



Whereas, The occupation of the carriage-way of many of the most prominent thoroughfares in this City, by four lines of railroad tracks, is productive of much annoyance, loss, and damage to the general public, particularly those who travel in vehicles; and

Whereas, It is desirable, if possible, in order to afford some measure of relief, that the several lines of railroads using such double sets of tracks should be confined to the use of two tracks only, thereby restoring the use of a great portion of the said streets thus unnecessarily obstructed, to the uses of the public; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Committee on Railroads be and is hereby directed to examine this question thoroughly, and report to this Board as soon as possible, the streets, avenues, and public places now so encumbered by unnecessary rail-tracks, with the measures necessary to be taken to compel the use of two tracks only in said streets, and jointly, by the several railroad companies now using such four or double tracks.

By Alderman Lysaght—

Whereas, In the final estimate adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by concurrent resolution, at a meeting of said Board, held on the 24th day of December, 1874, appropriations were made for the various departments and objects and purposes of the Government for the year 1875; and

Whereas, In the said final estimate an appropriation was made as follows, to wit:

"For procuring and presenting of evidence in all matters, suits, or proceedings in relation to "frauds committed prior to January, 1872, on "the City or County, \$20,000.00;" and

Whereas, It is necessary to provide for regulating the expenditure of the sum so appropriated for the purposes or objects stated; therefore

Resolved, That the said sum of twenty thousand dollars be expended only on the joint certificate of his Honor the Mayor and of the Counsel to the Corporation; and without such certificate no employment of any person shall be made who is to be paid for his services from said appropriation; and

the Comptroller of the City is hereby prohibited from making any payments out of or on account of said appropriation, except on the certificate aforesaid.

AN ORDINANCE to regulate the recovery of the arrears of personal taxes of the City of New York.

Whereas, It is lawful for the Receiver of Taxes, if any tax on personal property, with interest thereon, shall remain unpaid on the 15th day of the month of January succeeding the confirmation of such tax, to issue his warrant under his hand and seal to any Marshal of the City, commanding him to levy said tax, with interest thereon at the rate of 12 per cent. per annum from the day of the

delivery of the tax-rolls to said Receiver to the time when the same shall be paid, by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the person against whom the said warrant shall be issued, or of any goods or chattels in his possession wheresoever the same shall be found in the said City; and

Whereas, The annual loss by failure to recover personal taxes in this City amount to several hundred thousand dollars, and it is desirable, with a view to obviate as far as possible this loss, that the recovery of the personal taxes in arrear on the 15th day of January of each year should be duly provided for and regulated; therefore it is ordained and enacted:

1st. That within three days after the passage of this ordinance, and hereafter in each year, prior to the 15th day of January, the Mayor of the City shall select a Marshal, by a certificate in writing, to be filed by him in the Department of Finance, and to the Marshal so selected all warrants shall be issued under the hand and seal of the Receiver of Taxes for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes, which selection it shall be in the power of the Mayor to change, by a like certificate filed in said Finance Department, whenever he may consider it advisable in the public interest to do so.

2d. Upon receiving the warrant of the Receiver, it shall be the duty of the said Marshal forthwith to enforce the same, and to report the result as speedily as possible to the Receiver of Taxes, to whom he shall pay over all taxes and interest recovered, upon the day on which he receives the same.

3d. All warrants returned by the Marshal unsatisfied in whole or in part shall forthwith be reported by the said Receiver of Taxes to the Attorney for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes, and it shall thereupon be the duty of the said Attorney to adopt such proceedings in court as are by law authorized, with a view of recovery, the said taxes in whole or in part unsatisfied as aforesaid.

4th. Where, in such proceedings, the Court is satisfied that the person or persons taxed are unable, for the want of property, to pay any tax, and have dismissed the proceedings absolutely without costs, or conditionally upon the payment of costs, or have dismissed such proceedings on the payment of such part of the tax and costs as the Court consider just, it shall be the duty of the said Attorney, in addition to the reports now made by him as required by law, to report the facts in each case to the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments; and it shall be the duty of the said Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments to inquire into the matters so reported, and, if satisfied as to the facts, to correct the Assessment Rolls, where such is practicable, prior to the 30th day of April in each year, so as to remove therefrom the names of those parties appearing thereon so reported and found to be unable, from want of property, to pay any tax.

Any person holding any appointment or office, or employed in any of such departments or branches of the City Government, who shall, while holding such appointment or office, or so employed, remove from within the limits of this City, shall be deemed thereby to have resigned such appointment, vacated such office, or abandoned such employment; and it shall be the duty of the head of every such department or other person authorized to make appointments or give employment, to appoint or employ a resident of this City to the office made vacant, or employment so surrendered, by said removal from this City, as provided in section 1 of this ordinance.

SEC. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SEC. 4. This ordinance shall take effect on the first day of May, 1875.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks for the three weeks ending January 16, 1875.

Hon. W. R. Martin was appointed Commissioner for the unexpired term of Hon. Philip Bisenger.

Four new wheels under the draw of Third avenue bridge were ordered, at a cost not exceeding \$350 when placed in position.

The Landscape Architect, under instructions from the Board, presented a report upon the present condition of the work done and to be done, and the plans for the Riverside and Mornside avenues, when they were referred to the Executive Committee in conjunction with the Landscape Architect to report upon.

The Treasurer was authorized and directed to receive from the Comptroller the appropriation of \$14,000, made for "indebtedness of late town of Kingsbridge, arising under chapter 534, Laws of 1871, as authorized by chapter 651, Laws of 1874."

A modified plan of the public place at the Boulevard, Ninth avenue and Sixty-third street, was adopted.

The Engineer of the Bureau of Construction was directed to prepare a map of the southwest portion of the late town of Kingsbridge.

The bridge built along Third avenue and over the track leading to Port Morris, by the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, was accepted by this Department, under the provision of chapter 545, Laws of 1872.
