The Board of Health met this day.

Orders.

217 orders for the abatement of nuisances were made.

Suits for Penalties.

The Attorney was directed to commence suits for non-compliance with the orders of the Board in 60 cases, and for a violation of section 122 of the Sanitary Code in 1 case.

Resolutions.

That the Superintendent of Police be requested to allow the storing of manure at the foot of West Thirty-seventh to Thirty-eighth street, foot of East Forty-fifth to Forty-seventh street, and foot of East Ninety-fifth street, for thirty days from this date.

That the Attorney and Counsel be authorized and directed to commence an action against Dr. L. D. Broughton for violation of Sanitary Code.

That the Secretary be directed to call the attention of the Department of Buildings to the resolution of this Board, passed March 23, 1875, of which the following is a copy:

Resolved, That the Superintendent of Buildings be respectfully requested to forward to the Sanitary Bureau, every week, copies of specifications of plumbing in all new buildings, including the location of all basins, closets, sinks, traps, soil pipes, waste pipes, cellar drains, and sewer connections, together with the material of which they are to be constructed.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to call the attention of the Sanitary Inspector to the discharge of water from house-leaders across the sidewalk.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 20, 1875: The total number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,716, as follows: 5 public buildings, 840 tenement houses, 134 private dwellings, 70 other dwellings, 7 manufactories

and workshops, 11 stores and warehouses, 55 stables, 64 slaughter-houses, 3 public sewers and drains, 7 fat-rendering establishments, 1 gut-cleaning establishment, 6 manure dumps, 1 coal yard, 27 sunken and vacant lots, 55 yards, courts and areas, 73 cellars and basements, 98 waste-pipes and drains, 134 privies and water-closets, 51 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 8 dangerous stairways, 1 cistern and cesspool, 2 violations of the Code, 4 dangerous and smoky chimneys, 18 other nuisances, together with 41 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 668. During the past week 37 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

44 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

81 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 33 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have fumigated and disinfected 27 houses, 27 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. 23 persons sick with small-pox were removed to the Hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported during the week ending November 20, 1875: Typhoid fever, 8; scarlet fever, 31; cerebro-spinal meningitis 4; measles, 20; diphtheria, 122 (of this number of cases of diphtheria reported, 38 occurred in the annexed district); and small-pox, 35.

1,505 cans and 4 tanks of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the week ending November 20, 1875.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending November 20, 1875: Cattle, 1 carcass; calves (bob), 9 carcasses; calves (case), 2 carcasses; sheep, 6 carcasses; lambs, 1 carcass; veal, 40 pounds; poultry, 233 pounds; bear meat, 75 pounds; and fish, 18,250 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending November 20, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 451 burial permits for city deaths, 20 for bodies in transit, and 46 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 451 deaths, 164 marriages, 431 births, 46 still-births, 20 applications for transit permits, and 34 returns from Coroners. There were 14 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 2 transcripts of birth record, 1 of marriage and 11 of death were issued from this Bureau. Two cases of deaths were referred to Coroners.
