EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

Papers relative to the removal and appointment of Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction.

Reasons for Removal.

MAYOR'S OFFICE,
NEW YORK, December 22, 1874.

His Excellency JOHN A. DIX,
Governor of the State of New York:

SIR—I transmit to you herewith, my certificate of removal of James Bowen and Myer Stern, from the office of Commissioners of Charities and Correction of the City of New York.

The cause of removal is, as stated in the certificate, criminal violation of duty on the part of said Commissioners.

My reasons for this removal are as follows:

1st. In November, 1873, William M. Tweed was convicted in the Court of Oyer and Terminer, held in and for the City and County of New York, of a misdemeanor, and sentenced for a term of imprisonment in the Penitentiary on Blackwell's Island. This prison is under the care of the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction. A few days after Tweed was transferred to the Penitentiary he was permitted to put aside the prison dress, which all other prisoners were compelled to wear, and to dress in ordinary clothing. The prison dress he has not since worn. He is allowed the use of a room not in the prison proper, situated above the main entrance one stair up. This room he has furnished almost entirely at his own expense. He is not confined to his room, being at liberty to leave it through the day when he pleases. He performs no duty, is in excellent health, requires no medical attendance, none of the prison physicians having visited him for the last four months. He walks in the grounds surrounding the prison without restraint. He does not receive his meals as other prisoners, but at the residence of the Warden which is about a quarter of a mile distant from the prison, and to the Warden's residence Tweed goes three times each day at the usual meal hours. He takes these walks alone or in company of a keeper. He is permitted to receive all visitors he desires. No visitors are permitted to see him whom he does not wish to see. He receives visitors daily. He has a private secretary who has free access to him at all hours of the day, and with whom he passes considerable time. In short, Tweed is not treated as a prisoner, but as a guest, necessitated through force of circumstances to pass some time on the island, the officials of which are determined to make his stay among them as pleasant and agreeable as possible.

The Commissioner principally responsible for this criminal violation of duty is Mr. Myer Stern. It was on his instructions Tweed was allowed to put aside the prison dress and to wear ordinary clothing; and all the indulgences enjoyed by Tweed have been allowed with the sanction of Mr. Stern. I do not consider it necessary to determine whether these indulgences have been purchased by Tweed, or whether they have been extended to him for other considerations. I am, however, of opinion, on a review of the evidence, that Tweed pays for the privileges he is allowed.

Whatever the arrangements were which secured to Tweed these privileges, Mr. Stern was a party thereto.

Mr. Bowen informed me that he has not seen Tweed since the latter was sent to Blackwell's Island. This I have no doubt is correct, but I cannot see how Mr. Bowen is thereby relieved from the responsibilities which rest upon him. In this matter of Tweed, the omission by Mr. Bowen to act was a criminal violation of his duty. The subject was repeatedly brought officially to the notice of Mr. Bowen, but he omits to ascertain for himself the facts and remedy the matter complained of. He sustains by his vote and action

Mr. Stern, and I cannot therefore relieve him from responsibility. I consider the acts of both Commissioners were a criminal violation of duty on their part, for which they ought to be removed from office.

2d. In the administration of the affairs of the Department of Public Charities and Correction there have been repeated violations of the provisions of law in purchasing the supplies required by the Department, the particulars of which are set forth in a report made by the Commissioners of Accounts, on the 27th day of August last, now on file in this office. The restrictions of law as to purchasing supplies were disregarded and the Books of the Department altered for the purpose of deception. Purchases exceeding a thousand dollars in value were repeatedly made, the bills altered so as to represent purchases under a thousand dollars, and entries made on the books of the Department corresponding to the alterations.

These transactions were to the prejudice of the city. The prices for the supplies exceeded what they could have been purchased for, and in one transaction alone, where Mr. Myer Stern purchased goods through a relative of a member of his family, the relative, on a purchase of \$3,847.93, received a commission of \$914.95.

As a result of the system adopted and so persistently followed in the Department, as to the purchase of supplies, I know that, in one instance at least, a merchant was only allowed the custom of the Department after he had seen a son of Mr. Myer Stern, and, through a middle-man, had agreed to pay such middle-man, five per cent. on the purchases made; and that after some time the purchases were discontinued, because the merchant would not increase his price for the goods and pay corresponding with such increase a corresponding increase of commissions.

I do not say that these or such like transactions were known to the Commissioners, but if, through the instrumentality of a son of one of the Commissioners, such things could be carried into effect, I am satisfied that it is a result of the illegal system which has been adopted and continued by the Commissioners.

The action of the Commissioners, in violation of law, in relation to the purchase of supplies, I consider in its effect a criminal violation of duty on the part of the Commissioners, requiring their removal from office.

MY DEAR SIR—In the discharge of the duties of the office I have the honor to hold, I have found it necessary to remove Mr. James Bowen and Mr. Myer Stern, Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction.

Mr. William Laimbeer, the third Commissioner, has resigned, and his resignation is part of the records of this office.

Considering the circumstances under which I was so unexpectedly called upon to occupy the position of Chief Magistrate of the City, the near approach of the expiration of the term I have to serve, and recognizing the fact that you are the elected of the people to succeed me in the Mayoralty, and responsible under the law for the future government of the City, it is, in my opinion due to you, not only that I should consult you as to the Commissioners who should be appointed, but that you should name the persons to be appointed in the place of those removed.
