CERTIFICATE of the Commissioner of Public Works, the Counsel to the Corporation, and the Chief Engineer of the CrotonAqueduct, under the act, chapter 648 of the Laws of 1881.

Passed July 16, 1881.

To the Comptroller of the City of New York:

We, Hubert O. Thompson, Commissioner of Public Works, William C. Whitney, Counsel to the Corporation, and Isaac Newton, Chief Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct of the City of New York, acting under and pursuant to the provisions of the act, chapter 648 of the Laws of 1881, entitled "An act in relation to a certain local improvement in the City of New York," passed July 16, 1881, do hereby certify to the Comptroller of the City of New York that our proceedings under the act aforesaid have been as follows, to wit:

First—Upon Saturday, November 12, 1881 we mutually agreed to hold a public meeting upon Monday, November 14, 1881.

Second—Upon Saturday November 12, 1881, we united in the preparation of a notice of such meeting, of which a copy is hereunto annexed, marked "Schedule A." We caused a copy of such notice to be sent to each of the persons whose names appear in the list hereunto annexed, marked "Schedule B."

And we caused a copy of such notice to be printed in the "New York World" and "New York Tribune" and "Sunday Mercury," on Sunday, November 13, 1881, and in the "New York World" and "New York Tribune" and CITY RECORD, on Monday, November 14, 1881.

Third—Upon Monday, November 14, 1881, at twelve o'clock, noon, we all met at the office of the Chief Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct of the City of New York, at 31 Chambers street, in said city, there being then and there present, besides ourselves each and every of the following-named persons, to wit: Charles G. Waterbury, in person and by his counsel; John H. Strahan, Burton N. Harrison, Dexter A. Hawkins, appearing for himself, for John W. Ambrose, and for Hannah E. Brown and John L. Brown, Jr., both of whom also appeared in person; James F. Malcolm, Rufus P. Livermore, for Albert Cardozo, Richard S. Newcombe and the estate of Charles Devlin, deceased, and Francis Lynde Stetson appearing for the city.

Fourth—After hearing Messrs. Strahan, Harrison, Hawkins, and Stetson on behalf of their several clients, the other persons present not expressing any wish to be heard, although invited to make themselves heard if they desired, upon the day aforesaid and upon the 15th day of November, 1881, to which day we took an adjournment at the request of Mr. Strahan, we did proceed to ascertain and determine the work performed on or before July 16, 1881, in, or in connection with the regulating and grading of First avenue, from Ninety-second street to One Hundred and Ninth street, in said city, the proportion thereof performed by the city and the proportion thereof otherwise performed, together with the fair, just, and reasonable value of the work so otherwise found by us to have been performed, with whatever amount of interest we consider in fairness and equity should be paid thereon; and the result of such ascertainment and determination, by us made, is as follows, t

Fifth-We have ascertained and do determine that the total amount of work performed on or before July 16, 1881, in, or in connection with the regulating and grading of First avenue, from Ninety-second to One Hundred and Ninth street, in said city, was and is one hundred and twenty-five (125) lineal feet of culvert and two hundred and eighty thousand three hundred and eighty-two

(280,382) cubic yards of earth filling.

Sixth—We have ascertained and do determine that the proportion of such work performed by the city is and was one hundred and thirty-two thousand and ninety 58–100 (132,090 58–100) cubic yards of earth filling.

Seventh—We have ascertained and do determine that the proportion of such work otherwise performed is and was one hundred and twenty-five lineal feet of culvert and one hundred and forty-

performed is and was one hundred and twenty-five lineal feet of culvert and one hundred and fortyeight thousand two hundred and ninety-one 42-100 (148,291-42-100) cubic yards of earth filling.

Eighth—We have ascertained and do determine that the fair, just and reasonable value of the work
so otherwise found by us to have been performed, was and is five thousand seven hundred and fifty
dollars (\$5,750) for the one hundred and twenty-five (125) lineal feet of culvert, and ninety-six
thousand three hundred and eighty-nine 42-100 (\$96,389.42) dollars for the one hundred and fortyeight thousand two hundred and ninety-one 42-100 cubic yards of earth filling, making in all one
hundred and two thousand one hundred and thirty-nine 42-100 dollars.

Ninth—We have ascertained and do determine and we do consider that in fairness and equity
the amount of seven thousand six hundred and sixty 45-100 (\$7,660.45) dollars, by way of interest
upon the sum mentioned in the eighth paragraph of this our certificate, should be paid thereon and
in addition thereto.

Tenth—We have ascertained and do determine that the aggregate amount hereinbefore ascertained as the fair, just and reasonable value of such work so otherwise performed as aforesaid, together with the interest thereon, is and was one hundred and nine thousand seven hundred and

ninety-nine 87-100 dollars.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending November 12, 1881, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending November 5, 1881.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 617 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 12, 1881, which is a decrease of 56, as compared with the number reported he preceding week, and 12 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1880. The actual mortality for the week ending November 5, 1881, was 627, which is 140.8 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.97 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,255,410.

If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the

thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the

All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing aws.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of the City of New York to give public notice by advertisement

ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT

Section 3 of Chapter 521 of the Laws of 1880, requires that heads of departments shall reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that purpose, as follows, to wit:

"In making the reduction herein required, every head "of department may abolish and consolidate offices and "bureaux, and discharge subordinates in the same "department."

The Comptroller of the City of New York, in pursuance of the duty imposed and the authority thus conferred upon him, hereby orders and directs that the following Bureaux in the Finance Department shall be consolidated, the consolidation thereof to take effect on the first day of January, 1881, viz.:

First—"The Bureau or the Collection of Arsears of Taxes and Assessments and of Water Rents," shall be consolidated as one bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "The Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and of Water Rents," and possess all the power conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both of said bureaux, and the officers thereof, the chief officer of which consolidated bureau shall be called "Collector of Assessments and Clerk of Arrears."

Second—The Bureau for the Collection of the Revenue accruing from rents, and interest on bonds and mortgages, revenue arising from the use or sale of property belonging to or managed by the city," and "the Bureau or Markets," shall be consolidated as one Bureau, and and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "the Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue and of Markets," shall be consolidated Bureau shall be called "Collector of Ofty Revenue and or Markets," and possess all the powers conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said Bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief officer of which said consolidated Bureau shall be called "Collector of City Revenue and Superintendent of Markets," and possess all the powers conferred and perfor
