REPORTED MORTALITY * for the week ending July 10, 1886, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending July 3, 1886.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register : SIR—There were 1,111 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, July 10, 1886, which is an increase of 359, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 191 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1885. The actual mortality for the week ending July 3, 1886, was 783, which is 58.2 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 28.28 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,439,272.


