

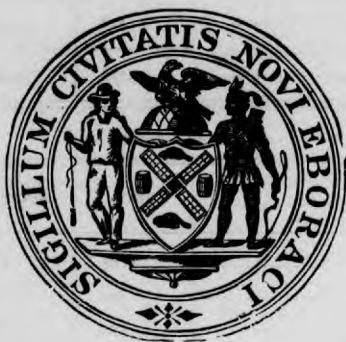

## BELLEVUE HOSPITAL.

MASON WORK FOR THE QUARTER ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 1898.

## JULY.

July 2 to 6—12 feet of flagging in front of Reception Office, repairing and resetting old flagging.

July 7 and 8—4 yards plastering, 1 new ceiling in toilet in Male Training School.

July 9—3 yards plastering, second floor, Male Training School.

July 10 to 18—Pointing and repairing plaster, 4 yards, in laundry; 1 yard plastering in storeroom and cellar and repairing plaster around building; repairing and pointing stoop at Male Training School.

July 19—1 yard plastering in Female Prison and pointing around wall.

July 20 to 23—Washing down gatehouse, pointing and general repairing.

July 24 to 31—Repairing, pointing and coating of walls on Twenty-sixth street with cement and metallic wash, wall 210 feet long; repairing and washing wall on Twenty-eighth street, metallic wash, wall 70 feet long; repairing and pointing wall on First avenue, wall 20 feet long, cement wash; pointing with cement around cells in Alcoholic Ward, 16 rooms.

## AUGUST.

August 1 to 6—Whitewashing walls around main building, whitewashing trees on grounds and repairing elevator in Ward 10.

August 7 to 12—Shoring and jacking up floor of Morgue, putting in 3 new girders, building 6 piers and seawall in Harlem Hospital.

August 13 to 15—Flagging in front of cook-house, building drain and repairing gutter in main entrance to hospital.

August 16—Plastering and painting in Dr. Rice's room; plastering room 2, 1 yard.

August 17 to 23—Tearing out old fire-box and putting in new one in boiler of Municipal Lodging-house, also new bridge wall and general overhauling of boiler in Municipal Lodging-house for Engineer Yates.

August 24 to 26—Plastering in Male and Female Lodging-house, 6 yards and general repairing all around dining-room.

August 27 to 31—Pointing and patching 1 yard in Miss Brennan's room, plastering 5 yards around window jams in Ward 33, patching and plastering in Deputy Superintendent's Room.

## SEPTEMBER.

September 1 to 12—1,400 feet of concrete in Workingmen's Dormitory, flagging and curbing at entrance to Marquand Pavilion, 28 running feet of new flagging, 32 feet new curbing.

September 13 to 25—Plastering 8 yards in Ward 41, and putting up new curbing slips and lathing the same; plastering in Female Dining Room, 1 yard; plastering and general repairs in Ward 26, 2 yards; plastering in Lodging-house all around base, 4 yards; plastering and repairs around range in Department Superintendent Rickard's room, 2 yards; 14 feet of new brick sewer around stable, patching 2 yards in Marquand Pavilion, whitewashing wall in Marquand cellar.

September 26 to 30—260 feet concrete for manure pit at stable, and putting in new brick drain for sewer; plastering and pointing 1 yard in Kitchen of Marquand, whitewashing around clothes house and trees on grounds.

## PLUMBER AND TINSMITH'S REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 1898.

Ward 1—Removed stoppage from water-closet.

Ward 2—Repaired hot water faucet, cold water faucet.

Ward 3—Removed stoppage from water-closet. Repaired 1 faucet.

Ward 4—Cleared out water-closet.

Ward 5—Removed stoppage from water-closet.

Ward 6—Removed stoppage from sink.

Ward 7—Repaired hot water and cold faucet, leak under sink, ice box. Cleared stoppage from sink.

Ward 8—Cleared out water-closet (3 times).

Ward 9—Removed stoppage from water-closet.

Ward 10—Repaired crank at trap in operating-room.

Ward 11—Repaired two faucets, hot water faucet.

Ward 12—Repaired leak at sink, 2 faucets.

Ward 13—Repaired mess pan.

Ward 14—Repaired cistern of water-closet, leak in drain pipe.

Ward 15—Repaired leak in cistern of water-closet.

Ward 16—Removed stoppage from water-closet. Cleared waste pipe at sink (twice).

Ward 17—Repaired gas leak in bath room.

Ward 18—Repaired gas leak in bath room. Cleared out water-closet.

Ward 19—Repaired leak at sink, cistern of water-closet, leak in flush pipe. Removed stoppage from water-closet.

Ward 20—Repaired 2 hot water faucets, water-closet, and soldered small bath tub. Removed stoppage from water-closet.

Ward 21—Repaired hot water faucet. Cleared out water closet.

Ward 22—Repaired 2 faucets and gas leak, 2 hot water faucets, 1 water faucet and gas stove, foot pan. Cleared stoppage in closet.

Ward 23—Repaired leak kitchen sink, gas leak in bath tub, 2 hot water faucets, gas leak in annex. Removed stoppage from sink in annex.

Ward 24—Removed stoppage from water closet. Repaired 2 hot water faucets.

Ward 25—Repaired mess pan and tin boiler, water closet. Cleared out water closet (three times).

Ward 26—Removed stoppage from water closet. Repaired water closet tanks.

Ward 27—Repaired water closet cistern (twice), 2 hot water faucets. Removed stoppage from water closet.



Ward 28—Repaired 2 hot water faucets. Removed stoppage from water closet.  
 Ward 29—Removed stoppage from water closet. Cleared water closet (twice). Repaired hot water faucet.  
 Ward 30—Repaired 2 faucets, drain pipe in bath tub. Removed stoppage from water closet.  
 Ward 31—Removed stoppage from water closet. Repaired 1 faucet in bath-room, 1 gas stove, 2 basin-faucets and cleared out water-closet. Cleared out 2 water-closets and reset them. Relined water-closet cistern with zinc.  
 Ward 32—Repaired 2 faucets, 1 milk-can, water-closet.  
 Ward 33—Removed stoppage from sink. Repaired hot-water faucet.  
 Ward 34—Repaired 2 hot-water faucets, back in ice-box, hot-water faucet and flush-pipe of water-closet, cistern valve, water-closet valve.  
 Ward 35—Put in new piece of pipe and repaired leak in hot-water pipe. Repaired hot-water faucet. Cleared stoppage from sink.  
 Ward 36—Repaired Croton pipe at sink. Removed stoppage from water-closet.  
 Ward 37—Removed stoppage from sink. Repaired mess pan, water-closet tank, cistern of water-closet.  
 Ward 38—Repaired 2 faucets in bath-tub, 2 hot water faucets; hot and cold water faucet, with 7 feet of galvanized pipe. Cleared stoppage from water-closet. Dug up and cleaned sewer pipe.  
 Ward 39—Repaired 7 hot water faucets, 1 cold water faucet.  
 Ward 40—Repaired 2 faucets, leak in ice box, cistern in water-closet, wash basin in Lusk room, cleared out water-closet, covered ice box with zinc, 30 by 20 inches.  
 Ward 41—Repaired leak in water-closet cistern. Put in new plug and chain in bath tub. Cleared stoppage in sink and waste pipe of sink.  
 Ward 43—Removed stoppage from water-closet. Put on gas tip.  
 Cook House—Repaired 20 mess pans, 3 boilers, 5 hot water faucets, 1 dipper, 5 tin boilers, 1 tin pail, 2 faucets and leak of sink, lead trap at sink, and put on sink collar, 7 roast pans, 1 saucepan.

## GOUVERNEUR HOSPITAL.

Repaired leak in wash tub, water-closet, third floor; 2 faucets. Put new gas burner on second floor and set up water-closet, third floor; put in new basin in Operating Room.

## HARLEM HOSPITAL.

Repaired leak in Laundry boiler, water-closet cistern in Isolating Room (twice); removed stoppage from sink, first floor; stoppage from bath-tub on second floor; used 3 old comp. water-cocks, cleared out sewer; removed stoppage from sewer, stoppage from sink, stoppage from water-closet.

## MALE TRAINING SCHOOL.

SIR—Herewith I have the honor to submit my report for the third quarter of the current year. Requisitions for medical supplies have been filled for the undermentioned institutions, viz.:

1st. Regular monthly Medical Requisitions Nos. 7 to 9 for Bellevue Hospital, Bellevue Dispensary, Gouverneur Hospital, Harlem Hospital, Fordham Hospital, City Hospital, Blackwell's Island, Almshouse, Blackwell's Island, Metropolitan Hospital, Blackwell's Island, Randall's Island Hospitals, Workhouse, Blackwell's Island, City Prison (Tombs), Department of Correction.

2d. Special monthly Requisitions for Superintendent Out-door Poor (general use), Photographic Department, Bellevue Hospital, the Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Seventh District Prisons, Department of Correction (general use).

General surgical requisitions (monthly) Nos. 7 to 9 have been filled for the under-mentioned institutions, comprising the following current numbers: Bellevue Hospital, 104 to 115, 124 to 355, 144 to 154; Bellevue Dispensary, 123; Gouverneur Hospital, 116, 136, 155; Harlem Hospital, 117, 137, 156; Fordham Hospital, 138; City Hospital, Blackwell's Island, 118, 119, 139, 140, 157; Almshouse, Blackwell's Island, 120, 141, 158; Metropolitan Hospital, 121, 142, 159; Randall's Island Hospitals, 122, 143, 160.

The manufacture of the usual pharmaceutical and chemical preparations for the institutions has been continued in the Manufacturing Bureau. The quality of the supplies received from contractors has been carefully controlled by examination and, when possible and necessary, by analysis. Analyses were also made for the heads of various institutions, the General Storekeeper and the Supervising Engineer. The daily inspection and periodical analysis of the condensed and cows' milk received by the Department is being kept up without interruption.

Considerable changes have taken place during the last few years in the rate at which certain supplies have been in demand. In a general way, it may be stated that the consumption of all articles used in surgical dressings has largely increased, and is still increasing. At the end of the year I shall submit a statistical account of the consumption of all the more important articles.

Took down and cleaned 180 feet stove-pipe. Renewed 30 feet and 2 elbows. Put in 3 new stove grates. Repaired 18 feet of gutter on main roof, using 12 sheets tin and 5 pounds solder.

*WARD 15 BUILDING.**Carpentry.*

Made new seats 35 feet long in reception room. Placed door on rear stairway. Renewed 2 door knobs and 2 pairs of butts. Repaired bannisters and hand rails and 5 rocking chairs. Fitted 3 keys to locks.

*Painting.*

Washed down, sized and calcimined ceilings of reception room, dining room and hallway. Painted side walls in 2 coats. Wainscoting, doors and window frames painted, grained and varnished. Sashes painted. Refrigerator painted, grained and varnished.

*Plastering.*

Cut out and pointed up cracks in ceilings and sidewalls.

*Plumbing.*

Renewed 4 feet of 6-inch earthen pipe to main sewer. Cleaned 85 feet gas-pipe. Repaired closet and waste pipe.

*Tinsmithing.*

Renewed zinc linings in 2 refrigerators, 20 feet of 4-inch leader pipe and 80 feet of stove-pipe, using ½ sheet zinc, 3 6-inch elbows, 3 4-inch leader hooks. Made repairs to hot water heater.

*Bricklaying.*

Reset 265 square feet flagging.



## PAVILION, WARDS 21 TO 24.

*Carpentry.*

Made and put on new top to dining-room table. Made 1 large box around trap in main waste in cellar, using 25 square feet of 1 1/4-inch pine and 84 square feet 2-inch spruce. Repaired 3 troughs. Put on 3 wardrobe locks and 2 mortise locks. Repaired 11 fanlights. Renewed 8 sashcords.

*Painting.*

Renewed 7 lights glass.

*Plumbing.*

Renewed blow-off pipe from steam boiler, using 60 feet of 1 1/2-inch pipe. Repaired troughs and closet wastes. Put in 1 new globe valve, 1/4 inch.

*Tinsmithing.*

Repaired copper bathtub and wash trough. Repaired wire fence.

## PAVILION, WARDS 25 TO 28.

*Carpentry.*

Made and put on 4 tops on dining tables. Put on strips on bed springs. Made box at trap in main sewer, using 90 square feet 1 1/4-inch pine and 108 square feet spruce, 2-inch by 9-inch. Built 1 recreation pavilion, 12 feet by 15 feet, using 15 spruce joists 3-inch by 4-inch, 440 square feet of old flooring boards. Fitted up same with seats and railings. Repaired 3 chairs, 1 door-knob and 3 locks. Fitted 4 keys.

*Painting.*

Painted recreation pavilion in Venetian red with olive green trimmings. Renewed 9 lights glass.

*Plastering.*

Removed 8 feet loose plaster in side walls and renewed same.

*Plumbing.*

Renewed blow-off pipe from steam boiler in basement, using 70 feet 1 1/2-inch pipe. General repairs to waste-pipes and closets. Repaired earthen pipe, using 1 length 6 inches. Cleared out waste-pipes from bath-tubs.

*Tinsmithing.*

Repaired bottoms of bath-tubs and troughs.

## PAVILIONS A, B AND C BUILDING.

*Carpentry.*

Cut opening 3 feet by 11 feet and cased up same. Made and hung 1 panel door, 2 feet 6 inches by 8 feet, with a 2-foot fanlight at entrance to wash-room. Repaired cupboard and closets, using 17 feet 3/4-inch clear pine; 4 pairs butts 2 1/2-inch. Renewed 4 perforated seats and backs to rockers. Put on 3 new door locks with keys, and 2 wardrobe locks to medicine closets. Refitted 5 keys and renewed 12 sash cords.

*Painting.*

Washed down and painted, in 2 coats, kitchen ceiling and side walls; painted, grained and varnished wainscoting and closets. Washed down, sized and calcimined ceilings of wash-room, reception room, clothes-room and 2 bath-rooms. Painted side walls in 2 coats; wainscoting and all woodwork painted, grained and varnished. Also painted 2 tanks and all pipes, in 2 coats. Material used: White lead, 450 pounds; boiled oil, 7 gallons; dryers, 1 gallon; varnish, 3 gallons; asphaltum, 1 gallon; whiting, 50 pounds; glue, 5 pounds.

*Plastering.*

Removed and replaced 60 square feet of loose plaster in pantry and on second floor, and pointed up cracks in side walls; rebuilt and plastered around door jambs removed.

*Plumbing.*

Run and placed in for hot-water supply 160 feet of pipe, 1-inch, using 12 T's, 1-inch, 6 L's, 1-inch, 6 nipples, 1-inch, 4 unions, 1-inch, 1 stop-cork, 1-inch, 2 globe valves, 1-inch. Removed 3 wash-sinks and 1 bath-tub.

*Tinsmithing.*

Removed 18 feet of 6-inch stove-pipe, covered with zinc a stove platform, using half-sheet zinc, and lined back of wash-tubs with zinc.

## PAVILION F BUILDING.

*Carpentry.*

Laid in cellar for coal 160 square feet of old flooring and 5 spruce joints, 3 feet by 4 feet; also 5 spruce uprights, 4 inches by 6 inches. Made and placed 1 picket gate in cellar.

*Painting.*

Washed down and painted in 2 coats the ceilings and side walls of pantry and toilet-room; painted, grained and varnished wainscoting and all woodwork of same. Painted large recreation pavilion. Materials used: White lead, 160 pounds; boiled oil, 10 gallons; metallic paint, 250 pounds; stain, 1 quart.

*Plastering.*

Removed and replaced 405 square feet loose plaster on second and third floors. Renewed 15 laths. Pointed up cracks in side walls.

*Plumbing.*

Put in 2 3/4-inch faucets and cleaned out 250 feet gas-pipes and waste-pipes.

*Tinsmithing.*

Lined refrigerator, using half-sheet zinc, and repaired bottoms of 3 bath-tubs, using one and one-half sheets zinc. Cleaned out hot water stove. Took down, cleaned out and replaced 300 feet stove pipe, using 3 L's, 6 inches, and 2 grates.

*Bricklaying.*

Excavated 2 areas for cellar ventilation on north side of building, 5 feet deep, 5 feet long, 3 feet wide, and cut opening through 18 feet stone wall. Built up 12-inch wall to level, 130 cubic feet. Materials used: 1,200 red brick, 4 barrels Rosendale cement, and 2 barrels Portland cement. Relaid 98 feet of flagging, using 5 loads of screened sand.

## PAVILION G BUILDING.

*Carpentry.*

Put up partitions in pantries and bath-room, using 700 square feet yellow pine, 1 1/4-inch by 4-inch. Made and set up 2 platforms at entrances 4 feet square, using 45 square feet pine, 1 1/4-inch. Took out window and made doorway, putting in jams and casings and 1 panel door, 2 feet 8 inches by 7 feet, using 18 square feet of pine, 1 1/4-inch. Built 68 feet fence, 4 feet 6 inches high, using 10 posts 3 inches by 6 inches and 7 feet long, 129 pickets, 3/4-inch, 168 feet of 9-inch base board and 372 feet fence rails. Made 2 clothes closets, 7 feet 9 inches high, 2 feet deep. Inclosed 2 door openings, using 92 square feet ceiling boards. Made 4 doors 8 feet high 1 foot 6 inches wide. Made 1 clothes box 9 feet long, 5 feet high, 3 feet wide, using 175 spruce boards. Made 2 dish closets 7 feet long, 1 foot deep, 2 feet 6 inches wide, 2 wash troughs, 18 feet long, 1 foot wide, 10 inches deep; using 76 square feet 2-inch pine. Put up coat and hat racks in clothes closets. Made 2 platforms for stoves, using 72 square feet spruce. Repaired 4 door locks.

*Painting.*

Washed down, sized and calcimined ceilings of building, washed down and painted side walls. Washed down, sized and calcimined ceilings of bath-rooms and clothes rooms and painted side walls in 2 coats; painted, grained and varnished wainscoting, doors and window frames throughout the building; painted 340 square feet of fence. Material used: White lead, 400 pounds; turpentine, 15 gallons; boiled oil, 7 gallons; varnish, 7 gallons; sienna, 15 pounds; chrome yellow, 5 pounds; whiting, 200 pounds; glue, 15 pounds.

*Plastering.*

Cut out cracks and pointed up same in ceilings and side walls, using 20 pounds plaster of paris and 1 barrel sand.

*Plumbing.*

Put in 30 feet of 1/2-inch gas-pipe, 2 bath-tubs and 2 wash troughs; using 1 4-inch trap, 4 2-inch traps, 6 2-inch ferrules, 6 2-inch T's, 6 2-inch bends, 40 feet 2-inch lead pipe, 30 feet iron pipe, 60 feet of 3/4-inch; 4 valves, 12 T's, 3/4-inch; 12 L's, 3/4-inch.

*Tinsmithing.*

Took down and cleaned 85 feet stove-pipe, renewed 35 feet. Made 3 6-inch elbows. Covered stove platforms with zinc, using 4 sheets.

## DORMITORY 2 BUILDING.

*Carpentry.*

Built 1 clothes house, 9 feet square, 7 feet high, using 20 joists, 3 inches by 4 inches, 600 laths, 80 square feet pine. Removed clothes closet flooring and beams. Wainscoted bathroom and hallways, using 580 square feet yellow pine; put up towel-racks, using 75 feet yellow pine.

*Painting.*

Painted in 2 coats clothes house. Washed down, sized and calcimined ceilings of hallways. Washed and painted in 2 coats ceiling of new bathroom; varnished wainscoting and grained and varnished doors and window frames. Painted 480 square feet gable end of building.

*Plastering.*

Lathed and plastered door opening in new bathroom. Removed 73 square feet loose plaster and replaced same. Cut out and pointed up cracks in ceiling and side wall of bathroom.

*Bricklaying.*

Filled and laid stone foundation for floor of bathroom, using 60 loads of ashes and 43 loads of stone. Concreted and laid cement floor, 4 inches thick, 530 square feet, using 15 barrels Portland cement, 23 yards of sand. Built a brick cesspool, 2 feet square and 18 inches deep.

*Plumbing.*

Fitted up in new bathroom 1 Hitching's hot water heater and boiler, 3 wash-basins and 1 bathtub, making all necessary connections. Fitted up 3 showers in bathroom, using 40 feet 1 1/2-inch pipe, 45 feet 1 1/4-inch pipe; 4 valves, 3/4-inch; 2 valves, 1 1/4-inch; 12 T's, 3/4-inch; 12 elbows, 3/4-inch; and 6 nipples, assorted. Made connections from cesspool to main sewer, using 10 feet 4 inches C. I. pipe, 1/4-inch traps, and 2 4-inch bends. Made repairs to closets and bathtubs.

*Tinsmithing.*

Took down and cleaned 60 feet stove pipe and replaced same.

## SCHOOL FOR FEEBLE-MINDED.

*Carpentry.*

Laid new floors in washroom and wainscoted same, using 120 square feet yellow pine. Renewed 180 square feet yellow pine flooring in sewing-room main hall; 22 square feet flooring laid in basement. Repaired picket fence, using 70 pickets and 7 posts. Made and put up 30 feet towel-racks. Repaired 3 closets and 2 doors. Renewed 3 keys to door-locks and 23 sash cords.

*Painting.*

Varnished wainscoting in bath rooms, enameled 4 bath tubs. Painted 285 feet picket fence. Renewed 17 lights glass. Material used: White lead, 35 pounds; turpentine, 7 gallons; boiled oil, 2 gallons, and 2 pounds putty.

*Plastering.*

Removed loose plaster, 72 square feet, and renewed same, using 1 barrel lime 35 pounds plaster paris, 1 yard sand and 16 laths.

*Plumbing.*

Set up bath tub in basement, making necessary supply connections, using 40 feet 3/4-inch pipe, 1 two-inch trap, 2 three-quarter-inch faucets.

*Tinsmithing.*

Repaired gutter on main roof, using 39 sheets tin, 8 pounds solder and 2 pounds tin nails.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S COTTAGE.

*Carpentry.*

Laid 96 square feet yellow pine flooring on veranda. Set 2 ventilating frames, covering same with wire netting.

Repaired scuttle on roof and gutter, 14 by 20 feet, using 15 sheets tin.

## DAY SCHOOLS BUILDING.

*Carpentry.*

Repaired 4 double sashes and renewed 5 sash cords.

*Plastering.*

Repaired ceiling with 15 laths, 30 pounds plaster of paris, 128 square feet fallen plaster.

## OFFICE BUILDING.

*Carpentry.*

Repaired hand-rail and door in main office. Put new lock on door.

## STEWART'S APARTMENTS.

*Plastering.*

Removed loose plaster on second floor and renewed same, 26 square feet.

*Tinsmithing.*

Repaired leak on roof with 3 sheets tin, 14 x 20.

## ICE-HOUSE.

*Carpentry.*

Made run for ice with 3 beams 4 inches by 10 inches and 30 feet long, with 4 side cleats 3 inches by 6 inches and 4 iron straps 1/2-inch by 2 inches. Repaired 40 square feet flooring with 2-inch by 9-inch spruce planks, using 15 pounds nails.

## BOAT-HOUSE.

*Plastering.*

Repaired 20 square feet of loose plaster.

*Tinsmithing.*

Repaired stove in waiting room.

## ENGINE HOUSE.

*Carpentry.*

Repaired closet and put 2 shelves in same, 25 feet 3/4 inches clear pine being used.

## MISCELLANEOUS.

*Carpentry.*

Repaired 13 chairs, 3 benches, 2 whiffle trees and body for wagon. Made 2 oak handles, 5 feet long, for ice picks. Made 2 tail boards for carts, using 14 feet spruce 1 1/4 inches, 4 kegs of nails and 7 gross assorted screws.

*Blacksmithing.*

Repaired 4 carts. Set 3 tires and shod 7 horses. Made 3 nut wrenches for carts, 1 crank for hay cutter, and general small jobbing.



**Masonry.**

Cut stone for cesspool in new bath-room in Dormitory 2, 2 feet 4 inches by 2 feet 4 inches and 10 inches thick, with centre opening for strainer. Cut 6 stones for areas at Pavilion F, 4 feet by 8 inches thick, 10 inches wide and 2 feet 4 inches long. Cut two stones 8 inches thick, 10 inches wide and 5 feet 6 inches long. Trimmed and dressed down 52 feet brown stone steps at east end of school building.

Excavated 3,358 square feet of walk and renewed same on path leading to main office.
