DEAR SIR—Herewith is the fourth quarterly report of the Kings County Hospital and Kings County Almshouse, for the year 1899. A superficial examination of the four quarterly reports for 1899 shows a slight increase in the per capita cost of maintenance, which is due to the very great improvement in the dietary, equipment and increased force of help necessary to carry forward the improved methods of conducting the institutions. The per capita is high now as compared with some previous years, but still low when compared with other similar institutions; and the increase is insignificant when compared with the conditions and results which obtain now and those of former years. The changes made during the year, and which now govern the reception and distribution of supplies, and keeping of accounts and records, has brought the whole system to an economical and safe business basis.
