It shall not evolve an inflammable vapor at a temperature below one hundred (100) degrees of

the Fahrenheit thermometer.

Action of the Board on Tenement House Plans.

The following plans for light and ventilation of tenement houses were approved by the Board upon the conditions specified in the several permits granted:

Plan No. 825 for one six-story house, 50 feet by 85 feet, on a lot 50 feet by 100 feet, on the south side of Fifty-sixth street, 475 feet west of Eighth avenue, to be occupied by twelve families.

Plan No. 826 for one four-story house, 20 feet by 54 feet, on a lot 20 feet by 75 feet, 10 inches on the north side of One Hundred and Fifteenth street, 75 feet east of First avenue, to be occupied

Plan No. 827 for three four-story houses, each 25 feet by 57 feet, on lots each 25 feet by 75 feet, on the east side of First avenue, beginning on the northeast corner of One Hundred and Fifteenth street, each house to be occupied by seven families.

Plan No. 828 for eight four-story houses, each 52 feet deep by 20 feet 11 inches and 20 feet respectively, on lots of the same width respectively, and 100 feet deep, 5 on the east side of Lexington avenue, beginning on the southeast corner of One Hundred and Ninth street, and 3 on the south side of One Hundred and Ninth street, beginning 65 feet east of Lexington avenue, each of said houses to be occupied by four families.

Plan No. 829 for four four-story houses, each 18 feet 9 inches by 52 feet, on lots each 18 teet 9 inches by 100 feet, on the north side of One Hundred and Ninth street, beginning 80 feet east of Fourth avenue, each house to be occupied by four families.

Plan No. 830 for twelve four-story houses, each 18 feet 9 inches by 52 feet, with an extension 11 feet wide and 20 feet deep, on lots each 18 feet 9 inches by 100 feet 8 inches, on the south side of Ninety-fourth street, beginning 110 feet west of Third avenue, each house to be occupied by four

Plan No. 831 for one four-story house 25 feet by 58 feet, with an extension 15 feet wide and 11 feet deep, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, on the north side of Seventy-eighth street, 219 feet west of Avenue A, to be occupied by nine families.

Plan No. 832 for one five-story house 25 feet by 62 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 91 feet, at No. Sixth street, to be occupied by families. 615 Sixth street, to be occupied by

Plan No. 833 for one four-story house 25 feet by 53 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, at No. 1441 Third avenue, to be occupied by six families.

Plan Disapproved.

Plan No. 834 for a five-story tenement-house, proposed to be built on the north side of Thirty-fourth street, 150 feet west of Seventh avenue, was disapproved by the Board.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 5, 1881. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,337, as follows, viz.:

1 public building, 668 tenement-houses, 74 private dwellings, 57 other dwellings, 8 manufactories and workshops, 19 stores and warehouses, 23 stables, 1 lime-kiln, 14 slaughter-houses, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 2 lodging-houses, 3 gas-mains, 1 soap factory, 21 sunken and vacant lots, 3 uninhabitable dwellings, 25 yards, courts, and areas, 75 cellars and basements, 190 waste pipes and drains, 123 privies and water-closets, 3 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 8 dangerous stairways, 2 smoky chimneys, 6 cesspools, 7 other nuisances, together with 4 special visits to cases of contaginus disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 550.

During the past week 144 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were granted to the consignees of 25 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

53 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 120 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 112 houses, 112 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

15 cases of contagious diseases were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

## Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 479 births, 49 still-births, 170 marriages, and 718 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, February 5, 1881; this shows a decrease of 100 births, and an increase of 2 still-births, and 11 deaths, and the same number of marriages, (170), when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1880, there was a decrease of 44 births and 52 marriages, and an increase of 197 deaths, the same number of still-births (49), being reported. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 4; scarlatina, 5; croup, 4; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 7; cancer, 1; bronchitis, 7; pneumonia, 14; heart diseases, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 6; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 6; meningitis and encephalitis, 5; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; and suicide 3; while the deaths from measles, increased 1; diphtheria 9; erysipelas, 2; puerperal diseases, 7; diarrheeal diseases, 10; inanition, 6; alcoholism, 5; rheumatism and gout, 4; phthisis pulmonalis, 12; aneurism, 2; convulsions, 10; apoplexy, 9; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 16; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 6; and drowning, 1. The number of deaths from whooping-cough, malarial fevers, and premature and preternatural births, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 127 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 201 under two years; 206 under five years, and 47 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 3 less than the number reported during last week, and represent 41.23 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 123 were in institutions, 402 in tenement-houses, 173 in houses containing three families or less, 14 in hotels and boarding-houses, 4 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 12 were on the basement floor, 147 on the first, 193 on the second, 134 on the third, 74 on the fourth, 29 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth. 713 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 5 non-residents. 66 were stated to be single, 196 married, 81 widowed, and the condition of 375 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 718; still-births, 49; bodies in transitu, 13. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 65 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 479 births, 170 marriages, 49 still-births, 718 deaths, 13 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 82 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 3 transcripts of the birth record, 5 of marriage, and 29 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending February 5, 1881, was 14.1 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.067, the mean humidity was 91, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,641, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.20 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 667 deaths and still-births, or 88.96 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 21; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 280; City, pauper burial ground (undenominational), 71; Greenwood (undenominational), 43; Lutheran, (undenominational), 96; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 23; Evergreen (undenominational), 64; Woodlawn (undenominational), 24; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 11; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 8; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 11; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 4; Washington (undenominational), 8.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending January 29, 1881, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 8; Second, 1; Third, 5; Fourth, 11; Fifth, 11; Sixth, 19; Seventh, 26; Eighth, 24; Ninth, 27; Tenth, 30; Eleventh, 38; Twelfth, 62; Thirteenth, 24; Fourteenth, 13; Fifteenth, 16; Sixteenth, 30; Seventeenth, 42; Eighteenth, 40; Nineteenth, 95; Twentieth, 30; Twenty-first, 54; Twenty-second, 50; Twenty-third, 13; Twenty-fourth, 2.

The actual mortality for the week ending January 29, 1881, was 671; this is 142 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1880, and 152.8 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 28.92 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,206,577.

SIR—There were 718 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, February 5, 1881, which is an increase of 11, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 197 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1880. The actual mortality for the week ending January 29, 1881, was 671, which is 152.8 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 28.92 per 1,000 persons living, the population, according to the last U. S. Census, being 1,206,577.

An Act in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-inch the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.
