BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX.

IN BOARD OF EXAMINERS, MAY 15, 1900.

The Board of Examiners met this day at 4.30 P. M.

Present—Thomas J. Brady, Commissioner of Buildings for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx (in the chair), and Messrs. Dubla, O'Reilly, Conover, Fryer, McMillan, Moore and O'Conch.

Absent—Mr. Croker.

The minutes of May 8, 1900, were read, and, on motion, approved.

Petitions were then submitted for approval as follows:

Plan 1030, New Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow the 12-inch walls at either side of elevator on the first, second and third stories to be recessed 4 inches, making elevator 4 feet 2 inches in width, instead of 3 feet 6 inches, said walls to be laid in cement mortar, as shown on plans and as stated in petition; south side One Hundred and Thirty-first street, 267 feet 11 inches east of Seventh avenue. Petitioner, Gilbert Robinson. Denied.

Fireproof Shutters—Petition for exemption from fireproof shutters on windows above the first story of rear of building, for reason as stated in petition; Nos. 154 and 156 East Fifty-third street. Petitioner, Simon Herman. Referred to Mr. O'Reilly for examination and report.

Petition for exemption from fireproof shutters on the window opening on the several stories of building, for reason as stated in petition; No. 450 West Thirty-ninth street. Petitioners, Owen Ward's Sons. Referred to Mr. Conover for examination and report.

Petition for exemption from fireproof shutters on windows of the north, west and court openings of the eighteen stories of building, for reason as stated in petition; Nos. 29, 31 and 33 Nassau street. Petitioner, George R. Reed. Referred to Mr. Fryer for examination and report.

Petition to allow iron shutters to be placed on rear, east and west walls for only three stories above the roofs of adjoining buildings, as stated in petition; No. 54 Wall street. Petitioners, Clinenn & Russell. Referred to Mr. Fryer for examination and report.

Petition for exemption from fireproof shutters on windows of the rear walls of No. 436 and windows of gable wall of Nos. 428 and 430 East Tenth street, for reason as stated in petition; Nos. 428, 430 and 436 East Tenth street. Petitioners, W. P. Youngs & Sons. Referred to Mr. O'Reilly for examination and report.

Petition to allow metal box window frames and sashes double hung, and glazed with wire glass 3/4-inch thick to be used on all rear windows, in place of fireproof shutters, as stated in petition; Nos. 152, 154 and 156 West Thirty-sixth street. Petitioner, Francis H. Kimball. Petition granted on recommendation of Mr. O'Reilly.
