Sir—Pursuant to the requirements of section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments submit the following report of the operations and action of the Department for the quarter ending June 30, 1904.

The aggregate assessed valuations of taxable real and personal estate liable to taxation in the five boroughs, constituting The City of New York, for 1904 is \$5,640,542,657—a net increase over 1903 of \$208,125,739.

The total assessed valuation of taxable real estate in The City of New York for 1904 is \$5,015,463,779—a net increase over 1903 of \$263,912,953.

The total assessed valuation of taxable personal property in The City of New York for 1904 is \$625,078,878—a decrease from that of 1903 of \$55,787,214.

The assessed valuation of taxable real estate in the Borough of Manhattan for 1904 is \$3,676,857,411—a net increase over 1903 of \$193,064,029.

The assessed valuation of taxable real estate in the Borough of The Bronx for 1904 is \$261,026,477—a net increase over 1903 of \$13,935,710.

The assessed valuation of taxable real estate in the Borough of Brooklyn for 1904 is \$901,994,957—a net increase over 1903 of \$48,234,600.

The assessed valuation of taxable real estate in the Borough of Queens for 1904 is \$131,379,225—a net increase over 1903 of \$7,597,502.

The assessed valuation of taxable real estate in the Borough of Richmond for 1904 is \$44,205,709—a net increase over 1903 of \$1,081,112.

The assessed valuation of taxable personal property in the Borough of Manhattan for 1904 is \$508,478,655—a decrease from that of 1903 of \$41,364,508.

The assessed valuation of taxable personal property in the Borough of The Bronx for 1904 is \$14,756,953—a decrease of \$5,088 from that of 1903.

The assessed valuation of taxable personal property in the Borough of Brooklyn for 1904 is \$88,573,775—a decrease from that of 1903 of \$11,478,573.

The assessed valuation of taxable personal property in the Borough of Queens for 1904 is \$7,477,425—a decrease from that of 1903 of \$2,609,475.

The assessed valuation of taxable personal property in the Borough of Richmond for 1904 is \$5,792,070—a decrease from that of 1903 of \$239,480.

As the total net increase for 1904 of the assessed valuations of taxable real estate in The City of New York is \$263,912,953, and the total decrease in taxable personal property is \$55,787,214, the net increase in the aggregate assessed valuations of real and personal property for 1904 is \$208,125,739.

The assessed valuations of Special Franchise for 1904, fixed by the State Board of Tax Commissioners, as provided in chapter 712, Laws of 1899, for The City of New York, is \$251,521,450, an increase over 1903 of \$16,337,125.

The assessed valuations of Special Franchise in Manhattan for 1904 is \$189,944,100, an increase over 1903 of \$12,496,400; The Bronx, \$10,791,600, an increase over 1903 of \$1,218,500; Brooklyn, \$43,790,950, an increase over 1903 of \$2,666,250; Queens, \$5,496,600, a decrease from 1903 of \$31,400; Richmond, \$1,498,200, a decrease from 1903 of \$12,625.

## TAXABLE PERSONAL PROPERTY FOR 1904.

The tabulated statement of the assessed valuations of personal property for 1904 show a decrease from 1903 in The City of New York of \$55,787,214.

The aggregate amount held in 1903 was \$680,866,092. The amount for 1904 is \$625,078,878.

By reference to the table, it will be seen that of the total decrease \$41,364,508 is chargeable to Manhattan, \$5,088 to The Bronx, \$11,478,573 to Brooklyn, \$2,609,475 to Queens and \$239,480 to Richmond.

The decrease in resident corporations in Manhattan alone in 1904 was \$42,397,156, and in non-resident corporations, \$1,492,163.

The decrease in estates in Manhattan was \$10,097,282, a total decrease of \$53,986,601.

The personal assessments against individuals in Manhattan shows an increase over 1903 in resident personal, \$8,117,189; non-resident personal, \$4,504,814, a total increase in Manhattan of individual personal assessments of \$12,622,003, leaving the net decrease from 1903, \$41,364,508.

In The Bronx there was a decrease in corporations of \$1,650,000; in estates, of \$296,690, a decrease of \$1,946,770; in individual personal assessments there was an increase of \$1,941,682, leaving a total decrease of \$5,088.

In Brooklyn there was a decrease in resident corporations from that of 1903 of \$15,315,260 and an increase in non-resident corporations of \$260,160. The increase in estates was \$997,420, and the increase in individual personal assessments was \$2,579,107, leaving a total decrease of \$11,478,573.

In Queens the decrease in corporations was \$3,210,654. The increase in estates was \$7,129, and in individual personal assessments \$504,050, leaving a total decrease of \$2,600,475.

In Richmond the decrease in corporations was \$77,730 and the decrease in individual personal assessments, \$205,300. In estates there was an increase of \$43,550, leaving a total decrease of \$239,480.

The above statement shows an increase in assessments of individuals, over 1903, of \$17,441,542. The decrease in the assessment of estates of \$9,345,873 is not an unusual one. The heavy falling off is in corporate assessments, the figures showing a decrease from 1903 of \$63,882,883.

This decrease is more apparent than real, for it represents largely assessments that, if retained on the tax-roll, would never have ripened into a collection of the tax levied. This class of assessments has been carried on the tax-rolls from year to year, but the courts have consistently declared that the basis adopted by the Department to ascertain their value was defective. As their further retention on the rolls would be in the light of a punishment to the City, by incurring

The following communication from the Corporation Counsel will more fully explain the character of the assessments referred to, and the policy adopted by the Department in relation thereto:

Hon. FRANK A. O'DONNEL, President, Department of Taxes and Assessments:

Sir—I have duly received your letter of the 10th instant, submitting the following statement and request for advice:

"For several years past I find from the records of this Department my predecessors assessed the capital of certain public franchise corporations on the market value of their stock when said value was justified by the earning capacity of their capital.

"My attention has been called to the fact that during all the several years when such assessments of said corporations were made in the manner aforesaid, writs were procured and the action of the Tax Commissioners reviewed by the Courts with results unfavorable to the City.

"Having no desire to still further preserve a system of assessment which may eventually be declared by the Court of Appeals to be erroneous, I have deemed it to be my duty to respectfully request you to forward to this Department your opinion upon this important subject of the taxation of public franchise corporations, particularly as to whether, in view of the action of the Courts, the Tax Commissioners would be justified in continuing to assess said class of corporations in the manner referred to, or if it is incumbent upon the Commissioners to assess the actual value of the capital of these several corporations in the same method as is now pursued with the capital of other corporations."

The capital stock of domestic corporations is assessable for local purposes under the provisions of section 12 of the Tax Law. The evident purpose of the law is to assess such capital stock at its actual value, after making the deductions specified in the statute.

There is no provision in section 12 distinguishing "public franchise corporations" from other business corporations, and the object in every case is to reach the taxable property of the corporation and assess it at its full actual or market value.

Since the decision of the Court of Appeals in People ex rel. The Union Trust Company vs. Coleman, 126 N. Y. 433, the words "capital stock" have had a well established meaning and have been held to refer to the property of the company as distinguished from the shares of the stockholders. Although various attempts have been made in later cases to secure modification of the rule announced in the Union Trust Company decision the courts have declined to permit a valuation of capital stock based upon the market value of shares, even when such value was justified by the earning capacity of the corporation. The real subject of inquiry in every case should be the assets of the corporation, real and personal, and when the facts are properly presented and there is no good reason to suspect their verity, assessors are bound by the statements and evidence submitted. If in any instance material and necessary facts tending to show the actual value of the assets of the corporation cannot be ascertained, it may be permissible to consider the market value of the shares and the dividends earned and paid in estimating the value of the capital, but such a test is always unsatisfactory and often entirely misleading. It should never be resorted to unless it is impossible to secure other and better information.

The amendments to the Tax Law introduced by chapter 712 of the Laws of 1899 have given rise to certain questions which so far as they have been considered by the courts have been decided adversely to the City. It seems to have been thought that the provisions of the law making special franchises of corporations real estate and taxable as such have changed the rule previously established by the Court of Appeals and consistently followed since the decision in the case above mentioned. It has been suggested that inasmuch as the special franchises of a corporation are now described and assessable as real estate, it is permitted to local assessors to determine for themselves the value of such special franchise in ascertaining the actual value of capital stock, and to assess such capital stock at its full value after deducting the assessed value of the special franchises and making the other deductions provided by statute. Upon this theory assessments have been made on the basis of the market value of corporate shares, on the dividends earned and on the value of the outstanding bonds. It was supposed that by deducting the assessed value of the special franchises the objection was met that a consideration of the market value of shares necessarily included the value of corporate franchises, which was the subject of separate assessment by the State. The local assessors, however, could obtain no advantage under this system of valuation unless they should find the actual value of the special franchises to be in excess of the value fixed by the State Board of Tax Commissioners under the present provisions of the Tax Law. It must be assumed, however, that the State Board properly performs its duty. Indeed, many judgments have already been entered reducing the assessed valuations of special franchises on the ground that such valuations were disproportionately high as compared with the assessment of real estate generally; and even in the absence of such findings of fact the provisions of the Tax Law relating to special franchises apparently forbid any assessments thereon not made by the State Board.

The attempt to secure a modification of the rule laid down in the Union Trust Company case has been unsuccessful in the Appellate Division of the First and Second Departments, and at Special Term of the Supreme Court in the First Department in the several proceedings argued since the amendments of 1899, and I am satisfied that you would no longer be justified in continuing to assess the so-called public franchise corporations in the manner referred to in your letter.

#### ASSESSMENT AND TAXATION OF BANK SHARES.

Chapter 126 of the Laws of 1902, amending section 24 of chapter 550 of the Laws of 1901, provides for the assessment and taxation of bank shares. The value of each share "shall be ascertained and fixed by adding together the amount of the capital stock, surplus and undivided profits of such bank or banking association and by dividing the result by the number of outstanding shares of such bank or banking association."

It fixes the tax at one per centum upon the value thereof, as ascertained in the manner provided.

No deduction is allowed from the taxable value of the shares on account "of the personal indebtedness of such owners, or for any other reason whatsoever."

It is made the duty of every bank or banking association in The City of New York to collect the tax due upon its shares of stock from the several owners of such shares, and to pay the same to the Receiver of Taxes on or before the 31st day of December in each year. Failure to pay, as provided, renders them liable by way of penalty for the gross amount of the taxes due from all owners of the shares of stock, and for an additional amount of \$100 for every day of delay in the payment of said tax. For the reimbursement of the bank, taxes so paid became a lien upon the shares and upon all property of the several share owners in the hands of the bank.

In The City of New York the statement of bank assessment and the tax thereon, shall be made by the Board of Tax Commissioners of said City on or before the 15th day of December in each year, and by them forthwith mailed to the respective banks and banking associations located in said City, and a certified copy thereof sent to the Receiver of Taxes.

Bank share assessments are not included in the aggregate assessments of real and personal property submitted in this report. The tax due on said shares December 31, 1903, when collected, is turned into the General Fund and becomes available for the expenses of the City.

The total number of banks in The City of New York liable to taxation in 1903 was 113, against 117 in 1902, a decrease of 4. The total number of shares was 1,504,173, against 1,240,854 in 1902, an increase of 263,319 shares.

The total assessed value of shares was \$266,692,116, against \$202,049,656 in 1902, an increase of \$64,642,460.

The total tax imposed was \$2,666,600.17, against \$2,019,650.05 bank share tax imposed in 1902, an increase of \$64,950.12.

SURVEYOR'S OFFICE.

The following is a summary of the work done in the Surveyor's office for the quarter ending June 30, 1904:

Lot Alterations.

Borough of Manhattan—Alterations were made affecting 138 lots in the 37 volumes of the block tax assessment maps.

Borough of The Bronx—Alterations were made affecting 443 lots in the 31 volumes of the block tax assessment maps, and in the 6 volumes of the tentative maps.

Borough of Brooklyn—Alterations were made affecting 882 lots in the 48 volumes of the block tax assessment maps, and in the 35 volumes of tentative maps.

Borough of Queens—Alterations were made affecting 728 lots in the 31 volumes of tentative maps.

Borough of Richmond—Alterations were made affecting 107 lots in the 13 volumes of tentative maps.

The duplicate copies of the tax maps used by the Deputy Commissioners in all the boroughs, the copies of the block tax assessment maps in the offices of the Bureau of Arrears and Water Registrar in the boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, and the maps used in the Borough of Brooklyn for the payment of assessments, where such assessments are paid in installments, were corrected to correspond with the alterations made on the original copies of the tax maps.

The number of volumes of tax maps in the several departments now in actual use for purposes of levying taxes, water rents, assessments and arrears is as follows:

## APPENDIX.

## Recent Decisions.

Transfer Tax—A seat in the New York Stock Exchange is "property" within the meaning of section 242 of the Tax Law, and liable to the Transfer Tax.  
 Matter of Hellman, 174 N. Y., 254.

State and Municipal Tax—The value of a seat in the New York Stock Exchange is capital invested in business in the State, but it is not taxable since the statute does not cover it.

Lemmon vs. Feitner, 167 N. Y., 1.

Supplementary Proceeding to Collect Taxes—Not barred by immaterial error in tax warrant or objection that tax is excessive in amount.  
 Matter of Adler Bros. & Co., 174 N. Y., 287.

Franchise and Succession Taxes—Are taxes upon corporate privileges and the right of succession by an individual not upon property. Property exempt from taxation by federal law may be included in appraisal. No distinction exists between domestic and foreign corporations.

People ex rel. U. S. A.-P. P. Co., vs. Knight, 174 N. Y., 475

Capital of domestic corporations invested in Letters Patent, United States Bonds or copyrights may be appraised for the purpose of ascertaining amount of franchise tax, the same as other property.

Tax not a lien when title passed to City—Where the report of Commissioners in Condemnation Proceedings instituted by The City of New York to acquire certain real estate for municipal purposes, which awarded a certain sum to the owner thereof, "for land and improvements," was confirmed by the Court on December 23, 1897, and the title to the property was taken thereunder by the City on July 6, 1897, the owner is not liable for the taxes levied on the property under an assessment roll in which the property was listed and valued, as of the second Monday of January, 1897, when the assessment roll was not acted upon and confirmed by the municipal authorities until August 24, 1897, one month and sixteen days after the title had passed from the owner to the City; the tax never became a lien upon the land, since when the assessment valuation was made condemnation proceedings were in progress, and by due course of procedure the City became the owner of the property more than six weeks before the assessment was completed, and a tax, whether imposed upon property or upon the person of the owner on account of his ownership of the property, cannot be enforced if, before the tax becomes a lien, the City suspends its power of taxation by taking the property away from the owner through the power of eminent domain.

Franchise Tax. Capital Stock—The meaning of the term "Capital Stock," as used in section 82 of the Corporation Tax Law, imposing a tax on corporations based upon the amount of their capital stock employed within the State, is not the share stock, or, in other words, the paper certificates held by individuals, but in the capital represented by such certificates, and it is that capital employed within this State on which the tax is to be computed.

Bonds of the United States, railroad bonds and bonds of a newspaper company, held by the relator within this State and which were purchased with capital, as distinguished from surplus, are to be treated as part of its capital stock and furnish a basis for taxation.

So also is the stock of a telegraph and cable company, all of whose shares, and substantially all of whose property, except its corporate franchise, had been acquired and were owned by the relator.

Assessment Against a Gas Company—A verified report of its treasurer prevails over inferences of the assessors, where they fail to require an examination of the officers and books of the corporation.

Tax—Certiorari to Review Assessment—The proceedings upon a writ of certiorari to review an assessment are in the nature of a new trial of the questions involved, and it is improper for the court to refuse to consider evidence produced by the relator either on the theory that the relator was concluded by written statements presented by it to the assessors on the original application for a revision of the assessment, or upon the theory that, as a matter of law, the relator could not go beyond those statements or show anything other than what was contained therein.

Bibb Manufacturing Company vs. Wells, 84 App. Div., 330.

Taxation of Domestic Corporations—A corporation organized under the Laws of the State of New York, and having its principal place of business therein, is not taxable in the State of New York on merchandise and materials located at its mills in the State of Pennsylvania.

If the corporation wishes to be relieved from taxation as to property owned by it, but which, in consequence of its being situated and taxable in another state is not taxable in New York, it is bound to make the facts entitling it to the exemption clearly appear to the taxing officers.

Orinoka Mills vs. Barker, 84 App. Div., 469.

Entry of a Corporate Assessment—The entry of an assessment against a corporation in the annual record, kept pursuant to section 892, and its not being entered in the record kept, pursuant to section 893 of the Revised Charter, does not render it void.

Section 892 of the Revised Charter furnishes a complete system for the assessment of all property, real and personal, within the Borough of Manhattan, whether belonging to corporations or individuals.

The record required to be kept by section 893 does not constitute any part of the machinery necessary for the imposition of a valid tax, but is designed for the convenience of corporations and of the Tax Commissioners.

Manhattan Life Insurance Company vs. Wells, 91 App. Div., 44

Tax on Corporations. Scope of the Statutory Writ of Certiorari to Review an Assessment—The statutory writ of certiorari to review the action of Assessors possesses all the functions of the Common-law and Code Writs, and in addition authorizes a rehearing of the question at issue and the introduction of additional proofs bearing thereon.

In the assessment of the capital stock and surplus of a corporation the corporation is entitled to have deducted from the value of its personal property the amount of its debts.

Capital stock, as used in the Tax Law, does not mean share stock, but is limited to the actual money or property paid in and possessed by the corporation. The Assessors have no power to determine the assessable value of a special franchise possessed by a corporation.

The Assessors have the power to examine the officers of a corporation under oath, and require a fuller statement of its assets and debts, even though the corporation has filed its verified statement, but if they neglect to exercise the power, they are not at liberty to disregard the statement as filed.

23d St. Railway Co. vs. Feitner, 92 App. Div., 518.

Tax. Correction of Assessment—The sworn statement of a corporation of its assets and debts, if properly filed, must be accepted as true, when there is nothing to contradict it.

Whenever the action of the Commissioners is challenged they must, in addition to their conclusion, state the evidence on which it is based, to the end that the Court may determine whether the conclusion was arbitrary or fairly drawn from facts established.

The market value of stock, as evidence of the actual value of a corporation's assets, is not a safe basis of value, when the Commissioners do not return how they ascertained the market value. The earnings of a corporation, as appear only from the dividend declared and paid during the year, are not a proper basis of assessment unless it appears that the dividend was paid from the earnings of that particular year.

The franchise of a corporation is not a part of its taxable capital.  
 New York Mutual Gas Light Co. vs. Wells, 42 Misc., 606.

Transitory Business—Where goods of a foreign corporation are sold by an agent in New York on orders approved by the home office, and the goods are delivered to said agent for distribution to the purchasers thereof, payment being made for the same direct to the home office, the agent receiving commissions on said sales, and where no bank account is kept by the corporation in the State of New York, held that the business is only transitory, and as such not liable to taxation in New York.  
 Goetz Silk Mfg. Co. vs. Wells, 42 Misc., 86.

Tax. When its Payment Becomes a Debt—Where a resident of the City and County of New York dies after completion under the Amended Charter of the City (L. 1901, Ch. 466) of the annual record of the assessed valuations of real and personal estate and after the time when application could be made to revise, cancel or correct an assessment, before the Board of Taxes and Assessments has delivered to the Board of Aldermen the assessment rolls and before the amounts of the taxes have been extended thereon, the taxes imposed upon his realty and personalty are debts of his estate, and where his executors pay them in compliance with Code Civil Procedure, section 2719, subdivision 2, they must be allowed a deduction for them upon a transfer tax appraisal of the estate.  
 Matter of Hoffman, 42 Misc., 90.

Residence—The relator taxed for personalty held as trustee, in New York City, and who, though he claimed a residence in Southampton, sojourned in New York City with his mother, from October 1, 1900, until after the second Monday in January, 1901, and voted there in November. Held not entitled to have the assessment for 1901 set aside.

Beers vs. Feitner, 40 Misc., 368; 82 N. Y. Supp., 258.

Bills Receivable. Imported Goods—The principle and reasoning of Yellow Pine Company vs. Barker (23 App. Div., 524; Aff'd 155 N. Y., 665) are authority for the proposition that the credits or bills receivable of the relator are taxable as capital invested in business within the State, within the meaning of section 7 of the Tax Law. They do not become less taxable because they are the proceeds of sales made on imported goods in original packages. This is not a tax on imports, and thus does not contravene Article 1, section 10 of the Federal Constitution. It is not a tax on the sales as such, or on the right to sell goods in the importer's hands while in their original packages.

When these packages have been sold and the proceeds have become part of the assets of a person doing business in this State, the property must be regarded as having lost its distinctive character as an import and mixed with the mass of relator's property.

The writ should be dismissed

Justice Leventritt, "N. Y. Law Journal," June 14, 1904; E. & J. Burke Ltd., vs. Wells.

Actual Situs—Mr. Justice Story, in his commentaries, says: "Although movables are for many purposes to be deemed to have no situs, except that of the domicile of the owner, yet this being but a legal fiction, it yields whenever it is necessary for the purpose of justice that the actual situs of the thing should be examined. A nation within whose territory any personal property is actually situated has entire dominion over it while therein, in point of sovereignty and jurisdiction, as it has over immovable property situated there."

Pullman Car Company vs. Penn., 141 U. S., 18.

When personal property is permanently located within a State for the purpose of ordinary use or sale, then, indeed, it is subject to the laws of the State and to the burdens of taxation, as well as when owned by persons residing out of the State as when owned by persons residing in the State. It has then acquired a situs in the State where it is found.

*Id.*

Interstate Commerce—A cab service maintained by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, to take passengers to and from its terminus in The City of New York, for which the charges are separate from those of other transportation, and wholly for service within the State of New York, is not interstate commerce, and the company is not exempt, on account of being engaged in interstate commerce, from the State privilege tax of carrying on the business of running cabs for hire between points wholly within the State.

Penn. R. R. Co. vs. Knight, 192 U. S., 21.

Imported Goods. Foreign and State—In a constitutional sense "imports" embrace only goods brought from a foreign country, and do not include merchandise shipped from one State to another. The several States are not, therefore, controlled as to such merchandise by constitutional prohibitions against the taxation of imports, and goods brought from another State, and not from a foreign country, are subject to State taxation after reaching their destination, and while held in the State for sale.

Goods brought in original packages from another State, after they have arrived at their destination and are at rest within the State, and are enjoying the protection which the laws of the State afford, may, without violating the commerce clause of the Constitution, be taxed without distinction like other property within the State, although at the time they are stored at a distributing point from which they are subsequently to be delivered in the same packages, through the storage company, to purchasers in various States.

Where the levy of a merchant's privilege tax violates no federal right, the mere determination of who are merchants within the State law involves no federal question. The construction of the State law is conclusive, and if it embraces all persons doing a like business there is no discrimination.

American Steel & Wire Co. vs. Speed, 192 U. S., 500.

Imported Goods—The States have no power to tax directly, or by license upon the importer, goods imported from foreign countries or other States while in their original packages, or before they have become commingled with the general property of the State, and lost their distinctive character as imports.

In cases not arising under the police power, where an article is made in one State and shipped in its original package in pursuance of an order to a person in another State, to be delivered on payment of the agreed price, the sale is actually made in the former State, and the seller cannot, by reason of the delivery of the article and passing of the title of the property in the latter State, be subjected to a license tax imposed by it on persons engaged in the sale of similar articles within that State.

Norfolk & West. Ry. Co. vs. Sims, 191 U. S., 441.

Taxation of Bank Shares—This Court will follow the ruling of the highest Court of a State when it has held that a State Statute does not violate the Constitution of that State.

While a State may only tax shares of a National Bank in accordance with the Federal Statute, a State Law which does not give the shareholders the benefit of all deductions to which they are entitled, is not necessarily void altogether, but may be ascertained as to the amount properly taxable.

The mere lack of a provision in a tax law for notice does not take away the jurisdiction of the taxing officer to make an assessment under any circumstances. If the tax could be imposed for a certain amount it is not void, but at most voidable for the illegal amount, if any.

Where the amount of the tax which shareholders should pay if all the deductions they claimed were allowed, is ascertainable, neither they, nor the bank itself on their behalf, can maintain an action in equity to restrain the collection of the entire tax. They should, under the rule that he who seeks the interposition of a Court in equity must himself do equity, first offer to pay that part of the tax which, under their contention, is not illegal.

Whereas, The steamboat "Franklin Edson," especially constructed for the use of the Department of Health, has been in the service of transporting patients affected with contagious diseases to and from the contagious disease hospitals of this Department continuously since May, 1885, and by reason of such continuous service has deteriorated to such an extent as to be unfit for further service, according to the report of the Engineer-in-Chief of the Department of Docks and Ferries of a recent survey of same; and

Whereas, In addition to the steamboats for the transportation of patients affected with contagious diseases already required, the needs of the contagious disease hospital known as Riverside Hospital, located as it is on North Brother Island in the East river, are such that the services of a suitable launch for the use of the physicians, nurses and other employees of said hospital and the transportation of the parents, relatives and friends of patients at said hospital are also required; therefore be it

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901, the Board of Aldermen be and is hereby respectfully petitioned to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of ninety-two thousand dollars (\$92,000) for the purpose of defraying the necessary expenses required to be incurred by the Board of Health in providing proper means for the transportation of patients affected with contagious diseases from the boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond to the Riverside Hospital of the Department of Health, situated on North Brother Island in the East river, Borough of The Bronx, and in the purchase of a launch for the use of the physicians, nurses and other employees of said hospital and for the transportation of the parents, relatives and friends of patients in same, as follows:
