Two (2) field parties were engaged in making preliminary surveys for the location of monu-

ments.
On June 30, 1895, the force in the Topographical Bureau consisted of a Chief Engineer, I Principal Assistant Topographical Engineer, 3 Assistant Engineers, 3 Computers and Draughtsmen, 20 Computers, 19 Draughtsmen, I Transitman, I Assistant, I Leveler, I Rodman, 2 Chainmen, 9 Axemen and I Clerk, making a total of 54 employees.

Up to June I the Topographical and Construction Bureaus were under one head. Since that time I Engineer under my appointment is Chief of the Bureau of Construction and another Chief of the Topographical Bureau.

On the North river, between Piers, old 9 and 10, there is a platform extending out from the westerly side of West street, about 69 feet on its southerly side, and about 79 feet on its northerly side, as shown on the accompanying map.

On the map of wharves and piers on file in this Department, dated 1849, this platform does not appear, but the bulkhead is shown at about 8 feet westerly of the westerly line of West street. It is probable that this bulkhead was built on the westerly line of West street and afterward slid out this additional 8 feet.
