In accordance with its request (72853) permission was granted the Pennsylvania Railroad Company to make general repairs to piers and bulkheads occupied by the company on the North and East rivers in New York and Brooklyn, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, to whom at least twenty-four hours' notice must be given prior to the commencement of any particular piece of

Permit was granted the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company to make necessary repairs to the stringpiece under the Second Avenue Bridge at its Harlem station, the work to be kept within existing lines and to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief (72859).

The Corporation Counsel was requested to advise whether the department can erect a pier extending from high-water mark out to the pierhead line in cases where the property acquired for street purposes extends outshore of high-water mark to the pierhead or bulkhead line, having particular reference to the foot of Fordham road, Borough of The Bronx, the land under water having been acquired by the City for street purposes at a cost thereafter assessed on the adjoining property owners.

In connection with the proposed construction of a pier under the new plan at the foot of Jamaica avenue, Astoria, Borough of Queens, the Corporation Counsel was requested to advise the department as to what property it is necessary to purchase as a site for the proposed pier, whether from low water mark out to the bulk-fiead line established in 1890, or whether it should purchase everything between the existing bulkhead line being the westerly boundary of the Boulevard (which is practically high-water mark) and the bulkhead line established in 1890.

From the Corporation Counsel and Comptroller (71526, 72362)—Transmitting report of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in proceeding for the acquisition of Piers (old) 9 and 10 and certain adjoining bulkheads, East river. Filed, vouchers in the sum of \$536,570.13 having been forwarded to the Finance Department for payment.

From Thomas Russel (71720)—Requesting permission to maintain stand for the sale of milk on the angle on the north side of the pier at West Twenty-second street, North river, about 210 feet west of the bulkhead wall. From the Comptroller—

1 (72484). Asking that the claims, forwarded to this department for payment, of Edward Brandow and Lucius J. Stevens be returned to him, as per opinion of the Corporation Counsel of August 2, 1906, for payment from the Revenue Bond Fund for Claims. Papers in the matter of the claims returned.

Fifteenth—The rates to be charged by the Company in the Borough of Queens for gas furnished by it to the City and to private consumers shall never be in excess of the following, and it is agreed that the same may be reduced by the Board, as hereinafter provided:

For gas furnished to the City for street lighting, to be used in its public buildings, or for gas furnished to any other public buildings located in the Borough of Queens, the sum of seventy-five cents per thousand cubic feet.

Plans and drawings of censtruction work may also be seen there.
