PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract, made and executed in duplicate this day between The City of New York (hereinafter called the "City"), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the "Board"), and the New York and North Shore Traction Company (hereinafter called the "Company"), party of the second part, witnesseth:

Whereas, By a contract dated February 1, 1909, the Company was authorized to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway from the former Village of Flushing, Borough of Queens, to the boundary line between The City of New York and the County of Nassau; and

Whereas, By a second contract dated April 14, 1909, the Company was authorized to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway from the former Village of Flushing to the former Village of Whitestone, Borough of Queens; and

Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited.
