

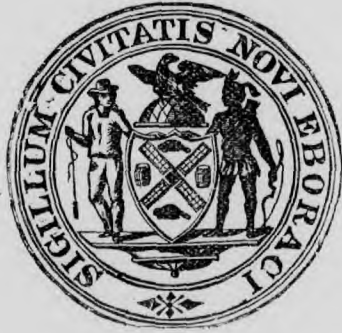

#### PETITION.

By Alderman —  
Petition of the East River Railway Company for permission to construct and operate a railway from Broome street, New York, to South Sixth street, Brooklyn, as follows :

OFFICE OF THE EAST RIVER RAILWAY COMPANY,  
MILLS BUILDING, SIXTH FLOOR, ROOMS NO. 29 AND 30.

To the Honorable the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York :

The East River Railway Company, a corporation of the State of New York, duly organized and incorporated under and by virtue of chapter 140 of the Laws of 1850, and chapter 582 of the Laws of 1880, to construct, maintain and operate a railway between a point at or near Broome street in the City and County of New York, and a point at or near South Sixth street in the City of Brooklyn, Kings County, respectfully ask your consent for the building of a part of their said road underneath the necessary streets and avenues of the City of New York, as specified on the map or sketch annexed hereto, and to make necessary surface excavations therefor.

The company agree that the said road shall be so built under said streets and avenues, and at all times kept in such condition as to make the surface of the ground above the same and in the neighborhood thereof firm and safe for buildings and other erections thereon ; that where surface excavations are made the surface shall be restored to its former condition as soon as can be done, except so far as may be actually required for ventilation and access ; that the gas, water and sewer pipes now laid shall not be disturbed except as far as may be actually necessary, and that where disturbed the same shall be restored to their former condition by the company under supervision of the City officials.

#### MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor :

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, February 9, 1891.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen :

I return, without my approval, the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted January 27, 1891, providing that an ornamental lamp-post and lamps similar to the lamp-posts and lamps now on Tryon Row be placed at or near the centre of the Circle at the intersection of Eighth avenue and Fifty-ninth street, on the ground that the Commissioner of Public Works reports that within a month the Circle at Eighth avenue and Fifty-ninth street will be lighted by electric lights under a contract recently awarded, which will render gas lamps unnecessary.

Resolved, That an ornamental lamp-post and lamps, similar to the lamp-post and lamps now on Tryon Row, be placed at or near the centre of the Circle at the intersection of Eighth avenue and Fifty-ninth street, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor :

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, February 6, 1891.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen :

I return, without my approval, the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted January 27, 1891, which grants permission for the placing and keeping of a news-stand in West Farms Square.

Following is the report of the Commissioner of Public Works, to whom the matter was referred for investigation as to its merits, to wit :

"In the absence of more specific definition of the location in which the stand is to be placed, an intelligent opinion cannot be given on the subject. The resolution should state whether the stand is to be placed on a carriageway or roadway, or on a sidewalk, and, in this connection, I would also call attention to the law which authorizes the Common Council to grant permission for the placing of news-stands within the stoop line only, and with the consent of the owner or owners of the property in front of which such stands are to be placed."

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Charles R. Cox to place and keep a news-stand in the square of West Farms, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works ; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That the curb-stones be set and the sidewalks on both sides of Bathgate avenue be flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, from One Hundred and Seventy-second to One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, where not already flagged, and that a crosswalk of two courses of bridge-stone, with a row of paving-blocks between each course, be laid at or near each of the four intersections of One Hundred and Seventy-second, One Hundred and Seventy-third, One Hundred and Seventy-fifth, One Hundred and Seventy-sixth and One Hundred and Seventy-seventh streets with Bathgate avenue, under the direction of the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards ; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor :

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, February 9, 1891.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen :

I return, without my approval, the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted January 27, 1891, providing that Wendover avenue, from Webster avenue to the Harlem river, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set and the sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, on the ground that the Commissioner of Street Improvements, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, reports that Wendover avenue is not legally opened, and that the resolution, if adopted, would be inoperative.

Resolved, That Wendover avenue, from Webster avenue to the Harlem Railroad, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set and the sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, under the direction of the Commissioner of Street Improvements, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards ; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

#### MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By the President—

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor be and he is hereby requested to return to this Board, for amendment, the resolution adopted at the last meeting, held on the 3d instant, amending section 174, article 9, chapter 6 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

Subsequently the paper was received from his Honor the Mayor, and is as follows :

Resolved, That section 174, article 9, chapter 6 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows :

Section 174. No connection with, or opening into any sewer or drain shall be used for the conveyance or discharge into said sewer or drain of steam or hot water above one hundred degrees Fahrenheit from any steam boiler or engine, or from any manufactory or building in which steam is either used or generated, or to discharge or permit to escape into any sewer or drain, or into any public street, steam from any stop-cock, valve or other opening in any steam pipe or main, under the penalty of fifty dollars for each and every day during any part of which such connection or opening may have been used for that purpose. This penalty shall be imposed upon and recovered from the owner and occupants, severally and respectively, of such manufactory or building, or from any corporation having mains for the conveyance of steam or hot water in the streets, avenues or public places.

The President moved a reconsideration of the vote by which the above resolution was adopted. The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

The President then moved to amend so that said section, when so amended, should read as follows :

Resolved, That section 174, article 9, chapter 6 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows :

Section 174. No connection with or opening into any sewer or drain shall be used for the conveyance or discharge into said sewer or drain of steam or hot water above one hundred degrees Fahrenheit from any boiler or engine, or from any manufactory or building in which steam is either used or generated, or to discharge or permit to escape into any sewer or drain, or into any public street, steam from any stop-cock, valve, or other opening in any steam pipe or main, under the penalty of fifty dollars for each and every day during any part of which such connection or opening may have been used for that purpose ; and the Commissioner of Public Works is hereby authorized and directed upon the expiration of five days after notice to discontinue the discharge of steam or hot water from any connection, to cancel the permit and to close up and remove the same. This penalty shall be imposed upon and recovered from the owner and occupants severally and respectively of such manufactory or building, or from any corporation having mains for the conveyance of steam or hot water in the streets, avenues or public places.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said amendment.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

The President then put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution as amended.

Which was decided in the affirmative.



By the Vice-President—

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor is hereby requested to return to this Board a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on February 3, 1891, permitting Josiah Macy's Sons to repave in front of their premises, Nos. 364, 365, 366 and 367 South street, with granite-block pavement.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution. Which was decided in the affirmative.

Subsequently the paper was received from his Honor the Mayor, and is as follows:

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Josiah Macy's Sons to repave in front of their premises, Nos. 364, 365, 366 and 367 South street, with granite-block pavement, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The Vice-President moved a reconsideration of the vote by which the above resolution was adopted.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

On motion of the Vice-President, the paper was then ordered on file.

By Alderman Oakley—

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor be and he is hereby respectfully requested to return to this Board for further consideration a resolution providing for the removal of a lamp from the northeast corner to the southeast corner of Broadway and Fourth street.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution. Which was decided in the affirmative.

Subsequently the paper was received from his Honor the Mayor, and is as follows:

Resolved, That the lamp on the northeast corner of Broadway and Fourth street be removed to the southeast corner of Broadway and Fourth street, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Alderman Oakley moved a reconsideration of the vote by which the above resolution was adopted.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

Alderman Oakley then offered the following as a substitute:

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Capes & Ryan to place and keep ornamental lamp-post and lamp in front of the southeast corner of Fourth street and Broadway, provided the lamp be kept lighted during the same hours as the public lamps; that the post shall not exceed the dimensions prescribed by law (eighteen inches square at the base), the lamp not to exceed two feet in diameter, the work to be done and gas supplied at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The paper was then laid over.

#### REPORTS.

The Committee on Docks, to whom was referred the annexed communication from the Department of Docks, asking the Common Council to authorize the Commissioner of Public Works to place necessary fire-hydrants along the North river, between Seventy-fifth and Eightieth streets, respectfully

#### REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed improvement to be necessary, as captains of vessels and others doing business along said water-front complain of their inability to secure an adequate supply of water. They therefore recommend that the following resolution be adopted:

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized to place fire-hydrants where necessary along the bulkhead of the North river from Seventy-fifth to Eightieth street, as provided in section 356 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

#### MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS RESUMED.

(G. O. 79.)

By Alderman Bailey—

Resolved, That One Hundred and Seventh street, from Park to Fifth avenue, be paved with granite-block pavement, and that crosswalks be laid at the intersecting and terminating streets where required, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was laid over.

(G. O. 80.)

By the same—

Resolved, That the sidewalk on west side Lenox avenue, between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirtieth streets, be flagged full width where not already done, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was laid over.

(G. O. 81.)

By the same—

Resolved, That the carriageway of Madison avenue, from One Hundred and Fifth to One Hundred and Eighth street, be paved with granite-block pavement, except that courses of three courses of bridge-stone with a row of paving-stones between each course be laid across each intersecting street, parallel with said avenue at or near such intersection, and a crosswalk of two courses of bridge-stone with a row of paving-stones between, be laid across said avenue at each intersecting street, at or near such intersection and parallel with such street, where not already laid, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was laid over.

(G. O. 82.)

By the same—

Resolved, That One Hundred and Seventeenth street, from Park to Madison avenue, be paved with granite-block pavement, and that crosswalks be laid at the intersecting and terminating streets where required, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was laid over.

By Alderman Flynn—

Whereas, Assembly bill No. 297, introduced by Mr. Mullaney, being an act entitled "An act empowering the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to sell privileges, permissions and franchises to the City of New York," is, by its provisions, such a direct interference with the right of the people of this City to govern themselves, and is such a deadly thrust at the vital Democratic principle of Home Rule as to warrant this Common Council in resorting to the most extreme measures to resist the passage of the bill; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Special Committee on State Legislation affecting public interests in this City be and is hereby instructed to proceed to the State Capitol at Albany, and to use every honorable effort to defeat or prevent the enactment of said Assembly bill No. 297 into a law.

Alderman G. B. Morris moved that the resolution be laid over for one week.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the negative on a division called by Alderman Oakley, as follows:

Affirmative—Aldermen G. B. Morris and J. Morris—2.

Negative—The President, the Vice-President, Aldermen Bailey, Brown, Clancy, Dooling, Flegenheimer, Flynn, Harris, Lynch, Mead, Moebus, Murphy, Oakley, Roche, Rogers, Ryder, Smith, Tait, and Terrell—20.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said preamble and resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

By Alderman Brown—

Resolved, That section 412 of article 41, chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 412. It shall not be lawful to erect any post or pole for carrying electric wires of any description in front of the entrance of any dwelling-house, nor within a distance of fifty feet from the nearest post or pole erected for such purpose, nor near the corner of any street upon a line with any crosswalk, nor within a distance of ten feet of any public street-lamp; and every post or pole now erected, or hereafter to be erected, for the purpose of carrying electric wires within the corporate limits of the City of New York, shall be painted a light brown color for a distance of ten feet, measuring upward from the level of the sidewalk, excepting those having a fire-alarm box attached to them, which shall be painted a red color, and the remainder of every such post or pole, and the cross-pieces thereon, shall be painted white. The name of the company or other owner of every such post or pole shall be branded or painted thereon in a conspicuous place within the distance of

ten feet measured upward from the level of the sidewalk, and no sign, handbill or advertisement of any kind shall be placed, pasted or otherwise fastened on any such pole or post. Any person offending against any of the provisions of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof before any of the police magistrates or justices of this city shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars, or, in default of the payment of such fine, by imprisonment not exceeding ten days.

Which was referred to the Committee on Law Department.

By the same—

Resolved, That section 124 of article 7, chapter 6 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 124. A Surveyor shall be entitled to receive ten dollars for every certificate for seventy per cent. payment to a contractor on any work done by contract made upon public advertisement and letting, which shall be paid by the Commissioner of Public Works, and except as herein otherwise provided, no Surveyor shall be entitled to any payment for a certificate to a contractor; the amount so paid for a certificate for seventy per cent. payment shall be deducted from the payment to be made to the contractor, on account of the work certified to be done.

Which was referred to the Committee on Law Department.

By Alderman Harris—

AN ORDINANCE to prohibit the sale of tickets or certificates of admission for all places of amusement where admission is by ticket or certificate, in the streets of New York City, or without the consent of the persons giving the entertainment, in the building where such entertainment is given.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Except as provided in section three hereof, no person shall sell or attempt to sell in any of the public streets of this city, any ticket or certificate of admission to any place of amusement or entertainment where admission is by ticket or certificate, nor shall any person sell any such ticket or certificate in any hallway, porch or vestibule of any building in which such entertainment is to be given, without the consent of the person giving the entertainment.

Sec. 2. Every person offending against or violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and shall be arrested and taken before a police magistrate, and, upon trial and conviction, shall be fined ten dollars for every such offense or violation, and in default of payment, by imprisonment not exceeding ten days.

Sec. 3. An ordinance adopted by the Board of Aldermen, December 14, 1880, and approved by the Mayor, December 27, 1880, entitled "An ordinance to license persons of good character, and citizens of this State, to sell tickets or certificates of admission for all places of amusement where admission is by ticket or certificate," is hereby repealed, except that the provisions of this ordinance shall not affect any person who has heretofore duly procured a license for the sale of tickets or certificates under the provisions of the said ordinance of December 14, 1880, but that said person so licensed may continue the sale of tickets or certificates until the expiration of his present license, as if this ordinance had not been adopted.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Which was referred to the Committee on Law Department.

(G. O. 83.)

By the same—

Resolved, That One Hundred and Twenty-second street, between Manhattan and Columbus avenues, be curbed and the sidewalks flagged full width where not already done, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was laid over.

(G. O. 84.)

By the same—

Resolved, That the vacant lots on north side of Ninety-ninth street, between Eighth and Ninth avenues, be fenced in, commencing two hundred and twenty-five feet east from Ninth avenue, and running fifty feet easterly and commencing three hundred and fifty feet west of Eighth avenue, and running twenty-five feet westerly, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was laid over.

(G. O. 85.)

By the same—

Resolved, That One Hundred and Eighth street, from Manhattan avenue to Columbus avenue, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was laid over.

(G. O. 86.)

By the same—

Resolved, That One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, from St. Nicholas avenue to Convent avenue, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was laid over.

(G. O. 87.)

By the same—

Resolved, That One Hundred and Thirty-second street, from Boulevard to Twelfth avenue, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was laid over.

(G. O. 88.)

By the same—

Resolved, That One Hundred and Thirty-third street, from Amsterdam avenue to Convent avenue, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was laid over.

(G. O. 89.)

By the same—

Resolved, That One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, from Amsterdam avenue to Convent avenue, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was laid over.

(G. O. 90.)

By the same—

Resolved, That One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, from Amsterdam avenue to Edgecombe avenue, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was laid over.

(G. O. 91.)

By the same—

Resolved, That One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, from Amsterdam avenue to Eleventh avenue, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was laid over.

(G. O. 92.)

By the same—

Resolved, That One Hundred and Ninetieth street, from Amsterdam avenue to Audubon avenue, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

## TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
