AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of The City of New York and the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and for other purposes, and to levy taxes on the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation in The City of New York, pursuant to law, in and for the year 1912.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, the sum of one hundred and thirty-nine million nine hundred and one thousand two hundred and ninety-four dollars and eighty-one cents (\$139,901,294.81), to pay the expenses included in the Budget for the year 1912, for conducting the public business of The City of New York in each Department and branch thereof, including principal and interest of the City debt, and an amount provided for deficiencies in taxes, pursuant to chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, amounting in the aggregate to one hundred and eighty-one million ninety thousand two hundred and fifty-six dollars and fifty-one cents (\$181,090,256.51), remaining after deducting therefrom the sum of ten million two hundred and seventeen thousand one hundred and fifty-four dollars and eight cents (\$10,217,154.08), being the aggregate of the county charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, included therein, which sum is hereinafter levied and imposed upon said counties in the manner provided by section 902 of the Greater New York Charter; and after also deducting the sum of thirty million nine hundred and seventy-one thousand eight hundred and seven dollars and sixty-two cents (\$30,971,807.62), supplied by the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, as stated by the Comptroller of The City of New York in a communication dated February 15, 1912, transmitting his certificates of the amount of the appropriations made for the year 1912, copies of which communication and certificates and of the said Budget are as follows:

City of New York, Department of Finance, Comptroller's Office, February 15, 1912.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—Section 900 of the amended Greater New York Charter, provides as follows:

900. For the purpose of enabling the board of aldermen to impose the annual taxes it shall be the duty of the comptroller of said city to prepare and submit to said board, at least two weeks before the first day of March in each and every year, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the corporation of the city of New York, as hereby constituted, or for city purposes within said city as created by this act, and purposes for which said city is liable, and on account of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the city treasury during the then current year from all the sources of revenue of the general funds, including surplus revenue from the sinking funds of the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York and of any of the municipal and public corporations, or parts of municipal and public corporations by this act consolidated with the municipal corporation known as the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, other than the surplus of revenues of any such sinking funds for the payment of interest on the city debt of the municipal corporation known as the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, or the like debts of the municipal and public corporations by this act consolidated as aforesaid, and the said board of aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which, by law, it is required to order and cause to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax only the balance of such aggregate amount after making such deductions.

Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the Comptroller to the Board of Aldermen, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the County officers and the other County charges and expenses in the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, and the Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said Counties, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of County officers and other County charges and expenses of such County; to the end that each of said Counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the County for County as distinguished from City purposes."

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of law, I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Body, statement as follows:

First: The Budget in detail, for the year 1912.

Second: The amount of County charges and expenses in the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, included in said budget, as well as the amount of County charges and expenses paid during the year 1911 from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, which amounts together are to be raised respectively, by levy upon taxable property within each of said Counties, as provided by Section 902 of the Charter.

Third: The estimated receipts of the General Fund of The City of New York applicable to the reduction of taxation.

Second—That no change shall be made by any Board or head of an Office, Bureau or Department in the City or County Governments in the schedules of "Salaries, Regular Employees"; "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees"; "Fees" or "Compensation," herein contained, except when authorized thereto by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that no requests for changes shall be considered except as follows:

(a). In the case of schedules or appropriations of "Salaries, Regular Employees," where the proposed change will not increase the amounts expendable in any month to more than one-twelfth the total amount herein appropriated for "Salaries, Regular Employees."

(b). In the case of schedules or appropriations of "Wages, Regular Employees," where the proposed change will not increase the amounts expendable in any week to more than one fifty-second of the total amount herein appropriated for "Wages, Regular Employees."

Third—That in case of modifications of schedules or transfers within appropriations classified as "Personal Service," where one of the appropriations is a Tax Levy Part appropriation, the full amount of cash necessary to pay the total salaries or wages of the incumbents transferred for the balance of the year 1912 shall be transferred to the appropriation to which the incumbents are transferred.

Fourth—(a). That the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Governments shall prepare their several payrolls for audit by the Department of Finance in accordance with the items of the aforesaid schedules, entitled "Salaries, Regular Employees"; "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees"; "Fees" or "Compensation" or in case these items have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in accordance with the items of the schedules as changed, and that no payroll shall be passed by the Department of Finance unless the incumbents and the rate of individual compensation agree with such schedule lines as originally adopted or as hereafter modified by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

(b). That each and every payroll shall be accompanied by a recapitulation showing the exact amount expended to and including said payroll for every item appearing on the schedules supporting any of the appropriations against which all or any part of the moneys involved in said payrolls is to be charged, and that this recapitulation shall contain the full schedules supporting any such appropriations or in case these schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the full schedules as changed.

(c). That each payroll of any Department, in addition to any other departmental number, shall be numbered during the year serially, beginning with number one for each specific account, and such payroll shall bear a certificate signed by a person cognizant of the fact, stating that the recapitulation attached thereto is the correct recapitulation for the payroll bearing said number.

(d). That in all instances where changes in schedule items have been made by twelve votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, all sums which have been expended against such schedule items as are changed shall be apportioned against the new lines in the same ratio as the new totals of the schedule items bear to the old totals.

(e). That on all payrolls against schedules entitled "Salaries, Regular Employees," and "Wages, Regular Employees," there shall be set forth the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules, or in case the items on such schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules as changed.

(f). That there shall be affixed to all payrolls a certificate made by the person preparing such payroll to the effect that there is a time record on file in said Board, Office, Bureau or Department, certified by the person or persons having knowledge of the facts, showing the character of service and the exact time of employment of such person or persons on said payrolls, and that the distribution or division of the time of such person or persons as shown on such payrolls is in accordance with such time record.

—be it further

Resolved, That wherever an appropriation under any classification other than "Personal Service" or "Supplies and Materials" is supported by a schedule, all expenditures against such appropriation shall be made in accordance with such schedule and no voucher shall be passed by the Department of Finance for a sum exceeding the amount shown in said schedule, except when such schedule shall have been changed by twelve votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Governments shall transmit to the Department of Finance on the first day of each month, or as soon thereafter as possible, a statement showing, firstly, the aggregate liabilities incurred against such schedules for which vouchers have been transmitted to the Department of Finance, and, secondly, all additional liabilities incurred against such schedules for which vouchers have not as yet been transmitted.

—be it further

Resolved, That wherever an appropriation under the classification of "Supplies and Materials" is supported by a schedule, such schedule shall be conclusive as to the amount allowed for each function or subdivision, and the heads of departments shall submit to the Department of Finance on the first day of each month, or as soon thereafter as possible, a statement showing the amount of supplies and materials consumed the previous month chargeable against each supporting schedule line of the appropriation for "Supplies and Materials," which monthly amount in the aggregate, shall not exceed the amount specified in the schedule, unless modified by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

—be it further

Resolved, That all appropriations under a classification other than "Personal Service," to any Board, Office, Bureau or Department of the City or County Governments, made in this Budget, be made under the following conditions:

First—That, in so far as practicable, all contracts and open market orders for purchases to be charged against such appropriation shall be based upon specifications which are definite and certain as to character and quality, and which conform with standard specifications for the various classes of supplies, materials, fuel and forage hereafter to be promulgated by this Board.

Second—That, in so far as such standard specifications may hereafter be established by this Board, the Comptroller at the time of certifying as to the sufficiency of appropriations out of which such contracts are to be paid shall also certify that the specifications for such supplies or materials, fuel or forage or other articles for which standard specifications have been prescribed, are in conformance with such standard specifications.

Third—That all open market orders issued by any Department for supplies or materials, from which standard specifications shall have been prescribed, shall contain a description of the goods ordered, conforming with such standard specifications.

Fourth—That the Comptroller shall, in auditing claims for goods delivered on open market orders, determine, through inspection or otherwise, whether the goods delivered conform with such standard specifications; be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with section 56 of the Greater New York Charter:

First—That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules under the classification, "Personal Service," and entitled "Salaries, Regular Employees," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and twelve be established in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments for the number of incumbents shown in said schedules, except that in all cases where a position or grade of position has previously been established for an unlimited number of incumbents, or for a number of incumbents greater than the number shown in said schedule, nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to reduce the number of incumbents previously authorized.

Second—That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules under the classification "Personal Service" and entitled "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees" and "Compensation," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and twelve be established in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments.

Third—Nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to nullify or abolish any position or grade of position in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments which has been previously established, but which does not appear in the schedules entitled "Salaries, Regular Employees"; "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees," and "Compensation," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and twelve.

THE CITY OF NEW YORK.
FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

Conditions Governing Payments to Charitable Institutions.

All appropriations made in this Budget for the use of charitable institutions are hereby declared subject to the following conditions, and the acceptance of a payment of money made from the City treasury, in pursuance of these appropriations, shall be deemed to be an acceptance by such institutions of the conditions under which the appropriations are herein made:

1. The accounts and records of all institutions shall be so kept as to show the receipts of the institution from all sources, and all its expenditures, and shall in other respects be in such form as the Comptroller of The City of New York may require, except that a record shall be maintained in which expenses shall be recorded under the following classification:

- A. Expenses incurred in the operation of the institution as follows:
 - a. Food stuffs.
 - b. Clothing.
 - c. Linen and bedding.
 - d. Fuel.
 - e. Magazines and newspapers.
 - f. Educational supplies.
 - g. Other supplies.
 - h. Salaries and wages.
 - i. Professional services.
 - j. Light.
 - k. Forage and care of animals.
 - l. Telephone.
 - m. Printing, stationery and advertising.
 - n. Postage and telegrams.
 - o. Hospital and sanitarium charges.
 - p. Funerals.
 - q. Recreation expense.
 - r. Miscellaneous expense.
 - s. Expense for boarded-out children.
- B. Expenses incurred in the maintenance of plant and equipment, as follows:
 - a. Repairs and renewals of plant and fixed equipment.
 - b. Repairs and renewals of furniture and movable equipment.

All accounts of institutions shall, so far as practicable, be kept on an income and expense basis.

2. All payments made to charitable institutions in pursuance of the following appropriations shall be used by such institutions only for the recurring expenses incurred by the institution for the care, support, maintenance and education of inmates duly committed by the courts or the Commissioner of Charities or accepted by the Commissioner as public charges. Expenses for care, support and maintenance as herein used shall be taken to mean all expenses incurred by the institution for food, clothing, attendance upon, medical service to, and other expenses properly incurred in behalf of inmates committed or accepted by the City, as shown in the classification set forth in Condition 1 governing these appropriations. Such expenses shall not include any expense incurred for improvements or additions to plant or equipment, nor insurance, taxes, rent, interest on loans or mortgages, or repayments of the principal thereof. Recurring expenses for education shall be taken to mean expenses incurred in providing suitable education for properly committed or accepted inmates, and shall include the salaries of instructors, and expenses incurred for supplies for use in instruction.

3. All institutions receiving payments of public moneys in pursuance of appropriations made in this Budget and all their books of record and all their accounts relating to all institutional funds, from whatsoever source received, shall at all reasonable times be open to the visitation, inspection and examination of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Finance and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The Department of Public Charities shall be deemed to have the right to visit and inspect any institution receiving City funds at any time whatsoever and at all proper times have access to all the records of such institution.

4. All institutions shall in each year, at a time to be designated by the Comptroller, submit in a manner and form prescribed by him, a statement of their financial operations, and they shall state specifically in their printed annual reports the amount of money received by them from the City treasury.

5. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable institution, he shall, in his discretion, suspend payments and give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease making further payments, and, upon the determination of said board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon end.

6. Where apportionments are made to private charitable institutions upon a per capita basis of payment for services to inmates, the bills of the institutions for such services shall show the names of the inmates and the period of service for which payment is claimed, and no payment shall be made for any inmate who has not been accepted by the Commissioner of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City. Except in emergency cases the Commissioner of Public Charities shall not accept as proper charges persons capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in the public hospitals. No case shall be regarded as an emergency case unless there shall have been made a certificate to that effect by a properly authorized and informed representative of the institution by which such case was received.

7. The City shall not be liable for any claim for services rendered committed inmates by any charitable institution which shall be in excess of the amount apportioned to such institution in this Budget, notwithstanding the acceptance of the Commissioner of Public Charities, or any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for various classes of inmates thereof.

8. No money shall be paid to any institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business

dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its board of managers.

9. Child-caring institutions not sending their inmates to the public schools, and not sharing in the corporate school fund, and not receiving Teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions for five (5) hours daily for a period equal to the public school year, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of five years of age and over, except that for abnormal or atypical children a special ruling may be made by the Comptroller. Institutions receiving a per capita allowance for the education of their inmates shall be under the general supervision of the Board of Education, as required by the general conditions relating to institutions receiving corporate school money, as provided in section 1154 of the Charter of The City of New York.

10. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City, and no money will be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children, under the supervision of the State Board of Charities and placed in this Budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

11. All child-caring institutions shall maintain for each inmate accepted as a public charge by the Commissioner of Charities a complete physical and health record in which shall be recorded the name, age, sex, height and weight, time of admission, general physical condition, including the presence or absence of defects in eyesight, breathing, teeth or any organic defect, in a manner to conform as nearly as practicable with the records maintained by the Department of Health for children in the public schools of The City of New York.

All such institutions shall examine and make a record of the physical condition of each of their inmates for whose care or education City money is received, at least once in every six months, noting the presence or absence of defects, as stated in the preceding paragraph of this condition.

12. All child-caring institutions shall submit quarterly to the Comptroller and to the Commissioner of Charities, and often if required, a sworn statement of the dietary actually employed for the feeding of their inmates for the preceding quarterly period, together with a statement of the approximate quantities of each kind of food allowed each inmate.

13. Each institution shall submit to the Comptroller on forms prescribed by him notice of all persons, for whose care City or county funds are received, within twenty-four hours after their arrival at or discharge from the institution.

14. Any person hawking, peddling, vending or selling merchandise in the streets of The City of New York shall be deemed to be a peddler, and shall be classified as follows: A peddler using a horse and wagon, a peddler using a push cart, and a peddler carrying merchandise in business; but the selling of newspapers or periodicals in the street is not hereby regulated in any way; but any such peddler as herein described shall not stand or offer his merchandise for sale or sell his merchandise within five hundred feet of any public school in the 59th Aldermanic District of The City of New York, as now constituted, between the hours of 8 and 9 in the forenoon, 12 and 1 and 3 and 4 in the afternoon, except on Saturday, and any person violating this section shall be deemed guilty of a minor offense and liable to a fine of not more than \$25 or less than \$2, or to imprisonment for a term of not more than ten days or both.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.



Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested in him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or to the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited.
