Commissioner Voorhis offered the following:

Whereas, The Counsel to the Corporation has in person informed the Board of Police that the order of the Supreme Court, staying the proceedings of said Board, and Commissioners of Police in regard to the appointment of any additional Inspector of Election, has been so modified as to enable certain of the Commissioners of the Board, if they so desire, to designate Inspectors of Election to represent Irving Hall, and certain Inspectors of Election to represent the Progressive Labor Party; therefore, in pursuance of such modification, Commissioner Voorhis presented the following certificate:

Whereas, the political party or organization entitled and known as Irving Hall or Democratic organization of the City and County of New York, have heretofore presented and filed a claim for the appointment of an Inspector of Election for each Election District in the City of New York, said claim being based on the fact of the said organization or party having, at the preceding municipal election, cast fifty thousand votes and upwards for not less than two of its candidates, to wit: its candidate for Mayor, and also its candidate for President of the Board of Aldermen; and

Whereas, The Board of Police has determined that said Irving Hall organization is not entitled to one of the four Inspectors of Election first authorized to be appointed for each election district in the City of New York, as provided in section 1850 of chapter 410, Laws of 1882, as amended by chapter 490, Laws of 1887, and of which Inspectors two are required to be of different political faith on State issues from their associates:

Now, therefore, I, John R. Voorhis, Police Commissioner of the City of New York, and a member of the Board of Police of the said city, having been in compliance with the requirements of section 1850 of chapter 410, Laws of 1882, as amended by chapter 490, Laws of 1887, duly designated by the Chairman and Secretary of the said Irving Hall or Democratic organization of the City and County of New York for the purpose of appointment herein made, do hereby appoint and certify that there are appointed by me to be further and additional Inspectors of Election, of the political faith or opinion of said party or organization, and representing the fifty thousand votes and upwards cast at the preceding election as before stated, the persons named in the schedule hereto annexed, one of the said persons to be in and for each election district of the City and County of New York as therein set forth.

Whereas, The Board of Police has determined that said Progressive Labor Party is not entitled to at least one of the four Inspectors of Election first authorized to be appointed for each election district in the City of New York, as provided in section 1850 of chapter 410, Laws of 1882, as amended by chapter 490, Laws of 1887, and of which Inspectors two are required to be of different political faith on State issues from their two associates.

Now, therefore, I, Fitz John Porter, a Police Commissioner of the City of New York and a member of the Board of Police of said city, having been, in compliance with the requirements of section 1850 of chapter 410, Laws of 1882, as amended by chapter 490, Laws of 1887, duly designated and named by the Chairman and Secretary of the said Progressive Labor Party of the City and County of New York, for the purpose of the appointment herein made, do hereby appoint and certify that there are appointed by me to be further and additional Inspectors of Election, of the political faith or opinion of said party or organization, and representing the fifty thousand votes and upwards cast at the preceding election, as before stated, the persons named in the schedule hereto annexed, one of each of said persons to be in and for an election district of the City and County of New York as therein set forth.

Upon reading and filing the foregoing certificate of Commissioner Fitz John Porter of the appointment of the persons named therein as further and additional Inspectors of Election of the political faith or opinion of the Progressive Labor Party,

Resolved, That the persons named in the said schedule be and are hereby appointed Inspectors of Election in the election districts set opposite their names respectively; that said list be ordered on file in the Bureau of Elections, and the chief of the Bureau be directed to issue the necessary notices to said persons and qualify them according to law.

Lost—Commissioners Porter and Voorhis voting aye; Commissioners French and McClave voting no.

Commissioner French for himself and in behalf of Commissioner McClave offered the following:

The undersigned members of the Board of Police of the City of New York do hereby object and protest to the reception or filing of the papers or communications, bearing date of September 30, 1887, and signed John R. Voorhis, Police Commissioner, and Fitz John Porter, Police Commissioner, and we specially object upon the following grounds:

1st. That this Board and the members thereof are under an enjoining or restraining order made by the Hon. Charles H. Van Brunt, Presiding Justice of the Supreme Court, preventing the making of any appointment of Election Inspector whether by the Board or any of its members; that the oral statements of the Counsel to the Corporation that Mr. Justice Patterson of the Supreme Court has orally decided to modify the injunction so as to permit appointments by any other Commissioners is not sufficient evidence of an actual dissolution or modification of such enjoining order, but that some written order of modification should be produced to this Board.

2d. That the names of proposed Inspectors submitted by Commissioner Voorhis with said communication have not in accordance with the practice of this Board been published in the CITY RECORD, as have been published the names submitted in behalf of the Democratic, Republican and United Labor Parties, so that no sufficient scrutiny of such names has been had.

3d. That the said communication of Commissioner Porter is not accompanied by any list of names whatever; that the paper package handed to the Clerk by Commissioner Porter is unopened and has not been examined or in any way acted upon by Commissioner Porter or by the other Commissioners; that Commissioner Porter cannot appoint or designate Inspectors without furnishing their names and without himself acting upon such names.

4th. That in neither of the said communications of Commissioners Voorhis and Porter is there any recital or statement that the party named in the communication has cast at the preceding municipal election fifty thousand votes or upwards; and that neither of the said Commissioners is willing to take the responsibility of deciding or certifying that the party named in his said communication had at such election cast upwards of fifty thousand votes.

5th. That there is already before the Board a sufficient appointment and selection made by Commissioner McClave on the 16th instant, of the additional Inspector provided by the law upon which the Board on that day and since has refused to act; and that until such action of the Board it is improper to receive any further appointment of Inspectors by any Commissioner.

On opening the newspaper package handed by Commissioner Porter to the Clerk at the time of offering his said communication, it is discovered to consist of no list of names, but simply of a series of applications unendorsed and unapproved; that, whereas there are required eight hundred and twelve additional Inspectors for as many polling places in twenty-four Assembly districts in this city, there are only in such package three hundred and thirty-eight applications, assigned or distributed in only twelve Assembly districts, and fifty-six further applications not assigned or distributed to any district; that there is no mention in any of the applications of the Progressive Labor Party or any statement that any applicant is a member of or intends to support or is of the political faith of that Progressive Labor Party.

SIR—In the matter of the appointment of the additional Election Inspectors, we beg to remind you that at the hearing before Mr. Justice Patterson in the Supreme Court to-day, that Justice decided that the pending applications then partially argued before him must be decided upon the facts as they then existed, and that testimony or statements of fact from the Police Board, or its members, would be accepted only so far as they showed a condition of facts then existing in behalf of the United Labor Party. This statement will, we think, be corroborated if you will kindly refer this letter to the Corporation Counsel.

We beg, therefore, to protest against your Board, or any of its members, taking further action, in order that such action may be used before the Court upon the pending applications.

Commissioner French offered the following, which was ordered to be forwarded to the Counsel to the Corporation:

The Hon. MORGAN J. O'BRIEN, Counsel to the Corporation:

SIR—In answer to your communication of to-day, addressed to the undersigned as President of the Board of Police, you will receive a statement of facts upon which, so far as the statement goes, all the members of the Board are agreed:

It is our understanding that the Court upon the pending applications has decided that it will receive information only as to what had happened prior to the filing of the application, and that the Court did not intend to invite further action, either on the part of the Board or on the part of its members as a ground for further action on the part of the Court.

If, however, it be proper to state what occurred at the meeting of the Board of Police yesterday, after your visit to it, and after your oral submission of the Judge's request to the Board, you will find that in addition to the formal tender of two papers to the Board, bearing date yesterday, by Commissioners Voorhis and Porter, the facts are contained in the two protests, one of yesterday and one of to-day, filed by Commissioner McClave and myself.

In answer to the part of your communication which asks in behalf of the Judge our reasons for not acting pursuant to the provisions of the statute, I am only able to say that upon the certificate of Commissioner McClave, of his appointment of Inspectors in behalf of the United Labor Party; second, upon his certificate of his designation by the United Labor Party to act for them; third, upon his certificate that that party had at the last preceding municipal election cast upwards of fifty thousand votes, a motion was regularly made that the Board appoint the Inspectors so appointed by him. That motion was lost, Commissioner McClave and myself voting in the affirmative and Commissioners Porter and Voorhis voting in the negative.

I am unable to state with any certainty the reasons, even if it were proper to do so, which actuated Commissioners Voorhis and Porter in their adverse vote against the formal appointment of Inspectors already appointed pursuant to the statute by Commissioner McClave. There is, so far as I am aware, no inability on the part of the Board or any of its members to construe the law in this matter, nor so far as I am aware has there been any difference as to any question of fact. Neither Commissioner Voorhis nor Commissioner Porter has denied that the party now known as the United Labor Party cast upwards of 50,000 votes at the last preceding municipal election, nor does either Commissioner Voorhis or Commissioner Porter state or claim that either of the parties now known as the Progressive Labor Party and the Irving Hall Democracy cast, either of them, at the last municipal election as much as 50,000 votes.

Commissioner Porter, for himself and in behalf of Commissioner Voorhis, offered the following: In response to the request of the Court, we, the undersigned Commissioners of Police, respectfully present the following statement of facts representing "our side of the case" now before it, and which raised doubts in our minds as to the proper course to be pursued by us in the appointment of an Inspector of Elections to the unrepresented political party "which had 50,000 votes cast for its candidate last year," and which doubts led us to seek advice to guide us in the proper performance of our duty.

1st. At last year's election 50,000 votes were cast by a combination of three political organizations, now known as the Progressive Labor Party, the Irving Hall Party, and the United Labor Party. Each of these organizations now make claim for the appointment of the fifth Inspector of Elections.

The Irving Hall Party has been for years, and long before the Labor Party was in existence, recognized as a part of the great Democratic Party. It is now repudiated by that organization, and is, in a measure, independent of it. It cannot properly be regarded as a part of the Labor Party, although last fall sustained by it.

Each one of these organizations selected a special Commissioner of Police to make the appointment of its Inspectors, and to present its application for recognition by the Board of Police, the first two selecting the undersigned, respectively, Commissioners Porter and Voorhis.

2d. The right of each organization to name its representative Commissioner could not be denied. A refusal to serve might have been misconstrued into an act of injustice caused by partisan or other prejudice. The acceptance of the duty arising from the appointment involved, in our minds, the recognition of a right of citizens and a determination on our part, if possible, to be just and fair to all parties concerned.

3d. Each organization at the time of application presented claims which could not be ignored—

which claims have been more fully laid before the Court by their respective counsel. The Progressive Labor Party claimed that it nominated Mr. George for Mayor, who was accepted by the United Labor Party as its nominee for the same office. The United Labor Party now supports the same gentleman in his candidacy for Secretary of State. The Irving Hall Party endorsed Mr. George for Mayor and nominated a candidate for President of the Board of Aldermen, who received fifty thousand votes and upwards,

Under the respective claims of these organizations, and with the above facts in view, the question naturally arose whether the claim under the law to all the Inspectors pertained to Irving Hall, or whether any one of the other two organizations, and which one, had the right of succession to the divided Labor Party, or whether the Inspectors should be divided among all or between two of them.

4th. Desirous not to violate the law, either directly or by implication, and wishing to be just and fair to each organization and all interested parties, we sought advice for our guidance. Pending this inquiry and up to the end of September the Board had the right to decide the questions and appoint the Inspectors, but the instruction of the Court restrained it from acting, and to the present time the questions are not solved.

5th. Now, as the legal time for appointing the Inspectors has passed, the additional questions arise for our consideration whether there is time before the first day of registration to prepare the necessary certificates and other papers, examine into the qualifications of Inspectors and swear them into office, and whether the Board has the right, even if the present injunction is removed, to act in the case without positive instructions from the Court.

6th. Though, in order to expedite the preparations for the election, the Board of Police called for the filing of the list of Inspectors before the tenth of August, in no case was there any timely response to the call by either of these organizations, nor could the call restrain action, as now claimed for the advantage of the United Labor Party and against the other organizations, as the law limits the selection of the Inspectors to September 30.

7th. It is claimed that, in the hope of harmony and unity of action in the labor organizations, the Progressive Labor Party continued for a time to co-operate with the United Labor Party, but it is notorious that these two organizations are now divided and are independent of each other in their political action, and that in fact they each advocate principles essentially different from each other.

This action delayed the preparation of the list of Inspectors of Election and of the application by the Progressive Labor Party for their appointment by their selected Police Commissioner. There was, however, abundance of time after September 20, when that party notified Commissioner Porter of his appointment to represent it, but the injunction prevented his action, and, moreover, there was no meeting of the Board till September 30, when action was not authorized to be taken upon the papers then laid before it, to enable the Progressive Labor Party to properly prepare and complete its list in case the injunction should be dissolved and a decision in its favor rendered.

The Eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Broadway, Rector street, and Greenwich street.

SIR—There were 677 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, October 1, 1887, which is a decrease of 16, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and the same number as was reported during the corresponding week of the year 1886. The actual mortality for the week ending September 24, 1887, was 692, which is 94.2 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.12 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,492,181.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT the Board of Aldermen, in compliance with the provisions of the Laws of 1887, amending sections 150 and 151 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 1, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through bath, or any other water fixture, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.
