did say was: "Arguments of this nature, made wholly from the pedagogical standpoint, fail to take into consideration the true meaning of health control of children." It would seem as though Dr. Crampton had here entirely missed the point of our criticism.

The human body requires certain kinds of foods called "proteins" in order to make up for wear and tear of the body machinery; that is, in order to rebuild bones and muscles and nerves.

You can get this "protein" by eating meat, but this is very expensive, and other forms of food are much cheaper and equally nourishing. Those of us who live near the sea should eat far more fish than we do. It is excellent for building up the body and is rich in "protein." Just look at the following comparison:

### Fish.

Haddock contains 18 per cent. protein; sells for 7 cents per pound.  
Herring contains 19 per cent. protein; sells for 8 cents per pound.  
Bluefish contains 19 per cent. protein; sells for 10 cents per pound.  
Codfish contains 18 per cent. protein; sells for 12 cents per pound.  
Eels contain 18 per cent. protein; sells for 15 cents per pound.

### Beef.

Chuck contains 19 per cent. protein; sells for 24 cents per pound.  
Rump contains 19 per cent. protein; sells for 28 cents per pound.  
Round contains 21 per cent. protein; sells for 28 cents per pound.  
Sirloin steak contains 19 per cent. protein; sells for 30 cents per pound.  
Ribs contain 18 per cent. protein; sells for 26 cents per pound.  
Since you eat meat for the protein it contains, why not eat it in the form of fish, and save money.

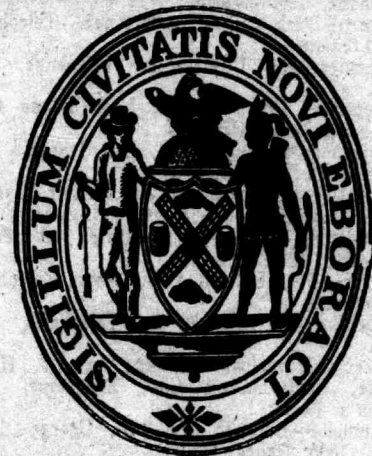

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of the City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer

in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beams, holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The Comptroller of the City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

#### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

#### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or her name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
