Banking Commission.

The quarterly meeting of the officers to designate City depositories, in accordance with section 196, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, was held in the Mayor's office on Friday, May 1, 1914.

Present—John Purroy Mitchel, Mayor; William A. Prendergast, Comptroller; Henry Bruere, Chamberlain.

The Chamberlain offered the following:

Resolved, That the present City depositories be redesignated.

The Chamberlain offered the following:

Resolved, That the minimum rate of interest on deposits be fixed at two (2) per cent.; that the Chamberlain be empowered, wherever he may do so in his best judgment, to enter into contract for such higher rate of interest as may be obtained, provided that in each case the specific approval of the Mayor and Comptroller be obtained. The Chamberlain is empowered in his discretion to require from any or all such depositories bonds to secure the deposits made therein, such bonds to be approved by the Comptroller.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The following report of the action taken by the Commission was approved and signed by the Mayor, Comptroller and the Chamberlain:

Report on the Meeting of the Banking Commission.

May 1, 1914.

The Banking Commission, consisting of the Mayor, the Comptroller and the Chamberlain, met to-day to fix the rate of interest on City deposits for the three months ending July 31, 1914. The minimum rate was fixed at 2 per cent., but the Chamberlain was authorized to make better arrangements with banks which offered to pay a larger rate of interest.

In accordance with the usual practice, a letter was sent to the banks by the Chamberlain ten days ago, asking what rate of interest would be paid on city balances for the quarter beginning May 1st. The replies received show that it will be possible to place \$26,000,000 in banks at rates higher than 2 per cent., the average rate for this amount being 2.56-100 per cent.

Under the law, which permits a deposit in any one bank of an amount equal to 50 per cent. of the capital and surplus, \$58,800,000 could be deposited in banks paying better than 2 per cent., but the Chamberlain has limited the regular deposits in banks to 20 per cent. of the capital and surplus, as a conservative policy.

Under the offers received at the beginning of the last quarter, it was possible to place \$27,000,000 above 2 per cent. following the plan of distribution which will govern the deposits for the coming quarter.

That the returns for this period should be so favorable is regarded as noteworthy, in view of the condition of the money market. During the past quarter call money has averaged from 1½ to 2 per cent.; 60 day money from 2½ to 3 per cent., and 90 days to 4 months money from 2¾ to 3½ per cent. Under these conditions it is not profitable for banks to pay high interest rates on City deposits. Those banks which are continuing the higher interest rates are doubtless doing so partly because they have enjoyed deposits from the City in the past at rates which permitted substantial profits, and partly because they expect, through generous dealings with the City, to obtain deposits when the condition of the money market will enable them to make a greater profit. During the past quarter the City has borrowed 30 day money at an average of 2½ per cent.; 60 day money at 3½ per cent., and 90 day money from 3 to 3¾ per cent.

A total of 78 institutions have agreed to pay rates in excess of 2 per cent., as follows:

Fifteen institutions, 3 per cent.; 3 institutions, 2¾ per cent.; 52 institutions, 2½ per cent.; 7 institutions, 2¾ per cent.

Section 195 of the Charter requires that the rate of interest shall be fixed quarterly. This provision was undoubtedly intended to permit the adjustment of the interest rate in accordance with the fluctuations of the money market.

The Commission stated that it was entirely in sympathy with the necessity for the reduction of the rate of interest on the part of several of the banks at this time. It recognizes that a reduction, when the money market is unfavorable, is just as appropriate as an increase in rates when a more favorable condition prevails. If it were not for the fluctuations of the market rates of money, it would not be necessary to adjust the interest agreements quarterly.

The method of distribution employed during the past quarter whereby banks impartially received sums on deposit in proportion to their size, strength and amount of interest paid, will be continued during the succeeding quarter. A great number of institutions have expressed themselves as most heartily in favor of the plan of distribution adopted on February 1st. Typical comments are as follows:

"This appears to be a very fair way to apportion the City's deposits among the several banks, and we have no comment or criticism to make."

"The plan is fair to every institution in the city, and we can see no reason for anyone to make any complaint."

"We think are satisfactory in every respect."

The increased interest earnings during the quarter ended April 30, 1914, due to the rates better than 2 per cent., were \$34,000, or more than twice the cost of the Chamberlain's office for the quarter. The prospective increased earnings over the 2 per cent. basis for the coming quarter will be as great as those for the quarter just ended. The slightly average lower interest rates will be offset by increased balances due to tax collections.

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, April 7, 1914, at 3.30 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; and Messrs. Farley, O'Keeffe, Paulding, Robbins, Sachs and Stern, Trustees. Excused, Mr. Kingsbury.

The minutes of the meeting of March 17 were held as read and approved.

Bills amounting to \$100,426.52 were approved and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows: The daily average census at the various hospitals during the month of March 1914, was as follows: Bellevue, 1,368; Gouverneur, 198; Harlem, 203; and Fordham, 181.

A request has been received from Dr. Norris for permission to appoint Dr.

Rolfe Floyd as voluntary assistant in the Department of Pathology. Dr. Floyd is now an adjunct assistant visiting on the Second Medical Division, and the approval of the Board is requested.

Through Miss Jones, the Visiting Obstetrician to Fordham Hospital, reports one case of septic infection during the month of March. The patient was undoubtedly infected previous to her admission to the hospital.

Dr. Goldwater, Health Commissioner, and the Borden's Condensed Milk Company, which has the contract for supplying milk to this department, have called attention to the fact that, in accordance with the new regulations of the Board of Health, regarding pasteurized milk, it will not be possible for this company to deliver raw milk, as called for in their contract.

A request has been received from Dr. Hirsch for the services of a Stenographer in the X-ray department. There is no position of this grade available, and the request can only be complied with by asking for revenue bonds, or by the appointment of a person with the title of Hospital Helper for the remainder of the year.

The Advisory Committee on Nursing has recommended that the salaries of the Charge Nurses at night in wards 30 and 34 at Bellevue Hospital be increased, and also that of Miss Hansen in the dispensary. Authority for these increases is requested.

A revision of schedule No. 2064 (salaries temporary employees, Fordham Hospital) is requested, to be effective April 1, no additional funds being necessary.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

The appointment of Dr. Rolfe Floyd as Voluntary Assistant in the Pathological Department was approved.

It was Resolved, To consent to the abrogation of the contract with the Borden's Condensed Milk Company for the delivery of milk, subject to the approval of the Law Department.

The appointment of a Hospital Helper at \$40 a month for service in the X-ray department for the remainder of the year was approved, and it was

Resolved, To include a request for a Stenographer for this place in the Budget for 1915.

It was Resolved, To increase the salaries of the two Nurses in charge of ward 30 and 34 at night and of Miss Hansen, the Nurse in charge of the dispensary, from \$600 to \$720 each.

It was Resolved, To request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to amend schedule 2064, as recommended by the General Medical Superintendent.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

The Building Committee reported that they had considered the estimates from the John H. Parker Company, referred to by McKim, Mead & White in their letter of March 6, for changes in the cooking equipment in the kitchen of pavilions I and K, and recommended on account of the high cost that these estimates be rejected and the architects instructed to proceed with the installation of the equipment in accordance with the original specifications. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved and its recommendations adopted.

The Building Committee recommended that a new refrigerator be placed in the Nurses' residence, as requested by the Board of Managers in their minutes of February 13. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved and the General Medical Superintendent instructed to have specifications prepared for this work, and it was

Resolved, To authorize an advertisement for bids for the installation of a refrigerator in the Nurses' residence of Bellevue Hospital.

The Building Committee reported that they had inquired into the desirability of providing a recreation room in the Nurses' residence, and recommended that the General Medical Superintendent be directed to prepare specifications for the necessary alterations to provide for such a room. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this recommendation was approved.

The Chairman of the Building Committee reported on the question of the color of the exterior sash and balconies of pavilions I and K. This was referred to the President and the Chairman of the Building Committee with power.

The Building Committee reported on the estimate of the John H. Parker Company for \$7,650 for changes in the radiographic department of pavilions I and K. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, this estimate was rejected on account of the high cost.

The Chairman of the Building Committee reported that he had inquired into the recommendations of the architects to improve the sewerage facilities in the vicinity of 28th and 29th sts. and 1st ave. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to request the Department of

Public Works to give this matter their attention.

Upon the recommendation of the Conference Committee of the First Division of Bellevue Hospital, Dr. Alice M. Flood was appointed Assistant Physician to Out Patients on the Children's Tuberculosis Service, and reappointments for the year 1914 were approved as follows: Dr. Dudley S. Conley, Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients; Dr. Leander H. Shearer, Physician to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physician.

Upon the recommendation of the Conference Committee of the Fourth Division, reappointments to that division were approved as follows:

Dr. Carl G. Burdick, Surgeon to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Surgeon; Dr. Seth M. Milliken, Surgeon to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Surgeon; Dr. Daniel A. Sinclair, Genito-Urinary Surgeon to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Genito-Urinary Surgeon; Dr. Faxton E. Gardner, Assistant Genito-Urinary Surgeon to Out Patients; Dr. D. Clifford Martin, Physician to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physician, Tuberculosis Service; Dr. John H. Wyckoff, Jr., Assistant Physician to Out Patients; Dr. J. F. McGrath, Assistant Gynaecologist to Out Patients; Dr. Joel M. Chasis, Assistant Genito-Urinary Surgeon to Out Patients.

Upon the recommendation of the Gouverneur Hospital Conference Committee, reappointments to that hospital for the year 1914 were approved as follows: Dr. Helen Montague, Assistant Physician to Out Patients; Dr. Samuel Blumenfeld, Assistant Physician to Out Patients.

Mr. Sachs, on behalf of the special committee appointed to confer with the Street Cleaning and Dock Departments in regard to the removal of the dumping board from the foot of E. 30th st., reported that he and Mr. O'Keeffe had met with the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, who had outlined to them a proposal to change the location of the docks used for dumping purposes by the Street Cleaning Department, and that this plan contemplated the removal of the dumping board from E. 30th st. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was accepted.

The Building Committee reported that they had inquired into the question of ventilating the kitchen of Fordham Hospital and suggested a number of changes to the General Medical Superintendent, which had been made. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved.

COMMUNICATIONS.

A preliminary plan of the new Gouverneur Out Patient Department was presented from McKim, Mead & White. As these plans had already been approved by Dr. Goldwater, the Department's Expert in Hospital Construction, and the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried, to accept the plans and instruct the architects to proceed with the preparation of the final working drawings.

A letter dated March 17 was presented from McKim, Mead & White, relating to changes in the kitchen of pavilions I and G. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this was referred to the Building Committee.

A letter was presented from J. H. Freedlander under date of March 19, transmitting two sets of plans and specifications for the alterations to the main building of Harlem Hospital. As these had already been approved by the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried, to send one copy to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval.

A letter dated March 31 was presented from J. H. Freedlander, transmitting plans and estimates for the construction of a sleeping porch on the south wing of Harlem Hospital. These were referred to the Building Committee.

A letter dated March 30 was presented from R. F. Almira, recommending that the money withheld from the final payment to the Luke A. Burke & Sons Company for the construction of the Nurses' residence at Harlem Hospital be paid, as the work is now completed. This matter was referred to the Building Committee for investigation and report.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for February 25 were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, Interims were appointed to the Fourth Division, as follows:

Shea, January 1, 1915, 2 years; Dr. Ralph M. Dodson, January 1, 1915, 2 years; Dr. Mav E. Walker, July 1, 1914, 18 months; Dr. Geraldine E. Watson, July 1, 1914, 18 months; Dr. Benjamin B. Burpee, July 1, 1914, 1 year.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital for April 1 were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, in accordance with the recommendation therein, the position of Associate Visiting Physician to Gouverneur Hospital was abolished, and Mr. Paulding was requested to make inquiry to determine what place or title would be appropriate for Dr. Henderson for his service at that hospital; the request that vacancies among associate and assistant visiting physicians and surgeons, as well as salaried positions in the dispensary, be published was approved; the request for a copy of the missing minutes and committee records of the Medical Board since 1910 was approved, in so far as these records are available; and the request for two copies of the rules and regulations of the Medical Board was approved.

The minutes of the Board of Managers of the Training School for March 13 were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the request for additional employees in the Nurses' residence was denied, as the Department has no funds available for this purpose.

A communication dated March 21 was presented from the State Board of Charities, enclosing a report on the Out Patient Department of Bellevue Hospital, and placing the plant and management in class one. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried, to refer this report to the General Medical Superintendent, in order that the needs and minor defects reported may receive his attention.

A communication dated March 24 was presented from the State Board of Charities, enclosing a report on the Out Patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital, which placed the plant in class 3 and the management in class 2, and requesting to be advised of the action taken to remedy the defects set forth therein. The President reported that he had supplied this information under date of March 26, and on motion, duly seconded and carried, this action was approved.

A letter dated March 10 was presented from the State Charities Aid Association in regard to the commitment of insane patients to the Bellevue psychopathic wards. The President reported that he had obtained an opinion from the Law Department under date of March 20 and a report from the Resident Alienist under date of March 24, and had transmitted copies of these communications to the State Charities Aid Association. The action of the President was approved.

A communication dated April 2 was presented from the Law Department relative to the bids received on February 26 on lines 345 and 350. In accordance therewith, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To reject all the bids received on these two lines.

A letter was presented from J. H. Freedlander under date of March 6, relative to his final contracts for architectural services in connection with the alterations to the ambulance station and power house of Harlem Hospital, and the alterations to the main building of that hospital. As the preliminary plans for the work covered by these contracts had been completed, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To transmit these contracts to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval.

A communication dated April 7 was presented from McKim, Mead & White, enclosing an estimate of \$897 from the John H. Parker Company for additional plumbing and steamfitting for the steam tables and urns in the doctors' dining-room of pavilions I and K. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this estimate was referred to the Building Committee.

A communication dated April 7 was presented from McKim, Mead & White, transmitting estimates of the cost of installing a solid floor, in place of the wooden slat floor, in the roof wards of pavilions A and B, and stating that an allowance of from \$300 to \$400 could be obtained from the present contractor for the omission of the wood floor. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the Building Committee.

A communication dated April 7 was presented from McKim, Mead & White, recommending that a number of changes and additions in pavilions I and K be incorporated in one contract and let in the usual manner. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this was referred to the Building Committee.

A letter dated April 7 was presented from McKim, Mead & White, transmitting

an estimate of \$997 from the John H. Parker Company for additional structural work in the radiographic department of pavilions I and K. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this was referred to the Building Committee.

A communication dated March 17 was presented from Dr. B. Raymond Hoobler, resigning as Physician to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physician to the Children's Service of the First Division of Bellevue Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this resignation was accepted with regret.

A communication dated April 2 was presented from Dr. Haven Emerson, resigning as Assistant Visiting Physician to the First Division of Bellevue Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this resignation was accepted with regret.

A communication was presented from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund transmitting certified copies of two resolutions adopted on March 25, (1) authorizing a renewal of the lease of 117 W. 136th st., and (2) authorizing a lease of a floor of Osborn Hall, 426 E. 26th st. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was ordered placed on file.

A communication dated April 1 was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copies of four resolutions adopted on March 27, (1) approving of the transfer of \$987 from the appropriations of the Borough President of Brooklyn for 1913 to this Department, (2) revising the 1913 schedules to include this amount, (3) transferring \$4,530 within the appropriations for 1914, and (4) revising the 1914 salary schedules as of March 1. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was ordered placed on file.

A letter dated April 3 was presented from the Mayor, transmitting a reply to the Trustees' answer to the recent report of the Commissioner of Accounts on the laundries of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. Action thereon was deferred until each Trustee has had an opportunity to read the report.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

Consideration was given to the acceptance of the contract of the Century Gas and Electric Fixture Company for the installation of lighting fixtures in the laundry building of Bellevue Hospital, which expired on October 24, 1912, and was finally accepted by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity on December 1, 1913. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this matter was referred to the Building Committee for investigation and report.

Consideration was given to the recommendation of the Gouverneur Medical Board contained in their minutes of February 2, upon which action was deferred at the meeting on February 24, and on motion, duly seconded and carried, Dr. S. S. Arluck and Dr. A. C. Henderson were appointed to the salaried places in the surgical and tuberculosis clinics, respectively.

Consideration was given to several matters referred to in the minutes of Gouverneur Medical Board of March 2 and 16, action upon which was deferred at the last meeting. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the rules and measures recommended to be adopted in the Out Patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital were referred to the General Medical Superintendent; the creation of the position of Dental Intern with a service of one year was approved; and the appointment of a paid pathologist was denied on account of lack of funds.

NEW BUSINESS.

It was reported that the wards of Gouverneur Hospital were oversited by some of the members of the attending staff. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to refer this matter to the Gouverneur Hospital Conference Committee.

In accordance with the rules creating the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital, it was moved, seconded and carried, to appoint Mr. O'Keefe and Mr. Paulding to meet with the Executive Committee at their next meeting.

The President referred to a request from Dr. Nordeman that the clinic for the treatment of syphilis be separated from the genito-urinary clinic in the Out Patient Department of Bellevue Hospital, as well as to the question of receiving payment for the Salvarsan used by patients who are able or willing to pay for the treatment. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to refer this to the President and General Medical Superintendent for investigation and report.

Reference was made to the impossibility of procuring doctors of the required ability and in sufficient numbers properly to man the Out Patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital. After discussion, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To pay salaries to all the doctors in the Out Patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital as funds become available, and to include these positions in the Budget for 1915, and it was further

Resolved, To request an issue of special revenue bonds for the payment of the salaries requested in the 1914 Budget for the physicians at Gouverneur Hospital.

The President referred to the placing of grass plots and the construction of a fence in front of the Nurses' residence at Harlem Hospital, and it was moved, seconded and carried, to instruct the General Medical Superintendent to obtain estimates for this work.

Reference was made to the death on March 29 of Dr. Egbert LeFevre, Visiting Physician to the Third Division of Bellevue Hospital, whereupon the following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, The Trustees have learned with profound regret of the death of Dr. Egbert LeFevre, for sixteen years an attending physician to Bellevue Hospital, to the duties of which position he brought an unflinching sympathy and fidelity, in addition to a signal ability in the art of healing the sick, therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees spread upon its minutes an expression of its appreciation, which shall serve as a record of his distinguished service, and further, that a copy of this minute be

sent to his widow, together with the earnest sympathy of the Trustees.

Before adjourning, the Board received word of the death that day of Dr. Joseph D. Bryant, Visiting Surgeon to the Third Division of Bellevue Hospital, whereupon, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, In the death of Dr. Joseph Decatur Bryant, a graduate of the house staff in the year 1871 and attending surgeon to the hospital since 1882, Bellevue Hospital has lost one of the most distinguished of her sons, who up to the very close of a long and useful life continued to expend his time and talent in her service, be it therefore

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals spread upon its minutes a record of its appreciation of his services to Bellevue and the City, together with the expression of their profound personal sorrow for his loss, and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to his bereaved family.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was seconded and carried.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING SATURDAY, MAY 9, 1914.

MOVIES TEACH HEALTH WORK.

Following a conference with Deputy Commissioner Emerson, the Motion Picture Exhibitors' Association of Greater New York has generously volunteered the services of over eight hundred moving picture theatres for the educational work of the Department. The start will be made to-day when hundreds of theatres in the city will display slides calling attention to the "Clean-up" campaign inaugurated by Commissioner Goldwater. This will shortly be followed by announcements concerning typhoid fever, flies, care of the baby, etc.

The Clean-up announcements have been prepared in the form of lantern slides in English, Italian and Yiddish texts. Some of the striking statements read: "Dirt Breeds Flies; Flies Carry Disease; Disease Means Doctors' Bills. Avoid Disease and Doctors' Bills by Cleaning up."

Remember this is "Clean-up Week."

EXEMPT POSITIONS VACANT.

The attention of physicians is called to the fact that a vacancy in the position of Hospital Physician in the Bureau of Infectious Diseases will occur on June 1st, 1914. This position will require at least three hours' time daily, the duties being the inspection and supervision of the Tuberculosis Clinics and Branch Offices in all boroughs of the city. Applicants who are especially qualified in the diagnosis of pulmonary tuberculosis will be given preference. The compensation is \$1,200 per annum.

Two vacancies also exist in the position of Attending Physician to the Tuberculosis Clinics in the Borough of Manhattan. The positions require a minimum attendance of eight hours per week. The Physicians attached to this service receive a compensation of \$600 per annum.

Candidates for these positions will make application in writing to Dr. John S. Billings, Director, Bureau of Infectious Diseases, 149 Centre st., New York City, and will include in their applications, a statement concerning their special qualifications for the position.

ANTI-VACCINATION PROPAGANDA.

It is encouraging to note how scientifically sound a position the various newspapers in this city have taken with reference to the question of smallpox vaccination. That the people of this city are not easily misled, is shown by the prompt and very general response to the Department's recent warning. The following extracts from the daily press are of interest:

"To argue after more than a century's experience that vaccination has not worked great good to the human race is to proclaim one's self not merely a crank but an ignoramus—a conjunction of ailments for which no known remedy exists." (New York World, May 5, 1914.)

"Again the earnest but fatally mistaken anti-vaccinationists are on the rampage, endeavoring to frighten parents from this well established preventive measure which has made a pock-marked face a curiosity, where in former times a smooth face was rare. * * * Is it not criminal to listen to the prejudiced anti-vaccinationists when testimony from unbiased and reliable sources is available?" (New York Sun, May 6, 1914.)

"How absurd is their claim that the motive operating in favor of vaccinating is 'to increase the fees of vaccinating doctors' may be realized by any unprejudiced person who will calculate that the fees from 200 vaccinations would not equal the fee that one case of smallpox would yield. Moreover, the army and navy surgeons of all modern countries have no such incentive. * * * It is criminal to advise teachers and parents against availing themselves of this powerful protective against a loathsome and fatal disease when these facts are considered. These army and navy surgeons and the Post Office Department in London cannot be accused of mercenary motives. Shall the opinion and baseless warning of violently prejudiced individuals, no matter how well meaning, be accepted in contradiction of the thousands of officers, medical and commanding, who would certainly not continue a practice if it were prejudicial in the slightest degree to the persons intrusted to them for the protection of the nation? Ponder upon this fact before refusing to be vaccinated." (Dr. Simon Baruch, in the Evening Sun of May 5, 1914.)

MORE ISOLATION WARDS NEEDED.

The Sanitary Code requires every public hospital and dispensary in The City of New York to provide and maintain a suitable room or rooms for the temporary isolation of persons suffering from infectious diseases.

A survey recently completed by the Department shows that notwithstanding the clear letter and the eminently reasonable character of this section of the Code a considerable number of institutions have failed to make the required provision. The number and distribution of these non-complying institutions is as follows:

The Department is bound to enforce this feature of the Code, and appeals to the managers of institutions as well as to the medical staff of such institutions, to cooperate by making earnest effort promptly to meet the requirements.

JURISDICTION OVER FOOD STORES IN TENEMENT HOUSES.

Numerous instances occur in which insanitary conditions are found in stores selling food-stuffs located in tenement houses. Inquiry having been made as to whether such matters come under the supervision of the Department of Health or the Tenement House Department, we give here a statement regarding the jurisdiction of these departments:

The Department of Health assumes jurisdiction over the store and its appurtenances and issues orders and notices requiring the insanitary conditions to be remedied or abated. Where the correction of an insanitary condition involves an alteration in the permanent construction of a building the matter is referred to the Tenement House Department. The proprietor of a store where food-stuffs are sold is responsible for the sanitary condition of the store and its appurtenances, while the owner of the building is responsible for the structural changes and alterations which involve changes in the realty.

TRAINING OF NURSES.

A correspondent recently asked this Department to state why it was interested in the training of nurses. The Department is interested in the professional training of nurses because the many thousands of nurses who are engaged in the care of the sick in this city and elsewhere are or should be popular and effective teachers of the principles of hygiene; and secondly, because the Department of Health is probably the largest single employer of graduate nurses in the United States.

The total number of nurses employed in the Department of Health is seven hundred and sixty-seven (767), distributed as follows:

The trained nurse is indispensable to modern public health work. Nurses employed in the Department of Health have demonstrated their ability and effectiveness. Unfortunately, the prevailing training school curriculum has not yet been adjusted in such a way as to meet the requirements of public health work. The training which nurses receive in their hospital course is an essential foundation for their work in public health, but the experience of this Department shows that hospital-trained nurses must be given post-graduate instruction to fit them for public health duties. In the Bureau of Child Hygiene a regular course of training has been instituted for the benefit of the nurses employed in that bureau. Moreover, the Director of the Bureau participates in the teaching of post-graduate students in the public health courses at the Teachers' College.

Many excellent women have sought service in the hospitals of the Department of Health, but the supply of hospital nurses is not uniform, either in quality or quantity, and a partial reason is to be found in the fact that the compensation and the opportunities for promotion which are offered do not prove generally attractive.

All of the nurses employed in the Bureau of Child Hygiene and in the Bureau of Infectious Diseases are graduate nurses, registered as such with the Board of Regents of the State of New York. Of the total number of one hundred and ninety-eight nurses employed in the hospital service, one hundred and eighty-seven are graduate nurses and eleven are non-graduates. Almost every State in the Union has contributed its quota of nurses to the hospital bureau and the other bureaus of the Department; besides which, the roster includes the names of graduates of institutions in England, Ireland, Scotland, Canada, Germany, Norway and Denmark.

MEDICINE LABELS IN FOREIGN LANGUAGES.

The cosmopolitan character of the City's population makes it necessary to print many of the publications of the Department in several different languages.

Translations have recently been made of the printed directions accompanying the medicine issued by the Tuberculosis Clinics, and a very large proportion of the medicines now dispensed bear labels giving the instructions for taking in English, Yiddish and Italian.

ADMISSION OF CHILDREN TO SCHOOL.

Through the courtesy of the President of the Board of Education and Dr. William Ettinger, Associate Superintendent, the Registrar of Records has been able to arrange a plan whereby school Principals and heads of Departments will receive applicants for school admission without compelling them to present a certificate of birth. This will do away with the confusion and interference with the business of the Department heretofore occasioned by the appearance at the beginning of the school terms of immense numbers of patients and children seeking birth certificates in order to obtain their children's admission to the public schools. Hereafter the child will be temporarily admitted to school until the Principal has had time to send its name to the Department of Health, with the date of birth, place of birth and names of parents. On receipt of this notice, the Bureau of Records will undertake a search for the record and will send a statement to the Principal within forty-eight hours. If the birth record cannot be found, that fact will be reported to the Principal. If the birth is on record, a card will be forwarded, showing the name of child and date of birth. This card will be attached to the child's school record card, and in case the child is transferred to another school, this card will be given to the child, in order that it may be attached to his or her school record card in the other school. The birth statement will thus accompany the child throughout its school career, and will be given to the child at the termination of its school service, so that, if necessary, it can be used in obtaining an employment certificate.

Anybody who has witnessed the scenes of near pandemonium which have prevailed at the offices of the Assistant Registrars of Manhattan and Brooklyn at the beginning of school terms in past years, will realize what a relief this plan will provide, not only to the Clerks of the Bureau of Records, but also to the applicants themselves.

MORTALITY FOR THE WEEK ENDING MAY 9, 1914.

There were 1,607 deaths and a death rate of 15.01 per 1,000 of the population reported during the past week, as against 1,543 deaths and a rate of 14.98 for the corresponding week of 1913, an absolute increase of 64 deaths and .03 of a point in the rate, equivalent to a relative increase of 3 deaths.

The following causes showed a decreased mortality: Measles, scarlet fever, whooping cough, diarrhoeal diseases under five years of age, other digestive diseases and deaths from violence. The following causes showed an increased mortality: Diphtheria and croup, typhoid fever, cerebro-spinal meningitis, organic heart disease, acute respiratory diseases, Bright's disease and nephritis. The number of deaths reported from pulmonary tuberculosis was the same as in 1913.

Viewed from the point of age grouping there was a decreased mortality of infants under one year of age, and also between one and five years of age. Between five and sixty-five years of age there was an increased mortality, and a considerable increased mortality over sixty-five years of age.

The Borough of Richmond had the highest death rate. The rates for the other boroughs following in this order: Manhattan, Brooklyn, Queens and The Bronx.

The death rate for the first nineteen weeks of 1914 was 15.41 per 1,000 of the population, as against a rate of 15.60 for the corresponding period in 1913, a decrease of .19 of a point.



TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situate thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Council can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
