#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 6, 1875. The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 991, as follows:

1 public buildings, 637 tenement houses, 75 private dwellings, 56 other dwellings, 5 manufactories and workshops, 6 stores and warehouses, 21 stables, 35 slaughter-houses, 1 head-cleaning establishment, 1 bone-boiling establishment, 8 fat-rendering establishments, 4 sunken and vacant lots, 13 yards, courts, and areas, 20 cellars and basements, 46 waste-pipes and drains, 46 privies and water-closets, 5 street gutters, and sidewalks,

6 dangerous stairways, 7 other nuisances, together with 75 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 294.

During the past week 58 complaints have been received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

34 Permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

63 Permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 91 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 85 houses, 85 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

51 Patients sick with small-pox were removed to the hospital, and 5 dead bodies to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending February 6, 1875: Typhus fever 1, typhoid fever

7, scarlet fever 50, measles 2, diphtheria 126, small-pox 95, and 3 cases of cerebro-spinal meningitis.

The following amount of meat was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food, during the week ending February 6, 1875. Calves (bob), 2 carcasses; calves (case), 1 carcass; sheep, 13 carcasses; hogs, 14 carcasses; beef, 167 pounds; and veal, 40 pounds.

156 loads of night-soil were removed by the night-scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city.

#### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending February 6, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 600 burial permits for city deaths, 21 for bodies *in transitu*, and 39 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 600 deaths, 162 marriages, 504 births, 39 still-births, 21 applications for transit permits, and 67 returns from Coroners. There were 26 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths, and 2 transcripts of birth records, 5 of marriage, and 20 of death were issued from this Bureau; 3 cases of death were referred to the Coroners.

#### To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

SIR—In the week that ended on Saturday, the 6th instant, there were 600 deaths reported in this city, against 604 that were verified in the week ending January 30. The course of mortality in the four weeks ending at the latter date exhibits the following facts respecting the chief diseases:

The excessive inclemency of the weather, its alternations of temperature through a range of 42 degrees Fahr., and the unusually severe and fatal character of the inflammatory diseases of the lungs, explain the causes of the steadily high death-rate, which, for the past four weeks, has been equivalent to 31.70 in the 1,000 annually, and last week was at 30 per 1,000. The average death-rate in 21 chief cities of Great Britain in the week ending 16th of January was equal to 32 per 1,000 yearly. In Liverpool it was at 38; in Manchester and in Dublin, at 42; in Edinburgh, at 34; and in Glasgow, at 44 per 1,000; while in Paris it was 25.2, and in Munich, the week previously, 33.3, and in Copenhagen it was at 38.4 per 1,000.

SIR—In accordance with your instructions, the undersigned, Inspectors of this Department, made an examination of the sewer in Centre street, extending from Pearl to Canal, for the purpose of



ascertaining whether it served to properly drain or sewer this district, or whether it in any way affected the sanitary condition of the dwellings on the line of this street or vicinity, and found the condition thereof to be as follows:

The site of this sewer is what was once known as a part of the Collect Pond (bounded by Baxter, Elm, Duane, and Centre streets) at that time surrounded by marsh lands, through which many streams of water ran, having an outlet into the pond. When the sewer was built it was laid almost level, without a proper descent to convey matter discharged therein with sufficient velocity to the main sewer in Canal street to keep it free from deposit. As a consequence, the stream flowing therein is always sluggish, from which cause it is subject to an accumulation of decomposing solid matter, giving rise to offensive and deleterious gases, which are conveyed by means of the house drains into the dwellings on the line of the street. The deposit referred to has also frequently caused the sewer to fill with water during heavy rain-falls, which, instead of being conveyed into the sewer in Canal street, would back through the house drains and into the cellars, and also percolate through the defective brick-work of the sewer into the surrounding ground. Owing to the nature of the soil on which the sewer is built, it has settled in many places, forming traps for the retention of filth, or in other words, hidden elongated cesspools, which are constantly generating gaseous poisons that must seriously affect the health of the adjoining houses. One of these traps or depressions extends from the middle of the block on which the Prison is located to Worth street, a distance of over 200 feet. From these causes there is at all times from four inches to three feet of water in portions of this sewer, which has no means of discharge except by percolation or absorption of the earth. It was found from the foregoing causes, and the failure of this sewer to adequately drain this district, that the cellars were frequently flooded with water, causing a saturation of the ground and an almost universal dampness of the buildings, to the serious detriment of the health of the occupants. In many of the cellars a steam-pump has to be used to keep the water from rising over the floors; the floors having to be frequently taken up and new floors laid, from this cause. Through the courtesy of Warden Quinn, your Inspectors were enabled to make an examination of the drainage of the City Prison. The surface of the cellar under the main building, at this point, was found covered with water to such an extent that one could almost swim in it. This condition was entirely due to the street sewer and the general defective drainage of the place. The question of properly draining the ground on which this prison is situated, is one which has been frequently agitated by the press of this City, and occupied the attention of our municipal authorities to such an extent, that at one time the removal of the prison from its present location was seriously contemplated owing to its unsanitary condition, principally arising from defective drainage. The prison cellar being several feet above the inner sewer bottom of the sewer in the street, and this being the rule in regard to all the cellars in this street, we can see no good reason why the prison site, together with all the property on the line of Centre street, from Pearl to Canal street, could not be properly drained and sewered if there was a proper sewer in the street. From the conditions hereinbefore enumerated, your Inspectors believe that the present sewer in Centre street is not capable of adequately draining or sewerage this portion of the city; and that the further use thereof is calculated to injuriously affect the sanitary condition of the locality which it was constructed to benefit.

We would respectfully recommend that the present sewer be taken up, and that a new water-tight sewer be constructed in lieu thereof, under the direction of the Department of Public Works. Before closing this report, we beg leave to acknowledge the valuable assistance rendered and the courtesy extended by Stevenson Towle, Esq., the Engineer in charge of Sewers of this city, under the Department of Public Works.

## BOARD OF EDUCATION.

STATED SESSION.

February 3, 1875.

The Board of Education held a stated session on Wednesday, 3d inst., at the hall of the Board at 4 o'clock P. M.

The minutes of the sessions of January 13 and 20 were adopted.

The President laid before the Board the following communications from the Trustees of the several wards:

From the Fourth, Tenth, Thirteenth, Fourteenth, Sixteenth, Seventeenth, Twentieth, Twenty-first, and Twenty-fourth Wards, relative to absence of certain Teachers.

Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From A. S. Barnes & Co., asking to have Monteth's wall maps placed on the list of supplies.

Referred to the Committee on Course of Study and School-books.

From Miss Henrietta Woodman, Grammar School No. 11, relative to her salary and grade.

Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From Amos G. Hull, Esq., Attorney, relative to the Senate Bill to adjust certain unpaid bills for expenses incurred by Trustees in 1869 and 1870.

Referred to the Finance Committee.

From Miss Mary J. Dowlin, late Principal of Female Department, Grammar School No. 5 (transferred to Grammar School No. 21), for re-appointment.

Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

The President, to whom was referred, with power, the application of Prof. Thomas Eggleston, of Columbia College, for a donation of school-books and publications to the municipality of Paris, France, for examination by their Committee, reported that he found no law giving such authority, and, on motion, was discharged from the further consideration of the subject.

Commissioner Dowd offered the following:

Resolved, That so much of the President's address as relates to a change in the grading of some of our Grammar Schools, and placing all the Departments in a building, under the management of but one principal, be referred to a Joint Committee, to consist of the Committee on Teachers, and the Committee on Course of Study and School-books.

Adopted.

Commissioner Herring offered the following:

Resolved, That the Committee on Course of Study and School-books be and they hereby are directed to inquire what books and materials now in use in the schools under the jurisdiction of this Board can be dispensed with, without impairing the success of the system of instruction now imposed by the By-laws and Rules of this Board.

Adopted.

Commissioner Farr offered the following:

Resolved, That the matter of putting up shelves under the desks, to keep the various documents necessary for the use of members, be referred to the Superintendent of Buildings, with power.

Adopted.

Commissioner Halsted offered the following:

Resolved, That the Trustees of the several wards be requested to report to this Board whether there are or not more school buildings in their respective wards than are necessary for the proper accommodation of the children attending said schools, and whether or not a consolidation of any of the schools could be effected without detriment to said schools.

Adopted.

Commissioner Dowd offered the following:

Resolved, That the second resolution, on page 928 of the Journal of 1874, be amended by striking out all the words commencing with "the dimensions of which are as follows," on the tenth line, and ending with the words, "on the east side," in the seventeenth line, and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"As the same are laid down upon a map of the village of Melrose, in the manor of Morrisania, made by A. Findley, Surveyor, March 4, 1850, and now on file with, and constituting part of, the judgment-roll entered in New York County, March 3, 1854, in the matter of the application of William H. Morris, etc., relative to the lands of James Morris, deceased."

Adopted.

The President announced that the special order of business before the Board was the consideration of the report of the Committee on Course of Study and School-books, relative to the course of instruction in the German language.

Commissioner Klamroth called for the reading of the report.

Commissioner Baker moved that the reading be dispensed with.

Adopted.

Commissioners Klamroth, Baker, Seligman, West, and Herring addressed the Board, and Commissioner Herring yielded the floor to Commissioner Farr, who moved that the further discussion be postponed until the next stated session of the Board. Commissioner Herring consented to suspend further remarks under the motion, to be resumed at the next session, and the motion of Commissioner Farr was adopted.

Commissioner Farr presented the annual report of the Normal College for the year 1874, and moved that the same be laid on the table, and that fifteen hundred copies be printed.

Adopted.

Commissioner Townsend presented a report from the Joint Committee on By-laws, Elections, and Qualifications, and Finance, relative to the appointment of Superintendent and Agents of Truancy, accompanied with the following resolution:

Resolved, That Alexander M. Stanton, Fordham, Twenty-fourth Ward, be and he is hereby appointed Superintendent of Truancy at an annual salary of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500), to be paid out of the fund set apart for the enforcement of the Compulsory Education Act.

Resolved, That the following-named gentlemen be and they are hereby appointed Agents of Truancy, at an annual salary each of thirteen hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,350), to be paid out of the fund set apart for the enforcement of the Compulsory Education Act:

Commissioner Wetmore presented a report from the Committee on Nautical School, asking for authority to advertise for proposals for an awning for the Nautical School-ship St. Mary's.

Adopted.

Commissioner West presented a report from the Auditing Committee, recommending the payment of sundry bills, for incidental expenses, postage, stationery, advertising, printing, etc., for the Board.

Adopted.

Commissioner Halsted presented a report from the Committee on Teachers, recommending that permission be given to the Trustees of the Eleventh Ward to withdraw the nomination of Miss Emily B. Hunt, for Vice-Principal of Primary School No. 5, she having declined to accept the appointment.

Adopted.

Also, to be discharged from the consideration of the appeal of Hubert A. Daly, Music Teacher, the action of the Trustees not being approved by the Inspectors.

Adopted.

Commissioner Farr presented a report from the Committee on Normal Schools, asking for an appropriation of \$1,000, for the use of the Scientific Department of the Normal College.

Referred to the Finance Committee.

Also, asking for an appropriation of \$164.95, to pay sundry bills for chemicals, etc., supplied the Normal College.

Adopted.

Commissioner Wetmore presented a report from the Committee on School Furniture, asking for an appropriation of \$385 for a piano and pianostool for Primary School No. 35.

Referred to the Finance Committee.

Commissioner Dowd presented a report from the Committee on Buildings, asking for an appropriation of \$257.72 to pay bills for alteration, etc., at No. 72 Elm street, branch of Grammar School No. 24.

Referred to the Finance Committee.

Commissioner Mathewson presented a report from the Committee on Evening Schools, appointing Miss Pauline L. Hart, Assistant Teacher in Female Evening School No. 38.

Adopted.

Also, to pay Samuel Morehouse for ten night's services in registration of pupils in Male Evening School No. 44.

Adopted.

Commissioner Vermilye presented a report from the Finance Committee, as follows:

To the Board of Education:

The Finance Committee, to whom was referred the communication from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, notifying this Board of the amount of moneys apportioned for the purposes of public instruction, respectfully report: That

the amount apportioned, including \$103,000 to be distributed to the Corporate Schools, is \$3,583,000: \$100,000 less than the estimate submitted to that Board in September last. This sum your Committee propose to distribute in the usual form, by appropriation of the larger portion of it for the general or current purposes provided for by the By-laws and Rules of the Board, and in such amounts as are, by the expenditure of 1874, indicated to be requisite for those purposes. These will aggregate \$3,337,967, leaving a reserve fund for all special purposes, such as buildings, repairs, etc., of \$245,033.

Among the current purposes that appear for the first time as objects of expense are the Nautical School and Compulsory Education, the sums named for these amounting to \$80,000.

Your Committee invite the special attention of the Board, and of its several Committees, to whom is largely intrusted the supervision of its expenditures, to the unusually small amount of the reserve fund, which can only be increased by lessening the expenditures for general purposes, through the application of strict economy in the use of the sums appropriated for those purposes, which fund, unless so increased, will be no more than sufficient to maintain the present school accommodations and the efficiency of the system, and will not probably permit of the erection of new buildings or the expenditure of any considerable sum for sites.

Resolutions in the usual form, for the appropriation of the funds, in accordance with the "ability" afforded by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and fixing the amount to be reserved for future appropriations, are herewith submitted, with the recommendation that they be adopted.

Resolved, That the sum of three millions three hundred and thirty-seven thousand nine hundred and sixty-seven dollars (\$3,337,967) of the moneys apportioned for the purposes of public instruction, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for the year 1875, be and the same is hereby appropriated to the several purposes, and in the specific sums herein named, the payments to be made therefrom in accordance with the By-laws, Rules, and Regulations of this Board governing payments.

buildings and premises under the charge of the Board of Education, and for repairing the furniture and heating-apparatus; for the support of schools which shall have been organized since the last annual apportionment of school moneys, and such further sum or sums as may be necessary for any of the purposes authorized by law," and not already provided for.
