Request of the Department of Street Cleaning, dated March 3, for authority to reinstate Michael Frawley as Driver.

Request of the Street Cleaning Department, dated March 4, for authority to reinstate Walter S. Chase as Driver.

Request of the Department of Docks, dated March 4, for authority to reinstate Philip Stanley as Laborer.

Request of the Street Cleaning Department, dated March 10, for authority to reinstate William A. Brazil as Driver.

Request of the Department of Street Cleaning, dated March 13, for authority to reinstate Giuseppe D'Alesio as Sweeper.

Request of the Department of Street Cleaning, dated March 13, for authority to reinstate Giuseppe D'Alesio as Sweeper.

Denied for Lack of Power.

Request of the Department of Parks, The Bronx, for authority to change the title of Thomas Miller from Laborer to Gardener.

Request of the President of the Borough of Queens, dated March 7, for authority to change the title of Mary T. McIntosh from Cleaner to Laundress.

Request of the Department of Parks, Manhattan, for authority to reinstate John Gallagher as Laborer.

Request of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated February 25, for authority to rescind his action of August 4, 1904, whereby he discharged Patrick Keating, a Laborer.

Emergency Appointments.

Notice from Bridge Department, dated February 28, of the appointment of Mike Turo and ninety-three others for removing snow on Williamsburg Bridge.

Notice from the Bridge Department, dated March 7, of the appointment of Bird Cities and forty-one others for removing snow on Brooklyn Bridge.

Notice from the Bridge Department, dated March 8, of the employment of Mike Ross and one hundred and sixty others for removing snow on Williamsburg Bridge.

The action of the President on the foregoing matters was approved.

Letters were presented from the People's Security Company, dated March 13, protesting (1st) against an alleged violation of the Civil Service Law in connection with the assignment of Firemen and Patrolmen to duty as Marine Engineers on the fire and police boats controlled by the City, and (2d) against the employment of one Charles Jamar as a Supervising Engineer in the Department of Correction. The Secretary stated that, under the provisions of the Charter, the Police and Fire Commissioners are authorized to assign members of the Uniformed Force to perform such duties as they may see fit; and stated, with reference to the complaint against the employment of Charles Jamar as a Supervising Engineer, that the records of this office show that he was appointed an Inspector of Heating and Ventilation in the Tombs Prison on August 12, 1902, and that he has been paid from a special fund for that work.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to communicate the foregoing facts to the People's Security Company and also to the Comptroller, with whom a copy of the complaint of the said People's Security Company had been filed; and to state further that the alleged violation of the law in the assignment of Mr. Jamar to perform duties other than those for which he was appointed, would be investigated by this Commission.

A letter was presented from Messrs. Strasbourger, Weil, Eschwege & Schallek, dated March 7, calling the attention of the Commission to the fact that one "Henry A. Rogers" was appointed by the Department of Health to the position of Disinfecter on January 14, 1904, and suspended on August 22, 1904, for insufficiency of appropriation; and that, at the time he was suspended, three persons were serving probationary periods in that Department in the same position, and requesting that the Commission order the reinstatement of Mr. Rogers as of the date of his suspension. The Secretary stated that the records of the office show the appointment of no such person as "Henry A. Rogers" on the date mentioned. He was instructed to communicate with Messrs. Strasbourger, Weil, Eschwege & Schallek and inform them of that fact.

The Chief Examiner appeared and addressed the Commission with reference to the following matters, which had been referred to him:

(1) The requests of Messrs. William S. Morgenroth, Joseph A. Courtney and John J. Gough, that the examinations taken by them for promotion to second grade Clerk be construed to have qualified them for promotion to the fourth grade without further examination.

(2) The request of Mr. George W. Morton, that the examination in which he competed for promotion to fifth grade Examiner be construed to have qualified him for promotion to the eighth grade without further examination.

(3) The request of the Secretary of the Department of Public Charities, that James J. McGowan, an employee of that Department, be certified as eligible for promotion from the position of Junior Clerk to that of second grade Clerk; and

(4) The request of Edward J. St. Leger, that the examination which he took for promotion from Orderly to Junior Clerk be construed to have qualified him for promotion to Senior Clerk, with compensation at the rate of \$1,500 per annum.

After the Chief Examiner had retired the Secretary was instructed (1st) to communicate with Messrs. William S. Morgenroth, Joseph A. Courtney and John J. Gough, and inform them that their requests were denied, but without prejudice to a renewal of the application to have them certified as eligible for promotion to the position of fourth grade Clerk by the heads of their respective departments; (2d) to communicate with Mr. George W. Morton, and inform him that his request was denied, but without prejudice to a renewal of the application to have him certified as eligible for promotion to the position of eighth grade Examiner by the head of his department; (3d) to communicate with the Secretary of the Department of Public Charities and state that inasmuch as James J. McGowan qualified for the position of second grade Clerk, and that his name appeared on the list for promotion to third grade Clerk, established January 3, 1902, the Commission would approve his promotion to the position of second grade Clerk without further examination. The case of Edward J. St. Leger was laid over for further consideration at the next meeting.

A letter was presented from John E. F. Higgins, dated March 3, requesting that his name be restored to the eligible list for the position of Rodman, and stating that he replied promptly to the notice sent him by the Aqueduct Commission and declined appointment in that Department on the ground of insufficiency of salary. The records of the office showing that the Aqueduct Commission notified this Department that Mr. Higgins failed to report, on motion, the Secretary was instructed to forward a copy of Mr. Higgins' letter to that Department and request them to advise us as to the facts in the case.

The request of William E. Haefner, of No. 150 West One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, dated March 8, that he be restored to eligibility for appointment to the position of Leveler at \$1,200 per annum, was denied, he having declined appointment in the Aqueduct Commission at that salary on July 15, 1904.

An affidavit was presented from William F. Emerson, of No. 107 East Eighty-fifth street, requesting that his name be restored to the eligible list for Bath Attendant, and stating that he was employed as a Bath Attendant in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan until September 14, 1904, when he applied for a leave of absence; that the same was granted him and that he was informed that the matter would be all right, and knew no different until he received a notice from said Department, dated October 24, 1904, informing him that his request for leave of absence was denied. It appearing from the records of this office that Mr. Emerson was dropped from the payrolls for "failing to report" on and after September 17, 1904, the Secretary was instructed to communicate with the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan and request to be informed of the facts in the case.

A letter was presented from Emily Stuart, of No. 1958 Fulton street, Brooklyn, protesting against the action of the Examining Physician in rejecting her in the physical examination for the position of Cleaner, in view of the fact that she had but a short time before been passed by the same physician in the physical examination for the position of Matron. Upon verification of the statements made by Miss Stuart, it appeared to the satisfaction of the Commission that her rejection in the examination for Cleaner was an error, and the Secretary was instructed to place her name upon the eligible list for that position.

A letter was presented from Joseph S. Jaffe, No. 32 Bronson street, Waterbury, Conn., dated March 6, requesting that his record be cleared, and that he be permitted to correct the misstatement in answer to question 10 made in his application for the position of Axeman (examination of August 17, 1904), in view of the fact that said misstatement was made inadvertently and with no intention to deceive the Commission. In substantiation of his statements, Mr. Jaffe called the attention of the Commission to the fact that at the same time that he filed the application for the position of Axeman he filed an application for the position of Topographical Draughtsman, in which he stated, in answer to question 10, that he had previously filed an application for a position in the City service. On motion, the request was granted.

On motion, the request of George B. Murphy, No. 104 West One Hundred and Second street, dated March 13, that he be restored to eligibility for certification to the Borough of Brooklyn for appointment to the position of Inspector of Plumbing, was denied for the reason that Mr. Murphy declined appointment in that borough on May 20, 1904.

A letter was presented from William J. Distler, No. 453 West Nineteenth street, candidate for the position of Patrolman, stating that the date of birth set forth in his application filed for the coming examination is correct, and presenting a birth certificate in substantiation of same. It appearing from said birth certificate that the date of birth given in a previous application was an error, and that the date given in the application filed for the coming examination is correct, the Secretary was instructed to notify Mr. Distler to call at this office and correct the date on the old application.

The temporary appointment of Michael J. Delaney to the position of Pilot in the Fire Department was approved (Mr. Delaney having filed a pilot's certificate in this office), pending the classification of that position in the non-competitive class.

The Secretary presented to the Commission, with a request for instructions regarding the publication of same, the eligible list for the position of Engineer of Steamer, established as a result of the last examination. After careful consideration of the matter, it appearing that the list as it then stood would not be adequate for the needs of the service during the ensuing year, the Secretary was instructed to refer the papers of all candidates in said examination who received an average of 79 per cent. or over back to the Examiners who rated same, with the request that they give the papers a careful examination to see if the mark of the lower Examiner might be increased sufficiently to give such candidates a passing mark.
