The Construction or Executive Committee presented the following :

The Construction or Executive Committee report :

That at a meeting of said Committee, held on October 20, 1891, the following resolution was adopted, and they now ask your approval of their said action :

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer is hereby directed to have said bids calculated and tabulated, and submit the same, together with his estimate of the work, at a meeting of the Construction or Executive Committee of the Aqueduct Commissioners, for consideration and canvassing by them at 3 o'clock P. M. on the 27th day of October, 1891 ; and the bids and checks of the bidders are hereby referred to the Committee of Finance and Audit for examination and report to the Commissioners as to their formality and the sufficiency of the sureties proposed by the bidders.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 7354 to 7369, inclusive, amounting to \$680.94 ; also of judgments obtained by former Inspectors of Masonry, amounting to \$470.91.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Construction or Executive Committee presented the following communication received from the Chief Engineer :

NEW YORK, October 20, 1891.

To the Honorable the Committee on Construction :

GENTLEMEN—I was waiting for the second installment of land to be taken near Carmel to ask you to authorize me to build temporarily a portion of road which will be necessarily flooded at moderately high water under our operations at the main dam. If this is not done the village of Carmel is going to be cut off from the western part of the county. As it is time that we should commence operations, I have requested the owners of land in the immediate vicinity to allow us to borrow earth from their land. They demur, however, and I believe that permission could not be obtained for the taking of such material unless we pay for it. The cost of such permission would be below \$200. Inasmuch as the very land from which the material is to be taken will be a part of the next taking, I respectfully submit to your Committee the question whether it would be advisable, in view of the future flooding of the ground, to buy the necessary material on the conditions above mentioned. I think that it should be done.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following resolution :

Resolved, That the accompanying bill, being for taxes due School District No. 6, Town of North Salem, N. Y., amounting to \$43.87, be and hereby is approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following resolution :

Resolved, That upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, Rodman John P. R. Taaffe is hereby recommended to the Civil Service Commission for examination for promotion to the grade of Leveler.

The Seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Carlisle street, Greenwich street, Morris street, and Washington street.

The Eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Vesey street, Broadway, Rector street, and Greenwich street.

The Ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Greenwich street, Carlisle street, and Hudson or North river.

The Tenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Barclay street, Greenwich street, Liberty street, and Hudson or North river.

The Eleventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Reade street, Broadway, Vesey street, Greenwich street, Barclay street, and Hudson or North river.

The Twelfth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Broadway, Reade street, Hudson street, Franklin street, Varick street, Beach street, and West Broadway.

The Thirteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Franklin street, Greenwich street, Harrison street, Hudson street, Reade street, and Hudson or North river.

The Fourteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Beach street, Hudson street, Harrison street, Greenwich street, Franklin street, and Hudson or North river.

The Fifteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Beach street, Varick street, Franklin street, and Hudson street.

The Sixteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Vestry street, Canal street, West Broadway, Beach street, and Hudson street.

The Seventeenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Lighthouse street, Hudson street, Beach street, and Hudson or North river.

The Eighteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Desbrosses street, Canal street, Vestry street, Hudson street, Lighthouse street, and Hudson or North river.

The Nineteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Hudson street, Desbrosses street, and Hudson or North river.

Second Assembly District.

The Second Assembly District shall be divided into twenty-four election districts, the extent and limits of which shall be as follows:

The First Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Oak street, Catharine street, East river, and Oliver street.

The Second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Cherry street, Oliver street, East river, and Roosevelt street.

The Eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Park row, Roosevelt street, New Bowery, New Chambers street, and Pearl street.

The Sixteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Worth street, Baxter street, Park row, Pearl street, Park street, and Centre street.

The Seventeenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Worth street, Chatham square, Park row, and Baxter street.

The Eighteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Park street, Mott street, Pell street, Bowery, Chatham square, and Worth street.

The Nineteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Bowery, Pell street, and Mott street.

The Twentieth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Bayard street, Mott street, Park street, and Mulberry street.

The Twenty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Leonard street, Baxter street, Bayard street, Mulberry street, Park street, Worth street, and Centre street.

Seventh Assembly District.

From the Commissioner of Public Works—Inclosing letter from Captain T. W. Symons, United States Engineers, requesting information respecting the present harbor lines, sea walls, etc., established for the City of New York. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief.

From the Counsel to the Corporation:

1st. In reference to the communication from O. D. Person, lessee, of the bulkhead foot of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, North river, submitted to the Board, October 1, 1891.

2d. Approving specifications and form of contract for extending the Pier foot of Jane street, North river, under Contract No. 401.

From the Department of Public Charities and Correction—Reporting that several piles are loose, and additional ones are required at the Pier foot of Twenty-sixth street, East river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to make such repairs as are necessary.

From the Finance Department—Returning the proposals of James Symington and James Baird for furnishing granite stones for bulkhead or river wall under Contracts Nos. 396 and 398 with the approval of the adequacy and sufficiency of the sureties.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—Respecting the request made October 15, 1891, for cleaning required around the various telegraph poles located between Piers, new 37 and 45, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to do said work.
