

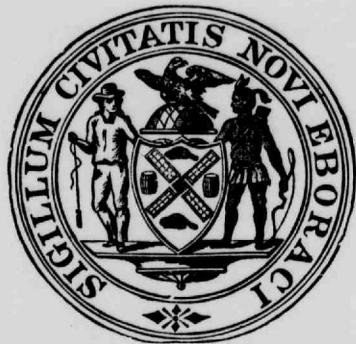

HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 520 births, 45 still-births, 131 marriages, and 604 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, March 15, 1879. This shows an increase of 40 births, 5 still-births, and 49 deaths, and a decrease of 3 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was the same number of births, an increase of 6 still-births, and 121 deaths, and a decrease of 6 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 6; diphtheria, 3; croup, 5; whooping cough, 1; inanition, 2; alcoholism, 1; rheumatism and gout, 2; cancer, 8; bronchitis, 13; meningitis and encephalitis, 3; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; premature and preterm births, 5; surgical operations, 2; while the deaths from measles increased 1; erysipelas, 3; typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 2; malarial fevers, 3; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 19; pneumonia, 17; heart diseases, 2; aneurism, 2; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 6; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 5; apoplexy, 3; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; suicide, 6; and drowning, 2.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 137 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 185 under two years; 259 under five years, and 33 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age were 3 more than the number reported during last week, and represent 42.88 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 105 were in institutions, 295 in tenement-houses, 191 in houses containing 3 families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, 6 in rivers, streets, boats, etc., 5 were on the basement floor, 121 on the first, 170 on the second, 117 on the third, 66 on the fourth, 14 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth. 603 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 1 non-resident; 70 were stated to be single, 160 married, 54 widowed, and the condition of 320 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 604; still-births, 45; bodies in transitu, 17. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 54 were upon certificates received from the coroners. 520 births, 131 marriages, 45 still-births, 604 deaths, 17 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 40 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 1 transcript of the birth record, 9 of marriage, and 31 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending March 15, 1879, was 45.1 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer 29.914, the mean humidity 71, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind 798, and the total amount of rainfall was .02 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the N. Y. Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 583 deaths and still-births, or 89.83 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 10; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 251; City (Pauper burial-ground, undenominational), 81; Greenwood (undenominational), 51; Lutheran (undenominational), 85; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 24; Evergreen (undenominational), 31; Woodlawn (undenominational), 16; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 9; Union (Methodist Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 6; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 4; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 8; Washington (undenominational), 3.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending March 8, 1879, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 8; Second, 1; Third, 1; Fourth, 16; Fifth, 6; Sixth, 4; Seventh, 24; Eighth, 29; Ninth, 24; Tenth, 22; Eleventh, 40; Twelfth, 26; Thirteenth, 22; Fourteenth, 15; Fifteenth, 10; Sixteenth, 17; Seventeenth, 40; Eighteenth, 18; Nineteenth, 109; Twentieth, 35; Twenty-first, 37; Twenty-second, 45; Twenty-third, 11; Twenty-fourth, 2.

The actual mortality for the week ending March 8, 1879, was 562; this is 23 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1878, and 11.4 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.73 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,093,085.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns, of Philadelphia was 17.94; Brooklyn, 19.53; St. Louis, 10.81; Baltimore, 19.94; Boston, 21.99; New Orleans, 21.54; Charleston, 22.30; Erie, 18.57; Lowell, 15.65; Worcester, 20.85; Cambridge, 22.31; Springfield, 19.94. SIR—There were 604 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, March 15, 1879, which is an increase of 49, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 121 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1878. The actual mortality for the week ending March 8, 1879, was 562, which is 11.4 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.73 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,093,085.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 4th day of March, 1879, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional sections to the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same are hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code.

Section 202. Any cattle, meat, birds, fowl, fish, fruits, or vegetables, found by any inspector or officer of this Department in a condition which is, in his opinion, unwholesome or unfit for use as human food, shall, upon the order of the Sanitary Superintendent, be removed from any market, street, or public place, and the owner or person in charge thereof, when so directed by the said inspector or by such order of the Sanitary Superintendent, shall remove, or cause the same to be removed, to the place designated by the Sanitary Superintendent, or to the official dock, and shall not sell, or offer to sell, or dispose of the same, for human food. And when, in the opinion of the Sanitary Superintendent, any such meat, fish, fruits, or vegetables shall be unfit for human food, or any such animal, cattle, sheep, swine, or fowls, by reason of disease, or exposure to contagious disease, shall be unfit for human food, and improper or unfit to remain near other animals or to be kept alive, the Board of Health may direct the same to be destroyed, as dangerous to life and health, and may order any such animals, sheep, swine, or fowls, to be removed by any inspector, police officer, officer, or agent of this Department, and to be killed and taken to the official dock.

Section 203. That hereafter no person shall gather, collect, accumulate, store, expose, carry, or transport in any manner through the streets and public places of this city, or in or to any tenement-house, cellar, or house in said city, any bones, refuse, or offensive material, without a special permit in writing from the Board of Health, in accordance with the conditions and subject to the limitations thereof, and in such manner as not to cause offensive odors or any nuisance whatsoever.
