Report for the Quarter ending June 30, 1877.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS,
No. 36 UNION SQUARE, July 1, 1877.

SIR—Pursuant to section 27, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, I have the honor to submit herewith the quarterly report of this Department for the quarter ending June 30, 1877.

CENTRAL PARK.

The statue of Fitz Greene Halleck, presented to the city by a committee of citizens, was unveiled on May 15.

Licenses for various services on the park were extended and renewed, and certain boys licensed to hold and water horses.

A temporary deer-shed was erected near the arsenal.

Mrs. Johanna Singleton was employed temporarily as lady's maid at \$1.50 per day.

Arrangements were made with Messrs. Dodworth and Grafulla for music on Saturday afternoons during the season, and with Mrs. S. S. Colt to print and distribute on each music day 5,000 programmes.

It was ordered that in the future the park ordinance forbidding military processions in the park be strictly enforced.

A site was designated for the Mazzini bust, and the necessary arrangements for its erection made. "The Green" was opened for base ball, croquet, and as a "common," on the same terms and conditions as last year.

The location of the carriage service waiting-house at the Eighth avenue and Fifty-ninth street entrance was changed to a point midway between the two drives at that entrance.

MUSEUMS OF ART AND NATURAL HISTORY.

Work upon these buildings was progressed during the quarter. Various changes in detail in the plans were made, additional works ordered, and payments allowed contractors on account.

The appropriation of \$30,000 made for the support, etc., of the museums was apportioned as follows, viz.:

To the Museum of Natural History, \$14,000.

To the Museum of Art, \$16,000.

Settees were ordered for the Museum of Natural History.

CITY PARKS, PLACES, BRIDGES, ETC.

Repairs were ordered to King's, Farmer's, and Third Avenue Bridges, and to Central Bridge, at a cost not exceeding \$1,000.

The 4-inch drain-pipe at the Highbridge Park Hotel was replaced with a 6-inch pipe extending to the Harlem river.

Cornelius Sandford, Watchman at Central Bridge, was transferred for duty at Manhattan square. A laborer was detailed for duty at Central Bridge.

The re-flooring of Third Avenue Bridge was ordered; the work to be done by contract.

The completion of Madison square fountain was ordered.

Repairs were ordered to City Hall Park fountain.

Ordinances relating to the government and use of Morningside and Riverside Parks were adopted.

The removal of the house on Riverside avenue, purchased by W. F. Boehm, was ordered.

PARK POLICE FORCE.

New uniforms and regulation helmets were purchased and supplied to the force.

Twenty special Patrolmen were appointed for May 15, the occasion of the unveiling of the Halleck Statue.

The appointment of eight special officers until the 1st day of October was authorized, to be detailed to duty on the parks as required.

TWENTY-THIRD AND TWENTY-FOURTH WARDS.

The balance due Mr. James Everard upon the contract for paving Third avenue, from Westchester avenue to the northerly side of One Hundred and Sixty-third street, was paid him.

Work upon the sewer in Brook avenue was progressed, and additional house connections ordered.

Plans and specifications for a sewer in Third avenue, from One Hundred and Forty-third to One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, and for a sewer in Mott avenue and streets adjacent, were submitted, approved, and the necessary advertisements for proposals ordered.

The railroad tracks on a portion of Boston road were ordered readjusted to conform to the new grade.

A store-room for the use of the Civil and Topographical Engineer was hired at One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Third avenue.

The assessment list for flagging and laying crosswalks on Berrian avenue was transmitted to the Board of Assessors.

A receiving-basin was ordered to be built at the northeast corner of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Lincoln avenue.

New advertisements for proposals for the construction of drains in the Twenty-fourth Ward were ordered, Mr. Jeremiah Crowley, to whom the contract had been awarded, having refused to accept the award and execute the contract.

The employment of H. R. Searing, Steam Engineer; Henry Reiley, Steersman and Watchman, and John Meehan, Night Watchman, upon the steam roller, was continued.

Repairs to the roads, etc., in this district were made from time to time as necessary. The sprinkling of Jerome avenue was continued through the quarter.

SURVEYING, LAYING OUT, ETC., TWENTY-THIRD AND TWENTY-FOURTH WARDS AND NORTH END OF THE ISLAND.

The plans presented to the Board, adopted and ordered filed, during the quarter, were as follows:

1. Laid before the Board.

April 11.—Plan for laying out the Fordham Heights District, bounded on the north by the road leading from Mosholu to Williams Bridge, on the east by Jerome avenue, on the south by Morrisania, on the west by the Harlem river and Broadway.

June 20.—Plan for laying out the Central District, bounded on the north by Woodlawn Cemetery, on the east by Berrian avenue, Fordham avenue, and Third avenue, on the south by One Hundred and Sixty-first street, and on the west by Jerome avenue.

June 20.—Plan for laying out the Hunt's Point District, bounded on the north by One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, the Boston road, and Home street, on the east by the Bronx river, on the south by Long Island Sound, and on the west by the Port Morris Branch Railroad and Third avenue.

May 22.—Plans and specifications for a sewer in Third avenue, from One Hundred and Forty-third to One Hundred and Forty-sixth street.

June 12.—Plans and specifications for sewer in Mott avenue, from One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad, with branches in One Hundred and Thirty-eighth and One Hundred and Forty-fourth streets.

2. Plans Adopted.

April 11.—Plan for laying out the district between Broadway and Riverdale avenue, from Kingsbridge to Yonkers.

May 23.—Plan for laying out the Fordham Heights District.

The proposal of Mr. Jesse Ryder for trap-rock and screenings was rejected, the material proposed to be delivered not being in accordance with the specifications.

Six old horses were sold and eight new ones purchased.

Screened gravel from Kohler's bank was approved as suitable for the park drives and roads.

Twenty copies of the minutes and documents for the year ending April 30, 1877, were ordered bound.

Requisition was made on the Board of City Record for the printing of 500 copies of the Annual Report of the Directory of the Observatory.

The seeds of some rare Chinese plants were presented by Mr. S. W. Williams.

The sale of 900 pounds of unwashed wool was authorized.

The Treasurer was authorized to issue orders to the Metropolitan and Central Gas-light Companies to light the lamps on the Park avenue parks, and on the east side of the Third avenue and Central Bridges for the remainder of the year.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending August 11, 1877:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,402, as follows, viz.: 27 public buildings, 567 tenement-houses, 193 private dwellings, 37 other dwellings, 6 manufactories and workshops, 17 stores and warehouses, 34 stables, 43 slaughter-houses, 1 public sewer, 3 dumps, 3 milk inspections, 1 fat-rendering establishment, 2 bone-houses, 14 sunken and vacant lots, 40 yards, courts, and areas, 43 cellars and basements, 97 waste-pipes and drains, 191 privies and water-closets, 43 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 1 cesspool, 14 violations of the Code, and 19 other nuisances.

The total number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 615.

During the past week 140 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors or investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 105 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

144 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 33 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 33 houses, 33 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Special Corps have disinfected 2,952 privies and water-closets, 437 cellars and basements, 156 yards, courts, and areas, 330 garbage-boxes, and 120 miles of street gutters.

During the week ending August 11, 1877, there were issued from this Bureau 625 burial permits for city deaths, 25 for bodies in transitu, and 44 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 625 deaths, 119 marriages, 508 births, 44 still-births, 25 applications for transit permits, and 59 returns from coroners. There were 44 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 10 transcripts of birth record, 7 of marriage, and 29 of death were issued from this Bureau.

SANITARY BUREAU, August 14, 1877.

To the Commissioners of the Board of Health:

I beg leave to make the following report upon the work performed by the nine Fruit Inspectors appointed by the Board at its meeting July 26, 1877. For convenience sake the city was divided into five districts, as follows, viz.:

1st District—All below Chambers street; Thomas J. Hanley and James McKiever.
2d District—All between Chambers and Canal and Grand streets on the north; John J. Delaney and John Waters, Jr.

3d District—All east of Broadway, north of Grand, and south of Seventy-second street; James Shannon and John Monihan.

4th District—All west of Broadway, north of Canal, and south of Seventy-second street; Dennis Healey.

5th District—All above Seventy-second street; Joseph Hutton and Isaac Halsey.
Thomas Burns, Daniel Daily, and William Barret, with their horses and carts, are doing duty in the Second, Third, and Fifth Districts.

For several days we were unable to obtain permission to place the unwholesome fruit and vegetables condemned and seized upon the dump of the Street Cleaning Department, in consequence of a temporary embarrassment under which that Department labored as regards a dumping ground, and the Inspectors were employed in distributing among the fruit-stores, groceries, commission merchants, and markets, circulars warning these dealers of the approaching inspection, and, through them, the producers in the country.

Since that time the Inspectors doing duty in the Third, Fourth, and Fifth Districts have, in the performance of their duty, visited places as follows, where objectionable fruit and vegetables would be likely to be found, and have made the necessary seizures:

Groceries and fruit stores, 122.

Licensed vendors' wagons, 51.

Fruit stands, 41.

Those operating in the First and Second Districts, among the commission merchants and the markets, have been obliged in some cases to condemn fruit in large quantities, as will be seen by the following list:

Apples—Barrels, 85; baskets, 26; bushels, 14.

Pears—Barrels, 73; baskets, 37; crates, 3.

Watermelons—3,042; barrels, 5; lots, 14.

Muskmelons—Barrels, 74; lots, 2.

Peaches—Crates, 68; baskets, 31.

Egg Plants—Barrels, 14.

Plums—Crates, 6.

Grapes—Baskets, 1.

Cucumbers—Crates, 4.

This branch of the inspection requires the Inspectors sometimes to board vessels late into the night, and they are commonly on hand at 3.30 A. M. to meet the coastwise steamers, sloops, and schooners.

They have been instructed in any doubtful case to give the owner its benefit, and to exercise the greatest possible discretion and delicacy in making seizures, which, however necessary, must occasion considerable pecuniary loss.

I cannot doubt that the destruction of so much unripe or rotten fruit, particularly of melons, which would otherwise have been peddled through the tenement-houses by licensed vendors, has prevented much sickness and saved many lives.

SIR—I have to report that during the week ending August 11th inst., the Special Visiting Corps visited 5,583 houses, 31,277 families, prescribed for 1,038 sick children, and distributed 1,093 excursion tickets for the floating hospital of St. John's Guild.

They also revisited cases previously under treatment, and distributed health tracts and the appropriate advice wherever such attentions have been needed. In addition to these duties, they reported whatever nuisances they found in their several rounds, which have been referred to the District Inspectors for investigation.

ORDINANCE.

CHAPTER XXXIV.—OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

Article I. Of the Districts for Sealing and Inspecting Weights and Measures.

Article II. Of the Sealing and Inspection of Weights and Measures.

Article III. Of the Fees of the Inspectors of Weights and Measures.

Article IV. Of the Fees of the City Sealers of Weights and Measures.

ARTICLE I.

Section 1. All that part of the City of New York lying southerly and westerly of a line running from the East river through the centre of Fulton street to Broadway; thence through the centre of Broadway to Bloomingdale road at Tenth street; thence through the centre of the Bloomingdale road to Union place at Fourteenth street; thence through the centre of Fourteenth street to the Bowery; thence along the easterly side of Union place to the Fourth avenue; and thence through the centre of Fourth avenue to Harlem river, shall be known as the First District for the sealing and inspection of weights and measures; and the Sealer and Inspectors of Weights and Measures who may be appointed for the said First District shall be confined thereto in the performance of their respective duties.

Sec. 2. All the remaining part of the said city not embraced within the limits of the said First District shall be known as the Second District for the sealing and inspection of weights and measures, and the Sealer and Inspectors of Weights and Measures who may be appointed for the said Second District shall be confined thereto in the performance of their respective duties.

ARTICLE II.

Sec. 3. All persons using weights, measures, scale-beams, patent balances, steelyards or any other instrument in weighing or measuring any article intended to be purchased or sold in the City of New York, shall cause the same to be sealed and marked by a City Sealer of Weights and Measures in the said city.

Sec. 4. Any person who shall, in weighing or measuring any article for purchase or sale within the City of New York, use any weight, measure, scale-beam, patent balance, steelyard, or other instrument not sealed and marked as is required by the third section of this chapter, shall forfeit and pay the sum of fifty dollars for each and every offense.

Sec. 5. All weights, measures, scale-beams, patent balances, steelyards, and other instruments for weighing, to be sealed and adjusted by a City Sealer of Weights and Measures in the City of New York, shall be made conformably to the standard of the State, and shall be marked by him with the initials of his name and the year in which the same shall be sealed and marked.

Sec. 6. If any person shall use, in the City of New York, in weighing or measuring as aforesaid, any weight, measure, scale-beam, patent balance, steelyard, or other instrument, which shall not be conformable to such standard, or shall use, in weighing as aforesaid, any scale-beam, patent balance, steelyard, or other instrument, which shall be out of order or incorrect, or which shall not balance, he, she, or they shall forfeit and pay for every such offense the sum of twenty-five dollars.

Sec. 7. It shall be the duty of the Inspector of Weights and Measures, and each is hereby authorized to inspect and examine, at least once in each and every year, and as much oftener as he may think proper, all weights, measures, scale-beams, patent balances, steelyards, and other instruments used in his district in weighing and measuring as aforesaid.

Sec. 8. No person shall refuse to exhibit any weights, measures, scale-beams, patent balances, steelyards, or other instruments to either of said Inspectors, for the purpose of being so inspected and examined, under the penalty of twenty-five dollars for each such offense.

Sec. 9. No person shall in any way or manner obstruct, hinder, or molest any Inspector of Weights and Measures in the performance of his duties, as hereby imposed upon him, under a penalty upon every such person of twenty-five dollars for every such offense.

ARTICLE III.

Sec. 10. The said Inspectors shall be entitled to demand and receive the following fees for inspecting and examining weights, measures, scale-beams, patent balances, steel-yards, and other instruments for weighing used in the City of New York, viz.:

First—For every weight under fourteen pounds, three cents. For every weight over fourteen pounds, five and a half cents.

Second—For every liquid measure, five cents.

Third—For every yard or dry measure, five cents.

Fourth—For every scale weighing less than two hundred and fifty pounds, twenty cents. All platform scales weighing over two hundred and fifty pounds, each fifty cents.

Sec. 11. All weights, measures, scale-beams, patent balances, steelyards, and other instruments used for weighing shall be inspected at the stores and places where the same may be used; but in case they or any of them shall be found not conformable to the standard of this State, they shall be sent by the owner thereof, at his expense, to the office of the City Sealer, for the purpose of being adjusted and sealed, within three days after the owner thereof shall be required so to do, in writing, by the said Inspector, under the penalty of ten dollars for such neglect.

Sec. 12. It shall not be lawful for the said Inspectors to make the aforesaid charges for inspecting and examining weights, measures, scale-beams, patent balances, steelyards, or other instruments used for weighing more than once in each year, unless they shall be found to be not conformable to the said standard.

Sec. 13. It shall be the duty of each of the said Inspectors to make a register of all the weights, measures, scale-beams, patent balances, steelyards, and other instruments used for weighing, inspected by him, in which he shall state the names of the owners of the same, and whether they are conformable to the standard of the State.

Sec. 14. It shall also be the duty of the said Inspectors to report forthwith to the Sealer of Weights and Measures the names of all persons whose weights, measures, scale-beams, patent balances, steelyards, or other instruments used for weighing shall be found to be incorrect.

Sec. 15. It shall be the duty of the said Inspectors of Weights and Measures, once in every three months, to deliver a copy of the register made or kept by them, as mentioned in the thirteenth section of this chapter, during the preceding quarter of the year, to the Clerk of the Common Council.

Sec. 16. It shall be the duty of the Inspectors of Weights and Measures to report forthwith to the Attorney of the Corporation the names and places of business of all persons violating this chapter, and of all persons making use of any fraudulent or unsealed weights or measures, gauge or balances.

Sec. 17. It shall not be lawful for the said Inspectors or Sealer to vend any weights, measures, scale-beams, patent balances, steelyards, or other instruments to be used for weighing, or to offer or expose the same for sale in the City of New York, under the penalty of fifty dollars for every such offense.

ARTICLE IV.

Sec. 18. The said Sealers of Weights and Measures shall be entitled to demand and receive the following fees for their services:

For sealing and marking every scale-beam, patent balance, steelyard, or other instrument used for weighing in the City of New York, twelve and a half cents.

For sealing and marking measures of extension, at the rate of twelve and a half cents per yard, not to exceed fifty cents for any one measure.

For sealing and marking every weight, three cents.

For sealing and marking liquid and dry measures: for every measure under one gallon, three cents; for one gallon and over, twelve and a half cents each.

For sealing and marking every measure of half a bushel, twelve and a half cents; for every measure of two bushels, seventy-five cents; and for every measure of three bushels and over, one dollar.

The said Sealer shall also be entitled to a reasonable compensation for making such weights and measures conform to the standard established by law.

Sec. 19. Whenever any Sealer of Weights and Measures shall resign, be removed from office, or remove from the city, it shall be the duty of the person so resigning, removing, or removed, to deliver at the Mayor's Office all the standard beams, weights, and measures in his possession.
