30, 1898:

During the past quarter, monthly tables from hourly readings have been printed for distribution to home and foreign observatories and libraries; weekly reports have been issued to the CITY RECORD and newspapers; hourly and weekly reports to the Health Department, and meteorological information has been supplied to the Counsel of the Corporation of The City of New York, and

The annexed tables give an abstract of the mean, the maximum and minimum hourly readings from the various self-recording instruments in this observatory for the second quarter of the year 1898, and also comparisons with the hourly observations for the same quarter for the past thirty years taken at this observatory.

A new comptometer has been added to the instruments this quarter.
