Resolved, That the Committee on Railroads be and is hereby directed to examine this question thoroughly, and report to this Board as soon as possible, the streets, avenues, and public places now so encumbered by unnecessary rail-tracks, with the measures necessary to be taken to compel the use of two tracks only in said streets, and jointly, by the several railroad companies now using such four or double tracks.

1. Is the organization of the Department of Parks in general, and are the duties, powers, profits, and relations held, exercised, and enjoyed by the Architect, the Superintendent, and other employees, in particular, in conformity and compatible with the statute and by-laws prescribing and directing the management of the Department of Parks?

2. Is the Architect a professional and skillful man, whose plans and devices are uniformly carried out as coming from him, or have they to be submitted to and corrected by other professionals, and at times necessitated such alterations which largely increased the costs of construction, and required the paying of additional fees to other architects?

3. Was the amount of money in salaries, fees, or commissions expended during the last year on and by the Bureau of Topographical Engineers in the neighborhood of \$60,000, more or less, and what has been done for the money?

4. Has the Engineer of construction received during last year a salary of \$5,000 or over, and in what way and manner was he employed during that time?

5. Was not the partition wall along Eighth avenue, and between Eighty-sixth and Ninetieth streets, built twice on account of the faulty grading of the Engineers and the subsequent misplacing of the foundation, and was not a similar blunder made on Manhattan Square, and thus a very large amount of money thrown away?

6. What was the cost of the sheep-house on Eighth avenue, and does it answer its purpose? Is the building said to have cost \$250,000 unfitted, for want of proper ventilation, to keep the animals in a healthy condition, and is the mortality among them as great as surmised, and their keeping altogether a costly luxury?

7. Are the wooden bridges in Central Park so carelessly constructed as already to demand frequent and expensive repairs—their wooden piers driven into the bare ground and showing signs of decay—and the vaults covering the transfer roads in such condition, that an expenditure of about \$50,000 during the current year will be necessary to keep them in repair?

8. Why are the foundations of the projected Conservatory between Seventy-second and Seventy-third streets, and near Fifth avenue, allowed to crumble after an expenditure of \$200,000 already incurred, and the building materials on hand carried off and used for other purposes? Is it true, that some of these materials have been charged over again to the Department?

9. Is the Superintendent the lessee of the building called Mount St. Vincent Hotel, and is the constantly-required patching-up of the dilapidated structure done at the expense of the Park Department?

10. Why is the Menagerie likewise said to be under the charge of the Superintendent, made use of as a hospital and boarding-place for the animals of showmen and traders? And why is this should-be-instructive institution not given in charge of a person possessing some knowledge and experience in the care and treatment of the animals?

It is charged that many animals in the Menagerie and all over the Park, are dying for want of proper attention and understanding; and that in particular the birds of song are fast disappearing, from neglect and carelessness.

11. Is it correct that the new Menagerie building in Morningside Park—though its cost is said to be computed at \$500,000 when completed—will prove a monstrous structure, ill-adapted to its purpose, and in a badly-chosen place?

12. Is Architect Vaux, although said to be no longer in the employ of the Park Commissioners, still drawing a commission of two and one-half per cent. on the Museum buildings, notwithstanding plans, drawings, estimates, etc., are made at the Department?

The foregoing enumerated cases of charged neglect, blunder, incapacity, and malpractice, to which many others of a similar nature could be added, are either gross calumniations, or indicate mismanagement of the affairs of the Department of Parks to such a degree, that a speedy change is called for; be it therefore further

Resolved, That, with a view to facilitate a thorough and satisfactory inquiry into the affairs of the Department of Parks, the aforesaid Committee on Lands and Places shall be and is hereby empowered and authorized to send for papers and persons.

Alderman Reilly moved to amend by striking from the resolution the words "Lands and Places" after the word "Committee," and inserting in lieu thereof the words "Arts and Sciences."

AN ORDINANCE to regulate the recovery of the arrears of personal taxes of the City of New York.

Whereas, It is lawful for the Receiver of Taxes, if any tax on personal property, with interest thereon, shall remain unpaid on the 15th day of the month of January succeeding the confirmation of such tax, to issue his warrant under his hand and seal to any Marshal of the City, commanding him to levy said tax, with interest thereon at the rate of 12 per cent. per annum from the day of the

delivery of the tax-rolls to said Receiver to the time when the same shall be paid, by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the person against whom the said warrant shall be issued, or of any goods or chattels in his possession wheresoever the same shall be found in the said City; and

Whereas, The annual loss by failure to recover personal taxes in this City amount to several hundred thousand dollars, and it is desirable, with a view to obviate as far as possible this loss, that the recovery of the personal taxes in arrears on the 15th day of January of each year should be duly provided for and regulated; therefore it is ordained and enacted:

1st. That within three days after the passage of this ordinance, and hereafter in each year, prior to the 15th day of January, the Mayor of the City shall select a Marshal, by a certificate in writing, to be filed by him in the Department of Finance, and to the Marshal so selected all warrants shall be issued under the hand and seal of the Receiver of Taxes for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes, which selection it shall be in the power of the Mayor to change, by a like certificate filed in said Finance Department, whenever he may consider it advisable in the public interest to do so.

2d. Upon receiving the warrant of the Receiver, it shall be the duty of the said Marshal forthwith to enforce the same, and to report the result as speedily as possible to the Receiver of Taxes, to whom he shall pay over all taxes and interest recovered, upon the day on which he receives the same.

3d. All warrants returned by the Marshal unsatisfied in whole or in part shall forthwith be reported by the said Receiver of Taxes to the Attorney for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes, and it shall thereupon be the duty of the said Attorney to adopt such proceedings in court as are by law authorized, with a view of recovery, the said taxes in whole or in part unsatisfied as aforesaid.

4th. Where, in such proceedings, the Court is satisfied that the person or persons taxed are unable, for the want of property, to pay any tax, and have dismissed the proceedings absolutely without costs, or conditionally upon the payment of costs, or have dismissed such proceedings on the payment of such part of the tax and costs as the Court consider just, it shall be the duty of the said Attorney, in addition to the reports now made by him as required by law, to report the facts in each case to the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments; and it shall be the duty of the said Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments to inquire into the matters so reported, and, if satisfied as to the facts, to correct the Assessment Rolls, where such is practicable, prior to the 30th day of April in each year, so as to remove therefrom the names of those parties appearing thereon so reported and found to be unable, from want of property, to pay any tax.

No person who is not a citizen of the State of New York, and a resident of the City and County of New York, shall be eligible to appointment to any office, in any or either of the Departments of the City Government, either as president or commissioner, chief of bureau, clerk, or officer thereof, or employee therein, whether legislative, executive, or judicial; nor shall any person not a resident of this City, who may be so employed or appointed, have any valid claim against the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of said City, for any salary, wages, or compensation, under or by virtue of holding any office in either of such departments or branches of the City Government.

SEC. 2. Any person holding any appointment or office, or employed in any of such departments or branches of the City Government, who shall, while holding such appointment or office, or so employed, remove from within the limits of this City, shall be deemed thereby to have resigned such appointment, vacated such office, or abandoned such employment; and it shall be the duty of the head of every such department or other person authorized to make appointments or give employment, to appoint or employ a resident of this City to the office made vacant, or employment so surrendered, by said removal from this City, as provided in section 1 of this ordinance.

SEC. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SEC. 4. This ordinance shall take effect on the first day of May, 1875.

Resolved, That section 56 of the Sanitary Code be amended to read as follows:

SEC. 56. That the keeping and slaughtering of all cattle, and the preparation and keeping of all meat and fish, birds and fowl, shall be in that manner which is, or is generally reputed or known to be, best adapted to secure and continue their safety and wholesomeness as food. Neither the

slaughtering nor the driving of cattle shall be permitted or conducted at any place in the City of New York south of Fortieth street; nor shall the slaughtering of cattle be conducted at any place in the City of New York north of said street, without a special written permit from this Department; unless the same shall be done in buildings located directly upon the water front, each having a capacity sufficient for the yarding and slaughtering daily of one-half of the entire number of cattle, or hogs, or small stock (all or separately, according to the particular object of each abattoir) slaughtered in this City, at the time the application for the permit for such abattoir shall be made; and so constructed as to receive all stock deliverable thereat, directly from cars or transports; and to discharge therefrom all liquid refuse below low-water mark, and to secure the proper care and disposition of all parts of the slaughtered animal upon the premises, or the immediate removal thereof by means of boats.
