BROOKLYN DISCIPLINARY TRAINING SCHOOL
FOR BOYS.

Report for the Year Ending October 31, 1905.

Office of the Board of Managers,
Nos. 4 and 5 Court Square,
Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York.

To the Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York:

Sir—The Board of Management of the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys respectfully present herewith the report of the Superintendent, and also the report of the President of the Board, for the year ending October 31, 1905, and we respectfully submit the same as our report for that period.

During the year just closed we have cared for 429 boys, classified as follows:

A. Number from 7 to 12 years of age.....	94
B. Number from 12 to 15 years of age.....	249
C. Number from 15 to 16 years of age.....	86

During this period we received from the Children's Court, committed for crimes other than a felony, 161, and have discharged to their parents, guardians and to employment 179, a total 18 in excess of the number received, and there remain in this institution at this date 250.

It is most gratifying to say that after careful investigation of monthly reports of those discharged, less than 4 per cent. were returned to other institutions by the Courts; about 35 are employed and self-supporting; 43 are going to school and found satisfactory in conduct to their parents and teachers; 6 per cent. are reported unsatisfactory; and a large number of the others not accounted for have either left the state or removed from the home addresses recorded on our books.

When it is considered that only those over school age are qualified to receive a certificate from the Board of Health; and that the average age of the boys in the school does not exceed 13 years, it will be at once admitted that the services rendered to the municipality and the people by this institution will compare favorably with the most favored institutions under City or State control, for the discipline, education and final reformation of children of this class, assigned by the Courts.

It can be briefly stated as an extract from the detailed financial report of the Superintendent of expenditures for the fiscal year ending October 31, 1905, hereafter submitted, that the total expenditure is \$53,289.69 for an average of 268 boys, and the rate per capita will be found \$198.82; and when the increased costs of supplies are considered, over that of previous years, it will be admitted that the support of the City's wards at the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School, which is a City institution, supported by City funds, the employees of which are assigned from the classified lists of the Civil Service Commission, thus removing from the jurisdiction of the Board of Management the responsibility of qualifying them with the necessary educational test, or the regulating of their compensation for such service, is lower than that of any other institution of a similar character. This statement is

made in answer to some adverse criticism in reference to our request for an increase of our appropriation for the year 1906, to the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment, which was referred to his Honor, the Comptroller, and refused on the ground of economy in cost, compared with religious and eleemosynary institutions.

It may be interesting, by way of illustration, to quote from a late report of the Chief Examiner of Accounts of Institutions to the Comptroller, published in the CITY RECORD of Saturday, December 9, 1905, on page 10,407, in which he states:

"It can be said, however, that the City has paid an average cost of \$134.15, per capita, per annum, in private institutions, although the full expense of maintaining the inmates of the private institutions is perhaps double that sum."

If this statement is true, and we believe it is, we find that the difference between the sum of \$134.15, per capita, paid on account of municipal responsibility and the actual cost of maintenance, comes from the pockets of charitably disposed people; and that the entire cost being \$268.30, it must be at once accepted that the per capita expense for the support, discipline and education in the school and trade shops of the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School is much below that of any other institution employed in similar work, under City or State control.

In a previous report to your Honor, we quoted from the records of the State Board of Charities, showing that ten schools and institutions under private management, but mainly supported by State appropriations, have an annual expenditure of \$917,289.63, with a total beneficiary numbering 3,324, showing an annual per capita of \$275.95; and among them is the House of Refuge on Randall's Island, which is maintained as a State institution, but a large percentage of its expense is furnished by indirect tax on The City of New York.

Repeated attacks have been made on the administration of this institution by the Chief Examiner of Accounts of Institutions in the employ of the Finance Department, founded on a visit made by him, lasting less than 40 minutes, in October, 1902, from which brief visit emanated a report to Mayor Low, in which was stated many malicious and untruthful statements, since contradicted in the published report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the then managers of this institution, all of which was substantiated by a careful investigation by the public press of our City, and numerous Grand Juries, who monthly visit this institution, and whose reports to the Court will be found on record in the District Attorney's office of Kings County.

Among the many members of the judiciary, we take the liberty of mentioning the name of Judge Robert J. Wilkin, of the Children's Court, from whom we receive a large percentage of the boys assigned to this institution. Many civic societies will be found among those who visit the school from time to time, of whom might be mentioned the president and members of the Brooklyn League. The heads of the charitable institutions make constant visits, on invitations, among whom may be mentioned the Monday Club of Brooklyn, all of whom, without exception, have most favorably commended the administration of the same, and officially contradicted the statements made by the Chief Examiner of Accounts of Institutions in his report of the one and only visit he ever made to this institution, though he reports otherwise in a communication to his Honor, the Comptroller, and published in the CITY RECORD of December 9, 1905.

The year which has just closed has been one of great activity in each of the educational divisions of the institution, in support of which I take the liberty of submitting the following extracts from the report of the November (1905) Grand Jury: "We found the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys the most interesting, as well as one of the most worthy and beneficent of the County institutions."

"The good work done here in reclaiming the young and giving them practical instruction in useful occupations, thus putting them in the way of becoming self-respecting and self-supporting citizens, is incalculable.

"We cannot too cordially recommend what is being done and accomplished at this institution, and it deserves, and we hope will receive, ample appropriation to enable it to have every facility necessary for furthering the good work being done.

"The order and neatness displayed, as well as the marvelous results achieved with the means at their command, bespeak the efficiency of the management.

"We wish that every citizen of Kings County could visit the institution and realize for himself the good accomplished."

The trend of education in school and trade shops is directed to fit your wards more for trades and other employment found in urban centres, and should they fail in opportunity, our military education fits them to fill positions in such departments as the Fire and Police, the Army and Navy, and many other departments of the government.

Classification enters largely in our plan of disciplining the mental and physical development of our youthful delinquents, and we find that the methods employed for reformation are not difficult when made attractive. Nine years of experience and service has placed the institution past the experimental stage and its increasing necessities for enlargement appeal with obligatory emphasis to the City authorities for more generous consideration during the coming year than has been accorded it in the past.

No institution within the bounds of the great metropolis or of the Empire State is so well adapted by location, education and discipline to cure the disease of crime in its early stages as the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys; hence we urgently appeal for an extension of our accommodations and facilities, for buildings adequate, congregate or segregate, to accommodate a population of from six to seven hundred boys, and thus permit us to perform the high duty of responsibility to the municipality and the people at large.

For evil associations we substitute rewards for good conduct, instead of prison cells; we have secular and religious instruction, trade schools and an ample pro rata of recreative hours during the day. That these methods are successful in accomplishing intended results there is ample testimony to show, and it might be mentioned that out of the large number of boys released during the past year from this institution we have received only a single complaint from an employer, and less than 4 per cent. of the entire number of boys discharged have been assigned to other institutions by the Courts.

In conclusion I respectfully present the list of officers and members of the institution and the Superintendent's statement of the finances for the year 1905.

Superintendent's Report.

To the Honorable Board of Managers of the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School
for Boys:

Gentlemen—I herewith submit my report as superintendent for the year ending October 31, 1905:

The past year has been one of steady progress in all branches of the work of the institution. The result accomplished has won for the administration abundant congratulations from all those interested in the good work performed, in the reformation of those assigned by the Courts for education and discipline to your care, hence the single exception made by an employee in the Department of Finance, referred to in the President's letter, and dating back to a report made by this employee in the year 1902, and also referred to in a late report published in the CITY RECORD, December 9, 1905, to his Honor, the Comptroller, as a reason why the schedules submitted for supplies and the support of this institution for the year 1906 should not be increased over the amount of \$48,000, a sum insufficient for the large increased population of previous years.

It may be worth stating that during the past year we cared for 429 boys, a number more than 50 in excess of that cared for during any one year of the life of the institution, now entering on its tenth year of usefulness.

I respectfully submit herewith a detailed statement of the expenditures for the year 1905, and I am gratified to say that the amount per capita, viz: \$198.82, shows a creditable reduction over all previous years, if the advanced cost of supplies during the past year is considered. I take the liberty of submitting the following table for comparison:

Many new equipments have been made in our shops, and other improvements throughout the buildings, which might be classed under the head of extraordinary expenses, but not classified in general results.

The curriculum of the trade shops, military discipline and school education has been carefully and successfully carried out during the year, the details of which are respectfully reported hereafter, and it is particularly unfortunate that I have to here express the same standard complaint, viz: that the authorities have done nothing throughout the year to relieve the dissatisfactory condition of the old frame building, now condemned by the Board of Health and the Building Department of the City, and in which are contained many of our shops, schools, lavatories, temporary hospital and detention ward.

It will be noted with much satisfaction the great liberality in the number of discharges from the institution during the year, numbering 179, or 83 over that of 1904 and 18 over the number received, and it can be stated with certainty that none were assigned to their parents, guardians or employment who were not fully qualified for the distinction of your clemency after the careful investigation of your Committee on Discharge.

The training of the hand has been found good, but best when combined with the training of the mind. The good work of the shops has not been secured at the expense of the school-room, and systematic instruction has been given daily, morning and afternoon, in the common English branches, as in the shops where thoroughness is required.

Withal, the military discipline of the school is held up to a standard unexcelled in any other institution in this State or City, and our band music holds the high position it had attained in my previous report.

In the health records of the school it will be found that we have had no deaths, and at the present writing there is not a single boy in the hospital needing treatment.

I take the liberty of submitting a few out of many reports from visiting Grand Juries, the Board of Health, and those of many civic and religious societies engaged in similar work and with some degree of pride I state that a single complaint or adverse criticism upon the administration and discipline of the institution has not been made by those qualified to judge of the character of work employed for the reformation of your wards.

The Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys is a City institution, established by act of Legislature and accepted by The City of New York for the reformation of juvenile delinquents, and strictly conforming in the fullest sense with the policy of municipal ownership in public utilities, as applied to criminal institutions, and depending for support on an annual appropriation from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the disbursement of which is authorized by the acceptance of monthly requisitions, presented at each meeting of the Board of Management, subject, however, to the approval of the Comptroller, after examination by authorized inspectors of the Finance Department.

I respectfully submit a detailed statement of the expenditures for 1905 in this report, and it will be noted by your Finance Committee that substantial reduction has been made in the per capita cost for maintaining during the year just passed, when the increased cost of supplies is considered over that of 1904, and it can be stated that this was not accomplished at the expense of efficiency in any of the departments in the institution.

The cost of supplies was much higher in 1905 than that of previous years and the number cared for was largely in excess, numbering 429 boys during that period, and less than 4 per cent. of the number of boys discharged to parents or employment during the year reached the Courts for assignment to other institutions. Most favorable reports have been received from those discharged to their parents or employment, verified by many interesting letters and investigations during the past year, a few of which are published in this report for the information of your Honorable Board.

While the strictest economy existed in each department the food supply was regulated only by the appetites of your wards; each was supplied with three suits of clothing during the year, two changes of underwear and a sweater completed their requirements in raiment.

If a comparison of expenditures were made with more favored institutions in population and structural equipment it would be found favorable to your administration.

I trust the foregoing brief summary will be found sufficiently convincing to prove that waste or extravagance does not exist in this institution in the expenditure of public money.

The attention of your Honorable Board of Management is respectfully called to a few of many reports of visiting Grand Juries on inspections of this institution, extracts from the public press and members of civic organizations, societies, charitable and eleemosynary institutions. All are of the most complimentary character and, considering the experience and high standing of the gentlemen in our civic life, they should be accepted as very encouraging.

It is imperative that I should again call the attention of your Honorable Board to the unfavorable conditions that exist in the housing of your wards and the many disadvantages your staff has to contend with in the exercise of duty imposed by the rules governing the management of the institution. The old frame building is inadequate and unsuited for the purpose of reformatory effort and is now condemned by the Board of Health and the Building Department of this borough, and if removed or razed will deprive us of many departments therein contained.

A proper classification should exist in all reformatory work. The mental and physical development of the youthful delinquents is not most difficult if the methods used are made attractive. Habits acquired by association and environment need many corrective methods before a sense of moral elevation is aroused, hence a proper classification should exist in all reformatory work. Therefore the official heads of our municipal government should seriously consider their civic responsibility for the proper housing of the unfortunate children assigned to your care and jurisdiction and discharge their obligations in a more liberal spirit by recognition of the great services rendered to them and the community alike.

It would incline one to the belief that the saving of one of those children from a life of criminality would return interest one hundred fold. If this is considered as an economic proposition it will be at once admitted that it is better to prevent crime in the kindergarten stage by discipline and education than to pay for its punishment and support in a later state of criminal development in jail.

Year after year your earnest petitions have met with no response to relieve conditions as they exist, and the temporary repairs made necessary by age and inadequateness should now be considered in reference to the structure complained of as an extravagance and waste of public money.

Public schools rise symmetrically and beautifully in every neighboring section to meet the ever increasing demand for a higher elementary education of the more favored children in home and environment, and the world rejoices at the great possibilities of the future in education.

If indeed the great heart of municipal responsibility throbs to an impulse harmonizing with public demand at the expense of the tax-paying minority, to the great benefit of the majority, it would incline one to the belief that one more throb of that beneficent civic heart would respond to the expending of a sum equal to the cost of one of those beautiful schools for the proper housing of those less favored children who, often without fault of theirs, are outcasts on the public streets, exposed to the temptation that leads to a life of criminality, disgrace and suffering. Is there not a possibility that their return to a place in American manhood would pay a profit one hundred fold, purely on the economic lines before stated, to the municipality? There is no degree of doubt on this subject from any standpoint of discussion.

What is true of the great city's obligations to our public school system is equally true of its responsibility to the Disciplinary Training School for Boys, with this difference, that after school sessions the responsibility of the Board of Education is assigned to home and parental love and supervision, while the city's wards, assigned by the Courts and for whom you are responsible, end only when a cure is effected, qualifying them for a new start in life, made possible by untiring effort on your part and the officers of your school, empowered to perform their duties under your direction and supervision. The argument has been advanced by high official authority that the congregate system should not be encouraged in institution life, and the statement is strengthened by the fact that many public institutions under State control are directing attention to this important consideration, and many have already secured large areas of land for the establishment of institutions on the segregate (on cottage) plan.

A late visit to the Juvenile Asylum at Echo Hill, near Dobbs Ferry, at the Hudson, by your Superintendent convinced him that there a perfect system of classification existed and it can be stated with certainty that the future of this institution is established, as far as it applies to the segregating of criminally inclined boys, and while it necessitated this private sectarian institution to reduce its population from a number exceeding one thousand to three hundred boys, and a large increase in the per capita cost to a sum equal to \$250 or \$275 per annum, no doubt should exist that benefits largely in excess of the amount expended will be returned in discipline best adapted to children of the streets in a great city like ours, and due consideration should be given to a line of training to fit them for opportunities presented in great commercial centres in occupations easily obtained when properly equipped by education and discipline.

To the Industrial School for Juvenile Delinquents at Rochester the State has granted an appropriation amounting to \$125,000, under the Laws of 1903, chapter 599, for the purchase of a farm of 1,400 acres outside of the City of Rochester, and a further sum of \$206,000 for buildings and equipments.

The House of Refuge on Randall's Island, conducted on similar lines with the Rochester school, and supported by State funds, desires to establish an institution of a similar character.

The Truants' Home in The City of Brooklyn has already acquired an extensive area of land on Long Island for the purpose of establishing the segregate system on the plan of the Juvenile Asylum at Echo Hill and only await the tendering of sufficient funds from the City treasury for the construction of buildings and equipment.

The Catholic Protectory, the largest and best equipped institution of this character within the bounds of the City or State, is seriously considering the sale of its property in Westchester and the transferring of its population to some favorable location on Long Island.

The Disciplinary Training School for Boys seems to be the only one neglected by our great municipality, though its present location has many advantages over those of the institutions before mentioned, needing only an extension of 10 to 15 acres to the property now owned by the City and which could be acquired adjoining the present holding, at a price most favorable, for the improvement desired.

The trend of education in the Disciplinary Training School is directed in education and discipline to fit those assigned for trades and other employment found in urban centres, and should they fail in opportunity our military education fits them to fill positions in such departments as the Fire, Police, the Army and Navy, and many other departments of the government.

It is a serious consideration as to whether City bred boys are adapted to fill a position as farm hand. Experience in the past has proven that a large number of these boys assigned from institutions deserted the occupation found for them on farms and returned to their old haunts after a season of travel in the country as tramps. Suburban life has few attractions for the City bred boy of our streets.

The one great advantage to be obtained is classification, and this must be considered as all-important. With this in view we accept popular judgment as it should apply to institutions founded on a military system like ours, in confirmation of which I respectfully suggest the following for the consideration of your Committee on Buildings and Repairs:

First—The future of this institution is established and should be considered seriously as a municipal responsibility. With this fact in view it should be placed in a condition to properly discharge its obligations to the community and the municipality alike, by improving its facilities as a reformatory school and by harmonizing with what is accepted as modern requirements in structures and equipment for the proper education and reformation of a number of boys, not less than 600, at an expenditure not largely in excess of the cost of a single modern public school.

Second—It is imperative that the defects in the present frame building should receive immediate attention, that the laws of the Board of Health and the Building Department, who have condemned the same within the last four months, and the recommendations of the State Board of Charities, be complied with, and a more comprehensive and effective system of classification be established.

Third—That the frame building referred to, now over 125 years old, in which are housed many trade shops, schools, hospital, detention wards, bath and wash room, house mother and female employees' sleeping apartments, should be removed from the main building, that better security from fire may be established and its present sanitary condition improved. Ample City land is available 200 feet from its present dangerous location. It should be removed at once and substantial alterations made to fit it as a detention ward and hospital—its isolation from the other buildings considerably strengthening this recommendation.

Fourth—An armory and gymnasium should be built sufficiently large to afford shelter and exercise for four hundred boys, fitted with individual closets (or lockers) for the protection of regimentals and other equipment necessary in military drill and calisthenics.

Fifth—A power house should be built, detached from the main building, sufficiently large to furnish light, heat and power to the many trade shops.

Sixth—A permanent brick extension should be built, conforming in style and elevation with the present brick structure, and extend north of the present building 200x70x60, in which could be established schools, shops, administrative offices, chapel and employees' apartments.

Seventh—Ten cottages should be built, each to house 40 boys, in size 30x50, two-story, basement and mansard, containing a kitchen, dining-room, dormitories, reading room, bath and wash rooms and suitable apartments for a caretaker and wife, and cooking assistant. Sufficient land is available on the west side of the present building and east of Eighteenth avenue.

Eighth—The want of a greenhouse or conservatory is felt for the raising of flowers and plants. This school of culture, like music, has a stimulating effect in the direction of refinement and better environment, and our spacious grounds could be materially improved and our wards would find many attractions to elevate their minds and instruct their hands.

Ninth—Nine acres of land, five on the north and four on the south side of the nine acres now in the possession of the City, can be acquired by purchase at market value, thus extending the area of the institution to about twenty acres, an area sufficient to meet every requirement necessary for the improvement of this institution for a long term of years. I take pleasure in stating that we are in a position to furnish plans, specifications and models of one or all of the improvements desired from our advanced class in carpentry when required.

The following brief statement I trust will be accepted as illustrative of each department, and that the same will be received by your Honorable Board as a detailed description of conditions as they exist in this institution:

Military Departments.

This department is conducted strictly on the lines of the United States code. Two hundred boys, fully equipped with guns and other necessary accoutrements, re-

ceive daily instructions, lasting one hour, in drill and calisthenics; they have attained an efficiency of 85 per cent. in the code by actual test. A full dress inspection drill is held on Saturdays, at 2 o'clock p. m., for public review, and a fire drill on Wednesdays, at 11 a. m.

Class in Band Music.

This class is composed of 56 pupils, receiving two lessons daily, morning and afternoon. They have received high recommendations from those qualified to judge their progress in musical education.

Carpentry.

The manual and arithmetical exercises in this department are conducted on the lines of the Sloyd School in the primary class—the advanced class has attained an efficiency in wood turning, carving and general construction in advanced carpentry, creditable to their intelligence and industry.

Shoe Department.

The boys are employed in this department in the morning and afternoon sessions. They manufacture and repair all shoes worn by the boys of the institution. Every new appliance in machinery known to the trade is here to be found, propelled by electric power. They receive instructions complete in every subdivision of construction known to the trade.

Printing Shop.

The course followed in this department is conducted with a view to educational direction, reading and correcting compositions, spacing, distribution, making up, lessons at the type-case, stone work and instructions at the press. Many creditable samples of their progress are on exhibition. This report is a sample of their work.

Tailoring Department.

Every opportunity is afforded the pupils of this department to become efficient in the manufacture of clothing. The mechanical appliances are up-to-date in every particular, and the sewing machines are propelled by electric power—13 in number. Twenty-four boys are here instructed in the technical branches of the trade, arithmetical measurement, pattern grading, busheling and repairing and operating on power machines. Uniform and fatigue suits, composed of coat, trousers, vests, shirts, caps, underwear and other articles of requirement are here manufactured. The advanced class of this department has shown efficiency in manufacturing employees' uniforms, and the output is estimated at 500 dress uniform suits (military), 500 fatigue suits, 1,000 shirts, 500 caps and 500 sets of underwear. This output could be doubled with increased floor space.

Electrical and Steam Engineering.

Here the pupil is afforded an opportunity to attain a foundation on which to build a future in electrical and steam engineering. The service of six boys in this department has contributed greatly in the operating and repairing of the machinery in use. The efficiency of this department is much curtailed by the lack of floor space. We are unable to introduce a blacksmith and plumber shop, two branches of trade that would economize largely in the expense of repairs to the institution and educate our wards in the kindred branches of these trades so well adapted to their condition.

Painting Class.

Here eight boys are taught to apply a paint brush in its application to house painting; the compounding and mixing of colors and glazing are made branches of this department; graining, varnishing, finishing and interior decorations have attained a degree at once creditable to their efforts and contribute largely to the order and cleanliness of the interior of the institution.

Landscape and Gardening.

This class is composed of those discharged from the detention ward and is made the first step in the direction of physical development and discipline. The junior class is composed of the latest assignment and receives two hours' instruction in the forenoon—they receive school education in the afternoon. The second class is employed in the afternoon and attends the morning school session. From this department all branches of manual training are recruited. Grading, sodding, the care of lawns and flower beds are the services rendered in this department. The erection of a conservatory for the raising of flowers and plants is looked forward to in the near future and will contribute largely to the health and development of the boys interested in this attractive branch of education.

Laundry.

Eight boys are assigned to this department. Here every modern appliance will be found to perfect instructions and economize labor. Here the clothing and general house wash of the institution is completed, and is seldom less than 1,000 pieces per week. The larger boys are taught how to operate the washing machine, the driers, wringers, mangles, extractors, ironing, all of which are propelled by steam power.

Scholastic.

The schools of the institution are composed of six classes—two in the morning and two in the afternoon—with an average attendance of 45 boys in each class; an evening class with an attendance of 200, and a special night class with an average attendance of 20. The daily sessions average five hours. The course of study is similar to that taught in the public schools. The writing material and text books are the best, and excellent results are obtained by the teachers who possess the necessary certificates of qualification and are assigned for duty from the Civil Service list.

Seamstress' Workroom.

Here eight wards of the junior class are assigned—four in the morning session and four in the afternoon. They are occupied in the repair of underwear, stockings and general examination of wash goods from the laundry, prior to assignment to departments for use. The weekly changes of raiment are here prepared, composed of a fatigue or working suit, underwear, socks, sheets, quilts, etc. Foot power sewing machines are here operated to instruct the boys prior to assignment to the tailor shop.

Storeroom.

This is a model of cleanliness and order from which all requirements of the different departments and shops are furnished on requisition. Four boys are here afforded an opportunity of learning a rudimentary lesson in bookkeeping, weights and measures and a general store education in merchandise, dry goods, stationery, hardware and groceries.

Religious Service.

Hebrew, Roman Catholic and Protestant services are held—twice in each subdivision—weekly. Instructions in each are given by the monitor under the direction of the clergyman of their faith. Services are held on Sundays, Tuesdays and Fridays of each week, for which the visiting clergymen receive a compensation of \$120 per annum each, regulated by the Civil Service Commission. Sunday evening is devoted to instruction by a lecturer, illustrated with view by a stereopticon, in history, travel and mechanics, closing with reading and songs, which inspire a spirit of patriotism, and this commendable spirit prevails among our little army of soldiers—for all are soldiers—to no ordinary degree, for their knowledge of drill and calisthenics is rarely to be found in youths of their age.

Armory.

A structure completed by the advanced class in carpentry, which is modeled from the house of William Shakespeare, at Stratford-on-Avon, England, and the new memorial arch and music stand, modeled from a gateway in Edinburgh Castle, Scotland, are illustrations of the progress made in this department within the last year. Near these will be found an attempt at landscape gardening—a conservatory is contemplated for the education of flower culture.

Dormitories, refectory, wash rooms, culinary and other minor departments need only a personal visit to convince one that cleanliness, order and discipline have attained a degree of efficiency at once creditable to the officers in charge.

I trust that the foregoing will be accepted as my report for the year ending November 1, 1905.

I thank you, gentlemen, for your continued confidence and support, without which my efforts would not succeed.

School Curriculum.

I take pleasure in presenting to your Honorable Board the following brief report of progress made in each of the educational departments during the year ending November 1, 1905, the details of which have been presented at the regular monthly meeting of your Honorable Board.

The class schedule is composed of six classes—two in the morning and two in the afternoon, with an average attendance of fifty-four boys in each class; night class of two hundred and fifteen boys and special night class of fifty-six boys. The day classes cover a period of five hours—two and one-half hours a. m., two and one-half hours p. m. session; the boys alternating class work with trades shops. All the ordinary branches of a common school education, as shown in the curriculum, are taught here. There has been a considerable increase in promotions during the year as compared with that of any previous year, the boys showing remarkable interest in their work and desire for advancement. A great deal of individual work has been done and the boy who was inclined to be dilatory in his class work was urged on by strenuous efforts to compete with those who successfully reached the top.

As a rule the boys are quite responsive to the interest manifested in them, and it is a very rare occasion in which any other measure than that of moral suasion has to be resorted to to insure perfect discipline and good feeling in the class room.

The study of history and geography is very much facilitated by the stereopticon views given at the Sunday evening entertainments. The lines followed during the week on those subjects and the current historical events are closely in touch with the views given.

In addition to the regular day classes a special class has been instituted for backward boys whose education had been seriously neglected previous to their entering the school, and whose talents are not up to the ordinary standard. Those boys receive special coaching—two sessions each week—on those subjects in which they are most deficient. Particular attention has been given to original drawings, and the improvements made in this branch is quite satisfactory. Marked progress has been made in the ordinary branches of education as shown by the result of examinations by the Committee on Education held periodically during the year.

Study Hall Exercises—Two hours each night are devoted to the preparation of lessons for the day following. The studies for each day are written on the blackboards, and careful supervision is brought to bear on the students to insure the best results. This exercise has borne good fruit, as when the boys present themselves in class they have a fair knowledge of the school work for that day.

The class exercises are begun and ended with the "Salute to the Flag."

Class D—Number in class, 50; rating, 60 to 80; spelling, arithmetic, grammar, 1 to 2; reading, history, geography, 2 to 3; civics, drawing, hygiene, writing, 3 to 4.

Night Class—Grammar Grade.

Class E—Number in class, 56; rating, 80 to 100; grammar, composition, arithmetic, 6 to 6.45; reading, writing, history, 6.45 to 7.15; spelling, geography, dictation, 7.15 to 8.

Special Day Class.

Class F, Wednesday, P. M., Saturday, A. M.—Number in class, 45; rating, 1 to 60; reading, writing, 1 to 2; arithmetic, tables, 2 to 3; spelling, sentences, 3 to 4.

Study Hall Exercises—Night Session.

Hours of study, 6 p. m. to 8 p. m., Grades A, B, C and D. Lessons from black-board selections preparatory to day class.

The subdivision of work daily is as follows:

Primary Class—Morning session, 2½ hours, 8 to 10.30.

Grammar Class—Afternoon session, 2½ hours, 1 to 3.30.

Manual Training Class—Morning session, 2½ hours, 8 to 10.30.

Industrial Class—Afternoon Session, 3½ hours, 1 to 4.30.

Military Drill and Calisthenics—Morning, 1 hour, 11 to 12.

Time allowed for meals 1½ hours, 6.30, 12, 5.

Dress and recreation period, 2 hours.

In dormitory, 9½ hours, 8.30 to 6.

Instruction in instrumental music, band, 3 sessions daily.

Classification.

The moral training and discipline of the school has advanced under the guidance of your visiting committees and the earnest efforts of our staff officers.

Still there is no doubt that more satisfactory results could be attained were it possible to establish a better classification of your wards. All that could be accomplished in this important direction has been carefully exercised considering the present inadequate structures, old and uninviting as they are, and never adapted to the purpose for which they are used.

It is at least compensating to know that every suggestion and order given by the Board of Health has been promptly complied with, when responsibility was chargeable to your Honorable Board.

The health records of the school can be classed among the best; and as stated in previous reports, can be said that only a single ward died in the institution since 1897, and it is of rare occurrence to find more than a single ward in our hospital at a time.

Admission to the school for inspection is permitted from 7 a. m. to 8 p. m., daily to those interested in reformatory work. And it is gratifying to say that outside of structural defects, adverse criticism has not been made against your administration. In the general management education, disciplining and restoration of our youthful incorrigibles to a brighter future than was hoped for in the past.

Synopsis of Distribution to Schools, Shops, Etc.

The following synopsis of distribution to shops and industrial departments of the institution shows that all inmates are receiving much needed mental and manual training, and the high percentages shown in each of the monthly reports of the progress in the various departments indicate success that deserves the high commendation expressed by members of the Grand Juries and others.

A daily record of each ward's progress is kept by the Instructor in each department from which a monthly report is made of his standing in class, shops and drill; the average per cent. is credited and published in the School Journal for distribution.

All understand the importance and value of a good record, not alone in good conduct but in each subdivision of employment, many look forward to the monthly report to discover how the record stands in some special branch in which they have not succeeded in previous reports. Understanding that everything comes to him who exercises effort in school, shop and drill, the boy attaining 75 per cent., qualified by age, which is usually placed at 14 years, finds little difficulty in obtaining a discharge to his parents or employment, if they are found competent to assume the responsibility after due investigation by your Committee on Discharge.

By means of these views, the boys are given a knowledge of the different countries of the world, their attention called to famous and interesting subjects of history by your Superintendent, who delivers the lectures and explains the subject represented by each view. Prior to the lecture and illustrations the boys are exercised in singing the national songs, accompanied by the school brass band, whose efficient playing is a subject of great comment by all who have had the pleasure of hearing it and of which the school may be justly proud.

Report of the Attending Physician.

During the year 1905 the following cases have been under treatment. The health of the inmates of the institution has been excellent, and a case of contagion is of rare occurrence. A late examination of the boys' eyes convinced the inspector that the much dreaded disease trachoma was unknown in the institution.

It is a rare exception to find more than one patient in our hospital, and then only for a short time, and none have been rejected out of a large number received for physical or mental defect. Our physician is untiring in his attention, and the greatest credit is due to our house mother for the efficient care of her large family of boys.

Report on Dental Surgery.

During the year each new arrival had his mouth thoroughly examined before leaving the detention ward, and semi-annually thereafter, and every tooth that can be saved is filled.

It is evinced from the bad condition of their teeth that their parents or guardians have not taught them the importance of cleaning and caring for their teeth as a necessary requisite to good health. A marked improvement was found at last examination over that of last year, and our young patients seem to have lost all fear of the dentist, owing to the application of an anaesthetic which makes extraction practically painless.

Dietary.

The following dietary has been carefully considered by the visiting members of your Honorable Board, the Health Department and the members of the Grand Juries on their monthly visits to this institution, all of whom have taken an earnest interest in the quality of the food, which is the best the market produces, and the quantity distributed to each ward is regulated only by his appetite. Pies, cakes, fruits and candies are given weekly as a reward for good conduct and discipline in shops and drill. The healthy, robust bodies of the boys bear testimony to the abundance of nutritious food that they receive, which is as follows:

December Grand Jury Submits a Report Regarding Condition of County Institutions.

The December Grand Jury sent the following letter to Borough President-elect Coler to-day:

Hon. BIRD S. COLER:

Dear Sir—The December Kings County Grand Jury on Tuesday last, the 19th inst., paid a visit to the various county institutions and has submitted a report thereon to the County Court.

In that report attention is called to the meritorious work being done at the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys, located at Eighteenth avenue and Fifty-sixth street, in this borough, and to the pressing need by that institution of more liberal treatment in the matter of appropriations for its maintenance and enlargement.

It is by no means the first time a Grand Jury has made similar recommendations in regard to this school, but as little or nothing has resulted, as far as we can learn, we take the liberty of addressing you on the subject, in full confidence that you will do whatever lies in your power to further the best interests of the community at large and of this school in particular, when you shall have satisfied yourself that it is deserving.

Not only as grand jurors, but as citizens, we are anxious to impress upon you the earnestness of our hope that you may find an opportunity to personally investigate the institution, for we feel sure that once you have done so you will be emphatic in upholding its claim for fair treatment at the hands of the proper authorities.

We will not attempt to describe the scope and methods of the school. It is, as you are undoubtedly aware, a place to which boys of tender age are committed by the Children's Court. We believe no one will deny that a great advance was made in the administration of justice when such children were rescued from the depraved influences to which they were formerly subjected, and we urge that this school, which is a necessary part of that important work of reform, be given proper financial support.

We realize the full force of the demand for economy in the administration of public affairs, and are in complete accord with it, but we believe that there are many other ways and means of exercising it, and that the undue application of it to the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys would be a grave mistake.

We therefore suggest that, inasmuch as the institution is covered by special appropriation, amenable to none of the regular City appropriations, that by right of office as the first citizen of Brooklyn, that you personally champion this worthy cause at this opportune time.

We do also desire to be on record as emphatically opposed to the proposition as suggested by the June Grand Jury, namely: the removal of this institution and the boys to any of the islands suggested by them.

We cannot help these boys to useful lives and help them to become good citizens if we place them amongst the more mature and hardened criminals.

We heartily commend the District Attorney and his assistants in their able and efficient presentation of the cases before us. It was due to this that we were able to accomplish the work that we have.

Extract from Speech by Hon. Robert J. Wilkin, Justice of Children's Court, Before the Brooklyn League.

In relation to the management of the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys, you have gone through the buildings, and as far as the management can make it the institution is in perfect condition. I never went through a dormitory where the air was more sweet and clean, and in view of the dilapidated condition of the adjoining building, the cleanliness of the institution speaks loudly for the management.

It is clearly evident that the institution is doing something necessary and should be supported in a proper way. It remains for all of us to go to our Board of Estimate and impress upon them the great necessity for such an institution as the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys.

Extract from Speech by Rev. William I. Nichols, Brooklyn Bureau of Charities, Before Monday Club of Brooklyn.

During the time the Monday Club has been in existence I suppose there is no institution with which we have had closer relations than the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School, and I may say briefly that the Monday Club is composed of people who are trying to help others in philanthropic and benevolent work. I have known a good deal about the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School. I have been here a few times, but I have never seen it under such favorable conditions as I do to-day. I do not know of any school in our community where the boys are better cared for and instructed under better conditions. I thought as I listened to that beautiful music that every one of those boys in that band has a trade with which he may be able to earn his living some day when he leaves this institution.

The boys here are taught not only to know things—reading, writing, arithmetic and these things—but to do things. I believe if the Board of Education of the City would only come out here they would at once conclude that this is a model school. I believe that one of the defects of the public school is that we try to educate the mind and do not sufficiently educate the hand. We must educate both together.

The boys of this institution are getting a rounded education. There is a place for study; there is a place for work; there is a place for play; so I cannot but speak in the way of encouragement to those who are carrying on the work of this institution and also encouragement to the community.

I saw something in the papers not long ago about doing away with this institution, and cannot imagine what anyone could have in mind, but I am satisfied if the people of influence in our City and in our State could come down here and see the work you are doing they would realize it as one of the most important institutions in existence. We shall all be the better for having seen the work that is being done here.

Extract from Speech by Hon. James McKeen, President, Brooklyn League.

It causes me great pleasure on behalf of the Brooklyn League to say we have come here as members of the Brooklyn League to get inspiration, which was possibly needed to add to the extent of our power in aiding the development of this very important institution of our City. I wish to take this occasion to express the delight with which I viewed the military drill, which we had the pleasure of seeing this afternoon, and to congratulate the Superintendent upon that feature in this institution. Military drill is one of the best fitting schools for usefulness in life.

Extract from Hebrew Standard.

A visit which I paid to the institution of the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys has afforded much food for reflection and has left a lasting impression on my mind. I found an institution of the most striking and useful character, which is hardly known to the general public and which pre-eminently deserves public attention, support and interest.

Extract from Speech by the Hon. George W. Brush.

I have known very little, I am sorry to say, about what this institution has been doing for the last two or three years. The father of this institution is on the platform at my left. Judge Wilkin is really the father of this institution and is the one who drew up the bill. He opened up the matter to me and I very readily fell in with it and took possession of the bill, and if you think I had any cinch, as the boys say, in getting the bill through the Legislature you are mistaken. It was defeated the first year, but I am not one to give up anything I undertake if I think it is right. The second year the bill went through and was signed by the Governor.

I have been very much impressed by what I have seen this afternoon. As I saw the boys drilling it brought back to my mind the early days of '63 and '65. Judge McKeen has said something about discipline. I know what that means; I spent four years in the army during the Civil War. I remember when we got into line and ran up and down the fields and learned to make those movements which were so important to us on the field of battle. I thought it was hard then, though; discipline is worth a great deal, as it is an important step towards success. If you are going to have success in this world you must have discipline and knowledge, and the object of this bill was to give you that discipline and knowledge; to take the boys out of the streets, where they were learning bad habits, and give them the education which they ought to have to make them good and perhaps useful citizens, a power in the land.

Extracts from the Press, Brooklyn League Day.

Saturday, November 12, was Brooklyn League Day at the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys, Eighteenth avenue and Fifty-sixth street. At 1.30 last Saturday a large number of the members of the league, and invited guests numbering two hundred, visited this institution. The inspection commenced with a battalion drill of the boys three hundred strong.

The uniforms and military equipment were all that could be desired and the boys went through the drill with a snappiness and precision that would have done credit to an elect regiment. The movements were excellently executed and all presented a clean and healthy appearance.

The band of the institution, with over forty-five pieces, then gave a concert on the parade grounds, during which a number of the boys of the institution sang some solos with remarkable sweetness of voice, which displayed talent, after which the gentlemen of the league and their guests, accompanied by several members of the Board of Management and the Superintendent, visited the class rooms, dormitories, carpenter, tailor, shoemaker, printing and other branch trade shops of the institution.

Much favorable comment was made on the perfect order and cleanliness of each department visited, all of which, we are informed, is attributable to the discipline of the boys, who performed the work under the direction of intelligent employees, after which the wards of the institution were transferred to the Chapel Hall, where the exercises of the afternoon were presided over by Morris Adler, President of the Board of Management, who opened the proceedings with a hearty speech of welcome to the gentlemen of the Brooklyn League and their invited guests. He then referred to the Hon. Judge Robert J. Wilkin, of the Children's Court, in complimentary terms as the father of the institution, he having prepared the first legislative bill some nine years ago for the State Legislature, and who served as first Secretary of the Board of Management for some years after the establishment of the institution. He also referred to Senator George W. Brush as the Godfather, he having presented the bill and successfully passed the same.

At the conclusion of his very brief and interesting remarks of welcome to the distinguished gentlemen he introduced the Hon. James McKeen, Chairman of the Brooklyn League, who complimented the Board of Management for the great pleasure afforded the league in visiting the institution, and the success of their efforts in behalf of the wards of the City assigned to their jurisdiction. He was followed by Senator George W. Brush, who addressed the boys on many topics interesting to children of their age.

Judge Robert J. Wilkin, of the Children's Court, was gratified to meet so many of the boys whom he was compelled to send to this institution, and remarked with some warmth the satisfaction he derived from the improvement in their appearance and demeanor since he first saw them.

Further addresses were made by Messrs. Samuel Rowland, Frank H. Tyler and Charles T. Hoogland, a member of the Board of Management, at the conclusion of which a formal reception was held by the Board of Management to the league and their guests.

The ceremonies concluded with the salute to the American flag, and all those present expressed themselves as highly satisfied with all they had seen, and congratulated Mr. Farrell sincerely upon his achievement.

Letters from Wards and Guardians.

The following communications are a few of a very large number received from wards and guardians. In presenting the same we eliminate the names and substitute the initials, with the record number, feeling that the exposure of the proper names and addresses may be detrimental to some degree in the future record of the pupils referred to. It is sufficient to say that we have received reports from about 120 of the 179 boys discharged during the year 1905. Of this large number only six complaints have been made of the conduct of the boys discharged, and not more than 4 per cent. of all those discharged have reached the courts for assignment to other institutions; 35 are reported as self-supporting, and favorable reports are received of 43 attending the public schools, satisfactory in conduct to both parents and teachers. I trust that the few following reports will be found illustrative of the number quoted above:

My mother found employment for me in a tinware factory at \$4 per week and I am working there steady now. At home my conduct is pretty fair and I am getting along well. BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held in the Staff Room of Bellevue Hospital on Tuesday, January 9, 1906.

Present—Doctor Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Tack, Robbins, Tierney, Sachs and Paulding, Trustees.

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows: Complying with the instructions of the Board of Trustees to report on the custom of other large hospitals in the matter of giving reporters access to the records of out patients receiving emergency treatment, none of the hospitals with which correspondence has been had grants any such privilege. If it is introduced here the amount of clerical work will be increased considerably.

In 1905 an appropriation of \$430 a month was allowed to purchase fresh vegetables and fruits for the various messes and hospitals. It is recommended that \$440 be appropriated this year, as the number of persons eating in the physicians' mess at Bellevue has been increased by temporary assistants in the pathological laboratory.

A letter from the N. J. Mitchell Company, No. 395 Broadway, New York, consulting and managing engineers, is submitted for your consideration. A representative called and requested authority to submit a proposal for inspecting the engineering service of the hospitals of this Department.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the matter of allowing reporters access to the records of emergency dressing cases be and the same is hereby referred back to the Superintendent for still further report.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the recommendation of the Superintendent regarding an increase of ten dollars a month for fresh fruits and vegetables in the doctors' mess, on account of additional doctors in the pathological department, be and the same is hereby approved.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the matter of employing a firm to supervise and inspect regularly the engineering service of the hospitals of this Department be and the same is hereby referred to the Superintendent for investigation and report.

Burke & Sons, contractors, submitting an estimate on changing the feed arrangements in the new ambulance stable at Harlem Hospital, and recommending that Mr. J. H. Freedlander, the architect, be requested to certify to the reasonableness of the price, and that the same be approved provided a satisfactory opinion be received from the architect.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the bid of Luke A. Burke & Sons on changing the feed apparatus of the new Harlem Hospital be and the same is hereby approved, subject to the certification by the architect of its reasonableness.

Dr. Brannan reported having prepared the following letter in his capacity as President of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and suggested that it be sent to the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and to all the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

"January 9, 1906.

"Hon. JOSEPH HAAG, Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, No. 280 Broadway, New York City:

"Sir—I beg to invite your attention to the desirability of acquiring for New York some of the sea beach within its limits or within a reasonable distance of the city. There is, perhaps, no city in the world which has so many miles of ocean shore, and yet, practically none of it is available for public use. The beaches are needed for the purpose of providing fresh air homes for children and for convalescent patients from the city hospitals and also health-giving parks for the people.

"As a result of considerable investigation it appears that there are three beaches which are easy of access and suitable for the purposes just mentioned—Long Beach, Rockaway Beach and the beach at Coney Island.

"At Long Beach there is a stretch of four miles which can be obtained for the sum of two million dollars or less. In addition to the possession of the beach the city would acquire a large hotel structure and thirty to forty cottages, all of which could be put to immediate use for the reception of children and convalescents.

"At Rockaway Beach two miles of shore are available, the price on which has not been fixed, but would not be less than two million dollars. Immediately adjacent are many hundreds of cottages, whose occupants might possibly object to the use of the beach in question by large numbers of convalescent patients or pleasure seekers. For this reason this beach may not be as suitable as Long Beach for the purposes of the City.

"The third beach, that at Coney Island, is already occupied by great public places of amusement, and by a number of fresh-air homes maintained by various charitable organizations of the City. The amount of money invested in the places of amusement is so great that it would probably be out of the question to buy the beach now controlled by them, on account of the excessive cost. The fresh-air homes, some five in number, own about fifteen hundred feet of the water front and it is quite possible that they would find it to their advantage to exchange their present sites for a similar or even better situation at Long Beach. This would give the City the opportunity to convert this portion of the beach at Coney Island into a great public park which could be used by the people who already frequent the

amusement places nearby to the number of hundreds of thousands daily during the warmer months of the year.

"The fact that Coney Island is accessible by boat as well as by train furnishes another reason for the use of this beach as a public park. Still another advantage of the control of this beach by the City would be the opportunity to perfect and carry out a systematic plan for protecting the entire beach by the construction of breakwaters or bulkheads, instead of the rather haphazard and ineffective method at present followed by the individual owners.

"I respectfully request that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment take this subject under consideration and arrange for a public hearing thereon at an early date.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that every possible effort should be made by the City to secure control of Long Beach, the western portion of Rock-away Beach, and whatever remains available of Coney Island, for purposes of recreation and public health, and, as the best means of effecting this end, the Board hereby approves the letter of the President and orders it spread upon the minutes.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
