The Board of Health met this day.

Orders.

271 orders for the abatement of nuisances were made.

Suits for Penalties.

The Attorney was directed to commence suits for non-compliance with the orders of the Board in 28 cases, and for violation of the Sanitary Code in three cases.

Resolutions.

That the pay-rolls of this Department for the month of January, 1876, when approved by the Chairman of the Finance Committee, shall be duly certified by the President and Secretary, and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

That the route for driving sheep shall, until further notice, be through Forty-second street; that no drove shall exceed in numbers fifty sheep and lambs, as now specified in the Code, and that there shall be an interval of at least ten minutes between successive droves.

That the application for permission to fill in space at the foot of East Forty-sixth street, with clean ashes, be granted.

That the permit for the dumping of stable manure on the dumping grounds, on the North and East rivers, be extended one month.

That the subject of procuring a night-soil dock in place of the one now in use at Rivington street, be referred to the President.

Whereas, Evidence has been furnished to this Board, that one John Moser, residing at No. 605 East Eleventh street, New York, to whom a license has been granted as scavenger, did empty a privy vault at No. 172 Avenue C, on the 24th day of January, without a permit so to do from this Department, and in violation of the ordinances, rules, and regulations of this Board; therefore

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor be respectfully recommended and requested to revoke the license of John Moser, as night scavenger.

That the complaints of Sanitary Policeman Anderson, on 314 and 316 Stanton street, with order and report issued thereon, be forwarded to the Board of Police.

That the Attorney and Counsel be authorized and directed to commence an action against Dr. J. C. Kendall and Dr. J. C. Howard, for violation of the Sanitary Code.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau during the week ending January 22, 1876: The total number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,524, as follows: 10 public buildings, 754 tenement houses, 92 private dwellings, 60 other dwellings, 3 manufactorys and workshops, 7 stores and warehouses, 37 stables, 78 slaughter-houses, 4 markets, 2 fat-rendering establishments, 1 stock yard, 1 roadway, 7 sunken and vacant lots, 23 yards, courts, and areas, 23 cellars and basements, 119 waste-pipes, 1 drain, 146 street-gutters and sidewalks, 9 dangerous stairways, 4 other nuisances, and 68 visits to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 445. During the week 56 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

24 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes.

40 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 53 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 44 houses, 44 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

35 persons sick with small-pox were removed to the Hospital and 1 dead body to the Morgue by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending January 22, 1876: Typhoid fever, 4; cerebro spinal meningitis, 2; measles, 62; diphtheria, 155; scarlet fever, 45; and small-pox, 43.

297 cans and 49 tanks of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the week ending January 22, 1876.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending January 22, 1876: Calves (bob), 10 carcasses; calves (case), 4 carcasses; sheep, 5 carcasses; hog, 1 carcass; veal, 135 pounds; poultry, 227 pounds; beef, 40 pounds; and fish, 2,150 pounds.

During the week ending January 22, 1876, there were issued from this bureau 600 burial permits for city deaths, 21 for bodies *in transitu*, and 50 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 600 deaths, 175 marriages, 475 births, 50 still-births, 21 applications for transit permits, and 48 returns from Coroners. There were 24 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 2 transcripts of birth record, 1 of marriage, and 22 of death were issued from this bureau. One case of death was referred to the Coroners.

To W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register of Records:

SIR—There were 600 deaths reported during the week ending Saturday, the 22d inst., being 58 more than were reported the previous week, and 64 less than were reported during the corresponding week in 1875. The actual number of deaths which occurred during the week ending January 15 was 524, or 172 less than occurred during the corresponding period of 1875, showing an annual death-rate of 25.84 per thousand, estimating the population at 1,054,413.

The mean temperature, as reported by Daniel Draper, Director of the Meteorological Observatory at Central Park, is as follows:

There was an increase of 14 deaths reported during the week from small-pox, 13 from diphtheria, 6 from membranous croup, 7 from whooping cough, 46 from phthisis pulmonalis, 8 from pneumonia, 6 from hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 7 from diseases of the brain and nervous system, 40 of children under 5 years of age, and 30 in institutions; and 1 death less of measles, 4 of scar-

latina, 2 of typhoid fever, 9 of bronchitis, 8 of heart diseases, 1 of apoplexy, 2 of Bright's disease and nephritis than were reported the previous week.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons reported to be living in London during the week ending January 1 was 27; Edinburgh, 22; Glasgow, 26; and Dublin, 33. The rate of Brussels for the week ending December 25 was 28.6; Amsterdam, 32.9; Rotterdam, 31.9; The Hague, 24.6; Breslau, 24.6; for Copenhagen, week ending December 23, it was 22.4; and Christiania, 30.6; for Berlin, week ending December 11, 27.5; for Munich, the week ending December 18, 37.2; Budapest, 32.2; and Alexandria, 42.8; for Naples, week ending December 2, 28.2; and for Turin, week ending December 19, 27.1.

The Board of Commissioners met this day.

Present—Commissioner Roswell D. Hatch, in the chair, and Commissioner Vincent C. King.

The minutes of the meetings held on the 5th and 12th instant were read and approved.

The Chairman submitted form of contract for furnishing hose, approved by the Counsel to the Corporation, and affidavit of Clerk of CITY RECORD, relative to publication of advertisement inviting proposals for same, according to law.

were received, and opened in presence of the Comptroller, as follows :
