

The 779 deaths represent a death-rate of 26.11, as against 24.79 for the previous week, and 25.85 for the corresponding week of 1888. The increase of 40 deaths was mainly due to a increase of 5 deaths each from measles and scarlet fever, of 7 from diarrhoeal diseases, of 13 from diseases of the nervous system, of 7 from diseases of the respiratory system and of 9 from diseases of the digestive system. There was a decrease of 4 in the deaths from diphtheria.

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THE CITY RECORD.

Diphtheria increased in the Seventeenth and Twenty-second Wards, and decreased in the Tenth, Twelfth and Eighteenth Wards. The increase of diarrheeal diseases was greatest in the Twelfth and Twenty-first Wards. There was a marked decrease of scarlet fever in the Seventh Ward, and an increase in the Thirteenth.

It shall be the duty of the physician or phy-sicians, of the officers, managers and of every one who has any duty or office in respect to patients in the course of treatment, or persons who apply for treatment or care it a dispensary or hospital, to see that a report is imme-diately made to the Health Department of the City of New York of every person infected with a contagious disease who comes to their knowledge, and that such person or persons on infected are properly isolated and kept separate from other persons and other patients.  WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.
 WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any yalve or cock of any described, per year, ten dollars
 For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

The returns of arrents of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirma-tion of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature. 4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be unposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful man-ner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective building's or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water. Sth. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, unposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1881, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department. METERS

METERS. Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act r882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be here-after placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public editices, at wharves, ferry-housiness consumption, except private dwellings. It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." * * All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter. Water measured by meter, ten cents prome hundred cubic feet.

out the knowledge or consent of the owners of the prem-ises. The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable the Department to detect and check the useless and un-warrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this ob-ject can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted. Under the law all charges for water supplied througn meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises re-sponsible for the amount of water used or water. Muther applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water benants or occu-pates of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings. Must be accant, and are likely to reman waccant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year. <u>JOHN NEWTON</u>,

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons. All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall *prevent all waste* of water.

connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall *prevent all waste* of water. The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be per-mitted. No horse-troughs o norse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permit date annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant stahding in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed. Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced. Fountauns or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited. The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardewalks, stoops, areas,

saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited. The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this depart-ment may'understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water. Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed. The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.
