DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held July 2, 1884.

Present—The full Board, and E. Grant Marsh, representing the Comptroller of the City.

The Board proceeded to open the bids advertised for to be opened this day at 12 o'clock M., for dredging at the bulkhead south of 'Pier, old 54, North river, at Pier 60, East river, and other places.

Two estimates were received for doing the said work:

The minutes of the meetings held June 12th, 13th, 16th, 20th, 25th and 27th, ultimo, were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read, and, On motion, laid on the table to await action, as stated, to wit:
From August Braun—Requesting permission to locate and maintain Swimming School and Bath, foot of Sixty-fifth street, East river. Referred to the Treasurer with power. Secretary directed to request Mr. Braun to call on the Treasurer and bring with him a statement of the dimensions, size, etc., of the said bath.

From John A. Bouker—Requesting the use of one hundred feet on the south side of Pier 29, East river, and fifty feet of the bulkhead, for the purpose of placing a float thereat.

From Engineer-in-Chief—Report on Secretary's Order, No. 3569, as to the condition of and repairs required to Pier, foot of Thirty-eighth street, North river.

From Sigismund Beer, agent for Alfred E. Beach, alleged owner of certain six plots of land under water, situate on Ward's Island, in the Twelfth Ward—Requesting permission to build a crib work bulkhead, and to fill in behind the same, upon plans to be approved by the Board.

The following communications were received, read, and, On motion placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Counsel to the Corporation:

1st. Requesting Department to furnish him with the lease of Piers, new 44 and 45, North river, and requesting information as to the nature of the structure erected on the bulkhead south of Pier, new 45, North river, by the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company, the lessees of the said premises. The action of the Secretary in furnishing the desired information was approved.

2d. Returning the contract for building Pier, new 27, North river, and November 1, 1875, and stating that on the trial of the case it had been decided in favor of the defendants; and requesting that credit be given on the books of the Department for the amount of the claim as against any charge heretofore made of the same to the Law Department.

4th. Requesting Department to furnish him with three copies of a map of the lands and premises between Sixtleth and Sixty-fifth streets, North river, lessed to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to prepare diagram of the said premises, and the Secretary to transmit the same to the Counsel to the Corporation.

5th. Enclosing copies of the contract for dredging at sundry named places on the North and East rivers, with his approval endorsed thereon.

6th. Enclosing summons to be served on Wm. H. Wood, in suits for \$1,562.50 and \$51.71 commenced against him, and requesting to be informed when the service of said summons is made. Secretary directed to endeavor to serve the said papers.

7th. Enclosing \$25 collected from Henry A. Gaubert, in settlement of suit for violation of the rules adopted by the Board. Secretary directed to acknowledge receipt.

8th. Enclosing \$25 collected from John Neshitir's Sons, for rent of platform at Eightieth street, each summon summer summary of the collected partment:
