

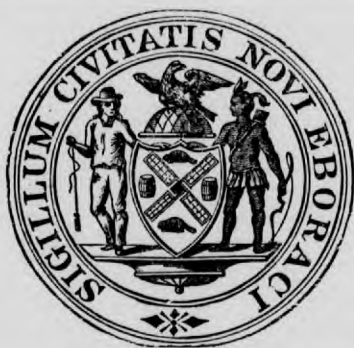

### LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

#### BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

##### SPECIAL SESSION.

MONDAY, November 24, 1879,  
12 o'clock M.

The Board met in their chamber, No. 16 City Hall, pursuant to the following call:

NEW YORK, November 18, 1879.

JACOB M. PATTERSON, Esq., Clerk of Common Council:

SIR—You are hereby directed to notify the members of the Board of Aldermen to meet in Special Session, in the chamber of the Board, in the City Hall, on Monday, the 24th instant, at 12 o'clock M., for the consideration and investigation of the Provisional Estimate for the year 1880, as provided in section 112 of chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

##### MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

On motion of Alderman Morris, the reading of the minutes of the last meeting was dispensed with.

Alderman Morris moved that the Board do now resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, for the consideration of the Provisional Estimate for the year 1880.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

Alderman Sauer was called to the chair.

After some time spent therein, the Committee arose and the President resumed the chair.

Alderman Sauer, Chairman of the Committee of the Whole, reported progress, and asked permission to sit again.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to grant the request.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

##### MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, November 24, 1879.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

I hereby revoke and withdraw the nomination of George B. Deane, Jr., to be Police Justice of the City of New York, which was made by me on the tenth day of November, 1879.

EDWARD COOPER, Mayor.

Alderman Morris moved that his Honor the Mayor be permitted to withdraw the nomination of George B. Deane, Jr., as Police Justice.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, November 24, 1879.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

In pursuance of the statute in such case made and provided, I hereby nominate Jacob M. Patterson, Jr., for appointment, by and with your consent, as a Police Justice of the City of New York, in place of George E. Kasmire, whose term of office has expired.

EDWARD COOPER, Mayor.

Alderman Morris moved the confirmation of the nomination of Jacob M. Patterson, Jr., as a Police Justice.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Burns, Finck, Foster, R. Hall, Haughton, Jacobus, Kenney, Kiernan, Morris, Roberts, Sauer, Sheils, Stewart, and Strack—15.

On motion of Alderman Morris, the Board again went into Committee of the Whole, for the consideration of the Provisional Estimate for the year 1880.

After some time spent therein, the Committee arose and Alderman Morris was called to the chair, the President being absent.

Alderman Sauer, Chairman of the Committee of the Whole, reported as follows:

The Committee of the Whole have had under consideration the Provisional Estimate for the year 1880, and have amended the same by increasing the following appropriations, viz.:

DEPARTMENT OF POLICE—Salaries Clerks, Deputies, Stenographers, etc., increased from \$40,000 to \$60,000.

FIRE DEPARTMENT—Repair Shop pay-roll, increased from \$45,000 to \$50,000.

FIRE DEPARTMENT—Bureau of Chief of Department pay-roll, increased from \$32,700 to \$37,700.

COMMON COUNCIL—Salaries Clerks and officers of the Board of Aldermen, increased from \$10,200 to \$18,000.

Alderman Sauer moved that the report of the Committee be accepted, and the amendments recommended by the Committee adopted.

The President pro tem. put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

The President pro tem. then put the question whether the Board would agree to adopt the Provisional Estimate for the year 1880, as rectified and amended by this Board.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—Aldermen Burns, Finck, Foster, R. Hall, Hyatt, Jacobus, Kenney, Kiernan, Morris, Roberts, Sauer, Stewart, and Strack—13.
