MINUTES OF THE LOCAL BOARD OF MORRISANIA, TWENTY-FOURTH DISTRICT.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen, the members of the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, met on July 9, 1902, at 4 p. m., at the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Present—President Haffen, in the chair; Aldermen Harnischfeger, Leitner, Goldwater and Peck.

Minutes of the meeting held June 18, 1902, were approved as printed, as were also the minutes of June 30, 1902.

No. 55.

Public Park or Place, Laying Out on Map, Bounded by East One Hundred and Eighty-third Street, Arthur Avenue, Crescent Avenue, Etc.

Laid over, awaiting report of Alderman Longfellow.

No. 138.

Regulating, Grading, Curbstones Set, Flagging Sidewalks, Laying Crosswalks, Building Approaches and Erecting Fences Where Necessary, in Hoe Street, from West Farms Road to Boston Road.

Petition of A. R. Baumann and others was read, as was also the protest signed by Thomas A. Driscoll and others.

The Chief Engineer reported under date of June 30, 1902, that title was vested in Hoe street, from West Farms road to Boston road, July 5, 1901, and that the detailed estimate of cost was \$61,000. Assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment, \$337,650.

Laid over and referred to Alderman Leitner.

No. 95.

Regulating, Grading, Etc., Ryer Avenue, from Tremont Avenue to East One Hundred and Eighty-seventh Street.

The Board of Estimate, under date of June 20, 1902, returned the resolution adopted for this work by the Local Board May 26, 1902, as per request of June 20, 1902.

Secretary directed to communicate with owners of property and suggest that a new petition be presented to read "Ryer avenue, from Burnside avenue to East One Hundred and Eighty-third street."

The following petitions were laid over and referred to the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx for his estimate of the cost of the proposed work, and a statement of the assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment:

No. 187. Construction of sewers and appurtenances in Bathgate avenue, from Pelham avenue to East One Hundred and Ninety-first street, and in East One Hundred and Ninety-first street, from Bathgate avenue to Hoffman street.

No. 188. Paving with granite block on sand foundation, East One Hundred and Fiftieth street, from Brook avenue, to the Port Morris Branch Railroad.

No. 200. Construction of sewers and appurtenances in Two Hundred and Second street (Tower place), between Webster avenue and the property of the New York and Harlem Railroad.

No. 203. Construction of sewers and appurtenances in Vyse avenue, between West Farms road and East One Hundred and Seventy-second street.

AN ORDINANCE to regulate the construction of fences, signs, bill boards and sky signs within the building line, being an amendment to Part XXVIII, section 144 of the Building Code.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Part XXVIII, section 144 of the Building Code, is hereby amended by striking out the paragraphs relating to fences, signs and bill boards beginning with the words "Fences of wood shall not be erected over ten feet high," and ending with the words "and the same shall be properly supported and braced," and substituting in lieu thereof the following words:

Fences, signs or bill boards shall not be at any point over ten feet above the adjoining ground; except that when any fence, sign or bill board shall be constructed entirely of metal or of wood covered on all sides with sheet metal, including the uprights, supports and braces for same, it shall not be at any point over eighteen feet six inches above the adjoining ground.

Any letter, word, model, sign, device or representation in the nature of an adver-

gement, announcement or direction, supported or attached, wholly or in part, over or above any wall, building or structure, shall be deemed to be a "sky sign."

Sky signs shall be constructed entirely of metal, including the uprights, supports and braces for same, and shall not be at any point over nine feet above the front wall or cornice of the building or structure to which they are attached or by which they are supported.

All fences, signs, bill boards and sky signs shall be erected entirely within the building line, and be properly secured, supported and braced, and shall be so constructed as not to be, or become, dangerous.

Before the erection of any fence, sign, bill board or sky sign shall have been commenced, a permit for the erection of the same shall be obtained from the Superintendent of Buildings having jurisdiction, as provided in Part II, section 4, of this Code. Each application for the erection of any fence, sign, bill board or sky sign, shall be accompanied by the written consent of the owner or owners, or the lessee or lessees of the property upon which it is to be erected.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The new reservoir built by the Department on the Muscoot river, a tributary of the Croton, has been completed and filled with water.

During the early part of the quarter 5,600,000,000 gallons of water were drawn from the three reservoirs on the east branch of the Croton, the west branch, and the Titicus river, to supplement the natural flow in the Croton river.

Surveys are in progress for a new storage reservoir on Cross river, another tributary of the Croton.

Keepers' houses have been built at the Muscoot Reservoir and the Middle Branch Reservoir.

For a daily supply of 15,000,000 gallons from the Bronx and Byram rivers 620,000,000 gallons of stored water was drawn from the Kensico and the Rye Pond Reservoirs.

Vigorous progress has been made in the construction of the dam and appurtenances at Byram Pond.

Maps have been furnished the Counsel to the Corporation for legal proceedings to acquire title to lands for the sanitary protection of the waters of the upper Bronx river, the Rye Ponds Reservoir, and the Byram and Wampus rivers.

The old Croton Aqueduct has been shut off during the quarter in consequence of work at the Jerome Park Reservoir and on the arch at Burnside avenue; the entire supply from the Croton being received through the new aqueduct.

The Chief Engineer's report, hereto appended, furnishes the details of work in the care and maintenance of the two aqueducts, the Bronx river conduit, the storage reservoirs and distributing reservoirs, and their appurtenances. Special measures became necessary to protect the old aqueduct during the progress of rock excavation for the grading of Edgecombe avenue, between One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street and One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street.

Under a special appropriation the water main connections with the old reservoir at Fifth avenue, Fortieth street and Forty-second street, have been removed, the reservoir emptied, and certificate has been made that the removal of the structure may now be commenced, as required by Chapter 556 of the Laws of 1897.

Under the special appropriation for additional fire hydrants, to increase the facilities for extinguishing fires, 301 new hydrants, 4,606 linear feet of new water mains and 62 new stop-cocks were placed.

In extending the water service into seventeen new streets, nearly all north of the Harlem river, 13,205 linear feet of 48-inch mains, 2,265 linear feet of 36-inch mains, 13,664 linear feet of 20-inch mains, 19,376 linear feet of 12-inch mains, and 31,942 linear feet of 6-inch mains were laid—total 80,002 feet or 15.15 miles. In connection therewith 148 stop-cocks and 208 fire hydrants were placed.

In the repairs of stone block pavement an average force of 199 pavers and rammers, 251 laborers, 96 carts and 5 teams were employed, the work being continued to the close of the year without interruption, except by storms. The area of pavements taken up and relaid by this force is 89,569 square yards. On order from the Department the Asphalt Companies relaid 962 square yards of asphalt in repairing damages by bonfires and other causes, for which they were not responsible under their contracts.

Street pavements were opened for the laying of 12.58 miles of new gas mains; 9.34 miles of electrical subways, 3.85 miles of ducts for fire telegraph and 3 miles of pneumatic tubes; also for overhauling and repairing 9.64 miles of gas mains and one mile of subways.

In the reconstruction of street railroads to substitute underground electricity for motive power in place of horses, 14 miles of double tracks, 4 miles of single track, and 18 miles of underground electric conduits were built; 245,178 square yards of pavement were taken up, and 202,418 square yards of pavement were relaid.

In making and repairing house connections with water mains, sewers, gas mains, electric conduits and steam pipes, 3,848 separate openings were made in the streets.

Three contracts for regulating and grading streets and eleven smaller contracts for flagging and reflagging sidewalks were completed during the quarter. The following are the aggregate quantities of work done under the several contracts, including those now in progress:

OFFICE OF ENGINEER IN CHARGE OF SEWERS.

The work for construction of new sewers and the improvement of the old sewer system has been unusually extensive during this quarter.

Seventeen sewer contracts and two basin contracts have been completed, and work is now in progress on fourteen unfinished contracts. The aggregate length of new sewers built is 5.82 miles, with 40 receiving basins.

The following are the principal items of work done in the maintenance and repairs of the sewer system:

199 basin heads reset.

124 cart loads of solid sewer deposit removed.

BUREAU OF STREETS AND ROADS.

Each successive season adds to the weight and frequency of business and freight traffic to which the uptown macadam roadways are subjected.

This traffic grinds up the gravel and small broken stone which compose the top dressing, so rapidly that the annual appropriation for maintenance and repair becomes more and more inadequate for the necessary material and labor for resurfacing the roads, and resort must be had to larger or special appropriations if these roads are to be kept in fair condition.

The resurfacing of the Seventh avenue driveway, which is the main northerly outlet from the Central Park drives, has been completed from One Hundred and Tenth street to One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, placing it in fine condition. The cost of this work is charged to the fund for repaving. The same treatment will have to be applied during the ensuing year to the Boulevard from One Hundred and Tenth street north, and to Avenue St. Nicholas from Manhattan street to One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street. As there is a double track railroad on this avenue, from Manhattan street to One Hundred and Tenth street, the macadam roadway should there be replaced by a more durable pavement.

The macadamizing of the Boulevard Lafayette, from One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street to Kingsbridge road, is progressing satisfactorily.

The unpaved carriageway of Fort Washington avenue (formerly Ridge road) has been covered with road material, making a firm surface at very moderate cost. Other repaved roads in that section of the City should be similarly improved, but this can be done to a very moderate extent only, as the demands on the appropriation for the maintenance of unpaved streets and roads is almost wholly absorbed in ordinary repairs of damages to dirt roads caused by rain storms.

In the report of the Acting Superintendent of Streets, hereto appended, will be found full details of the work done and materials used in the care and repairs of macadam roads and unpaved streets.

BUREAU OF LAMPS AND GAS.

The following are the changes and additions in the service of lighting the public streets and places during the quarter:

518 new gas lamps placed and lighted.
14 new electric lamps placed and lighted.
1 new naphtha lamp placed and lighted.
343 old gas lamps relighted.
98 gas lamps discontinued.
1 electric lamp discontinued.

At the close of the quarter there were 25,287 gas lamps, 4,122 electric lamps and 1,278 naphtha lamps in use on the streets, parks, places, docks and bridges of the City.

BUREAU OF REPAIRS AND SUPPLIES.

Among the principal repairs made during the quarter in public buildings and offices are: New cast iron bases placed on twenty-six columns on the first floor of the Criminal Court building; a new water closet placed; walls and ceilings repapered, and slate roof repaired in the Third District Court House (Jefferson Market); a new heating furnace placed in the old Hall of Records; stoves furnished and placed in the new Twelfth Judicial District Court and the new branch office of the Department of Buildings at No. 2775 Third avenue; 284 chairs renovated and new flooring laid at the Eighth Regiment Armory; 120 new gun cases furnished at the Ninth Regiment Armory; two new iron gates placed and iron doors repaired at the Twelfth Regiment Armory; the decks of the United States ship "New Hampshire" (the armory of the First Naval Battalion) repainted.

Extensive repairs are in progress on the roofs of Fulton, Washington, Catharine, West Washington, Jefferson and Centre Markets.

New offices have been fitted up for the Sheriff in the Stewart Building.

The offices of the Board of Assessors have been removed from No. 27 Chambers street to No. 320 Broadway.

The construction of the New Gouverneur Hospital on the site of the old hospital in Gouverneur slip is progressing slowly.

Specifications have been prepared for the repairs and refitting of the Free Floating Baths, now in winter quarters.

BUREAU OF INCUMBRANCES.

WATER SUPPLY.

The rainfall in the watersheds of the Croton river and the Bronx river for the year amounted to 5½ inches, which is three inches above the average for the past thirty-two years. There were brief periods, however, when the natural flow of the Croton river fell below the quantity required for the City's supply, and had to be supplemented by drafts on the water held in reserve in the storage reservoirs. Consumption of Water.

Up to July, 1890, when the new aqueduct was completed, the supply from the Croton watershed was limited to the capacity of the old Croton Aqueduct.

That structure was completed in 1842, and was designed to carry water only to the spring line of the top arch, giving it a daily capacity of 71,000,000 gallons. As early as 1867, however, the demands of the City had outgrown this limit. In 1870 the daily supply and consumption had reached 77,000,000 gallons, and in the succeeding five years it had increased to 95,000,000 gallons, which is the maximum capacity of the old aqueduct.

From that time (1875) until September, 1884, when the Bronx River Conduit was completed and brought into use, there could be no increase of supply, and during the severe droughts of 1876, 1877 and 1880, when the reserve held in storage was inadequate to supplement the diminished flow in the Croton river, the daily supply fell to a minimum of 60,000,000 gallons.

The addition of the Bronx river supply, which began at a daily volume of 10,000,000 gallons, and was gradually increased to 15,000,000 gallons, gave only temporary and inadequate relief.

This led to passage of the Act creating the Aqueduct Commission, chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883. Under the direction of this Commission the construction of the new aqueduct was begun in 1884 and completed in July, 1890, when the structure was transferred to the care of this Department. The daily supply from the Croton watershed was at once increased to 135,000,000 gallons, and subsequently as follows: In 1891 150,000,000 gallons; 1892, 156,000,000 gallons; 1893, 164,000,000 gallons; 1894, 170,000,000 gallons; 1895, 174,000,000 gallons; 1896, 205,000,000 gallons; 1897, 210,000,000 gallons.

The large increase for 1896 and 1897 is partly due to a more liberal policy, which utilizes the water supply for flushing and cleansing asphalt-paved streets in the tenement districts during the summer, to promote the health and comfort of the tenement population.

The daily consumption of water for 1897, including 15,000,000 gallons from the Bronx and Byram rivers, is 226,000,000 gallons.

Distributing System.

During the year the water service has been extended in 125 different streets enumerated in the Chief Engineer's report. The following statement gives the sizes and length of additional water mains laid:

The two lines of large mains on Fifth avenue, from South Washington square (Fourth street) to Eightieth street, are completed, except the line on the east side of the avenue for the four blocks from Sixty-fifth street to Sixty-ninth street.

In connection with the laying of new water mains, 532 new stop-cocks and 632 new fire hydrants were placed.

Under a special appropriation for placing additional fire hydrants at locations selected by the Fire Department, to increase the facilities for extinguishing fires, 331 new fire hydrants were placed.

The distributing system now includes 816.85 miles of water mains, 8,633 stop-cocks, and 11,068 fire hydrants.

High Service Supply.

The first high service pumping works, to supply the parts of the city above the elevation at which water can be delivered by gravity from the City reservoirs, were erected at High Bridge, and were completed in 1870, having a capacity of delivering 6,000,000 gallons of water per day. The constant and rapid increase in buildings and population on the high grounds in the upper part of the city called for repeated additions to the capacity of the high service works.

In 1880 new pumping works were erected at Ninety-eighth street, west of Columbus avenue, with a daily capacity of 15,000,000 gallons. In 1892 this was increased by 10,000,000 gallons by the placing of new pumping engines. In 1896 new works were completed on the west bank of the Harlem river, near Washington bridge, having a daily capacity of 28,000,000 gallons.

There are now 38,000,000 gallons of water distributed daily from the high service works.

Sanitary Protection of the Water Supply.

By chapter 189 of the Laws of 1893, special powers were granted to the Department to acquire lands along the streams, lakes and reservoirs which are tributary to the City's water supply, and to take other measures to prevent pollution of the water. Under that act title has been obtained to 2,639 acres of land required in the Croton, Bronx and Byram river watersheds, and everything tending to the defilement of the water has been removed therefrom.

At the villages of Brewster and Mt. Kisco, the Department continues to maintain plants for the disinfection of the sewage.

The Counsel to the Corporation has been furnished with maps of lands required around Lakes Mahopac and Kirk, and along the Muscoot river in Putnam County. Surveys are in progress as to lands required

This work is progressing favorably and will be completed early next spring.

SEWERAGE AND DRAINAGE.

During the year 57,451 linear feet of sewers and culverts were added to the sewer system on Manhattan Island, which now includes 403.06 miles of sewers, with 5,743 receiving basins.

In the improvement and reconstruction of the old sewer system 16,645 linear feet of sewers and culverts were built.

At the close of the year work is in progress for the construction of 18,941 linear feet of sewers now under contract.

Plans and specifications are prepared for 3.30 miles of new sewers.

In 1870 the sewer system comprised 260.82 miles of sewers and 3,372 receiving basins. From 1870 to 1888 there were added 168 miles of sewers and 1,787 receiving basins. From 1889 to 1894 there were added 33 miles of sewers and 322 receiving basins. From 1895 to 1897, inclusive, there were added 21 miles of sewers and 162 receiving basins.

For details of the improvements made this year, I beg to refer to the annexed report of the Engineer in charge of sewers.

I mention, as an illustration of the incompleteness of the old sewer system, that on Broadway there are twenty-six blocks without sewers, and twelve blocks with sewers on one side only; on Fifth avenue, from Waverley place to Fifty-first street, there were thirteen blocks wholly or partly without main sewers, which have since been constructed simultaneously with the laying of large water mains; on Madison avenue, between Forty-second street and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, thirty-five blocks were without main sewers, which have now been completed in conjunction with the construction of the electric railway on that avenue.

STREET LIGHTING.

During the year 4.84 miles of additional streets on Manhattan Island and 4.71 new streets north of the Harlem river were lighted with gas lamps. On 2.73 miles of new streets in the newly annexed districts naphtha lamps were placed and lighted.

On 25.68 miles of streets on Manhattan Island and 5.43 miles of streets north of the Harlem river, the gas lamps have been displaced by electric lamps.

There are now 111.26 miles of streets south of the Harlem river and 88.31 miles of streets north of the Harlem river lighted by electric lamps.

The public lamp service now extends to 646.82 miles of streets, 3.11 miles of bridges and docks, and 109.7 acres of public parks.

Electric light was first introduced on our streets in 1881.

A tubular statement, attached to the report of the Superintendent of Lamps and Gas, shows the contract prices for lighting public lamps each year, from 1858 to 1897.

From 1858 to 1864 there were three gas companies, which were paid \$25 and \$28 per year for each lamp.

From 1865 to 1872 there were four gas companies, paid from \$45 to \$53 per year for each lamp.

From 1873 to 1880 there were seven gas companies, paid respectively \$12, \$17,

\$19, \$30, \$35, \$42, \$45 and \$50 per year for each lamp.

For the first seven years that electric lamps were used, from 1881 to 1887, the Brush Electric Light Company was the only bidder, and charged 70 cents per night for each lamp, amounting to \$255.50 per annum. In subsequent years eight other electric light companies came into competition. The average price for each electric lamp per annum has been reduced to \$155.17, at which it has remained for the past three years.

The average price for lighting gas lamps, which has also been unchanged for the past six years, is now \$19.33 per year for each lamp.
