Hon. WILLIAM L. STRONG, Mayor, New York City:

SIR—Pursuant to section 40, chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and force for the three months ending September 30, 1897.

REPORT.

On the 30th day of September, 1897, the number of members of the force of all grades, including Surgeons and probationary employees, was 4,954. Number of Matrons, 26.

SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received, for the quarter, and the details thereof, are shown in schedule annexed marked "A," from which it will be seen that the sick time lost was 11,704 days; sick time paid, 5,852 days; sick time unpaid, 5,852 days; total, 11,704 days. Total number of days' time of the force was 454,641; per cent. of sick to full time was 2.57; per cent. for preceding quarter was 2.62; amount paid for sick time, \$20,702.28; amount paid for preceding quarter, \$20,113.59; decrease, \$588.69.

APPLICANTS FOR APPOINTMENT.

During the three months ending September 30 there have been no examinations held for applicants for appointment.

ARRESTS.

The total number of persons arrested by the Police force during the quarter was—Males 25,006; females, 4,775; total, 29,781.

Number of arrests during preceding quarter was 27,486.

Number arrested for principal felonies was 1,446; number discharged without trial, 539; number acquitted, 62; number convicted, 250; number sent to other authorities, 30; number died, 5; number pending, 560; total, 1,446.

LOST CHILDREN (see Schedule "B").

Males, 459; females, 260; total, 719. Restored to parents or guardians, 162; brought to Central Office, 557; total, 719. Schedule "B" contains a valuable collection of miscellaneous statistics, to which attention is respectfully called.

NOTE.—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses in felony report and general report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the general report is made up from daily returns from the station-houses, and the felony report is made from the quarterly returns. An offense charged in the station-house at the time the arrest is made is liable to be, and frequently is, changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the Magistrate.

HOUSE OF DETENTION.

The number of persons committed to and detained in the House of Detention for Witnesses during the quarter was: Remaining in House July 1, 1897, 12; committed during July, 17; total, 29; discharged during July, 22. Remaining August 1, 7; committed during August, 18; total, 25; discharged during August, 13. Remaining September 1, 12; committed during September, 7; total, 19; discharged during September, 12. Remaining October 1, 7. The aggregate number of days' detention was 974½ days; number of meals, 2,924, at a cost of 25 cents each, \$731.00. For the names of persons detained and other details see schedule annexed marked "C."

SANITARY COMPANY.

The transactions of the Sanitary Company for the quarter, setting forth the number of steam boilers examined and their condition, and the number of applicants for examination as Engineers, will be found in schedule annexed marked "D."

PROPERTY CLERK'S OFFICE.

The value of lost and stolen property recovered and returned to owners, and other transactions of the Property Clerk's Office, will be found in the schedule annexed marked "E."

FINANCIAL.

The Treasurer has made payments during the quarter to the amounts following:
