FIRE DEPARTMENT.

November 30, 1910.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, City of New York:

Sir—Pursuant to the provisions of section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, I have the honor to transmit herewith report of the operations and action of this Department for the quarter ending September 30, 1910.

Financial.

The budget appropriations made to the Department in the various boroughs for the year 1910, aggregated \$8,153,542.40, of which there was expended during the third quarter the sum of \$1,959,211.67. This added to the expenditures of the first three quarters (\$3,708,141) makes a total outlay for the current year to September 30, 1910, of \$5,667,352.67, leaving a balance available of \$2,486,189.73 for the remainder of the current year.

Uniformed Force.

On September 30, 1910 the uniformed force in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond consisted of 2,666 officers and men, and in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens of 1,684, an aggregate of 4,350, including four Chaplains. At the end of the quarter there were 145 apparatus companies in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond and 112 in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, 257 in all. In the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, 16 appointments of probationary firemen were made, and in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, 14, a total of 30. There were six promotions made in the first three boroughs and 5 in the last two, a total of 11. There were retired on half pay 14 officers and men in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, and 21 in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, a total of 35; and on one-third pay, a fireman second grade in the first-mentioned Boroughs, and a fireman of the first grade in the last mentioned boroughs, a total of 2. The dismissals numbered 2 in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, and 1 in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, a total of 3. There was one resignation, that of a fourth grade fireman in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, and none in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens. There were 2 deaths in the active force in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, and 4 in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, a total of 6. The deaths on the retired and relieved lists numbered 10. There were 2 reinstatements of first grade firemen in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, and no reinstatements in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

The number of cases of illness during the quarter in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond was 173, and the time lost as the result thereof 2,030 days; of injury 75, and the time lost thereby 1,106 days. In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens these figures were 84 and 1,242 respectively in the case of illness, and 52 and 883 respectively in the case of injury. The total number of cases of illness and injury in all boroughs was 384 and the time lost thereby 5,261 days.

During the quarter 33 applicants were examined for appointment, 3 of whom were rejected. There was a total of 12 officers and men examined as to their fitness to continue longer in the service, reports in regard to whose condition were submitted to the Commissioner for his action.

In the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond 2,582 alarms for fire were received, and in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens 1,301, a total of 3,883.

Civilian Force.

The civilian force on September 30, 1910, numbered 388 in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, and 133 in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, a total of 521.

Fire Alarm Telegraph Bureau.

At the close of the quarter the underground system in the Borough of Manhattan consisted of 137.84 miles of cable in subways, or 1,223.67 miles of conductor; 4,085 feet of cable were pulled in for alterations and repairs, 6,700 feet of aerial cable taken down, and 9,350 feet of aerial cable strung for alterations and repairs; 2,000 feet of wire were strung and 8,400 feet of wire taken down.

In the Borough of The Bronx 10,285 feet of wire were strung for alterations and repairs, 20,975 feet of wire and 397 feet of aerial cable taken down, and 1,240 feet of aerial cable were placed.

In the Borough of Richmond 2,245 feet of wire were strung and 195 feet of aerial cable were used for alterations and repairs.

In the Borough of Brooklyn the fire alarm system at the close of the quarter consisted of 1,106.7 miles of electrical conductor; 3.54 miles of No. 10 wire and 435 feet of No. 16 wire were used for repairs and replacements and 70 mile of No. 10 wire used for extending the system.

In the Borough of Queens 1.41 miles of No. 10 wire and 750 feet of No. 14 twisted pair wire were used for repairs and replacements.

Fire Prevention.

During the quarter ending September 30, 1910, in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, 1,322 inspections were made of office buildings and 268 at the request of the Police Department and the Bureau of Licenses of premises having theatrical concert and common show licenses; also 2,511 inspections of theatres, making the total number of inspections in these boroughs 4,101.

In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens these inspections numbered 135, 394 and 220 respectively, a total of 749. The aggregate number of inspections in all boroughs was 4,850.

Fires.

The total number of fires during the third quarter in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond was 2,353 with a total estimated loss of \$1,366,839, and an average loss per fire of \$580.89. In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, the number of fires for the third quarter was 1,231, with a total estimated loss of \$376,665, and an average loss per fire of \$305.97.

The aggregate number of fires in all boroughs was 3,584, with a total estimated loss of \$1,743,494.

Combustibles and Explosives.

The receipts for licenses, permits and penalties for the third quarter in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond were \$10,680.50, and in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens \$10,210.50, a total of \$20,891. Special surveys to the number of 8,751 were made in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond to determine the fitness of premises for the storage of combustible or explosive material, including investigation of complaints, and 1,902 in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, a total of 10,653. In the first three boroughs 43 special surveys were made of places of amusement, and 13,616 blasting operations were supervised.

Fire Apparatus.

During the third quarter there were received one 65-foot water tower for use in the Borough of Manhattan, and one horse-drawn gasoline fire engine for use in the Borough of Queens; also 1,500 feet of one-inch chemical hose for use in the Borough of Brooklyn. At the repair shops, Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, considerable miscellaneous repair work was done.

Buildings.

During the quarter contract was completed for additions and alterations to heating and power plant at Repair Shops, Manhattan, and work was in progress on the annex to Headquarters Building, and alterations to main building (including fifth floor, contract for which was awarded during the third quarter) in the same borough, and for new steam heating system therefor; also for steamfitting at various company houses in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and for additions and alterations to quarters of Engine Co. 201 and Hook and Ladder Co. 101 in the Borough of Richmond. Minor repairs were made to 121 buildings in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond.

In the Borough of Brooklyn during the quarter covered by this report, work was in progress on new building for a combination company on E. 14th st. near Kings highway and on additions and alterations to quarters of Engine Cos. 111, 115, 136 and 138, contracts for the work at the last two mentioned buildings having been awarded during the quarter.

Plans and specifications have been completed for additions and alterations to Headquarters Building, Repair Shops and Hospital and Training Stables, and Engine Co. 156 and for repairs and betterments at quarters of Engine Cos. 121, 143 and 144 and Hook and Ladder Cos. 56, 57 and 69, all in the Borough of Brooklyn, and the preparation of plans has been begun for improving, permanently bettering and equipping quar-

ters of Engine Co. 162, Long Island City, Borough of Queens. Repairs and betterments have been completed or are in progress at the Hospital and Training Stables and at 22 other department buildings in the Borough of Brooklyn and at 5 in the Borough of Queens. The work of making repairs to steam heating apparatus and asphalt floors at various company quarters in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens is in progress. During the third quarter contract was completed for erecting new building for quarters of Engine Co. 163 and Hook and Ladder Co. 67, Borough of Queens.

Horses.

At the close of the third quarter there were 833 horses in service in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond and 681 in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, a total of 1,514.

Contracts.

Contracts executed during the quarter call for an expenditure of \$74,967.01; agreements for architect's services to \$16,404.73, and agreements to furnish supplies based upon proposals amounting to less than \$1,000, to \$11,032.95. Contracts awarded, but which had not been executed at the close of the quarter amounted to \$157,680.45. Contract orders issued during the third quarter for the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond numbered 163, amounting to \$61,371.06, and for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens 73, amounting to \$40,916.41, being 236 of such orders in all, aggregating \$102,287.47. Open market orders for the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond for the same period numbered 420, amounting to \$28,235.97, and in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens to 300, amounting to \$33,684.56, being 720 of such orders in all, aggregating \$61,920.53.

BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

(Received at City Record Office December 15, 1910.)

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held in the office of Mr. Sachs, 60 Wall st., on Monday, October 3, 1910, at 2 o'clock. Present, Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. O'Keefe, Paulding, Robbins, Sachs and Stern, Trustees; and Mr. Drummond, Commissioner of Public Charities. Excused, Mr. Farley.

The minutes of the meeting of September 20, a copy of which had been sent to each member, were held as read and approved.

Bills amounting to \$38,290.14, were presented for approval.

Dr. W. H. Smith, the General Medical Superintendent, submitted a report prepared by Dr. O'Hanlon, the Assistant Medical Superintendent, as follows:

In the matter of condition of floors at Harlem Hospital, I would report some progress. We are at present having the floor of one ward scraped, and shall await its completion before deciding whether it is advisable to attempt this work with our own employees or to engage the services of some floor-polishing concern.

In regard to the communication from the State Charities Aid Association in the matter of fire protection, etc., at Bellevue Hospital, I would say that it seems impossible to learn anything definite regarding an appropriation made several years ago for the closing of certain openings in the walls of the cellar and garret of the main building. Mr. Harkins is of the opinion that the firm who had this contract failed. This is really the only information that I am able to obtain. Work is now progressing in the matter of putting the present fire alarm system into working order, and it will be a matter of only a short time before this will be completed. Some of the watchman's boxes to which reference is made as being incorrectly located have been changed, and with only two or three exceptions, the Watchman must now pass through the room before being able to register at these boxes. A request for the installation of an independent water supply for fire protection at this hospital was reported upon adversely by the Engineering Bureau of the Department of Finance. The other matters in the report for which the Fire Department of the City is responsible have been referred to them for report. The fire alarm system installed in Pavilions A and B has not been connected, and the only means of alarm in case of fire is by telephone. The pathological building is still without water.

The appointment of special Nurses reported by the General Medical Superintendent was approved.

The question of the condition of the floors at Harlem Hospital was continued with the General Medical Superintendent.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to secure estimates for the closing of the openings in the walls of the cellar and garret of Bellevue Hospital referred to in the report of the State Charities Aid Association, and to present them at next meeting; and it was

Resolved, To continue the report of the State Charities Aid Association in the hands of the General Medical Superintendent for further investigation and such action as is necessary to secure a report from the Fire Department and the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. It was verbally reported by the General Medical Superintendent that the fire alarm system installed in Pavilions A and B would, within a few days, be connected with the system now being repaired in the main building of Bellevue Hospital.

The General Medical Superintendent presented lists of changes in help at Bellevue Hospital for the four weeks ending August 20, 27, September 3 and 10, and, as these had already been reviewed by the Committee on Officers and Employees, it was

The President reported that he had received communications from Judge Barlow and from Chief City Magistrate McAdoo relative to the commitment of women to hospitals under the new court law, in which it was stated that all commitments are now stamped "workhouse hospital." It would therefore appear that no more prisoners will be sent to Bellevue Hospital under this law, at least for the present time.

A communication dated October 1 was received from R. F. Almirall, submitting approximate itemized estimates in connection with the enlarging of the balconies at Fordham Hospital. This communication was referred to the President and Mr. Robbins with power.

A communication dated September 30 was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, directing that a statement be prepared showing the appropriations and accompanying schedules for the Budget allowance of 1911 revised and reduced below the departmental allowance for 1910 to an amount not more than \$1,027,854.45 or ten per cent. less than the original appropriations granted for 1910. After discussion and the consideration of statements made by the General Medical Superintendent and the President of the Board, it was

Resolved, That the communication which had been prepared for transmission to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on this subject be approved and the President authorized to sign and forward it to that Board.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital held on September 27 were presented, and, on motion, duly seconded and carried, the recommendation that Dr. Lombardi be appointed Instructor in Anaesthesia at \$750 per annum was approved; the nomination of Dr. Henry G. Wincor was referred to the Conference Committee; the complaint in regard to the laboratory service was referred to the General Medical Superintendent and the Director of Laboratories; the petition of the house staff relative to the ambulance service was considered, and as the difficulty referred to therein had arisen through the establishment of the twenty months' service, it was

Resolved, To request the Medical Board to consider whether it would not be advisable to return to the old system and to make the service of internes twenty-four months instead of twenty; and it was further

Resolved, pending a decision on this question, To approve of the proposal that the second juniors be allowed to take transfers.

Two forms of assignment by A. L. Alldridge & Company, one to the David M. Olshar Iron Works in the amount of \$311.32, and one to John C. Duffy in the amount of \$430 were presented, and it was

Resolved, To approve these assignments.

A communication dated September 27 was received from the Department of Finance, stating that there were grades and positions now on the payroll which did not appear to have been established under section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, and also giving a list of the positions provided for in the departmental estimate for 1911, for which no grades had been established. This communication was referred to the President with power to take the necessary steps to request the establishment of the grades of positions referred to.

A communication dated September 30 was received from McKim, Mead & White, submitting an estimate received from the P. J. Carlin Construction Co. for installing in the new boiler house a scale of three-ton capacity at an estimated cost of \$775. Upon the recommendation of the Building Committee it was resolved to accept this estimate.

A communication dated September 19 was received from the Department of Finance, stating that after January 1, 1911, all expenditures must be made by the particular department and for the specific purpose indicated in the budget whether corporate stock, revenue bonds, or current appropriation funds.

A communication dated September 20 was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, modifying the salary schedules for 1910, and also transferring the sums of \$1,320 and \$1,020 involved therein.

A communication dated September 19 was received from the Department of Finance requesting information in regard to the tests of the plumbing work in the Pathological Department and men's dormitory installed by the Wells & Newton Co. Communications received from the architects were also presented, under date of September 21 and 27, in reference thereto. The President submitted a copy of a report which he had forwarded to the Comptroller on September 28 based on these communications, and on motion, duly seconded and carried, the action of the President was approved.

A communication dated September 30 was received from Gerald J. Barry, transmitting the thanks of the widow and relatives of the late John J. Barry for the resolutions adopted by the Board of Trustees.

Reports were submitted from the Supervising Nurses of each of the allied hospitals relative to the weighing of supplies in those institutions, and a verbal statement was made by the General Medical Superintendent in regard to the practice at Bellevue Hospital; it was

Resolved, To submit a report of the investigation in this matter to the Department of Finance.

The General Medical Superintendent submitted a statement of the actual economies or reduced cost of government of the department during the first six months of the current year and an estimate of the economies or reductions in administrative cost for the last six months of 1910, which he had prepared in compliance with a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted on July 1, 1910. The President referred to the advisability of employing a man permanently in the Department to construct, repair, and take care of the awnings. This suggestion was referred to the General Medical Superintendent.

It was resolved to renew the request to the Commissioners of Accounts to conduct a quarterly audit of the books of the Department.

The General Medical Superintendent submitted a communication which he had received from the Corporation Counsel relative to the disposition of subpoena fees received in the Department, and recommended that in accordance therewith all fees paid to officers and employees of this Department, other than members of the house staff, when subpoenaed as witnesses pursuant to subpoenas served upon them which call for attendance at court to testify upon matters in connection with their official duties or for the production of hospital records, be placed in a fund to be used for various charitable purposes. The recommendation of the General Medical Superintendent was approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, these questions were referred to a committee consisting of Mr. Paulding, Mr. O'Keefe, and the General Medical Superintendent, for recommendation and report.

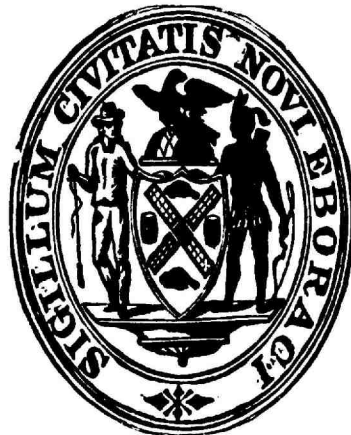

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furnishings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs of adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
