DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

REPORT FOR WEEK ENDING AUGUST 29, 1914.

ABOLISHING RABIES, OR THE JOYS AND SORROWS OF A COMMISSIONER OF HEALTH.

Some weeks ago, owing to the prevalence of rabies in certain sections of the City, and recognizing the inadequacy of existing municipal ordinances bearing on the subject, the Committee on Infectious Diseases of the Advisory Council of the Department, recommended the adoption of an amendment to the Sanitary Code, requiring that all dogs which appear on public highways and in public parks or places, should be muzzled. The proposed ordinance was adopted at a meeting of the Board of Health held on July 28th, 1914.

In view of the drastic character of the new law, the Department decided, in fairness to dog owners, to give them ample time to adjust themselves to its requirements. Through the public press, announcement was made that individuals would not be prosecuted for failure to comply with the muzzling ordinance until September 15th.

Since the adoption of the muzzling ordinance, the Department has been flooded with letters from interested citizens, an overwhelming majority of whom have commended the action of the Department, while a few, holding contrary views, have expressed themselves in opposition. Extracts from the letters received are here presented, showing the divergent views of citizens. It will be noticed that the antediluvian Ostrich Party, whose platform declares that there is no such thing as rabies, still has a few scattering supporters.

"Your recent order that all dogs, whether in leash or not, in the public streets, public buildings, apartment houses, etc., must be muzzled, is certainly a step in the right direction and worthy of the highest commendation by all fair-minded citizens of this great City.

"I write to thank you most cordially for the statement you have made in reference to the appalling dog nuisance. I have paid over to this City, in cash, for taxes and assessments, more than \$500,000. I refer to this fact merely to indicate that I am personally entitled to some consideration. On two occasions I have had my clothes torn by stray dogs, howling, snapping and biting at me, both of these in upper Manhattan. I should hate to lose my life from the bite of a mad dog in a city which in so many ways, conditions and regulations leads all the great cities of the world.

"At last we have some one in power with courage enough and common sense backed by intelligence to try to remove dogs from New York. Why should we stand all this barking, smell, howling, etc., besides danger to health and morals is more than I could ever comprehend. Please continue on those lines.

"Thanks for your pronouncement against dogs in the city. I can see no excuse for the abominable nuisance, not to speak of the danger involved in it.

"I am glad you have the courage to come out frankly and say you would rather see dogs banished from our city than human life jeopardized on every side. Rabies is one of the most horrible diseases and the sufferings it causes are awful. The owners of dogs are seldom bitten, compared with their neighbors or children who cannot protect themselves, and citizens at large who do not

own dogs and seem to have no rights against the owners of the dogs, and I understand have to be bitten once before they can even claim the dogs are vicious. Owners of dogs in large cities get little pleasure out of them, and the dogs themselves are, for the greater part, miserable, being cooped up and suffering from lack of exercise.

"I agree with you that all homeless dogs in the streets should be destroyed, but when you say that dogs are filthy, you do not know what you are talking about. Don't forget that a dog is a man's best friend, and ever faithful and a protection. How long would you last in the late Mayor Gaynor's cabinet? We all worked for you to be made Commissioner and did not expect to see you act so inhuman.

"How long is the 'dog plague' of New York to last? The muzzle law is a joke, as the streets are overrun with dogs not only without muzzles but without a leash. Surely the street car company should bar dogs. Please do it. If women must carry their dogs with them, let them take a cab.

"Apropos of your war on stray dogs. Why not make the campaign short and certain by enlisting the aid of the army of small boys. Make an offer of a dime a dog for all animals picked up at large and brought to certain stations. The lads will do the rest.

"Dogs are undoubtedly a nuisance and a menace to health in any city. The block on which I live seems to be infested with an abnormal number of the pests. The walks on both sides of 11th street between Fifth and Sixth avenues are always polluted by these animals so that we must pick our way along. If the nuisance were confined to the pavements it would be bad enough, on the walks it is disgraceful.

"You cannot imagine how pleased I am to read about your crusade against dogs. They are a menace to health. Why not have your men go around to all apartments and compel landlords and tenants to clear the dogs out of their apartments. This would be the best way to clean up this city.

"Long may you live and prosper for the good works you have begun to eliminate the danger of rabies. I am fond of animals, but consider the welfare of humanity of more vital importance.

"I am very glad you have issued an order muzzling all dogs in public places during the entire year. This is something that no previous Commissioner had the nerve to do, and it is a safe guess that ninety-five per cent. of the people of this great city approve of your humane action.

"I read with great satisfaction in the paper this morning your statement in regard to the keeping of dogs in the City of New York. It is a singular thing that many of the ladies who concern themselves so greatly over the safety and protection of animals fail to realize the cruelty of keeping large dogs in a city. Entirely aside from this aspect of the case, I know of no good reason why dogs should be allowed to exercise privileges in the streets and on the pavements of New York which have long since been renounced by mankind in civilized communities. Cows, goats and pigs, which formerly roamed the streets of this city at will, have been driven out for sanitary reasons by the advancement of civilization, and we are in a fair way to get rid of horses with their contaminating filth and the flies which breed therein. I therefore congratulate you on inaugurating what I believe is a most necessary, and possibly popular, movement to put an end to a filthy practice and a public nuisance.

"Just a line of appreciation for the good work you are doing regarding the dog nuisance of this city.

"It gives me great pleasure to thank you from my heart for attempting to carry on this hard and noble task of getting rid of these dogs. I wish you could have the power of getting rid of dogs in flat homes. Many a mother will be glad to know her children will be safe on the streets hereafter."

"Apparently a number of our city folks have become indignant over the plan of not permitting unmuzzled dogs upon the streets. I cannot see that the muzzling of these animals will in any way torture or injure them, but it will on the other hand serve as a precaution against possible injury to little children. I have no dislike for dogs or any other animal, but my love for little children and my consideration of human beings is greater than for dogs."

"F. CAMPION."

"As bearing greatly on the health of the City of New York, and the comfort of its inhabitants, which you have so much at heart, may I be permitted to suggest that dogs be banished absolutely from all thoroughfares and public places? We have ordinances now, I believe, that make it a misdemeanor to expectorate on the sidewalk. The dogs which are generally permitted to run at large are an infinitely worse and more annoying nuisance."

A. HECKSCHER.

"Why maintain the Pasteur Institute? Why pay vast sums to specialists to study the germ of rabies? Put the dog like any other dangerous animal in the Zoological Garden and thus save the lives and health of our people, and stamp out forever the horror of hydrophobia. I have lavished love upon dogs, like many others, but am not blinded to the danger of the stray dog who lives upon decayed and germ covered garbage. Some of us will live to look back with horror upon the barbaric time when so many lives were sacrificed by the useless keeping of dogs."

MRS. ERRINGTON.

"I really pity anyone who has never known the true love and friendship of a dog. You have unduly caused a law to go into effect that is absolutely cruel and will do no good in stamping out so-called rabies. Lots of dogs are driven to bite by children teasing and hurting them. Would you not want to bite if you were tantalized as I have seen them by the children you want to protect? The meanest little devils are these same children who do everything mean to animals and then expect them to stand still and bear it."

MRS. M. D. PAUL.

"Dogs and cats seem to me a nuisance in the city and a menace to safety and comfort. I have often wondered why a civilized city should permit dogs to run at large and to use the sidewalks as a place for depositing their excrement. I remember being in Constantinople many years ago and at that time one could not walk the streets, without being offended by the sight and smell of the dogs. New York will be hardly behind if we continue to allow dogs to run anywhere."

"W. H. PARSONS."

"It was with considerable satisfaction that I read the enclosed editorial in the Evening Journal regarding your efforts to dispose of the apartment house dog nuisance in this city. If you are successful you will deserve the gratitude of thousands who are kept uneasy on account of this disgraceful condition. I am very fond of dogs, having been brought up in the country, where we had dogs and cats on a farm of 132 acres, but I could not be induced to keep an animal in the city for three reasons: From the standpoint of health, danger, and also because I believe in setting an example."

L. E. FISCHER.

"Accept my congratulation and best wishes for the success of your efforts. Some four years ago my little daughter, four years old, was bitten in the forehead by a stray dog. If there are people who believe that canine pets have a place in the social life of a city like this, they should have a settlement set apart for them, where they and the other dogs could live in peace and enjoy the Rabalaisian delights which they now inflict on others."

"M. JOSEPH McCLOSKEY."

"I agree with you that dogs have become a nuisance in straying through the city at will. Some of the sidewalks are in a horrible condition; besides, there is the constant fear of the average dog which is allowed to run about."

"ROBERT J. MASBACH."

"Thanks for your sane view of the situation. Surely all the dogs in dogdom are not worth a single human. Then the side issues—the constant yelping of cur 'pets' in back yards, and the fouling of courtyards, fences and walks by the excrement of your neighbors' dogs. If a referendum could be submitted to the voters on this subject, a 'no-dog' measure would be carried by an overwhelming majority."

A. COCHRAN.

"Your remarks about dogs are immense. But there are by far more dangerous dogs walking around on two legs. They not only bite one, but a whole community. But money is honored, not anything else; therefore such may roam at large, bite, murder, etc., at will."

CITIZEN."

"You say that you are a lover of dogs, but, if that were so, you could not take the stringent measures against them that you are advocating. I have a collie dog, eight years old, which we have owned since puppyhood. He has never been muzzled or leashed, except in parks, where dogs are restricted. He is a well-behaved dog, noticing no one unless they notice him. He is allowed to run and play at times, as necessary to his health. Now, what do you suppose would be the effect of muzzling and leashing such a dog, after years of freedom? I really would prefer him dead, but, as that is what you appear to desire, I guess my feelings, or that of other dog owners, will not be considered."

"J. HARRIS."

"Last night two unmuzzled, unleashed bulldogs tore my clothes at 116th street and Broadway. Don't you think it is a fitting season and time to really rid the city of that dread scourge, rabies?"

H. A. WELLES.

"Now you have issued the second threatening order against the—here in Greater New York—murderous, raging dog—hordes of more than 300,000!!! With what result? Nothing. The scandalous and very Constantinople-like circumstances not only return, but are growing more terrible from year to year; more stray dogs, more bitten children, more patients in the Pasteur institutes and more desperate parents who deplore the murder of their innocent darlings."

"WILLIAM DOONEY."

"Nearly three years ago my little son, five years old, was coasting on a hill in our neighborhood, Morris Heights, 177th street and Cedar avenue, when, entirely without provocation, a little fox terrier sprang at him and threw him in the snow, and, at each attempt he made to rise, biting him viciously about the face, hands, ears and arm. It was with great difficulty that the animal was at last driven off by a man with a shovel. It was the well cared for pet of one of our neighbors—not a stray dog. It was one year before the little fellow recovered his nerve."

MRS. ALMA COLSON.

"Of all the laudable ordinances passed during your successful short tenure of office, none will be more appreciated than the muzzling ordinance."

"A. POLLACK."

"It is with a keen sense of relief that I read that you intend to compel all dog owners to muzzle their dogs, for I know what it is to come home from a hard day's work, and within a few doors of my residence to be attacked by a neighbor's bull dog and compelled either to run out into the middle of street or up the block to avoid being bitten. I sincerely hope you will keep up your crusade."

FRED DIEHM.

"I want to endorse the demand for a law against dogs in apartment houses and residences."

HARRY A. STONE.

"In bringing about the muzzling of all dogs in public places, you and your associates deserve the thanks of the community. You have succeeded in pushing forward a big idea. The great wonder is that a matter of such tremendous importance should have been regarded with such continued indifference up to now. I'm sure all thoughtful men appreciate what you have done and you will have the satisfaction of knowing that a great decrease in the death rate of New York will be due to the intelligent efforts of your department."

"MAX JAEDIKER."

"I see you are to take up the question of ridding the city of dogs. I thank you very much for this, and hope you may stick to it, and let none swerve you from your purpose."

HENRY P. MOTT."

"Of what use are dogs in the city? Perhaps of no more good than to be at least one true friend to mankind, and that is more than one can say of the majority of the human animal, male or female. There is more harm than good done by muzzling a dog, and the only animal which should be muzzled or put on a leash is the animal called Man. A CITIZEN OF THE FREE COUNTRY."

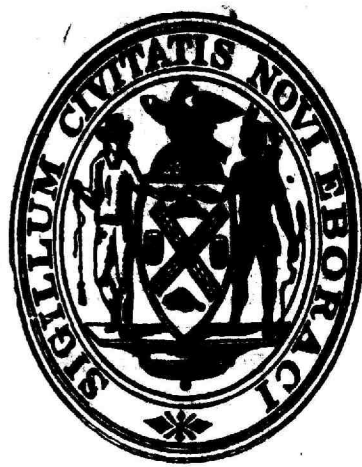

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Holmes Electric Protective Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of the City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of the City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This Contract, made, and executed in duplicate, this day of September, 1914, by and between THE CITY OF NEW YORK (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the HOLMES ELECTRIC PROTECTIVE COMPANY, a domestic corporation of the State of New York (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, WITNESSETH:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

SECTION 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other electrical conductors under the streets and avenues within the Borough of Manhattan and to lay, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other electrical conductors and the necessary conduits for the same under the streets and avenues within the Borough of Brooklyn for the purpose of electrically connecting signalling and communicating apparatus to be located on the premises of subscribers with recording apparatus located at some suitable point or points where such signals are to be received, and thereby maintaining and operating a burglar alarm signalling service system and for no other purpose whatsoever.

SECTION 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The said right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate wires or other electrical conductors in conduits, and on bridges, for the purposes aforesaid, shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor to and until December 31, 1928, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for a further period of ten (10) years, upon a fair revaluation of said right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal, it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the minimum sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the minimum sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers, and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the minimum sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted, the following sums of money:

1. The sum of twenty-five thousand dollars

(\$25,000) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

2. For past use and occupation of the streets of the City, a sum at the rate of twelve thousand five hundred dollars (\$12,500) a year from December 29, 1911, to the date of the signing of this contract by the Mayor.

3. During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than Fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts within the City, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of Fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000).

4. During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than Twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) and which shall be equal to three and one-half (3½) per cent. of its gross annual receipts within the City, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of Twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000).

5. During the remaining term of this original contract an annual sum which shall in no case be less than Twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) and which shall be equal to four (4) per cent. of its gross annual receipts within the City, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of Twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000).

6. Such reasonable sum or sums as may be imposed by the Board of Commissioners for the use of such bridge or bridges under his jurisdiction as he may permit.

The gross annual receipts of the Company mentioned above shall be deemed to include all receipts of the Company from its operations within the City of New York, excepting therefrom those receipts which accrue to it from its real estate and investments.

The annual charges shall commence from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on or before the first day of December 31 next preceding. Provided that the moneys due when this contract is signed by the Mayor shall be paid into the Treasury of the City within thirty (30) days immediately following such date, and provided further that the first annual payment thereafter shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and December 31 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before February 1 in each year for the year ending December 31 next preceding. Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatever kind or description now or hereafter levied or imposed by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for the payment of similar rights or franchises at a different rate and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose, unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof, or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein to the contrary notwithstanding, and the granting or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Fifth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the wires and equipment of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its wires and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Sixth—The Company shall construct, maintain and operate its electric system subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City, and in strict compliance with all laws or ordinances or departmental rules and regulations now in force, or which may be adopted, affecting companies operating electrical conductors in the City.

No construction or repair of said electrical system shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials. In any permit so issued, such officials may impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures in the streets and avenues and the proper restoration of the surface of such streets and avenues over which such officials have jurisdiction, and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

Upon completion of any work of construction, the Company shall furnish to the President of the Borough a plan of such character as he may direct, showing accurately and distinctly the location, size and type of construction and complete dimensions of the structures erected, installed or constructed under this contract, and the location and dimensions of all sub-structures encountered during the progress of the work; the depth below the street surface of the new structures and of the substructures encountered must be shown, and their location with reference to the nearest curb-line and the nearest curb-line intersection.

The electrical and other equipment to be in-

stalled by the Company, whether the same be under streets and avenues, in any Department of the City or in private property, shall be constructed and maintained subject to the approval and under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Seventh—The plant, conduits, wires, conductors, connections, instruments and all appurtenances thereto, shall be constructed, maintained and operated in the latest approved manner and with the most modern and improved appliances, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to its plant, conduits, wires, conductors, connections, instruments and appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions or improvements are determined by the Board, after hearing, to be necessary and reasonable. Upon failure of the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Eighth—All cables and wires of the Company laid pursuant to this contract shall be placed in ducts, conduits or subways (referred to in this paragraph as subways). In the Borough of Manhattan such subways shall be leased from the company or companies having control thereof under the provisions of law, or from the City, should it succeed to the rights of such company or companies. In the other territory in which the Company is authorized to operate by virtue of this contract, it may construct such subways as are necessary for the accommodation of its cables and wires, and no more. If the City shall construct or acquire subways for electrical conductors of the character or tension of those used by the Company, or similar companies, in any or all of the Boroughs in which it is authorized to operate by this contract, the Company hereby agrees to lay its wires and conductors in such subways and the City agrees to lease to the Company such space as may be necessary and available for the operation of the system hereby authorized. No cables or wires shall, in the future, be strung above the surface of the streets and avenues by the Company, and those at present in existence shall be removed and placed underground when and where required by the Board or the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Ninth—The use of any bridge under the jurisdiction of the Department of Bridges shall be at the discretion of the Bridge Commissioner, and in accordance with such terms and conditions and upon such reasonable charges as he may prescribe.

Tenth—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all alterations to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets required on account of the construction or operation of the underground conduits herein authorized to be placed in the streets, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Eleventh—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to lay and maintain conduits shall not be a preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said conduits in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move its conduits and their appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twelfth—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate be changed at any time during the term of this contract, or any renewal thereof, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its conduits and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets or avenues the Company shall take care and protect its conduits and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City officials having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Thirteenth—The Company shall, upon request from any individual or corporation occupying or owning premises in the territory in which the Company is authorized to operate by this contract, not in arrears to it for service already rendered, extend its wires to such premises and furnish burglar alarm service to such individual or corporation, provided that such premises are not more than one-half mile from any central office of the Company. The Board may require the Company to open additional central offices from time to time where it appears that there is a reasonable public necessity therefor.

Fourteenth—The Company shall file with the Board on the first day of February in each year a map or plan upon which shall be plainly and separately indicated the number of wires which were in use by the Company on December 31, preceding, and the streets in which the same are located, and also those which were put in use during the year preceding that date. It shall also file with the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, on or before the tenth day of each month, a map or plan of the locations in which wires have been placed by it during the preceding month.

Fifteenth—The rates to be charged by the Company shall not be in excess of the following, and it is agreed that the same may be altered or changed by the Board as hereinafter provided:

(a) For burglar alarm service furnished to a bank, trust company, cooperative savings and loan association, building and lot association, mortgage loan or investment corporation, safe deposit company, personal loan association, stock brokers' office, insurance company or other financial institution, the sum of one dollar (\$1.00) a day for each circuit required to be used in furnishing such service.

(b) For burglar alarm service furnished to any other person or corporation other than those specified in Subdivision (a) above, the sum of fifty cents (50c.) a day for each circuit required to be used in furnishing such service.

(c) For watchman supervisory signal service a yearly rental of sixty dollars (\$60) for the first signal box installed and thirty dollars (\$30) for each additional box installed, and an additional yearly rental of twelve dollars (\$12) for each additional box installed for the same subscriber in the same building or premises.

(d) For temporary burglar alarm service for which the telephone circuit connecting the telephone in the subscriber's premises with the central exchange of the telephone company is used, a monthly charge of seven and 50/100 dollars (\$7.50), provided such service is taken for at least two months.

(e) For temporary watchman service which it may be found necessary to furnish to any subscriber to any of the before mentioned classes of burglar alarm service or which may be required by any such subscriber, the sum of forty cents (40c.) per hour for each hour of such service actually furnished.

(f) For any other service furnished or to be furnished by the Company, the rates charged shall be reasonable and fair and before being put into effect shall be submitted to the Board for its approval.

Within thirty (30) days from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, the

Company shall furnish to the Board certified forms of all the contracts used by it with subscribers for its various classes of service, and thereafter when any change shall be made in any such form of contract, a certified copy of the same shall be filed with the Board within thirty (30) days after the said change goes into effect. The Company shall also file with the Board on February 1 of each year a verified schedule of the rates charged by it for each class of service which it furnishes.

The Company agrees, upon request of any Board, Department or Bureau of the City or other government, the expenses of which are paid out of the City treasury, to furnish burglar alarm protection service to any and all buildings under the control of such Board, Department or Bureau, within the territory in which the Company is authorized to operate, subject to the provisions of this contract, at sixty-six and two-thirds per cent. (66⅔%) of the rates above authorized to be charged by it for whatever class or classes of service may be required.

Nothing herein contained shall be deemed, nor is the same intended to require the Company (except as specified in clause (d) above) to furnish burglar alarm service for any period less than one year, nor to install the equipment or apparatus which may be required by a subscriber without charge, but the Company may and it is hereby authorized to write its contracts for service on an annual basis and charge the reasonable and fair cost of value of such equipment and apparatus under such reasonable and general restrictions as it may see fit to impose. Provided, however, that this exception as to equipment and apparatus is not intended to nor shall the same apply to watchman supervisory service and the rate specified in subdivision (c) above, for such service, is intended to include each and every charge for installation, rental of instruments, service furnished and everything incidental thereto, except where temporary watchman service may be required, as specified in subdivision (e) above.

Sixteenth—During the term of this contract, or any renewal thereof, the Board shall have the power, by resolution, to regulate and fix the maximum and minimum rates to be charged by the Company in the City, provided such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Seventeenth—The Company shall not require nor receive from its subscribers any deposit or advance payment in excess of what is reasonably necessary to insure payment of current bills, and on such amounts so paid the Company shall pay interest at the statutory rate whenever such money is held for more than one month. Unpaid bills, unless due from its owner, shall never be charged against property, and no person not himself in arrears shall be denied service because any previous occupant of the same premises is in arrears to the Company for service.

Eighteenth—The wires of the Company shall be employed for no other purposes than those explicitly set forth herein and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate wires for illegal purposes or to illegal places.

Nineteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the system authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company.

Twentieth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions in the territory covered by this contract, or any part thereof.

Twenty-first—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company, specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of One hundred dollars (\$100) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-second—If for a period of three consecutive months the system of the Company shall not be operated, or if the same shall not be operated for a period of six months out of any consecutive twelve months, the Board may declare the right and franchise and this contract terminated without further proceedings at law or in equity.

Twenty-third—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account and shall, on or before February 1 in each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending December 31, next preceding. Such report shall contain a statement of the gross receipts received from the operation of the system hereby authorized from all subscribers served by the Company in the City, together with such other information and in such form and detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report and may examine its officers' under oath.

Twenty-fourth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than February 1 of each year for the year ending December 31 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The amount of debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year, and the rate of same.
11. The names of the directors and officers elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
12. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
14. Number and location of premises served by the Company in the City, and central stations to which same are connected.
15. Total receipts of the Company for each class of business in the City.
16. Amounts paid by the Company for dam-

age to persons or property on account of construction and operation in the City.

17. Total expenses for operation, including salaries, in the City.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-fifth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of Thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privileges hereby granted, in default of which payment of the annual charges, the City shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund, after ten (10) days' notice to the Company.

In case of failure of the Company to comply with the terms of this contract relating to the filing of annual statements, furnishing of service to applicants as herein provided, the installation or maintenance of its structures and equipment, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any demand or direction of the Board or other municipal officials, made pursuant to the terms of this contract, or under the authority of any laws, ordinances or departmental regulations now or hereafter in force, in such case and in any of these events, the Company, except as hereinafter provided, shall pay to the City a penalty of Fifty dollars (\$50.) for each violation.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President, or other officer, to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the provisions of this contract. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or after a hearing appears, in the judgment of the Board, to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund, the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Twenty-sixth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board, by regular action, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the portion of its system constructed and in use by virtue of this contract and located in the public streets and avenues shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company served in the same manner as a summons in an action in the Supreme Court to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-seventh—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned, or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers, shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Twenty-eighth—The words "notice" or "direction" wherever used in this contract shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall, except as otherwise in this contract provided, be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or, if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Twenty-ninth—The words "streets and avenues" or "streets or avenues" wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, concourses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels public places or any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement, included within the limits of the territory in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Thirtieth—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues of the territory in which the Company is authorized to operate by this contract.

Section 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New York.

Section 4. First. It is understood and agreed that neither this contract nor anything within it contained, nor any operation of the Company's business under this contract, nor any act or acts of the Company or its officers or servants in the course of such business in the streets of said City or elsewhere shall be construed or interpreted to be or to effect a waiver, surrender, abandonment, modification, impairment or limitation of such rights, privileges or franchises as the Company may have heretofore acquired, or claims to have acquired, in any manner whatsoever, to lay, maintain, use or operate wires or other lines of electrical conductors, in, over, along or under the streets or avenues within the City or any portion thereof for the purpose of carrying on or operating a telegraph, telephone or other telegraph or telephone system or business nor shall such rights, privileges or franchises, or any of them, be deemed to have been merged by, with or into this contract, and this contract and the acceptance and execution thereof is and shall be entirely without prejudice to any such rights, privileges or franchises, or to the Company's claim that it is and should be entitled, to lay, maintain, use or operate wires or other lines of electrical conductors, in, over, along or under the streets or avenues, or any of them, for the purposes aforesaid, without and in the

absence of this contract; all of which claims, rights, privileges and franchises the Company asserts its intention to enforce by or in some form of action, suit or judicial proceeding. The Company agrees, on its part, to conform to, abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained, but only unless and until in any action, suit or other judicial proceeding, to which the City or one or more of its officers or departments shall be a party, the courts shall finally determine substantially that the Company had heretofore acquired the right to carry on its aforesaid business without and in the absence of this contract, or shall otherwise decide substantially that the Company, antecedent to the making of this contract, had such rights, privileges or franchises as entitles it to lay, maintain, use or operate wires or other lines of electrical conductors, in, over, along or under the streets and avenues of the City or some portion thereof, for the purposes aforesaid. And the City agrees, on its part, that the failure or refusal in good faith, of the company to conform to or abide by and perform any of the terms, conditions or requirements in this contract fixed and contained, in order to raise or present questions or issues for the purpose of judicially determining as aforesaid its rights, privileges or franchises in the premises shall not, anything in this contract to the contrary contained, notwithstanding, subject the Company to any forfeiture or cumulative damages.

Second. Upon any such final judicial determination applying to or affecting the whole territory specified in Section 1 of this contract, all further obligation of the Company thereunder shall cease and determine and the monies or securities deposited by it with the Comptroller as a security fund shall be returned to it, less any sum then lawfully due by the Company to the City. Should it be so judicially determined that such prior rights, privileges or franchises of the Company applied or extended only to some City, then in that case all obligations of the Company under this contract shall cease and determine as to such borough or boroughs or part or parts of the City, and thereafter the amount of annual compensation which the Company shall be required to pay to the City under subdivision second of Section 2 of this contract shall be computed upon the gross receipts of the Company only within the remaining parts of the City.

Third. The Company shall not claim or demand any money compensation or damages from the City for or by reason of any monies paid to the City under this contract or any expense, suits or other disadvantage incurred by it because of entering into this contract and it hereby expressly waives and surrenders to the City any such claim or demand.

Section 5. Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to nor is the same intended to be an admission or recognition on the part of the City or any of its Boards, Departments or Officials of any authority, franchise, right or privilege in the Company, except as granted by this contract, nor shall the same in any manner bind the City, or affect or waive its right, freedom or privilege to defend any action commenced or prosecuted by the Company for the purpose of establishing its alleged rights, privileges or franchises independent of this contract.

PART OF SEVENTH AVENUE-LEXINGTON AVENUE RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD.

THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION FOR the First District (hereinafter called the "Commission") invites proposals to construct Section No. 2 of Route 48, a part of the Seventh Avenue-Lexington Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad.

The points within the City of New York between which the said part is to run and the route or routes to be followed are briefly as follows:

SECTION No. 2. Beginning at a point under Beekman Street, in the Borough of Manhattan, about sixty-two (62) feet west of the westerly building line of William Street, curving thence southerly under private property into William Street, extending thence southerly under William Street and easterly under Hanover Square to a point about opposite the easterly building line of Pearl Street.

The general plan of construction calls for a subsurface railroad having two tracks.

A fuller description of the work and other requirements, provisions, details and specifications are given in the form of contract and in the contract drawings therein referred to. The forms of contract, bond and contractor's proposal and the contract drawings are to be deemed a part of this invitation.

The City of New York (hereinafter called the "City") and the Interborough Rapid Transit Company will both be parties to the contract; the Interborough Rapid Transit Company being a party for the purpose of disbursing part of its contribution toward the cost of construction as provided in the contract dated March 19, 1913, between the City and said Company for additional rapid transit railroads. The liability of Interborough Rapid Transit Company will be limited to an amount equal to fifty per centum (50%) of the total estimated amount to be paid to the Contractor under the contract.

Partial payments to the Contractor will be made as the work proceeds as provided in the contract.

The Contractor must complete the work within twenty-eight (28) months from the delivery of the contract.

At the time of the delivery of the contract the Contractor must furnish security to the City by depositing a bond, cash or securities in the sum of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000). As further security fifteen per centum (15%) of the amounts certified from time to time to be due to the Contractor will be deducted until the amounts so deducted and retained shall equal ten per centum (10%) of the total estimated amount to be paid to the Contractor under the contract. Thereafter there shall be so deducted and retained for such purpose ten per centum (10%) of the amounts certified from time to time to be due to the Contractor.

Sealed bids or proposals will be received at the office of the Commission at No. 154 Nassau Street, Borough of Manhattan, New York City, until the 15th day of September, 1914, at twelve fifteen (12.15) o'clock p. m., at which time, or at a later date to be fixed by the Commission, the proposals will be publicly opened.

Proposals must be in the form prescribed by the Commission.

A statement, based upon the estimate of the Chief Engineer of the Commission, of the quantities of the various classes of the work and of the nature and extent as near as practicable of the work is to be found in the schedule in the form of contractor's proposal. THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash, in full of the amount of the purchase price for the security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either of any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-ends, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or her name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
