### JUDICIAL SALARIES.

The following correspondence constitutes portion of the operations of the Law Department for the week ending July 18th, 1873 : CITY OF NEW YORK, DEPARTMENT OF FI-

NANCE, COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, July 14, 1873. To the Counsel to the Corporation :

SIR-I sent you on Saturday an order of the Supreme Court, to show cause why a mandamus should not issue in the matter of salaries of the Judges.

The following provision of law is contained in section 116 of the new charter, chapter 335, laws of 1873:

"It shall not be lawful for any authority of "the City or County of New York to authorize "or pay, and hereafter no judicial officer of said "City or County, or of the Supreme Court, "shall be paid a salary exceeding in the aggre-"gate, together with the salary paid by the State, "the sum of ten thousand dollars per annum. "The salaries of the Judges of the Marine "Courts is hereby fixed at six thousand dollars "each."

By the Supplemental Charter, chapter 757, passed June 13, 1873, the paragraph in which the above question appears is so modified as to exclude it. The view I have taken is that under the provisions of chapter 335, I ought to pay the salaries as therein fixed up to the time of its repeal by the supplemental act.

Will you do me the favor before the return day of the writ, if practicable, to give me your official opinion whether my view of the law is correct, and oblige

LAW DEPARTMENT, OFFICE OF COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION, July 15, 1873. Hon. Andrew H. Green, Comptroller :

SIR-I am in receipt of your letter of the 14th instant, asking my opinion as to the rate at which the salaries of the Justices of the Supreme Court, and of other judicial officers of the city and county of New York, should be paid for the period from April 30, 1873, to June 13, 1873, and calling my attention to chapters 335 and 757 of the laws of 1873.

The question submitted by your letter received my consideration at the time of the passage of the new charter ; and I had no doubt then, and I of the Supreme Court now holding chambers have none now, that the provisions of section and Special Term in this city. His honor Judge 116 were clearly unconstitutional.

Section 14 of the amended Judiciary Article of s and justices h The judge shall receive for their services a compensation to be established by law, which shall not be diminished during their official terms."

Among the judges and justices referred to in said section are the judges of the Superior Court of the city of New York, and of the Court of Common Pleas of the City and county of New York, and the justices of the Supreme Court.

Subsequently to the adoption of the amended judiciary article above cited the salaries of the judges and justices of the three courts above mentioned were fixed by the Board of Supervisors of the county of New York, by a resolution adopted by shid Board May 26, 1870, and approved by the Mayor, May 27, 1870.

See proceedings of the Board of Supervisors for 1870, volume 1, page 384.

This action of the Board of Supervisors was

legalized and confirmed by an act of the Legisof Christopher treet Ferry, N. R. Application lature, passed April 19, 1871, being chapter 573 withdrawn of the laws of that year.

The compensation of the judges and justices, which was thus, in the language of the amendment of the Constitution, "established by law," was for the judges of the Superior Court and the Court of Common Pleas \$15,000 per annum, and for the justices of the Supreme Court, \$17,500 per annum, and such compensation, so established, continued to be and was the lawful compensation of said judges and justices on the 30th day of street, East river. Granted. April, 1873, when Chapter 335, of the Laws of 1873, became a law.

By the last subdivision of section 116 of said chapter it is provided that "it shall not be lawful for any authority of the city or county of New York, to authorize or pay, and hereafter no judicial officer of said city or county, or of the Supreme Court shall be paid a salary exceeding in the aggregate, together with the salary paid by the State, the sum of ten thousand dollars per annum."

Now, if the legislature could lawfully reduce the established compensation of judicial officers from \$17,500 or \$15,000 to \$10,000, the provisions of the constitution can be practically disregarded, and the salaries of the judges be reduced to \$1,000 or even to a merely nominal sum. Such a construction of the constitution would be a fatal blow to the independence of the judiciary, and render it subject to the capricious or inadvertent action of every legislature.

I am strongly inclined to the opinion that the clause in the charter, above quoted, must have been inserted through inadvertence or a misap-

prehension of the provisions of the Constitution. The fact that this clause was repealed by the same legislature that enacted it a few weeks afterwards, tends very strongly to sustain this view of the matter.

It seems to me that the provisions of section 116, above quoted, are in direct conflict with section 14 of the amended judiciary article above cited.

It is not, of course, ordinarily within the province of executive or administrative officers to treat any enactment of the Legislature as unconstitutional. Such officers should, in most cases, maintain the validity of every statute until it is declared void by the authoritative decisions of the courts.

It was therefore, doubtless proper, for you, as the Head of the Finance Department, to treat, the law in question as of binding force until otherwise advised.

But the question having been submitted to me, as the legal adviser of your Department, and my convictions being such that I should do injustice to myself and be wanting in candor toward the court if I attempted to maintain the constitutionality of the law, I deem it my duty to advise you that the law in question is clearly unconstitutional, and that the judges and justices referred to should be paid their salaries for the period named in your letter, at the rate at which they had been and remained established at the time of the passage of the new charter.

A judicial decision of the question could, of course, be obtained from the very eminent justice Daniels, resides in another district, and would be wholly disinterested in the matter. But I the Constitution of this State provides as follows: think it is due to the judiciary of this city that they should receive their hard earned salaries at the rate fixed by law, without being compelled to submit to the delay and annoyance of litigating the matter in the courts.

SANITARY BUREAU, NEW YORK, July 15, 1873. Dr. Stephen Smith, Chairman Sanitary (

SIR: I have the honor to submit the followin report upon the condition of the streets an avenues, compiled from the reports of the inspec

avenues, compiled from the reports of the inspec-tors, for the week ending Saturday, 12th inst. Inspector Judson (1st, 3d, and 5th Wards), re-ports no improvement since last week. He men-tions Liberty and Barclay streets, from Washing-ton to Greenwich, as filthy with old street dirt, moistened and converted into mud by the sprink-

Assistant-Inspector Lockwood (2d and 4th Ward) reports that during the first three days of the week, Water street, Cherry, Roosevelt, Oak, Oliver and James streets were filthy with dirt Oliver and James streets were filthy with dirt and garbage thrown from tenement houses— Catharine, Frankfort, Spruce, and South streets were fifthy with street dirt. During the last three days the streets have been much cleaner, with the exception of Rose street, filthy with dirt and garbage. The whole 4th Ward is cleaned twice a week, the worst streets three times a week, and sometimes four times. Inspector Lockwood recommends that Cherry, Water, James, Oliver, Roosevelt, and Oak streets be swept daily, night and morning, during Water, James, Oliver, Rooseven, and during streets be swept daily, night and morning, during streets where the season. In these streets where the streets wh the warm season. In these streets where the gutter stones are out of grade and repair, collec-tions of stagnant water, thrown from houses, are constantly found. He also recommends that the

constantly found. He also recommends that the stones of the gutters be repaired and graded. Inspector Tracy (6th Ward) reports Walker street dirty with garbage and dirt, from Broad-way to Canal, Elm street, from Canal down, Pearl street, from Broadway to Chatham, Mott street, below Bayard. All the streets in the vicinity of the "Five Points" were filthy with street dirt, slops, and garbage. A model of cleanliness, with a cobble-stone pavement, may be seen at any time at the corner of Baxter and Leonard streets.

Assistant-Inspector Emerson (7th Ward) reports his streets well cleaned with the exceptions of Monroe and Water streets, between Scammel and Jackson.

Assistant-Inspector Hughes (8th Ward) reports Assistant-Inspector Hughes (8th Ward) reports his streets as in a fair condition of cleanliness with the following exceptions—viz., West Hous-ton street, between South 5th avenue and Hud-son street, King street, between Varick and Hudson, Thompson, between Canal and Hous-ton, Sullivan, between Canal and Spring streets, and the whole of Clark street. Inspector Morris (9th and 15th Wards) reports his streets uniformly clean with the exceptions of Greenwich avenue, between Jane and Horatio streets, and West Thirteenth street, between Seventh avenue and Greenwich avenue. Inspector Bryant (10th and 13th Wards) re-

Inspector Bryant (10th and 13th Wards) reports dirt and garbage in Chrystie street, between Broome and Rivington streets, Delancey street, between Ludlow and Essex, Norfolk, between De-Broome and Rivington streets, Delancey street, between Ludlow and Essex, Norfolk, between De-lancey and Broome, Attorney, between Delancey and Broome, Ridge street, between Delancey and Broome, Pitt street, between Delancey and Broome, Willett, between Delancey and Broome, Sheriff street, between Delancey and Broome, Mangin, between Delancey and Broome, Broome street, between Norfolk and Willett streets, Divi-sion street, between Pitt and Ludlow, Hester street, between Norioik and Willett streets, Divi-sion street, between Pitt and Ludlow, Hester street, between Clinton and Orchard, Allen, Ludlow, Eldridge, and Forsyth, and Delancey, between Eldridge and Forsyth are also imper-factly elegend fectly cleaned.

fectly cleaned. Inspector Munde (11th Ward) reports 3d street, between Avenues B and C, full of gar-bage, rubbish, and mud—likewise 10th street, between Avenues C and D, East 9th street, be-tween Avenues C and D, Stanton street, between Pitt and Willett, Goerck street, between Stanton and Houston, 9th street, between Avenues B and C, and 12th street, between Avenues C and Dry Dock street. He recommends that these streets

bock street. He recommends that these streets should be more frequently swept. Assistant Inspector Atwater, (17th Ward) re-ports his streets as in better condition than during the two preceding weeks, with the exception of portions of 3d, 5th, 6th and 11th streets, and the 1st avenue and avenue A.

Assistant Inspector Hamilton, (16th Ward) re-ports his streets clean, excepting 10th avenue between 14th and 15th streets, 17th street between oth and 11th avenues, 11th avenue between 14th and 26th streets, and 25th and 26th streets between ioth and 11th avenues. He complains of the delays of the ash men in removing the garbage and ashes.

Inspector Russel, (18th Ward) reports his Inspector Russel, from ward reports in streets as less cleanly than heretofore. East of 2d avenue the streets always without exception were dirty with collection of ashes and garbage in the gutters and in the innumerable holes and in the gutters and in the innumerator, which de-unequalities of the street pavements, which de-pressions were likewise filled with foeted water, pressions were likewise filled with foeted water. A thorough repair of these streets is essential to their future cleanliness. The Belgian pavements were quite unobjectionable. The following streets presented the most filthy appearance, viz: 21st street for several hundred feet west of 1st streets parts between to avenue and avenue 21st street for several hundred feet west of 1st avenue, 19th street between 1st avenue and avenue A, 15th street between 1st avenue and avenue B between 14th and 17th streets, 18th street be-tween avenue A and B. In East 18th street there was a huge accumulation of ashes and garbage in the street before each of the row of tenement because from 510 to 518 inclusive.

Losses, from 510 to 518 inclusive. Assistant Inspector Walker, (20th Ward) re-ports his streets cleaner than last week, with the

following exceptions, viz; 38th street between 8th and 9th avenue, 36th street between 9th and 10th avenue, 35th street between 9th and 10th avenues, 27th street between 7th and 8th avenue. Inspector Roberts, (21st Ward) reports his streets clean excepting Broadway alley, which is ware 6th w

very filthy. Assistant Inspector Ewing, (lower part of 22d Ward) reports his streets in fair condition, except-

Ward) reports his streets in fair condition, except-ing where the pavement is bad. Assistant Inspector Strong, (upper part of 22d Ward) finds all his paved streets in a creditable condition, excepting 9th avenue between 62d and 63d streets, which contained garbage. Of un-paved streets the following deserve attention, 62d street between 9th and 10th avenues, 63d street between 9th and 10th avenues, 63d street between 9th and 10th avenues, 64th street between 10th and 11th avenues, 10th avenue between 64th and 65th streets, and 65th street 200 feet west of 10th avenue. These all contain garbage which should be removed. Inspector Post, (lower part of 19th Ward) re-ports his streets as cleaner than usual, excepting the unpaved blocks.

Assistant Inspector Fowler, (upper part af 12th Ward) finds all his streets in good condition, ex-cepting 111th street between 2d and 3d avenues. In addition to the above facts, the Inspectors of badly paved districts have made special com-plaints of defective paving, and gutters out of grade, which will be referred to the Department of Public Works. These reports cover the week up to Saturday

of Public Works. These reports cover the week up to Saturday since then I have personally inspected a large number of the worst streets of the city. While this city is comparatively well cleaned, the work of the street-cleaners is not well distri-buted. If their capacity is limited the most work should be done where it is most needed. In thickly populated, ill-paved cobble streets, where the inhabitants are entirely indifferent to Sanitary considerations, and throw their slops and garbage the inhabitants are entirely indifferent to be a straight of the second straight of the second straight behind the sweeper, there is need of daily cleaning-All of which is respectfully submitted, WALTER DE F. SIR-There were 690 deaths reported in this city during the week ending July 12th. In the previous week the actual mortality was 683. This is equal to a yearly death-rate of 35.88 and 35.52 in the successive weeks. In the corresponding week last year there were 1,591 and 1,022 deaths, with 653 and 481 deaths in the respective weeks, charged to diarrhœal maladies. Last week there were 273 deaths by these maladies, and in the week ending the 5th inst., 206. The favoring natural causes by which this year, in the first two weeks of July, the total number of deaths in the city has been 1,240 less than in the corresponding two weeks last year, are worthy of special study. The furnace of this treeless city destroys young children. The parks and highland regions might save thousands that perish in the city during our hot summers.

The death-rate and the causes of death in New York, at this period, correspond with those in Vienna and Rome in Europe. All the large cities of the United States, continue to report a moderate rate of mortality, and in the towns that have suffered in the Southwest, the saving effect of sanitary duty has been very marked.

The decrease of mortality in the public institutions, the comparatively light death-rate among children, and the absence of epidemic diseases in New York justly encourage the utmost thoroughness of sanitary duties by the people generally as well as by sanitary officers. Respectfully submitted

The following compilation of the re-quirements of the Charter with reference to matter to be published and advertised in THE CITY RECORD has been prepared for the convenience of Heads of Departments of the City government.

MATTER TO BE PUBLISHED AND ADVER-TISED IN THE CITY RECORD IN AC-CORDANCE WITH THE PROVISIONS OF CHAPTER 335 OF THE LAWS OF 1873.

SEC. 16. Immediately after the adjournment of each meeting of either board, it shall be the duty of the clerk of such board to prepare a brief abstract, omitting all technical and formal details, of all resolutions and ordinances introduced or of all resolutions and ordinances introduced or passed, and of all recommendations of commit-tees, and of all final proceedings, as well as full copies of all messages from the Mayor and all re-ports of departments or officers. He shall at once transmit the same to the person appointed to supervise the publication of THE CITY RECORD

In all cases the yeas and nays upon the final passage of the resolution or ordinance shall be published.

§ 17. 1. 26. The ordinances of the Common Council shall, as far as practicable, be reduced to a code, and be published as such in THE CITY RECORD.

§ 24. The Mayor shall render to the Board of Aldermen every three months, an account of the expenses and receipts of his office, and therein shall state, in detail, the amounts paid and agreed to be paid by him for salaries to his clerks and subordinates respectively, and the general nature of their duties which shall be published in THE CITY RECORD.

§ 27. The Departments of the City govern-ment shall, once in three months, and at such other times as the Mayor may direct, make to him in such form and under such rules as he may prescribe, reports of the operations and action of the same and each of them, which reports shall be published in THE CITY RECORD.

§ 32. The Comptroller of the City of New York shall appoint and at pleasure remove for cause to be stated in writing and published in THE CITY RECORD, a Deputy Comptroller.

§ 38. The sworn statement of the Corporation Attorney and Public Administrator, with a de-tailed list of costs, commissions, fines and penal-ties collected shall be published in THE CITY RECORD monthly, as furnished.

44. The name, residence and occupation of each applicant for appointment to any position in the Police Department; as well as the name, residence and occupation of each person ap-pointed to any position, shall be published, and such publication shall, in every instance, be made on the Saturday next succeeding such ap-plication or appointment in THE CITY RECORD.

§ 64. All property transmitted to the property clerk of the Police Department shall be adver-tised in THE CITY RECORD for the benefit of all persons interested, and for the information of the public as to the amount and disposition of the property.

§ 65. All property and money that shall re-main in the custody of the property clerk for the period of six months without any lawful claim-ant thereto, shall be sold at public auction, after having been advertised in THE CITY RECORD for a period of ten days.

 $\S$  75. Real or personal property belonging to the city, or city and county shall be duly adver-tised previous to the sale thereof at public auction

tion. § 82. The Health Department is authorized and empowered to add to the "Sanitary Code" from time to time, and shall publish additional provisions for the security of life and health m the City of New York, and therein to distribute appropriate powers and duties to the members and employes of the Board of Health, which shall be published in THE CITY RECORD. § 91. All contracts shall be entered into by the appropriate heads of departments, and shall, except as otherwise provided, be founded on sealed bids or proposals, made in compliance with public notice duly advertised in THE CITY RECORD, said notice to be published at least ten days.

days.

§ 92. All property sold shall be sold at auc tion, after previous public notice.

§ 105. The "Board of Street Opening and Improvement" is authorized and empowered, after laying its proposed action before the Board of Aldermen, and publishing full notice of the same for ten days in THE CITY RECORD, to alter the map or plan of New York City so as to lay out new streets, &c., &c.

§ 106. It shall be the duty of the Commission-ers of Accounts, once in three months, and oftener if they deem it proper, to examine all vouchers and accounts in the offices of the comptroller and and accounts in the offices of the comptroller and chamberlain, and to make and publish in THE CITY RECORD a detailed statement of the financial condition of the city, showing the amount of its fuunded and floating debt, the amount received and expended since the last pre-ceding report, with a classification of the sources of revenue and expenditure, and such other in-formation as they shall deem proper.

§ 108. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller to publish in THE CITY RECORD, two months before the election of charter officers, a full and detailed statement of the receipts and expen- city.

ditures of the corporation during the year ending on the first day of the month in which such pub-lication is made, and the cash balance or sur-plus; and in every such statement the different sources of city revenue, and the amount received from each the several appropriations made, the objects for which the same were made, and the amount of moneys expended under each, the moneys borrowed on the credit of the Cor-poration, the authority under which each loan was made, and the terms on which the same was obtained, shall be clearly and particularly speci-fied. fied.

fied. § 110. In every Department or Board there shall be kept a record of all its transactions, which shall be accessible to the public, and once a week a brief abstract, omitting formal language, shall be made of all transactions, and all con-tracts awarded and entered into for work and material of every description, which abstract shall contain the name or names, and residences by street and number, of the party or parties to the contract, and of their sureties, if any. A copy of such abstract shall be promptly trans-mitted to the person designated to prepare THE CITY RECORD, and shall be published therein. Notice of all appointments and removals from office, and all changes of salaries, shall, in like manner, within one week after they are made, be transmitted to and published in THE CITY RECORD.

§ 111. There shall be inserted in THE CITY RECORD nothing aside from such official matters as are in this act (Chap. 335 Laws of 1873,) expressly authorized.

All advertising required to be done for the city, and all notices required by law or ordinance to be published in corporation papers, shall be inserted, at the public expense, only in THE CITY RECORD, and a publication therein shall be a sufficient compliance with any law or ordinance requiring publication of such matter or notices.

There shall be published in THE CITY RECORD, within the month of January in each year, a list of all subordinates employed in any Department (except laborers), with their salaries, and resi-dences by street numbers, and all changes in such subordinates or salaries shall be sopublished within one week after they are mode within one week after they are made.

such subordinates of salaries shall be so published within one week after they are made. It shall be the duty of all Heads of Depart-ments to furnish to the person appointed to supervise the publication of THE CITY RECORD, everything required to be inserted therein. The said person shall have power to make requisitions in writing upon the Heads of Depart-ments, to furnish the information necessary to make up such list, according to rules pre-scribed by him and approved by the Comptroller; and such information must be supplied by the department within ten days after such requisition. He shall have power to require such information in the same manner, every three months, and all other information in the control of said Heads of Departments necessary to perform his duties under this section. He shall include in his list the number of laborers, designating the department in which they are employed, and, if practicable, the numbers em-ployed in the prosecution of specific work, and the amounts paid to them. He shall also cause to be printed in each issue of said CITY RECORD a separate statement of the hours during which all multic offices in the city are onen for business a separate statement of the hours during which all public offices in the city are open for business, and at which each court regularly opens and adjourns, as well as of the places where such offices are kept, and such courts are held.

The detailed canvass of votes at every elec-tion shall be published at the expense of the city only in THE CITY RECORD.

The Mayor may order the insertion of any official matter or report in THE CITY RECORD.

§ 112. After the provisional estimate is made by the Board of Apportionment, it shall be sub-mitted by said board, with their reasons for it in detail, within ten days, to the Board of Alder-men, whereupon a special meeting of said Board shall be called to consider such estimate, and the same shall simultaneously be published in THE CUTY RECORD. By Alderman Van Schaick— Recognizing the fact that for the purpose of completing the various improvements in the City, already projected and to inaugurate such other plans as the wants of our growing City may demand, it is absolutely necessary to establish a fixed financial policy, such as will not only give confidence to our own citizens, but to the capitalists of all countries, and will enable our metropolis to obtain money on as favorable

the capitalists of all countries, and will enable our metropolis to obtain money on as favorable terms as any other city in the world. Resolved, That the Comptroller of the City of New York, be instructed to take the necessary steps to insure the passage of such laws by the State Legislature as will enable the Finance De-partment to inaugurate the following measures, viz: viz:

First, To issue a consolidated loan of \$150,000 ooo, at, not to exceed five per cent. interest in gold, (at the present legal standard of fineness) payable quarterly, the city to assume all government, personal, or other taxes.

Said loan to be due and payable A. D. 2000, a sufficient amount thereof to be set apart for the payment of the present indebtedness of the

The balance, to be used from time to time as it may be lawfully required. Second, No increase of the debt to be made without giving the citizens an opportunity to vote hereupo

Third, All the property of the city, parks, mar-kets, docks, etc., to be especially pledged to the payment of principal and interest of this consoli-dated loan, no bonds should be sold below par, and any money that may be required for imme-diate or temporary use, until the bonds can be sold at their par value, to be bowrowed by the Comptroller, on revenne or other bonds, not to run over five years, and to bear seven per cent. interest, provided the money cannot be obtained on better terms on better terms.

By Alderman Cooper— Whereas, It has been alleged, and with appar-ent justice, that valuable property and franchises belonging to the city of New York in its corpor-ate capacity, or held by its authorities as custo-dians of the individual rights and privileges of its citizens, have long been, and continue to be, occupied and used for personal advantage and private profit, without any adequate compensaprivate profit, without any adequate compensa-tion therefor or any emolument to the City Treasury, thereby adding materially to the bur-dens necessarily imposed on the people in an in-crease of annual taxation; therefore,

Resolved, That a joint Special Committee of three of each Board, to be known as the "Com-mittee on City Reform," be appointed to inquire and report as early as practicable, and from time to time, on the following questions relating to the municipal rights and interests of the city of New York and of the people thereof, namely,

of New York and of the people thereof, namely, First, What income, if any, has been or is now derived by the city from the use or occupation of the streets, open grounds, wharves, piers and waters, wholly or in part occupied by any railroad or Transportation Company, the terminus or busi-ness station of which is in the City of New York; or by any City Horse Railroad Company or Ferry Company, or any other public or private organi-zation used for public purposes; and whether in any and what cases such income has failed to reach the City Treasury. Second, What income, if any, has been or is now derived by the City for the use of wharves or piers devoted to the loading or unloading of vessels of any kind by means of carts, trucks, or other conveyances, irrespective of the sums paid as wharfage by owners of vessels; this inquiry to have especial reference to all cases in which the city is called on to defray the cost of construc-tion and keeping in repair such wharves or piers, and whether in any and what cases such income has failed to reach the City Treasury. Third, What is the actual income derived by

Income has failed to reach the City Treasury. Third, What is the actual income derived by the City from the use of all public markets, open passages used as public markets, wharves, piers and docks, which remain the property of the City, by whom paid, and what is the rate of annual interest thus received into the City Treasury, and the aggregate value of said property.

Fourth, What income has been, or is now de-fourth, What income has been, or is now de-rived by the city for the use of the paved side-walks of the various streets, alleys, or avenues, walks of the various streets, alleys, or avenues, in front or rear of stores, warehouses or sheds occupied by wholesale merchants dealing in for-eign or domestic commodities, for the purpose of loading or unloading carts, trucks or other con-veyances, to the exclusion of passengers from the sidewalks through said streets, alleys, or ave-nues, and to the interruption and damage of the progress and business transactions of lawful citizens.

citizens. Fifth, Whether in the judgment of the Special Committee, there are any just grounds for the belief prevalent in the community that the per-sonal property and real estate of wealthy citizens, merchants and capitalists, have been either in-tentionally or unintentionally undervalued in the preparation of Assessment lists for taxation, to the manifest injury of other tax-paying citi-zens. zens.

Sixth, In what other modes and ways, if any, Sixth, In what other modes and ways, if any, have the public interests of the City of New York, or its people, sustained loss or damage by the diversion or misappropriation of the rightful income of public property, or the suppression of the legal franchises of its citizens, to swell the profits or diminish the burdens unequally of in-dividual members of the community. Seventh, The said Special Committee is here-by vested with power to subpoena witnesses to take testimony under oath to demand the exhi-bition of books and papers, to employ counsel and such other assistance as may be necessary in the discharge of its duties, and to report by ordi-

and such other assistance as may be necessary in the discharge of its duties, and to report by ordi-nance or otherwise. Which was adopted by the following vote: Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Cooper, Falconer, Flanagan, Kehr, Koch, Lysaght, McCafferty, Morris, Reilly, and Van Schaick—

Negative—Alderman Ottendorfer—I. And the President subsequently appointed Al-dermen Cooper, McCafferty, and Billings as such committee on the part of the Board.
